On cotton

From wife Judy:

This time of the year I like to get caught up on the reading I put off during the hectic pre- Christmas time. It is so pleasant to have a little time to read, and think and evaluate.

Last week, I browsed through a copy of Southern Textile News, a publication for the textile industry. They send it to the Tribune and because it was sitting on my desk I browsed through it.

Cotton is a major agricultural product in this area, and it is of course a fiber. Oil is another product of the high plains, and it is an ingredient in several man- made fibers. There are many, many other ingredients used in the fiber industry today.

One article was about changes in the textile industry and the way American consumers are reacting.

Apparently, one of the hot items in the industry is microfibers - ultra fine fibers that are added to regular yarn - fiber mix.

Micro fibers have been on the market for about two years; they are a new and exciting part of the industry. They will enable the industry to develop several new fiber structures, yarns, and fabric concepts that existing fibers cannot. But, they will require new processing techniques, new equipment, and greater care in handling fabrics.

When I was a girl growing up, my 4-H leader, Anna Hicks, took great pains to

teach us about the fabrics on the market in those days. We knew that some fabrics were ideal for some patterns because the fabrics had the right weight and drape ability. We knew that some fabrics washed well and others needed dry cleaning. We were taught that some needed ironing and others didn't.

Today, the new fabrics on the market can be a total mystery.

The part of the article that really hit home to me as a consumer was the statement that: "The American consumer is not a particularly quality apparel purchaser. Our industry, like our market, is oriented to high volume, lower priced merchandise. It is no accident that the most successful retailer in America is Wal Mart."

I have mixed feelings about foreign made clothing. Some of it is superb. But, often the size listed on the hangtag of foreign -made clothing has no relationship to the sizing standards of the USA. Every garment has to be tried on, and every one has to be evaluated individually.



Recipe of Week

Mediterranean Sausage Vegetable Soup

1/4 c. olive oil

1/4 c. Martha White All - Purpose Flour

2 medium onions, coarsely chopped

4 celery ribs, coarsely chopped 3 1/2 c. chicken broth

1 can (28 oz) whole tomatoes, chopped and undrained


1 teaspoon dried basil

1 teaspoon rosemary, crushed

3 cups quartered small red new potatoes (about 8 or 9) 1 lb. Tennessee Pride Italian Sausage (mild or hot) sliced, browned and drained

3 c. torn fresh spinach leaves

Heat olive oil in a 6- quart soup pot or Dutch oven. Stir in flour. cook over medium heat, stirring frequently until golden. Add onions, celery and garlic; cook until vegetables are slightly tender. Slowly add broth, stirring constantly. Stir in tomatoes, basil, rosemary and potatoes. Simmer 25 to 30 minutes or until potatoes are tender. Add sausage and spinach; simmer 5 minutes. Here's a look at the area cotton crop

The 1992 High Plains crop is well on its way to being off the stalk and in the gin yard according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG).

PCG estimates that the crop is now at least 75percent harvested and that a week of favorable conditions could easily allow the remainder of the crop to be harvested. Rain in southern parts of the area during the past week has kept some producers out of the field completely and has delayed others for at least a couple of days.

How much cotton the area crop will produce is still an unknown at this time. Most industry estimates for the area are still below the USDA estimate of 1.51 million bales, however, the size of the crop is changing everyday as more cotton makes

its way to gin yards around the area.

"The numbers we have been able to put together indicate a crop below the USDA estimate," notes PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson. "Few people have been able to get an accurate estimate of the crop because of the unique circumstances around which this crop was produced."

The December USDA estimate, released Thursday, left expectations for the size of the crop in districts 1-N and 1-S unchanged. Districts 1-N and 1-S are often used as a measuring stick for the 25 county area known as the Texas High Plains.

In contrast to the USDA estimate, preliminary figures on how much cotton is expected to be classed in the Lubbock and Lamesa cotton classing office's continue to indicate a crop slightly over 1.235 million bales, considerably lower than the USDA estimate of

1.51 million bales.

Some adjustment, however, must be made in the classing office figures to allow for a difference in the average weight those bales. This adjustment is necessary since the estimate reflects the actual number of bales to be received from area gins. These bales, known as "running bales", tend to vary in weight both above and below the 480 pound figure used to compute statistical bales.

Applying the necessary conversion factor moves the classing office estimates up to 1.27 million bales. An additional 100,000 bales can then be added to account for gins in the area that send their cotton to classing offices other than Lubbock or Lamesa. This brings the total to 1.37 million bales, still 140,000 bales below the USDA estimate. Most trade estimates place the crop approximately 100,000 bales below the USDA figure.
