13 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution. Although Parmer County voted against a state lottery, it Aas passed in the state.

classes set

Farwell 4-H Club hunter safety classes will be offered Nov. 15 - by Richard Montgomery, a Texas Parks and
Wildlife Department certified instructor.
The first class will be held at 4 p.m. on Nov. 15 at the Farwell High Ag classroom. Texas has a mandatory pro-
gram requiring persons of a gram requiring persons of a plete the course before they can legally hunt in Texas. Effective Sept. 1, 1991, hunters whose date of birth
is during the period Sept. is during the period Sept.
21971 through Aug. 31, 1975 must have successfully completed the course to hunt in Texas.
Those exempt from this law are hunters whose date
of birth is on or before Sept of birth is on or before Sept.
1, 1971; hunters who have been certified in the voluntary Texas Hunter Safety Education Program; and hunters certified through another state's resource agency. Also
exempt are hunters under 17 years of age whose date of birth is on or after Sept. 2, 1971 when accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older. Hunters under 12 years of
age must be acimen age must be accompanied by
a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older.
Those under 12 may attend hunter safety classes and receive recognition of attendance, but must retake the course after turning 12. be carried at all times while hunting with all firearms and archery equipment. Failure to carry proper certification while hunting constitutes a
Class C Parks and Wildlife Class C Parks and Wildlife
Code Misdemeanor which is punishable by a fine of $\$ 25$ to $\$ 500$.
Those interested in taking the $4-\mathrm{H}$ Hunter Safety
class need to contact Richard Montgomery at Farwell High School.
