You be the judge

I don't get angry too often any more. It must be an age thing.

But something said at the Farwell City Council last week really got under my skin. In fact, after the meeting I had a few choice words with the fella who made the comment. I don't think he likes me any more.

The comment arose during a discussion on awarding the bid for the annual city's insurance contracts. There were two bids presented, one from Farwell's Town & Country Insurance, represented by Mike Camp, and the other from TML, a statewide agency.

TML got the bid. That's the council's decision and I know they do the best job they can.

But during the discussion, the TML representative said words to the effect that Town & Country wasn't that much of a local company because only the commission to the salesman stays local. And he said the same thing to me after the meeting.

Nobody from the council publicly disputed that statement. But I strongly do. And I told that to the TML fella.

When I attended the Farwell Buyer's Breakfast Monday morning, Mike Camp was there helping with the cooking. I didn't see the fella from TML.

When the kids at Farwell School need local companies to help sponsor the footballs, to put ads in their yearbooks, and for so many other causes, it's Town & Country that comes through.

I can't wait to see if TML has an ad in the school yearbook this year. Kids, don't forget to call them.

And when the Farwell Youth Commission needs an area to have its fund-raising car washes - Town & Country provides a free space.

And here's what really got my goat:

When the insurance bids were first opened at the Farwell City Council meeting in mid-January, an emergency call came in for the ambulance. Mike Camp was out of his chair in a split second, running to get the ambulance which had been called to the Prentice Mills residence, and to make an emergency transport to the hospital.

The TML fella also was at that meeting. But he didn't go on the ambulance call.

Then there's the matter of taxes, which Town & Country pays to the City of Farwell. TML doesn't.

And so on. For the economy of a small community like Texico-Farwell to work, folks have to work together. It's as simple as that, although it's a concept that's hard for some folks to realize.

Too often, a government agency, or just a plain citizen, can be "penny wise and pound foolish."

When you seek bids, the legal ad normally says the "lowest and best" bid is to be accepted. That means sometimes the "lowest" bid isn't the "best."

I realize that TML's bid was probably lower (depending on what specs were used), but when I see all the money plowed back into Farwell by Town & Country, than I view Town & Country's as the "best."

We need to go the extra

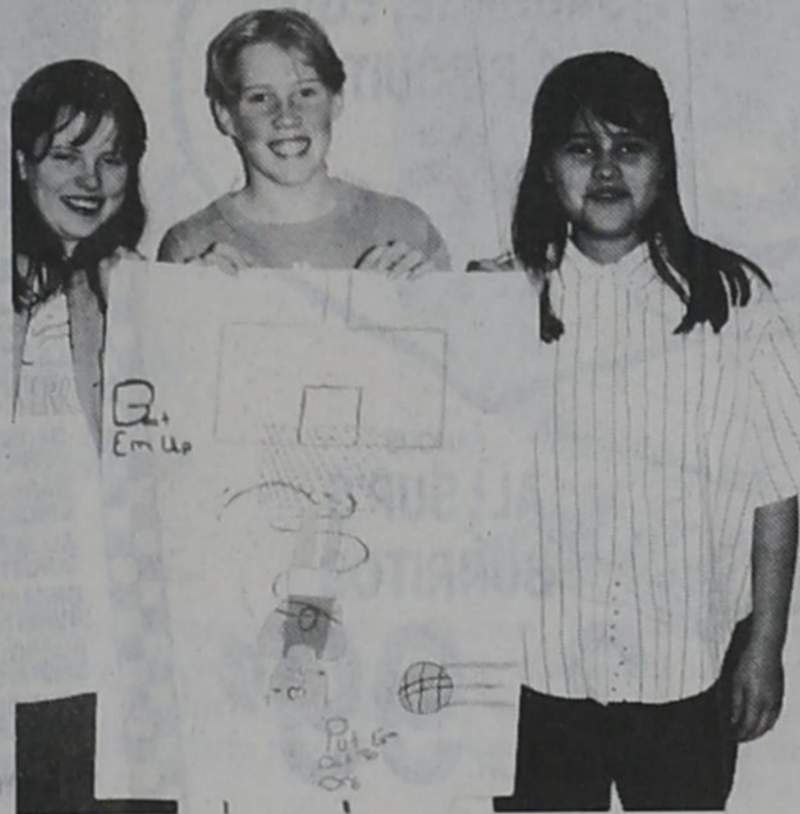

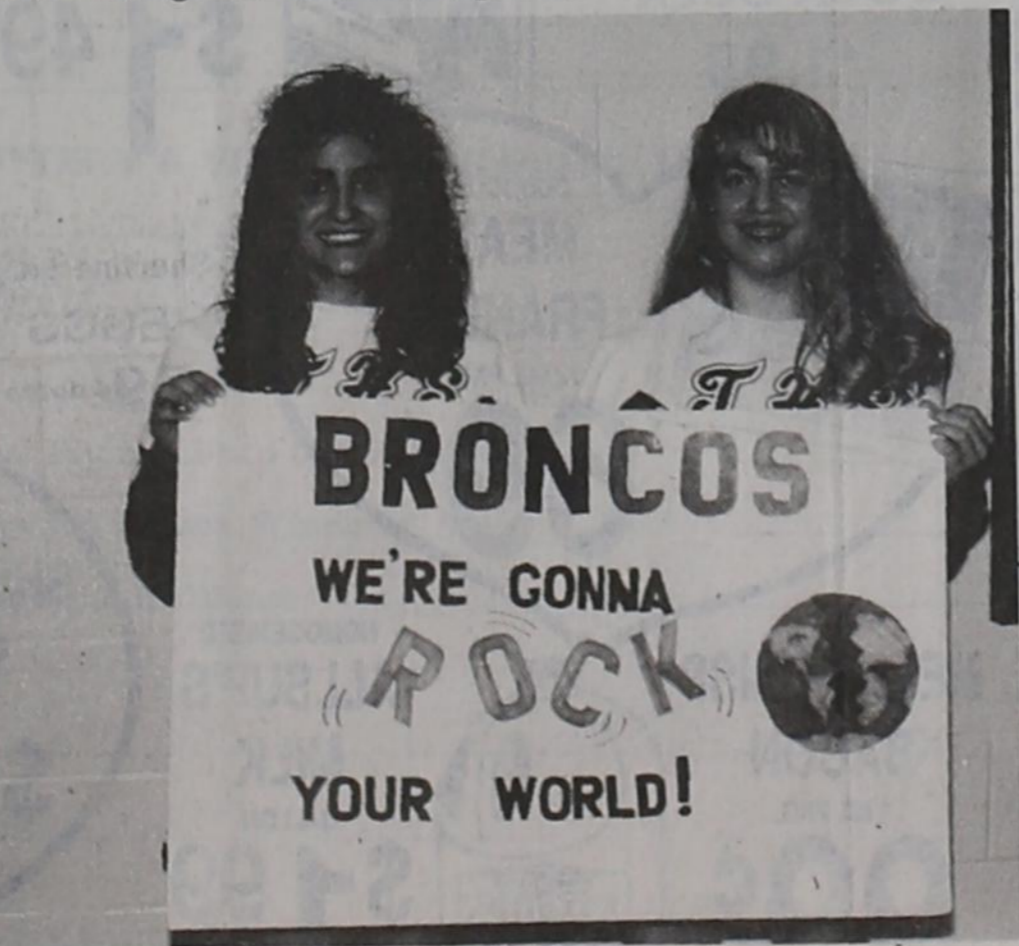

Insurance contract awarded

The Farwell City Council held a special meeting Jan. 28 to discuss letting the city's insurance contracts.

There were two bidders - Town & Country, of Farwell, and TML, a statewide group.

The council ran into a problem because while Town & Country, represented by Mike Camp, gave them a bid according to the bid specifications, TML didn't.

Also, TML had a much lower bid for worker's compensation. TML is a group which can bid worker's comp much lower than any state-regulated insurance agency because TML is under different guidelines.

However, the council, if it

At this time of the year there may be more dead cattle along the side of the road, and prompt removal of these animals is important for the health and safety of everyone in the area. Sometimes in this cold weather the animals die of pneumonia or other illnesses; sometimes they die bearing young; sometimes they are struck by vehicles.

What ever the reason for the carcasses, prompt removal is important. If you see a dead animal, contact the owner if you know whose animal has died. If not, please contact county health department officials or a company that can remove the carcasses. Disease can be spread from dead animals to pets and also to human beings.

Insurance

Depending on which statistics you used, and how you viewed it, the "low bidder" could be determined.

For example, TML's liability insurance bid was lower than Town & Country - only if the city agreed to take TML's worker's comp bid in September when worker's comp is up for renewal.

The TML representative insisted it wasn't a question of using a local insurance agency as opposed to TML because when local insurance agencies are used, he said only the commission to the salesman stays local.

The original bids were received at the Jan. 19 council meeting. But TML had also offered a worker's comp bid. At that meeting, liability insurance bids were also received from Town & Country, and Henry Insurance, of Muleshoe, who held the city's contract the past year.

At that session, since the latter two agencies hadn't offered worker's comp bids - they weren't included in the bid specs and worker's comp didn't come due until September - the council slated the special meeting to give Henry and Town & Country time to come up with worker's comp bids.

But at the Jan. 28 meeting, the council received a letter from Henry declining to bid at this time.

Camp stressed that Town & Country's bid met the bid specs, while TML's didn't.

But at least two councilmen felt that TML's bid would be lower if the two firms had bid the same way.

The council voted 2-1 to accept TML's bid, and to give them the worker's comp contract in September.

Voting for TML were John Carlson and Martin Kube.

Opposed was Pat Howard. He wasn't happy about the fact that it was only near the end of the discussion that the TML representative pointed out that the TML lower bid was contingent upon accepting their worker's comp package, too.

James Chadwick, who arrived at the council meeting near the end of the discussion, abstained.

Royce Bethel was absent. In other business, the council:

- Had a friendly discussion with Gordon Smith, manager

of TCA Cable. They talked about ways to improve service.

Smith noted that projects are planned to improve water drainage in Clovis, which hopefully will cut down on service interruptions when it rains heavily.

He also said sometimes lightning hits the power poles, causing outages. There's not much that can be done to help in this area.

Smith also talked about new FCC rules dealing with technical standards. This has forced TCA Cable recently to test its lines during the daytime, causing interruptions to service. This test was passed, he added.

Smith noted that the HSE sports network was being added to TCA Cable next month. He also was asked by one citizen about adding WGN, home of the Chicago Cubs. But he said rules for this size market doesn't allow two superstations and TCA already offers WTBS, home of the Atlanta Braves.

- Agreed to allow Cecilia Quezada to place a home where her trailer is at 300 9th St. The home would be moved in from elsewhere in the county. This is contingent upon payment of a deposit, approval by neighbors and an okay by city water Supt. Dee Hammit as to the lot size.

She originally had planned to move the house to First Street but that fell through.

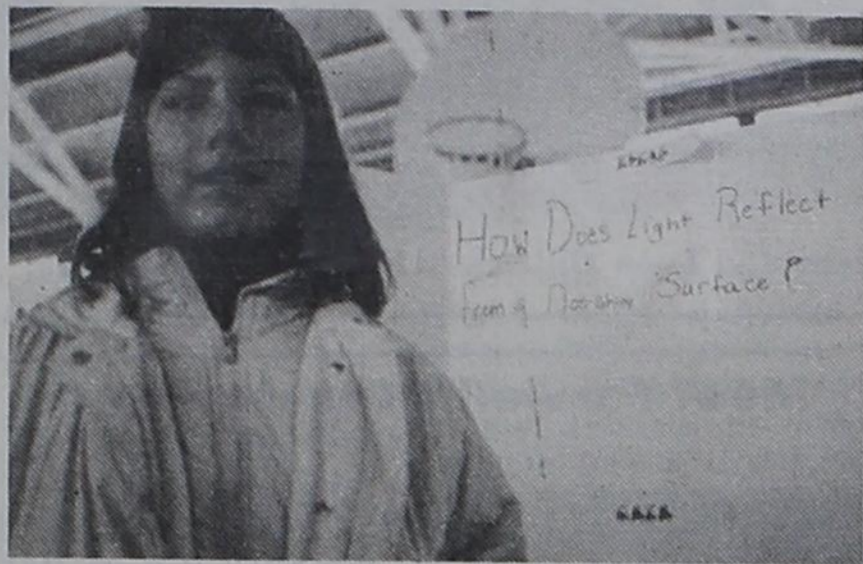

Letter To The Editor

Letter from the desert

Dear Friends:

This letter is being sent to let you know that your loved ones are safe here in the desert and that your tax dollars have been put to good use over the past month. As you know by now, there have been air strikes into Iraq by Coalition aircraft. What has not been shown to my satisfaction is the fact that the 158 personnel that deployed here to the Arabian Gulf from the 335th Fighter Squadron at Seymour Johnson AFB have not received the proper credit for the work that they have put into those missions which ensured their success.

At first, it appears that all we did was just decide one day to go and drop bombs in the No-Fly Zone. What actually transpired was that the weapons loaders here actually uploaded weapons, downloaded weapons and uploaded weapons several times during the weeks prior to the attacks. These changes coincided to the changes in the targets that we were targeted against and the requirement to have the correct weapon to destroy a particular target. They have performed yeoman's jobs in their specialty. The entire maintenance complex provided the air crews with a weapon system that was capable of delivering the weapons with the precise accuracy that was required to destroy the targets. My hat is off to them and their stellar performance.

As for the air crews, one must realize that we have been in country for only 2 1/2 weeks prior to the attacks. Most of the crews had only flown once or twice this month and their previous flights were prior to Christmas last year. Although our proficiency was not as high as I would have wanted prior to going into combat, the crews have proven that our peacetime training is viable and we can transition from the training mode into a combat mode with minimum effort.

Don't believe all the stories you hear about the people here being heroes. We have all sworn to defend our nation and perform the mission as described by the commander in chief. In interviews, the press has a tendency to create the image of giants in a small world. This is only one specific time in history. Iraq has not effectively rebuilt their military after Desert Storm and the resistance is minimal compared to the next contingency where we may be called to fight. We cannot allow ourselves to be lulled into a false sense of security because we are a superior force here in the Arabian Gulf Region.

As for all of our friends and family back in the States, you must understand that for every mission we fly over here, we have one main objective. That objective is simple: all air crews and aircraft return to the base after each mission. It does not matter if all aircraft return with bombs and the target is not destroyed. We can go back another day to bomb the targets. We cannot replace equipment or personnel over here without increasing the defense spending or training new people to replace losses. All of these options take time. Not
