Christian re-elected

Troy Christian was re-elected Tuesday as the Farwell area director on the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District. He was unopposed.

The Tribune didn't carry an article about the forthcoming SWCD election last week because the press release from the SWCD office arrived last Friday - the day after the Tribune was printed.

Well, nobody's perfect...

Before coming to Texas, I spent about 5 years in Virginia - 1 year in Blacksburg, in the southwestern part of the state, and 4 in Woodbridge, near Washington, D.C.

I used to write a daily column then. I only kept a copy of a few of them, and I happened to be going through them the other day when one struck my eye.

Back in 1980 - 12 years ago - I wrote a semi-facetious column about electing federal agency section chiefs.

Being in that governmental area, I was able to see where most of the real power lay - in the hands of the burocracy. That's something very few folks in the U.S. truly understand.

Here's some of what I wrote 12 years back:

"I get a big laugh each time I read a newspaper or watch a TV news show when there's mention of the "big changes" in store when Ronald Reagan takes over the presidency.

"I get another laugh when I read about the new Republican majority in the Senate and what that will mean.

"It all sounds so familiar. Like in 1976, when Jimmy Carter was riding his charger into D.C., ready to reform government. I think his lance got caught.

"Anyway, we're all for government reform and I'm no different. But I don't see big changes coming just because Reagan is in the White House or the Grand Old Party has Senate control. Let's get down to the basics.

"We want change? Okay, let's make the moves which are needed. Let's set up a system where section chiefs in the various federal agencies are elected. Here's what I propose:

"Each federal agency will be responsible to a group of states. For example, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development would be under the auspices of Florida, Delaware and Michigan.

"HUD section chiefs would be listed on the ballot in those areas every two years. Meanwhile, each of the three states would form a committee to annually review the performances of the various section chiefs in HUD. Prior to election, a list of those commended and those noncommended would be given voters.

"To get a commendation. a section chief would have to show how he has saved the taxpayers' money and eliminated waste. If he can't. well... Those section chiefs who don't get 50 percent of the votes cast are then asked to join the private sector."

Anyway, that was part of a half-joking column I wrote in the last month of Carter's presidency. A week later, I got a letter from a federal burocrat, who wrote:

"Your idea to elect federal agency section chiefs isn't as far out as one might think at first reading. Such an idea has been discussed among my co- workers and we all agree that we need a better way to select governmental department and agency heads through other means than political appointment.

Here are the overall totals after 5 weeks of the 12-week contest, with the winner getting the tickets to the Dallas Cowboys - Chicago Bears game:





start with the pups." And that is what he did. He enrolled 25 boys, and using demonstrations, taught them the latest practices in corn

production. The corn show, which was held in a train

caboose at Jacksboro in the fall of 1908, proved Marks' point that farm youth could put into practice better-known methods of production.

"Beef Calf Clubs" came next, the first being organized in Coleman County in 1910 largely through the support of the late J.W. "Boog" Scott, a prominent cattleman. Sam L. Mathews, also of Coleman, showed the first beef calf at the 1910 Southwestern Expositon and Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth.

The first statewide rally for corn club boys was held at the 1910 State Fair of Texas in Dallas. A feature of the rally was a parade of 1,500 boys through the downtown section of Dallas, each carrying a stalk of corn.

Girls were enrolled in tomato clubs in 1912 in Milam County with Mrs. Edna Trigg as the first home demonstration agent. Growing tomatoes and canning were the main demonstration.





Watch out for those power lines!





odern farming requires the use of large, complex machinery. Each year a tragic number of accidents are caused by careless handling of farm equipment around electric power lines. Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative urges you to use caution at all times. Watch for overhead power lines and utility poles and avoid any contact with this potentially lethal power equipment.

Insist that family members and hired hands learn to survey their work areas carefully. Although you may not have power lines in your fields, you certainly have them present around equipment storage areas. Be sure there are safe routes from the equipment storage areas to the fields. Before extending the height of or transporting farm equipment, look up and check the clearance. Be extremely cautious when moving or raising portable grain augers, aluminum irrigation pipe, bailers, combines, front end loaders, cable or hydraulic dump trucks, cotton strippers, cotton module

plows with row markers. If you have a question about whether equipment will clear a power line, assume it won't and take action to avoid contact.

Watch for power lines on or near your property lines. They could possibly be hidden by trees or brush, so when turning your equipment at the end of your field there's a very good chance power lines and guy wires could be nearby.

If construction of new storage bins is in your future plans, take the placement of existing power lines into account. If you can't find adequate space for construction away from the power lines, contact DSEC for advice. Your complete safety and comfort are prime concerns of DSEC. We will be happy to assist you in developing a safer

So, remember, when moving your equipment into your fields to tend your crops, think safety, and make your harvest as safe as it is rewarding.


Gooden scores 4 TD's to pace Wolverine win


