Thanksgiving Day: An American Heritage

Nov. 26, 1992, Thanksgiving Day.

This day is more than a legal holiday celebrated in the United States on the fourth Thursday of each November. The annals of American history testify that this is a day for giving thanks to God! Our fathers and mothers before us recognized that we are the recipients of gifts and blessings bestowed by God. From generations which now lie silent new families have learned the tradition of Thanksgiving "in the good oldfashioned way."

What is Thanksgiving Day? It is an American Heritage - a heritage of gratitude with national, family and spiritual ties, to which we have fallen heir as creatures of God, and sons and daughters of the Republic.

This heritage reminds us annually of the gifts that we have received as God's creatures. In this respect, conviction about Divine Providence transcends national and family tradition. On Oct. 3, 1863, Abraham Lincoln called the nation to Thanksgiving (observed Nov. 26, 1863) because the gifts of God compelled a spirit of gratitude: "The year that is drawing towards its close, has been filled with the blessings of fruitful fields and healthful skies. To these bounties, which are so constantly enjoyed that we are prone to forget the source from which they come, others have been added, which are of so extraordinary a nature, that they cannot fail to penetrate and soften even the heart which is habitually insensible to the ever watchful providence of Almighty God."

The Giver of gifts, God Himself, has born witness to the abundance that He bestows on His creatures. Life itself is appraised in the Holy Scriptures as a divine gift: "Then the Lord God formed man of dust from the ground and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and man became a living being" (Gen. 2:7). Job acknowledged that "...the life of every living thing, and the breath of all mankind" is the hand of

the Lord (12:10). It is in God that we all live, move and exist (Acts 17:28). Even the seasons and the rains, which supply our tables with an abundant feast on this day, testify to God's good gifts to His creatures: "and yet He did not leave Himself without witness, in that He did good and gave you rains from heaven and fruitful seasons, satisfying your hearts with food and gladness" (Acts 14:17).

Lincoln observed in the above Presidential Proclamation that God's gifts to us are things which we did not possess before the gift was made: "No human counsel that devised nor hath any mortal hand worked out these great things. They are the gracious gifts of the Most High God, who, while dealing with us in anger for our sins, hath nevertheless remembered mercy. It has seemed to me fit and proper that they should be solemnly, reverently and gratefully acknowledged as with one heart and one voice by the whole

American people."

The heritage of Thanksgiving Day also compels us to reflect upon the national context in which God's gifts of life and prosperity have been received. In fact, the history of Thanksgiving Day can be appreciated only against the background of momentous events in the evolution of our country. Before "our fathers brought forth upon this continent a new nation, conceived in liberty," their fathers in the Plymouth colony were giving thanks for a meager harvest. In spite of the lean, summer harvest, Governor William Bradford convened the Pilgrims and neighboring Indians in the autumn of 1621 for a three-day festival of prayer, rejoicing and feasting in gratitude for the season's produce.

When our fathers did bring forth a new nation, they did so with the price of their own blood. Yet even then, during the years of the American Revolution, the Continental Congress found occasion to recommend days of thanksgiving. After the establishment of a constitutional form of government,

President George Washington issued a proclamation that Thursday, Nov. 26, 1789, should be a nationwide day of thanksgiving and prayer to God. In the years from the Revolution to the Civil War, however, there was no uniform date on which all celebrated this festival.

While the nation was "engaged in a great civil war,"



Thanksgiving Day finally found its niche in the American calendar. Sarah Josepha Hale, editor of the American Ladies' Magazine and then Godey's Lady's Book from 1837 to 1877, persistently urged President Lincoln to make the annual day of Thanksgiving a national festival. Therefore, on Oct. 3, 1863, President Lincoln issued a Proclamation of Thanksgiving which states in part,

I do therefore invite my fellow citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next, as a day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens. And I recommend to them that while offering up the ascriptions justly due to Him for such singular deliverances and blessings, they do also, with humble penitence for our national perverseness and disobedience, commend to His tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife in which we are unavoidably engaged, and fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty Hand to heal the wounds of the nation and restore it as soon as may be consistent with the Divine purposes to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquillity and Union.

The following year President Lincoln issued another Proclamation of Thanksgiving, dated Oct. 20, 1864, appointing the last Thursday in November "as a day of Thanksgiving and Praise to Almighty God the beneficent Creator and Ruler of the Universe." Thanksgiving Day was not, however, the only occasion for which Lincoln issued a Proclamation of Thanksgiving. He made a Proclamation of Thanksgiving for Victories on April 10, 1862, which was to be observed by the people of the United States on their next occasion of public worship. Then again on July 15, 1863, Lincoln "set apart Thursday the 6th day of August next, to be observed as a day for National Thanksgiving Praise and Prayer..." Apparently, God deserves to be thanks more frequently than once per year.

Succeeding presidents, from 1864 until 1939, annually proclaimed the last Thursday in November as the day of national thanksgiving. President Franklin D. Roosevelt parted with tradition in 1939, however, and appointed the fourth, but not the last, Thursday of the month, Nov. 23,

as Thanksgiving Day. Many states resisted the change and observed Thanksgiving Day on Nov. 30 that year. Roosevelt continued through the Thanksgiving season of 1941 to appoint the next-to-last Thursday of November as Thanksgiving Day in order to leave more time between Thanksgiving and Christmas.

In December 1941, however, the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives adopted a joint resolution officially designating the fourth Thursday of November as Thanksgiving day: President Roosevelt approved this resolution on Dec. 26, 1941, 19 days after Pearl Harbor. This is the heritage of Thanksgiving Day, a heritage fashioned in triumph and tragedy, prosperity and hardship, union and adversity, freedom and sacrifice.

Where we begin to learn about and experience Thanksgiving Day, however, is within our own families. There a thankful mother and father teach son and daughter every day, in one way or another, about gratitude to God. We learn that the giving of thanks to another is pleasant and rewarding. It is as members of families the we learn that thanks may be given even in hardship, adversity and sacrifice. We rejoice in what we have, rather than grumble about what we do not have. Helen Keller exemplified this attitude when she said, "So much has been given to me; I have not time to ponder over that which has been denied." This quality of gratitude derives only from a humble spirit that marvels that it can be so well thought of and treated.



his hobbies - rodeo and golf. Thurmond is looking forward to achieving some long range goals. "I would like to get into a canine division and work with dogs, maybe 8 or 9 years from now," he said. "Some day I'd like to go home to my own home county (Carson County) and run for sheriff."
