Parmer voted against lottery

Parmer County residents went to the polls Tuesday to vote on 13 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

Although Parmer County voted against a state lottery, it was passed in the state.

Below are the results, plus statistics for Parmer County, Farwell, Oklahoma Lane and Lazbuddie:

Proposition 1: "The constitutional amendment allowing home-rule cities with a population of 5,000 or less to amend their charters by popular vote."
Passage projected statewide. Results in Parmer County - for 931, against 389; Farwell, for 120, against 55; Oklahoma Lane, for 53, against 37; Lazbuddie, for 98, against 45.

Proposition 2: "The constitutional amendment mandating the repayment to the Department of Transportation of monies expended to assist the Texas Turnpike Authority in the construction, maintenance and operation of turnpikes, toll roads and toll bridges."
Passage statewide unprojected. Results in Parmer County - for 430, against 929; Farwell, for 80, against 139; Oklahoma Lane, for 22, against 68; Lazbuddie, for 44, against 101.

Proposition 3: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to further implement and enhance the administration of the veterans' housing assistance and land programs and to expand the investment authority of the Veterans' Land Board."

Passed projected statewide. Results in Parmer County - for 472, against 897; Farwell, for 92, against 130; Oklahoma Lane, for 30, against 59; Lazbuddie, for 52, against 95.

Proposition 4: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$1.1 billion in general obligation bonds for acquiring, constructing, or equipping new prisons or other punishment facilities to confine criminals, mental health and mental retardation institutions, and youth corrections institutions, for major repair or renovation of existing facilities of the institutions, and for the acquisition of, major repair to, or renovation of other facilities for use as state prisons or other punishment facilities."

Passed projected statewide. Results in Parmer County - for 707, against 685; Farwell, for 120, against 106; Oklahoma Lane, for 42, against 52; Lazbuddie, for 87, against 65.

Proposition 5: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the exemption for ad valorem taxes of certain property in an enterprise zone."
Projected failure statewide. Results in Parmer County - for 352, against 974; Farwell, for 65, against 148; Oklahoma Lane, for 18, against 70; Lazbuddie, for 32, against 110.

Proposition 6: "The constitutional amendment creating the Texas Ethics Commission and authorizing the commission to recommend the salary for members of the legislature and the lieutenant governor, subject to voter approval, and to set the per diem for those officials, subject to a limit."

Passed projected statewide. Results in Parmer County - for 501, against 859; Farwell, for 95, against 124; Oklahoma Lane, for 23, against 67; Lazbuddie, for 60, against 85.

Proposition 7: "The constitutional amendment to allow the board of trustees of a statewide public retirement system to invest the funds of the system in a manner that the board considers prudent."
Failure projected statewide. Results in Parmer County - for 286, against 1063; Farwell, for 59, against 158; Oklahoma Lane, for 14, against 72; Lazbuddie, for 30, against 115.

Proposition 8: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the voters of this state to consider state debt questions in the form of ballot propositions that must clearly describe the amounts, purposes, and sources of payment of the debt only after approval of the propositions by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature."

Passed projected statewide. Results in Parmer County - for 719, against 609; Farwell, for 126, against 82; Oklahoma Lane, for 27, against 60; Lazbuddie, for 86, against 57.

Proposition 9: The constitutional amendment authorizing the commission of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years."

Passed projected statewide. Results in Parmer County - for 613, against 703; Farwell, for 111, against 97; Oklahoma Lane, for 47, against 42; Lazbuddie, for 75, against 68.

Proposition 10: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxes certain property of a nonprofit corporation that supplies water or provides wastewater service."

Passed projected statewide. Results in Parmer County - for 529, against 796; Farwell, for 82, against 127; Oklahoma Lane, for 31, against 56; Lazbuddie, for 73, against 73.

Proposition 11: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a state lottery."
Passed projected statewide. Results in Parmer County - for 611, against 829; Farwell, for 102, against 138; Oklahoma Lane, for 37, against 58; Lazbuddie, for 68, against 86.

Proposition 12: "The constitutional amendment to increase from 20 percent to 50 percent the percentage of Texas water development bonds previously authorized by Texas voters that may be issued for economically distressed areas."

Passed projected statewide. Results in Parmer County - for 521, against 820; Farwell, for 107, against 108; Oklahoma Lane, for 28, against 64; Lazbuddie, for 61, against 84.

Proposition 13: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds not to exceed \$300,000,000 to continue existing programs to provide educational loans to students with repayments of student loans applied toward retirement of the bonds."

Passed projected statewide. Results in Parmer County - for 814, against 569; Farwell, for 131, against 89; Oklahoma Lane, for 43, against 47; Lazbuddie, for 95, against 56.

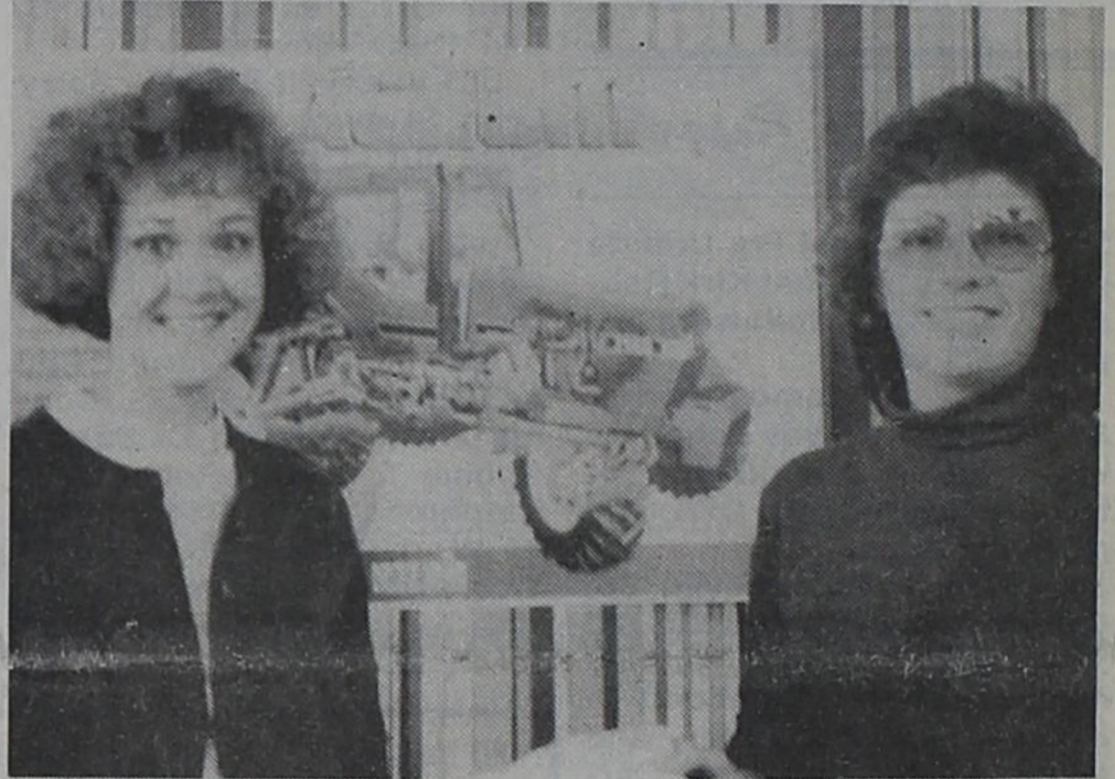

Clovis agrees to take Farwell's garbage

Farwell may have found an answer to its trash problem down the road.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has announced some time back that it would put in regulations next year that, in effect, would force the closing of small city landfills - and also prohibit open burning.

The Farwell landfill is already closed for burning. It allows tree limbs, etc., to be buried correctly.

In looking ahead to the time when, and if, the Farwell landfill is closed, the city council has spoken with garbage company representatives about hauling the city's trash to landfills in Canyon and Lubbock. As is

obvious, it would be expensive, considering the distance.

But it has been learned that the Clovis City Commission on Aug. 15 approved a resolution allowing Waste Management of New Mexico to dump trash from Farwell at the Clovis landfill.

Waste Management currently is the trash collector for Texico.

Jerry McCully, Clovis finance director - and a Farwell High School graduate - said the new rates that go into effect Jan. 1, 1992, would be:

- \$3.50 per cubic yard of compacted solid waste.
- \$1.75 per cubic yard of uncompacted solid waste.

the lead in the article. 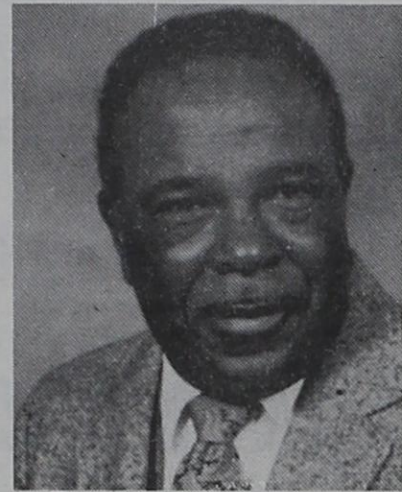

Hunter safety classes set

Farwell 4-H Club hunter safety classes will be offered Nov. 15 - by Richard Montgomery, a Texas Parks and Wildlife Department certified instructor.

The first class will be held at 4 p.m. on Nov. 15 at the Farwell High Ag classroom.

Texas has a mandatory program requiring persons of a specific age group to complete the course before they can legally hunt in Texas.

Effective Sept. 1, 1991, hunters whose date of birth is during the period Sept. 2 1971 through Aug. 31, 1975 must have successfully completed the course to hunt in Texas.

Those exempt from this law are hunters whose date of birth is on or before Sept. 1, 1971; hunters who have been certified in the voluntary Texas Hunter Safety Education Program; and hunters certified through another state's resource agency. Also exempt are hunters under 17 years of age whose date of birth is on or after Sept. 2, 1971 when accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older.

Hunters under 12 years of age must be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older.

Those under 12 may attend hunter safety classes and receive recognition of attendance, but must retake the course after turning 12.

Proof of certification must be carried at all times while hunting with all firearms and archery equipment. Failure to carry proper certification while hunting constitutes a Class C Parks and Wildlife Code Misdemeanor which is punishable by a fine of \$25 to \$500.

Those interested in taking the 4-H Hunter Safety class need to contact Richard Montgomery at Farwell High School.

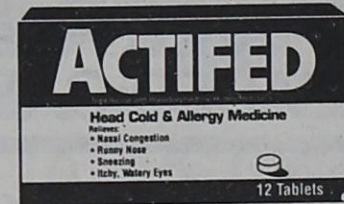

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Steers fall to Happy, 33-8

The Farwell Steers fell to the Happy Cowboys, 33-8 last Friday in an away game.

The loss ended any chances for the Steers to make the district playoffs. Farwell is now 1-3 in district and 17-1 overall. The Steers end the season tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m. when they host Vega.

Against Happy, Farwell lost six fumbles and had an interception. Four of their first five offensive drives were stopped by lost fumbles.

Happy kicked off and Lupe Garza returned it to the Steer 25. He suffered a shoulder injury on the play and left the game.

Chad Byrd connected with Brent Harrison for a 16-yard pass play, then Harrison raced for another 8 yards before Farwell lost a fumble at the Happy 46.

Happy was held and punted. Harrison returned it to the Farwell 30. Lingnau burst through center for 10 yards, then Farwell lost a fumble at its 35.

The Steer defense dug in and on a 4th and 6 play, a Derrick Haseloff tackle halted Happy again at the Steer 14.

As the second quarter began, the Steers moved the ball behind 12- and 15-yard runs by Kirk Lingnau. Farwell got to midfield before having to punt. It was returned 80 yards for a TD at 4:35. The kick was good and Happy led 7-0.

Lance Anderson returned the punt to the Steer 25. Lingnau gained 15 yards on two carries before Farwell lost a fumble at its 40. Happy quickly capitalized: a 18-yard pass and 19-yard TD run at 6:20. A bad snap killed the extra point and it was 13-0.

Farwell started its next possession on its 28. Ruben Lucio gained 5 before Farwell lost a fumble at its own 10. Happy scored from the 2 and it was 19-0; the extra point run failed.

Harrison returned the kick to the Steer 35. Farwell was held and punted to the Happy 24. Brian Johnson had a strong tackle for a 7-yard loss. The teams traded possessions as the half ended.

Farwell kicked off in the third quarter to the Happy 35. Clint Austin, Johnson and Kade Kent had good tackles but Happy moved the ball well. At 7:20, the Cowboys scored on an 8-yard run. The run for extra points failed and it was 25-0.

On offense, the Steers went for it on 4th and 1 at its own 43. Lucio made the first down. But 2 unsportsmanlike conduct calls against Farwell resulted in 2nd and 40. Farwell then lost a fumble at its 15.

At 3:27, Happy scored from the 1. The pass for extra points was good and it was 33-0.

On offense, Anderson ran for 11 and Lingnau gained 10. As the final period began, Farwell had a 4th and 8 situation on the Happy 32. Lingnau broke loose to the Cowboy 13. Then on 4th and 1 at the Happy 4, Byrd kept for 2 yards and a first down. But Farwell lost a fumble at the Happy 1. But the Steers gang tackled the Happy runner for a safety, making the score 33-2.

On offense, Harrison had a good runback. Lingnau and Byrd runs gained a first down. Lingnau ran around end to get to the Happy 1, then bulled over for the TD at 3:47. The run for extra points failed and it was 33-8.

An onside kick failed and Happy started at its 35. The Cowboys were stopped and Farwell started on its 20. Byrd connected with Harrison for a 5-yard pass and Roger Billingsley for another 7. Farwell then tried a trick play that

Defensively, we stopped many of the things they did, but could not overcome the field position game."

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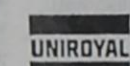
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
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

Longhorns pulverize Amherst, ready for Silvertown showdown

The Lazbuddie Longhorns once again rolled over another opponent last Friday, this time Amherst, by a resounding 74-39 score.

The victory put the Longhorns at 9-0 overall and 4-0 in district. They face a showdown tonight (Friday) against Silvertown, which is also 4-0 in district and 8-1 overall. Both teams are headed into the playoffs.

Lazbuddie opened the game with Paul Williams as starting quarterback. He had been injured early in the season. He was hurt again but Mario Zamora came on at QB to continue the Lazbuddie scoring outburst.

After Amherst took an 8-0 lead, Lazbuddie scored 2 points on a safety when Amherst ace runner Jason Miles (410 yards on 32 carries) fell on the ball in his end zone. Amherst scored again, taking a 16-2 lead.

Then the Longhorns came on in a rush:
- Paul Williams hit Eric Williams with a 44-yard TD pass; the Luis Gonzales kick was good.

- Paul Williams hit Matt Cozby with a pass for a 31-yard TD; Kirk Jesko took a pass from Gonzales for the extra point.
- Cozby scored on a 37-yard pass from Paul Williams; the Gonzales kick was good.

Thus, Lazbuddie had a 25-16 lead in the second quarter. Amherst scored on a 1-yard run by Miles before Cozby scored on a 32-yard pass from Paul Williams, followed by a Gonzales kick. The half ended with the Longhorns leading, 33-24.

The third quarter opened with Miles scoring on a 54-yard run for Amherst, closing the score to 33-31. Then the Longhorns went wild again:

- Cozby scored on a 37-yard pass from Zamora; the Gonzales kick was good.

- Leland Brockman scored on a 17-yard pass from Zamora; the Gonzales kick was good.

- Miles was tackled in his end zone for a safety.
- Kirk Jesko tallied on a 53-yard run; Gonzales threw the extra point pass to Terry Darling.

- Cozby scored from the 10 yard line on an interception; the Gonzales kick was good.

After Amherst scored on a 16-yard run by Miles,

Lazbuddie's final score was made on a 49-yard pass play from Zamora to Brockman; the Gonzales kick was good.

Jesko led Lazbuddie in rushing with 85 yards on 10 carries. Paul Williams hit 9 of 20 passes for 188 yards, and Zamora was 7 of 10 for 153. Top receivers were Eric Williams, 6 for 86 yards; Cozby, 7 for 813; and Brockman, 3 for 71.

Amherst totaled 468 yards to Lazbuddie's 510. Amherst lost 2 of 4 fumbles; Lazbuddie 1 of 5. Lazbuddie had 10 first downs to Amherst's 15. Amherst punted 3 times for 35 yard average; Lazbuddie, 3 for 33 yard average. Amherst was penalized 6 times for 64 yards; Lazbuddie, 12 for 130.

Coach C.W. Williams was gratified with the victory, especially in light of the running by Amherst's Miles. The 6'2,

215-lb. runner "ran great," the coach summed up.

Williams is concerned with the Longhorns' injury situation. Gonzales had a dislocated thumb and Jesko a bruised shoulder. Both are expected to play against Silvertown, though. Also, Monty Foster received a concussion and Frank Gonzales a sprained knee.

On the quarterback front, Paul Williams is expected to start against Silvertown although he bruised his collarbone, which had been injured earlier in the season. Zamora will be the backup QB. Also, Brett Thomas, who led the Longhorns to several victories earlier this season before going down with an injury, may be back for the playoffs, although he won't play against Silvertown, the coach said.
