Referendum hits snag

Whether Farwell city officials can have a referendum to let city residents tell them whether they favor having a city police officer or not has run into a snafu.

At the last council meeting, Mayor Wendol Christian Add to that the Corn Kids and the council appeared favorable at having some kind of election whereby residents could vote on whether the city should have a police department.

Last week, City Clerk Cynthia Thigpen checked with Texas Municipal League officials and the response wasn't favorable. Here's why:

Farwell is governed un-

der general law statutes. This means the city doesn't have the authority to call an election for the purpose discussed. The city cannot spend any of its money on such an election nor use city employees or city offices.

It is possible for a volunteer group to hold such an election in a place not operated by the city.

For example, a social of service club could ask residents to come to a certain place on a given day and cast ballots, to get the community's feelings on whether a police department should be created.

Girls who will participate in athletics this year are urged to come at this time, as there will be no charge on this date only.


Letters have been mailed to all athletes who participated last year. They will need to bring their physical forms and acknowledgement forms with them, and with thier parent signature on both of them.

Christians reside in 'sweepers' colonies'

Editor's note: Will Anderson, a Farwell resident, is in the U.S. Navy and is stationed at the U.S. Embassy in Islamabad, Pakistan. He has written some articles from life there for the Tribune.

Pakistan was formed in the partition of the Indian subcontinent following World War II. The British gave India its independence, but the Muslim League insisted that those provinces with a Moslem majority form their own new nation, to be called "Pakistan," which means the Land of the Pure.

For years, the Moslem minority in Hindu India were oppressed and many were forced to live in the lower fringe of society, so the League vowed to form a new nation based on tolerance of all religions and beliefs. This nation was to consist of the eastern-most province of Bengal, and the western province of Buluchistan, Sindh, Punjab, Kashmir, and the Northwest Territories. All these provinces were subdivided into different language groups, different peoples, different traditions, but the one unifying bond was to be the Moslem faith.

Both pillars of the new nation, tolerance and the unification of Islam, were created by the father of the nation, Muhammad Ali Jinnah, and were written into the Constitution.

When the Partition occurred, Moslems and Hindus clashed

and there were mass migrations. Half the Punjab remained in India, and Kashmir's Hindu ruler kept it in India despite its Moslem population. There have been three wars, countless skirmishes, and the constant threat of new conflict here ever

Pakistan's fear of India has caused it to invest a lot of its budget in defense, but not necessarily at the expense of the care of the people. India is beset by the same problems as Pakistan, but it has had democracy, increasing literacy, and a legislature of people from all levels of society. When Pakistan has not been under martial law, its legislature is always made up of men with great wealth, feudal lords, and Moslem clerics.

The radical Moslems cannot get any great number into the legislature, but they can shape every action by the power they have over the people with the mosques. Most of the people are illiterate.

Much misery exists here today. And a united Moslem nation didn't work. The eastern provinces of Moslem Bengal broke away from Pakistan to become Bangladesh in 1971. Today, there are separatist movements in various parts of the country, and especially the Sindh and Baluchistan.

The other pillar, tolerance of different beliefs, is still proclaimed but never observed to any real extent. In a nation that is 98 percent Moslem, the 2 percent who are Christian

are on the absolute bottom of society. The average Moslem laborer makes 40 to 50 rupees a day, about \$2, which is barely enough to get by. Christian laborers make barely half that much, and are relegated to work that no one else wants.

The Christians in Islamabad live in ghettos, which are called "Sweepers Colonies," sweeping the streets being one of the few jobs they can get. They receive nothing in the way of electricity, water, or other services from the government. But these Christians work together to get by, building their huts from the stones of buildings that are torn down, paving their own streets, putting in their own drainage systems, and even putting up basic street lighting with electricity they steal from nearby power lines. (I have always wanted to see how they make those connections).

Pakistan is more tolerant of Christians in the diplomatic and expatriate communities than some Moslem countries, most notably Saudi Arabia. Western Christians can run their hospitals and utilities, but they cannot build churches in Saudi Arabia, Western soldiers can fight and die to keep Iraq out of Saudi Arabia, but their chaplains cannot wear a cross on their uniforms.

Pakistan allows us to have Christian churches for the expatriate community and Pakistani Christians, and my congregation is even trying to build a larger building now. But the purely Pakistani congregations are subject to constant harassment and are sometimes attacked. The Rawalpindi congregation tried to build a church but the mullahs stopped them cold. And even Western organizations that attempt to spread Christianity here are thrown out of the country for attempting to "infect" the purity of Islam.

Sheriff's Report

Here is the weekly report from Parmer County sheriff Rex

The lack of protective headgear led to a 10-hour chase and the arrest of two New Mexico boys on charges of theft last week.

Williams said state trooper Marshall Thomas met two boys riding motorcycles about 11:30 a.m. on July 23 about 4- 5 miles east of Farwell on Hwy 60. Thomas said they were not wearing headgear. When he tried to stop them, they attempted to outrun him.

The youths eventually laid their motorcycles down near some trees on David Norton's property.

"They jumped off their motorcycles and took off on foot," said Williams. The youths hid for a while in Norton's beet patch.

The trooper pursued on foot, while the youths ran into a corn patch. Williams arrived there about that time.

He contacted the Department of Public Safety in Lubbock

which dispatched a helicopter to assist in the search. "The chopper showed up around 1:30 p.m.," said Williams.

"I called on surrounding counties to help surround them." Williams said that he was assisted by two units from the Curry County Sheriff's Office; two canine units from the Clovis police, three Bailey County units, two Texico Marshal's units, and patrolmen from Deaf Smith Highway Patrol, Castro County Highway Patrol, and Bailey County Highway Patrol in addition to five Parmer County units.

Williams said that later five cowboys arrived with their horses from Caprock Feed Yards to assist in the search. as did several local farmers on 4- wheel ATV's and 2 motorcycles.

About 2:30 p.m. the law enforcement agents got one of the youths to come out of the corn patch.

About 10 p.m. Williams got a call that the other youth was

in the custody of a local farmer. Both boys were taken to the juvenile detention center in Lubbock to await extradition back to New Mexico. Williams said that the boys will be charged with theft in Alomogordo.

N.M., in addition to the local charges of failure to wear protective head gear and resisting arrest.

"I want to thank all of the other law enforcement agents who helped with this. We all have to work together," added Williams.

In other police news, Williams said his staff has been working on the reports of stolen lawn mowers here.

"We investigate every case," says Williams. "We may not respond immediately at the time it's reported stolen, but we take reports."

He said his staff has contacted every source where the lawn mowers may be sold within a 200 mile radius. He has also sent teletypes of the reports to Lubbock and Albuquerque.

Williams believes that the rash of local lawn mower thefts may be connected to a rash of lawn mower thefts in Clovis and Muleshoe.

Also:

- On July 24, Stephen Williams, 18, Zephyr, Texas, was arrested by the sheriff's office on a charge of violation of probation. The case is pending in district court.
