Parmer voted against lottery

Parmer County residents went to the polls Tuesday to vote on 13 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

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Although Parmer County voted against a state lottery, it ... was passed in the state.

Below are the results, plus statistics for Parmer County, Farwell, Oklahoma Lane and Lazbuddie:

Proposition 1: "The constitutional amendment allowing home-rule cities with a population of 5,000 or less to amend their charters by popular vote."

Passage projected statewide. Results in Parmer County for 931, against, 389; Farwell, for 120, against 55; Oklahoma Lane, for 53, against 37; Lazbuddie, for 98, against 45.

Proposition 2: "The constitutional amendment mandating the repayment to the Department of Transportation of monies expended to assist the Texas Turnpike Authority in the construction, maintenance and operation of turnpikes, toll roads and toll bridges."

Passage statewide unprojected. Results in Parmer Countyfor 430, against 929; Farwell, for 80, against 139; Oklahoma Lane, for 22, against 68; Lazbuddie, for 44, against 101.

Proposition 3: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to further implement and enhance the administration of the veterans' housing assistance and land programs and to expand the investment authority of the Veterans' Land Board."

Passed projected statewide. Results in Parmer County- for 472, against 897; Farwell, for 92, against 130; Oklahoma Lane, for 30, against 59; Lazbuddie, for 52, against 95.

What stupidity.

First, as background, I previously have theorized that with the burgeoning loss of middle class jobs (being substituted by low-income service jobs), and other market factors, such as the loss of factory jobs to other nations, ever increasing taxes and costs, growth of government bureaucracy, etc., we are in a tailspin that will not turn around until the basic problem is understood and addressed by our leaders.

Proposition 4: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$1.1 billion in general obligation bonds for acquiring, constructing, or equipping new prisons or other punishment facilities to confine criminals, mental health and mental retardation institutions, and youth corrections institutions, for major repair or renovation of existing facilities of the institutions, and for the acquisition of, major repair to, or renovation of other facilities for use as state prisons or other punishment facilities."

Passage projected statewide. Results in Parmer County for 707, against 685; Farwell, for 120, against 106; Oklahoma Lane, for 42, against, 52; Lazbuddie, for 87, against 65.

Proposition 5: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the exemption for ad valorem taxes of certain property in an enterprise zone."

Projected failure statewide. Results in Parmer County- for 352, against 974; Farwell, for 65, against 148; Oklahoma Lane, for 18, against 70; Lazbuddie, for 32, against 110.

Proposition 6: "The constitutional amendment creating the Texas Ethics Commission and authorizing the commission to recommend the salary for members of the legislature and the lieutenant governor, subject to voter approval, and to st the per diem for those officials, subject to a limit."

Passage projected statewide. Results in Parmer Countyfor 501, against 859; Farwell, for 95, against 124; Oklahoma Lane, for, 23, against, 67; Lazbuddie, for, 60, against, 85.

Proposition 7: "The constitutional amendment to allow the board of trustees of a statewide public retirement system to invest the funds of the system in a manner that the board considers prudent."

Failure projected statewide. Results in Parmer County- for 286, against 1063; Farwell, for 59, against 158; Oklahoma Lane, for, 14, against 72; Lazbuddie, for 30, against 115.

Proposition 8: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the voters of this state to consider state debt questions in the form of ballot propositions that must clearly describe the amounts, purposes, and sources of payment of the debt only after approval of the propositions by a two - thirds vote of each house of the legislature."

Passage projected statewide. Results in Parmer County for 719, against 609; Farwell, for 126, against 82; Oklahoma Lane, for 27, against 60; Lazbuddie, for 86, against, 57.

Proposition 9: The constitutional amendment authorizing the commission of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years."

Passage projected statewide. Results in Parmer County for 613, against 703; Farwell, for 111, against 97; Oklahoma Lane, for 47, against 42; Lazbuddie, for 75, against 68.

Proposition 10: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxes certain property of a nonprofit corporation that supplies water or provides wastewater service."

Passage projected statewide. Results in Parmer Countyfor 529, against 796; Farwell, for 82, against 127; Oklahoma Lane, for 31, against 56; Lazbuddie, for 73, against 73.

Proposition 11: "The constitutional amendment authoriz-




Fashion show planned


The Parmer County Extension Home Economics Committee is sponsoring a Heritage and Home Sewers fashion show.

Hunter safety

classes set

Farwell 4-H Club hunter safety classes will be offered Nov. 15 - by Richard Montgomery, a Texas Parks and Wildlife Department certified instructor.

The first class will be held at 4 p.m. on Nov. 15 at the Farwell High Ag classroom. Texas has a mandatory pro-

gram requiring persons of a specific age group to complete the course before they can legally hunt in Texas.

Effective Sept. 1, 1991, hunters whose date of birth is during the period Sept. 2 1971 through Aug. 31, 1975 must have successfully completed the course to hunt in Texas.

Those exempt from this law are hunters whose date of birth is on or before Sept. 1, 1971; hunters who have been certified in the voluntary Texas Hunter Safety Education Program; and hunters certified through another state's resource agency. Also exempt are hunters under 17 years of age whose date of birth is on or after Sept. 2, 1971 when accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older.

Hunters under 12 years of age must be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older.

Those under 12 may attend hunter safety classes and receive recognition of attendance, but must retake the course after turning 12.



- Leland Brockman scored on a 17-yard pass from Zamora; the Gonzales kick was good.


- Miles was tackled in his end zone for a safety.
