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Farwell senior trips ruled out

The Farwell School Board voted Monday to eliminate the annual senior trip, effective next year.

The vote was 6-1, with Katherine White opposed.

The board has had a rule that all senior trips would be within the state or within 500 miles of Farwell. But the board has been granting waivers the past few years. In the last four years, including this one, the trips have been to Arizona, Missouri and twice to California.

The board acted on Farwell High Principal Larry Gregory's recommendation. The points Gregory made were:

- Money is being taken out of the community. It would be better to keep the \$15,000 in the community and used for school activities, such as FHA, Student Council and National Honor Society, to cite just three examples.

- The senior trip was originally designed to benefit kids who normally couldn't go on such a trip because of expense. But it has turned out that many of those kids don't go anyway. Plus, more and more of the work done to raise funds for the trip is being handled by the parents - instead of the kids.

- The trip has become a real distraction during the school day, although that's not the reason this year for Gregory to make his recommendation, he said.

- Liability questions involving if the kids get hurt while on the trip.

In other business, the board:

- Named Stan Stroebel varsity football coach. Currently, he is teaching in the junior high and coached the junior high gridders to a highly successful season. Current varsity grid coach Rex Cumpton has resigned to take a post at Abernathy.

- Hired Misty Riney to teach the gifted / talented program at the elementary and junior high schools. Currently, a teacher's aide is in charge of this program. Ms. Riney, of Olton, recently graduated from West Texas State University.

- Named Gregory athletic director. Cumpton also had this position.

- Hired Darnell Gordon, a graduate of Panhandle State University, to be the junior high and junior varsity girls' basketball coach and to teach social studies. Patsy Camp, who held these coaching posts, will not be coaching next year, said Supt. Richard Boothby.

- Named board member Ronald Byrd to be the delegate to the state school board association's convention.

- Will meet with John Cole, the board's construction manager on the proposed building project, Wednesday night.

It's hoped that Cole will be able to present lower cost estimates so that the project will get under way. Additional classrooms are planned at all three school campuses, plus a new gym. Last estimates showed the project costing about \$2.2 million, with the school only having about \$1.8 million available.

If the cost estimates are unable to be lowered to available funds, it's possible the school board may seek another bond issue, perhaps in the neighborhood of \$200,000 to \$400,000.

Proposal given on dog pound

Texico Mayor Doyal LaRue attended Monday's Farwell City Council meeting to discuss the possibility of Texico using Farwell's animal pound.

Farwell Mayor Chris Gikas gave LaRue a proposal for him to bring back to the Texico council. If the Texico council approves a proposal, it then is to be returned to the Farwell City Council for a vote.

The proposal Gikas gave LaRue included:

"The pound opens at 8 a.m. and closes at 5 p.m. cdt weekdays and is closed all day weekends. Texico will be responsible for any dog left in Farwell's pound as Farwell will not be held liable for any injury or death of dogs Texico places in the Farwell pound.

"Texico will dispose of their dogs after three days the same as Farwell so as not to cause Farwell any lawsuits if the owner of a dog wants to sue after his dog is disposed of. The placing and removing of Texico dogs will be carried out by Texico personnel so as not to involve Farwell personnel.

"Farwell will board Texico's dogs (feed and water) for \$5 a day, with a three day limit per dog unless otherwise arranged."

Texico has no dog pound and, due to finances, is seeking to use Farwell's. Texico checked with Clovis, but Clovis wants \$50 per animal brought to its pound.

Gikas also told LaRue that there had been a misunderstanding as to a statement made at a previous Farwell council meeting that Texico owed money for Texico dogs brought to the Farwell pound in the past. Gikas stressed that no funds were owed.

LaRue told the council he appreciated the opportunity to discuss the animal situation with them and that Texico wants to cooperate on matters that concern the Twin Cities. Gikas noted he hopes that Farwell's new police officer can work together with Texico's police officers.

LaRue also was asked about Texico's water situation since the city only has one functioning well due to the KKR Park contamination problem. LaRue said results of recent tests should be ready within a month and if all goes well a new

Niece, Roberts sentenced

Lloyd Niece, ex-Friona police chief, and Bailey Roberts, ex-Friona police officer, have been sentenced in federal court in Amarillo for making false statements in the regard to the purchase and resale of firearms.

Assistant U.S. District Attorney Chris Drake told the Tribune that Niece and Roberts used City of Friona letterhead stationery, and the city's tax exempt status to purchase firearms between 1989-91. Drake said many of the weapons were on a restricted list - only law enforcement officers could use them.

Niece and Roberts contended that the weapons were purchased for use by a SWAT team.

Niece, 64, of Clovis, was sentenced May 7 to a 12 month sentence in federal prison to be followed by two years of supervised release after completion of his prison term.

On May 10, Roberts, 36, of Merkel, Texas, received a 14 month sentence, a \$5,000 fine and three years supervised release.

Niece resigned from the Friona Police Department in September 1991, and Roberts in July 1991.

Widening moving along

The project to widen Highway 60 in Parmer County is "really moving right along, and will pick up in the next 30 days," according to Texas State Highway Engineer Rhea Bradley.

Most of the work done concerns "dirt work" south of the Running Water Draw. Bradley said that the construction crew has begun mixing base material for the highway construction in a pit west of Bovina.

Under new Texas policy, more non-violent inmates are being left in county jails instead of being sent to state correctional facilities. Counties receive funds for this. Parmer County used this money to buy a new vehicle and hire another deputy.

- Heard Mike Pomper, Border Town Days chairman, thank the city for installing new basketball hoops at Farwell City Park. The basketball court had been donated by ESA to the city. The city council voted last month to put in new hoops, on a one-time basis only.

The council also got a piano donated last year for the community center and had to spend some money to tune it.

Gikas said the city will not accept any more donations unless the donor agrees to help maintain what is being donated.

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

Cotton schedule announced

The 1993 Upland Cotton Schedule of Discounts and Premiums used to determine Commodity Credit Corporation loan prices brings a whole new meaning to the phrase "the good, the bad and the ugly."

The good news for producers according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) is that a close examination of the new schedule reveals far more good news than bad.

For the High Plains the majority of the good news results directly from the work done over the past few years by PCG and Cotton Incorporated's Barky Cotton Task Force says PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson. PCG appreciates the work done by researchers, research facilities and other grower organizations.

The result of this cooperative effort is a new loan schedule that promises anywhere from three to slightly more than seven dollars per bale in additional loan value on the grades most commonly grown here on the High Plains: Strict Low Middling (SLM), color grade 41; SLM Light Spotted, color grade 42; and, Low Middling (LM) Light Spotted, color grade 52. Loan values are based on an average staple length of 33, or 1 1/32 inch.

The 1993 loan schedule promises to add as much as 20 to 25 million dollars to the value of the areas cotton crop through increased loan prices.

Another selling point for the new schedule, which incorporates the decision to have separate Color and Leaf grades, is that a new discount schedule has been developed for bark and other extraneous material. The new bark schedule has both good and bad points say PCG officials.

They point out the fact that, to get away from an automatic one or two grade bark reduction, a fixed discount rate for Level One and Level Two bark had to be established.

Unfortunately the Level One bark discount is higher than the difference between most of the Middling (31) and better grades.

The High Plains, on average, has less than 15 percent of its total crop receive a grade 31 or better. By far the bulk is in the 41-51 and 42-52 range. Work will continue to move the bark discounts even closer to the value research has shown the market actually places on bark.

For the Texas/Oklahoma region Level One bark will require a 250-point discount. Level Two bark has assigned a 600 point discount. The level Two discount may seem severe, however, historically Level Two, or a two grade reduction under the old system, will affect less than one percent of each years crop and only reach a maximum of around three percent in a heavy bark year. A quick look at the 1992 Loan Schedule shows that a two grade reduction from grades 41 and 42 averaged more than 900 points, 300 more than the 600 point Level Two reduction for 1993. A 100-point discount is equivalent to one cent per pound.

The 1992 and 1993 loan discounts for Color grades 41, 42 and 52 with and without bark penalties are compared below.

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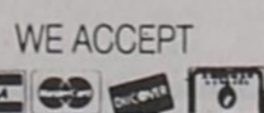

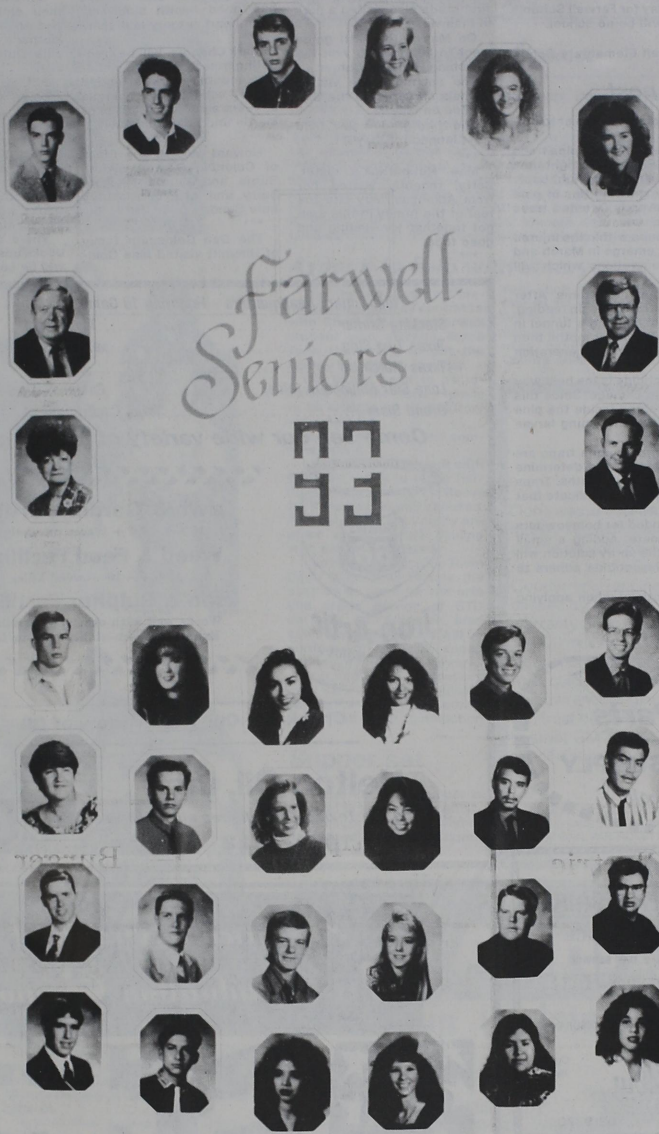

Pine tip moth can be a pest

Brent Baugh, Parmer County's Extension Service entomologist, passed on this information:

The pine tip moth can be a serious pest of young pine trees planted by homeowners on the South Plains. And right now is one of the few times homeowners can effectively fight back.

The larvae of this moth bore into the growing tips of pine trees, causing them to turn brown. Severely infested trees develop a bushy appearance over time.

The tip moth passes the winter as a pupa within the injured terminals and twigs of the tree. Moths emerge in March and April and begin the first of several generations which will occur during the summer.

Female moths lay eggs on the needles and stems. After hatching, the young larvae bore into the tip and begin feeding. After several weeks of feeding and constructing a tunnel in the tip of the stem, the larvae pupate. The adult moths then emerge from the pupal cases, and a new cycle of generation begins.

Properly timed application of an insecticide is the best way to reduce pine tip moth populations and damage. Since this pest spends most of its life cycle protected inside the pine tip, foliar sprays are most effective when the young larvae are just hatching from the egg.

To properly time these applications, pheromone traps are used to detect the presence of adult moths and determine when eggs are being laid by the first cycle of moths. Traps being monitored on the South Plains this spring indicate that now is the time to spray trees for this pest.

Foliar-applied insecticides recommended for homeowners include Orthene, Dursban and dimethoate. Adding a small amount of liquid soap or surfactant to the spray solution will improve control because it helps the insecticide adhere to the treated trees.

Always read and follow label instructions when applying insecticides.

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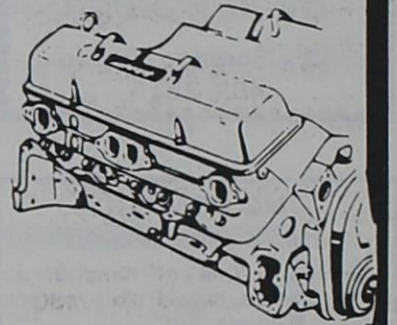

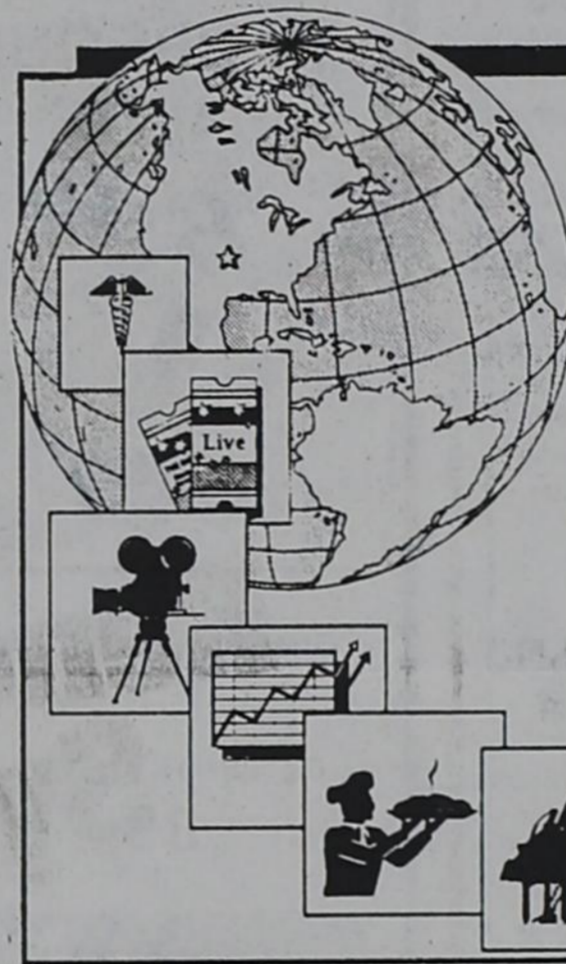

- Tabled improving the city barn due to costs.

- Heard councilman Butch Sharp report that the work set to renovate Lions Park last weekend was postponed because the ground is too dry.

- Heard that Kendale Burch had received a national honor for her work with new vocational sponsors.

- Changed the summer working hours for staff members. They will work from 7:30 a.m. - 4 p.m. Tuesdays - Thursdays and from 8 a.m. - noon on Fridays.

- Made budget changes: A Carl Perkins Grant was used to purchase a microwave for the home economics department; insurance recovery checks were received, and money in the Chapter II fund was transferred to allow for travel.

- Hired Sandra Johnson to audit the budget.
