Church to celebrate its 40th anniversary

The First Baptist Church of Farwell will celebrate its 40th anniversary on March 21.

"Finding Us Faithful" is the theme. The day-long event will feature three former pastors returning with messages:

- Dudley Bristow, who served from 1977 - 1981, will speak on "The Challenge of God's People Today" at 11 a.m.

At 12:30 p.m., dinner on the grounds will be held. The public is invited to the dinner, plus all other events.

- J. L. Bass, who served from 1961 - 1971, will speak on "The History of God's People" at 2 p.m.

A reception and fellowship will be held at 4 p.m.

- Pat Riley, who served from 1982 - 1987, will speak on "God's People Committed."

Also, special guests during the day will feature Trilogy, Central Baptist Church Glory Choir, John Lowry, Clyde Powell, Ronald Byrd and others.

Following is a history of the church, compiled by Mark Cole and Susan Johnson:

On March 22, 1953, the First Baptist Church of Farwell was formed.

The church was actually formed by a group of Baptists who were already part of a fellowship in Texico for 47 years previously. Some members of this original group had a dream of having a church in Farwell, and in early March 1953 they met in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jack McManigal to discuss this possibility.

Later meetings were held in the showroom of Hardage Motors and in the Farwell School gym. At this meeting, Bro. Barto Massey, pastor of Oklahoma Lane Baptist Church, spoke to the group about organizing a church. The group elected Sterlyn Billington as the first acting moderator, and Elsie Hardage as temporary clerk. Two additional committees were formed: Joe McWilliams, Johnnie Williams, and Jack McManigal were in charge of finding a location for temporary services. W.F. Markum, Ben Atkins and W.M. Roberts formed the first pulpit committee in charge of finding a minister.

On March 15, the congregation met to elect the first officers of the church. Leatha Jo Roberts was elected as the first church clerk; Joe McWilliams as the first church treasurer; Dick Gerles as the first Sunday School superintendent; Elsie Hardage was chosen to be the first Sunday School secretary; the first choir leader was Walter Hardage; first Training Union director was Willie Hardage; Sterlyn Billington was elected first Training Union secretary; and Mrs. Jack McManigal was chosen as the first pianist.

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SWCD honors Christian brothers

Brothers Vick and Todd Christian, of Oklahoma Lane, received the Conservation Farmer of the Year award from the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District.

The award was presented at Saturday's Friona Chamber of Commerce banquet.

The SWCD also gave special awards to four brothers - Robert, Mark, Matt and Ben Osborn - for improving the wildlife situation in Parmer County.

The Osborn brothers released 4,000 bobwhite and red quail chicks, then helped feed them as they spread throughout the county.

Chamber officers are Sylvia Ingram, president; Bill McCoy, vice president, and Karen Harrelson, secretary - treasurer. Executive vice president is Terri Outland.

The Chamber has 153 members. The main speaker was Rick Perry, Texas agricultural commissioner.

Perry, a Republican, said he was proud of the many things that Texas was No. 1 in, except for one: in the past two years, he said Texas has added more people to the state payroll than any other state in the union.

"And we're not seeing that kind of growth in the private sector," he added.

Perry said that only two state departments have decreased the number of employees the past two years - his, and the treasury run by Kay Hutchinson, another Republican.

Perry said there were 619 employees in the Texas ag department when he took over four years ago. Today, there are 538.

Perry talked about the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority (TAFA) which he helped start. It loans funds for ag-related projects.

Perry said 31 projects have been funded by TAFA and 3,900 jobs created the past four years in Texas.

Perry talked about the program of firms building in Texas due to high worker's comp rates and trucking regulations. He said Texas' Blue Bell Dairies is building a new facility in Tulsa, Okla., because of those twin problems.

"We have got to turn the state around," said Perry.

Farwell appoints police chief

James Richard "Dick" Colwell was appointed Farwell's police chief by the Farwell City Council Tuesday.

Colwell, 65, of Amarillo, will be moving to Farwell next month with his wife, Kathleen. He will begin his new duties when the police car arrives, expected in mid-April.

Colwell has 25 years experience in law enforcement. He held various ranks in Amarillo for 14 years, plus serving as police chief in Irving, Texas, for three years, and as police chief in Garden City, Kan., for 8 years.

He was retired before accepting the newly-created Farwell position.

The Colwells have four grown children: Mrs. Mary Prubski, of Garden City; Mrs. Erin Bergen, of Gruver, Texas; Mrs. Kathy Harborson, of Oklahoma City, and Michael Colwell, who is undergoing training at a Catholic seminary in San Antonio and will become a priest next year.

An ordinance setting up the police department also was approved by the council. It allows the council to hire more police officers if deemed necessary.

Mayor Chris Gikas asked councilmen Pat Howard and John Carlson to work with Colwell, who attended the meeting, to work on getting the necessary supplies.

In a related development, the council approved Gikas' recommendation to put off the annual street seal-coating program, for which \$30,000 had been budgeted. Water Supt. Dee Hammit reported the winter has been mild and the streets are in pretty good shape, except for one block (along Avenue I due north of the football field).

Thus, the \$30,000 will stay in the general fund and can be used to initiate the city police department, estimated to cost around \$50,000. Originally, the city had expected to take \$50,000 from its Certificates of Deposit to start up the police department.

At last month's meeting, the council had put off until September whether to give city employees pay raises due to the budget tightness. Gikas suggested Tuesday that city employees get 3 percent cost of living raises (to cost about \$3,100), which could be taken from the \$30,000 saved on street repairs.

But no councilman made that motion after Carlson said the council ought to stick with its decision to wait until September. Carlson noted that it's the climate in the country to be more conservative when dealing with government employees.

The decision to put off pay raises antagonized Hammit. He pointed out that there's one less city employee since Michael Robinson recently resigned.

Hammit said to councilman James Chadwick, "You said if we dropped Michael, we'd get a salary hike ... We're doing more work and we're not being compensated."

As for the streets, the city will check with Eastwood Construction about the Avenue I block.

And the council, as it did last year, talked about a new rubberized seal-coating process that is more expensive but last longer. No action was taken.

In other business, the council:

- Appointed Edwina Owen judge for the May 1 election and Roene Stewart as a clerk. Last time, Colleen Stover also was a clerk but due to a conflict (her husband, Jerry, is a candidate for city council) she wasn't chosen. Gikas will appoint the other clerk.

- Opened bids to sell some vacant lots near 7th St. and Ave. B. The only bidder was Jack Landrum, who owns adjacent property and was interested in buying them.

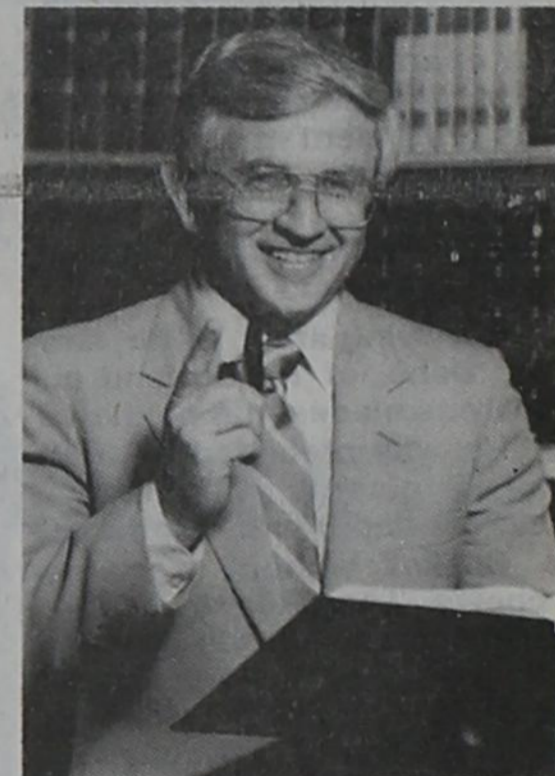
But the council had put a \$1,700 minimum on its bid ad due to costs and back taxes owed. Landrum said the 3 half-lots were appraised at \$1,094 and he bid \$1,200 for them.

The council accepted Landrum's bid contingent on the getting the government entities owed back taxes to lower their liens to the \$1,200 total.

- Approved a building permit for Jerry McIntosh, 100 block of Second Street, for a 1,152-sq.-ft. metal garage, with steel beams. This request was denied two years ago when the permit was sought for a wooden structure, since it's within the fire zone.

- Heard a report on the poll taken to move a house to 909

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS

OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION
MAY 1, 1993

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to redistribute among other school districts ad valorem taxes levied and collected by a school district. The amendment would also allow the legislature to create county education districts with the taxable property of existing school districts in one or more counties combined. County education districts may levy, collect, and distribute ad valorem taxes as authorized by general law. The legislature would be allowed to set the rate of the ad valorem tax to be imposed in a school district or county education district or it may authorize the board of trustees of each school district or county education district to set the rate, provided that the rate of county education district ad valorem taxes may not exceed \$1.00 per \$100 valuation of taxable property, unless a higher rate is approved by the voters of the district. The amendment also provides that the amount of ad valorem taxes redistributed among school districts by the legislature and effectively redistributed within a county through county education districts may not exceed 2.75 percent of the sum of the state revenue appropriated for public schools and the revenue from local ad valorem taxes levied and collected for public schools. The term "state revenue" does not include revenue from ad valorem taxes, revenue for the provision of free textbooks, or contributions to a retirement system. Finally, the amendment provides that it does not affect the distribution of the available school fund under article VII, section 5, of the Texas Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing limited redistribution of ad valorem taxes for schools, authorizing the legislature or local districts to set

a minimum tax rate in county education districts, and placing a cap on the ad valorem tax levied by county education districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 2 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that, except for state educational mandates imposed in compliance with the Texas Constitution or federal law, or unless enacted by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members elected to each house of the legislature, a school district may not be required to comply with an obligation requiring expenditure of school district funds unless the obligation is fully funded. The amendment also requires the legislature to provide by law a procedure for determining whether an obligation is fully funded. In the absence of such a procedure, and at the request of a school district's board of trustees, the comptroller of public accounts shall determine whether or not an obligation is fully funded. This amendment applies only to state educational mandates enacted after December 31, 1993.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting a school district from the obligation to comply with unfunded state educational mandates."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes an amendment to article VII, section 5(b), of the constitution, which currently authorizes the legislature to provide for using the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts and certain education-related revenue bonds issued by the state. The amendment would repeal the provision authorizing

the use of the permanent school fund to guarantee state revenue bonds, but would permit the legislature to provide by law for the issuance of general obligation bonds or revenue bonds of the state for the purpose of making loans to, or purchasing bonds of, school districts for the purpose of acquisition, construction, or improvement of instructional facilities, including all furnishings. The amendment also provides that the state, pursuant to general law, may forgive the payment of principal and interest on all or part of a loan made to a school district under the amendment to partially finance an instructional facility. The cap of \$750 million on the amount of bonds that could be issued under article VII, section 5(b), as amended, would be retained. The amendment would repeal the current provision of the constitution permitting the legislature to authorize bonds in excess of \$750 million by two-thirds record vote of both houses of the legislature. While any of the general obligation bonds issued under the amendment or any of the interest on those bonds is outstanding and unpaid, there would be appropriated out of the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, the amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that matured or became due that fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of \$750 million in state general obligation or revenue bonds to assist school districts in partially financing facilities, authorizing the state to forgive payments of loans made to a school district for partially financing facilities, and repealing the authorization for \$750 million in state revenue bonds guaranteed by the permanent school fund."

Note: this batter is best when made ahead of time and allowed to rest at least one hour, but it can be used immediately after mixing.

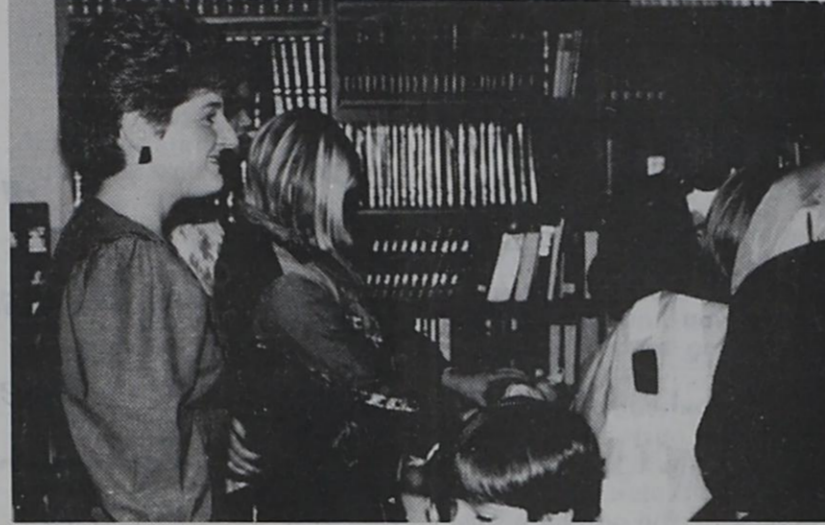

Construction should start Monday on highway widening project

"This meeting marks the culmination of 30 years of hard work by a lot of people," commented Parmer County Judge Bonnie Clayton Tuesday when the project to complete the widening of U.S. Highway 60 from Bovina to the New Mexico state line was discussed.

Construction should begin Monday.

Plans call for creating a divided four lane highway over the 12-mile stretch except for one portion near the Farwell Cemetery where there won't be a divider.

Representatives of the State Department of Highways and Transportation from Texas and New Mexico, the building contractor, county and city governments, and law enforcement were all on hand to discuss the project.

Rhea Bradley, area engineer from the Texas Highway Department, said the project is scheduled to take 720 calendar days, and to finish in September 1994.

Bradley discussed many details which had to be worked out before construction could begin. Highway 60 will be closed from FM 292 (near the Farwell Cemetery) to the state line for 48 days. Traffic will be re-routed through Farwell during that time.

A temporary traffic signal will be installed at Hwy. 292 and U.S. 70 (the drug store - Dairy Queen - Capitol Food intersection) during the construction. Traffic will have to cross three railroad crossings - one of which does not have a crossing signal arm.

Speed limits within the construction area will be 45 mph on the open highway, and 35 mph in Farwell and Bovina.

"We plan to get started at the feed yard and hope to be in Farwell by the first of July," said Bradley. "We'll try to finish by the end of August," he said. "Hopefully the New Mexico Highway Department will work with us."

Plans call for finishing one side (2 lanes) of the highway by Dec. 1, and the other side (2 lanes) by September 1994. "We will have a temporary change in the road until the project is done," said Bradley.

Bradley said it will be important for the construction company to meet its deadlines. "There is hefty damage if it doesn't get done in time."

One resident present at the meeting pointed out that sometimes the railroad crossings are blocked for long periods of time due to a coal train. Bradley said that he planned to talk to the Santa Fe about that.

Texas State Trooper Trey Ellis asked who needed to be contacted if the road had to be closed. On the first and second sections of this road widening project the road has had to be closed at various times because of blowing sand, blowing snow, and flooding. Law enforcement agents have not always known who to contact. Ellis was told that he would get the names and phone numbers he needed.

Paul Zagone, technical support engineer from District 2 of the New Mexico Highway Department, asked about the guardpost and fence at the state line which New Mexico will have to move. Texico City Councilman Butch Sharp answered that it belongs to Southwestern Public Service. Bradley opined that it does not meet federal standards, and would have to be removed.

Bradley said his department will inspect the construction site every two weeks during the project.

Bovina Mayor Keith Knight asked if the portion of FM 1731 in Bovina which has been destroyed by construction would be replaced with a new road. Bradley answered that it is not in the long range plan, but the contractor would probably put

it back in order.

"The total maintenance of this road is up to the contractor from the day that the barricades go up until the project is done - except for snow removal," said Bradley.

Zagone was asked about the work done by the New Mexico Highway Department on this project. He replied that officials in Santa Fe did not expect the project to get done before 1994.

"I've got to go back and tell my boss what's going on," he noted. New Mexico's portion of the construction on this side of the state line is a segment of highway about 800 feet of highway that belongs to New Mexico.

"We could probably come up with a temporary construction plan pretty quick ... It's the additional right of way that's the problem," he said. "I don't know that we can get it all together that soon."

"It's my personal opinion that we should get the 800 feet done if the New Mexico folks' political pressure gets hot enough," said Zagone.

Mel Pope, District Engineer from the Texas State Highway Department, commended Bradley and the Amarillo Road Company and the New Mexico folks for the work they had done. "This is really a major project," said Pope. "It takes time to get these things scheduled."

Bradley called the Farwell meeting one of the better attended pre-construction meetings that the Texas Department of Highways has had.

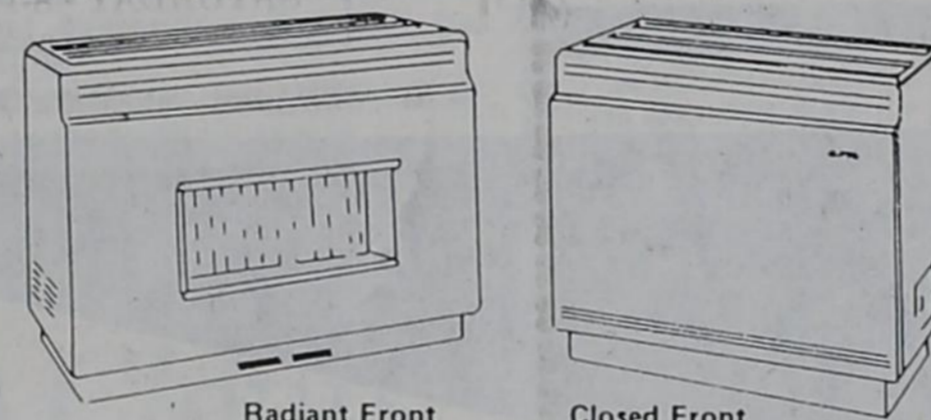

Farwell's 1st Baptist Church plans celebration

(Continued from Page 1)

Murry Dial were elected to the Finance Committee. Charlie Hromas, Jack McManigal, Dickie Magness, Claude Rose, Joe McWilliams and Bill Garrett were chosen to serve as the building committee, and Claude Rose, Sterlyn Billington and Joe McWilliams were elected as trustees.

On March 22, 1953, the group met with names of 126 people who expressed a desire to organize and become members of a Baptist church in Farwell. Most of this group came from the Texico fellowship. The newly formed congregation voted that ordained deacons in the fellowship be installed as deacons. Sterlyn Billington, Dick Gerles, Willie Hardage and Joe McWilliams thus became the first deacons in First Baptist Church of Farwell. Bro. Otis Holiday from Vernon, Texas brought the first message, titled "Camping in the Wilderness". He urged the newly formed congregation to push forward at all times, even though there would be times they would feel like turning back. April 5, 1953 was set as the deadline for charter members. By this date, membership had increased to 136.

In June 1953, J.D. Horton accepted the call to become pastor of the church. He served until July 1954. During his tenure, the members moved into their own building. Aug. 2, 1953 was the official "Move-In Day", and Sunday School and Worship Services were held in the new building for the first time. The parsonage was also completed at this time. The new congregation held its first revival meeting only a few days later, Aug. 16-23, 1953.

In March 1954, the members celebrated the first anniversary of the church. On this day, attendance had already grown to 184, with an additional 15 new members added that day. In May 1954, the church conducted its first Vacation Bible School.

The second pastor to serve the congregation of First Baptist, Farwell was E.J. Keith. He served from August 1954 to May 30, 1958. In June 1956, a cabin was built at the Plains Baptist Assembly at Floydada, Texas.

Sidney Cox succeeded Keith as pastor in August 1958. He served until Jan. 31, 1961. During his tenure, the congregation saw the auditorium completed in the spring of 1960.

J.L. Bass was the next pastor, in May, 1961. He served for over a decade, until November 1971. These years saw a growing commitment to missions and to continued building by the members of FBC Farwell. In 1962, the church purchased a building in east Farwell for a mission, which later became the New Light Baptist Church. This church became self-supporting in 1978. In July 1968, FBC Farwell voted to contribute to the financial support of two churches in the Northwest.

In May 1962, the church purchased the lots north of the church, which extended ownership of the church to the entire block. In addition, a church library, under the direction of Mrs. John Zahn was organized in 1963. An additional unit of the church was also constructed in 1963 which included Sunday School rooms and the Pastor's study. The church indebtedness for this new unit was paid in full on June 5, 1968. April, 1971, the lot between the church and the parsonage was paved for parking space.

Bass succeeded in 1972 by Dr. Cliff Ennen. During the five years of Ennen's leadership, the church participated

in two crusades. In December 1974, a group conducted a mission to Guatemala. In January 1976, a second group went to El Salvador. The church began supporting two additional churches in the Phoenix area, and the churches in the Northwest became self-supporting.

By 1976, the church membership had reached 576, and the library had grown to include 1,300 volumes. The church had 8 staff members, and Dr. Ennen conducted a daily radio ministry, and Sunday services were also broadcast on the radio.


Ennen served until 1977. He was succeeded by Dudley Bristow on July 31, 1977. Bristow's ministry saw the church continue its growing commitment to missions and outreach. In October 1977, Pam Monk, Karen Bristow and the High School Youth formed a puppet ministry. Another crusade mission to Guatemala was conducted in 1979. Also in 1979, the church began a support program for Bo and Jeanne Bartley for El Rancho de los Ninos, a Guatemala-based children's home. In 1980, the church voted to raise the necessary funds to construct the first dormitory for the children's home. The library was also remodeled in 1981 to become a Media Center, which contained 1,700 volumes, and the church audio-visuals.

Bristow resigned in June 1982, and was succeeded by Pat Riley in October 1982. Riley served until 1987. In 1983, the church sent a group to participate in the building of a church in El Peten, Guatemala at El Rancho de los Ninos. Building continued at FBC Farwell, and a new fellowship hall, a new kitchen, parlor, and additional classrooms were added in 1986. Also in 1986, Oklahoma Lane Baptist Church merged with FBC Farwell with 25 new members joining the fellowship.

In 1987, the parlor was furnished and decorated with memorial funds. The church nursery, preschool rooms, and the foyer area were extensively remodeled in 1990. In addition, a new choir room, additional space for the Media Center, new offices and restrooms were also added in late 1990.

In December 1987, Rick Sullivan came from Billings, Mont., to become pastor. During his first five years as pastor, the church has continued to expand its awareness of and contributions to missions. The following are missions the church has participated in recently:

- Supporting Wayland Baptist University and Yellowstone Baptist College.
- Missionaries from Farwell are staffing three mission points in Africa.
- Vacation Bible School in June, 1992 was one of the largest ever, with 203 children enrolled from preschool age through sixth grade.
- The last three years, a group of members has traveled to the northwestern area of New Mexico to lead in Vacation Bible School. In 1990 and 1991 the group worked in Crown Point and in 1992 in Thoreau.
- In October 1991, three men from the congregation went on a mission trip to Nova Iguaçu, Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.
- A local jail ministry, which was begun in January 1992, by Carol Sullivan for literacy education, has developed into a Sunday Bible study time for the inmates.
- Seven volunteers went on a mission trip to Estrella Association in Arizona during the summer of 1992.
- The congregation participated in the World Missions Conference in January 1993. Also the church exceeded its goal for the Lottie Moon Mission Offering.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor,
Statehood proposals for Washington, D.C. should be rejected.

Statehood would not solve D.C.'s many problems and no amount of political posturing on the part of statehood supporters will change that fact. In truth, many problems would be intensified, not improved. Washington, D. C. does not meet the requirements for statehood. Making such an exception to the historical prerequisites for statehood would risk fundamentally changing our federalist republic. This is a risk that should be avoided.

There are a number of alternatives to D.C. statehood. Given the intent of the Founding Fathers, maintaining the status quo may be the best choice. Denying Washington, D.C. statehood does not mean denying its residents a voice in the nation's affairs. The District's residents currently have far more access and influence than the residents of any state. They maintain control over their local affairs, and receive more in federal aid than any other area of the country.

If the status quo is deemed unacceptable, ceding territory back to the state of Maryland is an alternative that should be considered. If representation is truly the issue concerning statehood proponents - not personal political advancement - then retrocession should receive their full support. Retrocession would give the city's residents congressional representation on par with other U.S. cities, while minimizing the damage to the nation's federalist form of government.

Dismantling the federal city and creating the "State of New Columbia" is a serious threat to our federalist heritage and should be rejected. It would seem D.C. statehood proponents have chosen to ignore the risks and have forgotten Washington, D.C. is the nation's capital. D.C. Statehood is a risk the American people do not wish to take. A Post election poll conducted Nov. 3, 1992 by Citizens United found that 62 percent of Americans disapprove of statehood initiatives for D.C.





WTRT Co-op mails out capital credit checks

West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative members who obtained service during 1970 are being mailed capital credit checks in March totaling over \$96,000.

The sum represents 100 percent of the capital credits allocated for 1970.

Also, this spring, WTRT members will be mailed a statement detailing their allocation of the Patronage Capital for 1992.

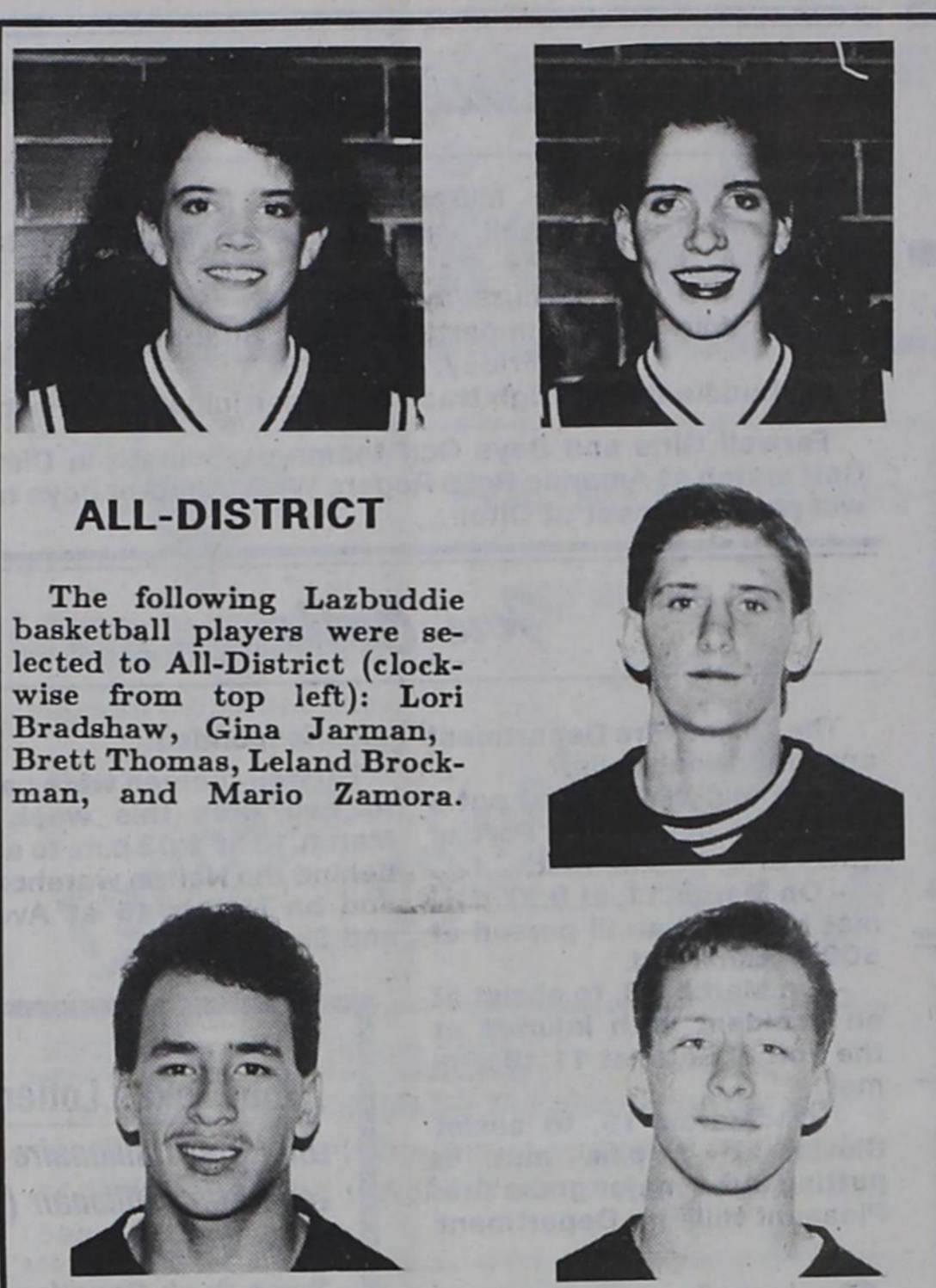
Returned profits are known as Patronage Capital Credits, and represent the member's share of the annual margin, or revenues less expenses, that was achieved by WTRT in that year.

Telephone service purchased by patrons, including equipment, access lines and long distance calls, is tabulated and Capital Credits are calculated on a proportionate basis with all other WTRT members during the same annual period.

A Patronage Capital Credit check represents a member's share in the equity/net worth/ownership of WTRT Cooperative. The \$10 fee that individuals pay upon application for telephone service from the cooperative entitles WTRT customers to a membership in the cooperative. Members then become part-owners of the cooperative.

Until it is returned to patrons, as required by cooperative by-laws, capital credit funds are used by WTRT to provide funds for the construction of telephone plant such as central office equipment and buried cable, to service debt, and to provide cash reserves for business operations of the cooperative.

It's vital that the cooperative's business office have current addresses on all WTRT members, past and present, in order for payments of Capital Credits to be made. Members are asked to advise WTRT business office of any recent or future address changes. If you know the address of a past member, or the executor of a deceased member's estate, please tell the business office. After three years,, any unclaimed Capital Credits revert to the state of Texas.
