## The mystery of the tornado

Editor's note: Jose M. Garcia, the Warning Coordination Meteorologist at the National Health Service in Amarillo, featured the tornado that hit Parmer County in the Spring issue of "The Dryline." Here is what he had to say:

One of the strongest tornados we have had this year was an F2 strong tornado that occurred in Parmer County, just northeast of Farwell. On the early evening of March 26, strong thunderstorms began to develop along a dryline in extreme eastern New Mexico. Remember, the dryline is a boundary between dry and moist air and is often a trigger for thunderstorm development. As the dryline moved into the Texas Panhandle, one of the storms developed into a strong thunderstorm.

Damage was reported at 6:35 p.m. cst, and there was still daylight at this time. Based on a lack of visual confirmation and initial reports of damage, it was not clear whether the storm had produced a strong downburst or a tornado.

The mystery was solved very easily with an on-site damage survey. During the drive to Farwell, it was quickly evident that the thunderstorms had produced heavy rainfall. Water had ponded in fields and ditches. Jim Curtis (Farwell Emergency Manager) and Rex Williams (Parmer County Sheriff), were quite nice in providing details on the damage and taking us on an inspection of the damage.

The inspection revealed damage to two residences just northeast of Farwell. At this time the tornado was confirmed based on two pieces of evidence. First, large trees were found to be completely uprooted. Second, a large wooden beam traveled 200 yards and smashed into a brick home.

Generally, damage caused by large missiles is produced by a tornado. One of the strangest things found in the damage was that one end of a large tin metal structure had been lifted completely off the ground and very little damage occurred to

the heavy machinery inside. Still, there was the mystery of why no one really saw the tornado. One reason was that luckily, no one was at the residences that experienced damage. A couple of people

did see the roof fly off the building they were in, but initial thoughts were of downburst winds. As it turns out, the roof was probably torn off by the outer winds of the tornado. The large amounts of rain and lack of visual tornado confirmation, indicate the thunderstorm was a Heavy Precipitation (HP) supercell. This type of storm produces

very heavy rainfall and makes tornado spotting quite difficult. Also, many times the wall cloud can develop on the right front side of the thunderstorm. Therefore, even if a spotter is on the right rear side of the storm, rainfall can obscure the view under the normally rain-free base.

The following information are excerpts from preliminary Storm Data Tornado reports that are prepared at the National Weather Service in Amarillo:

Strong thunderstorms developed along a dryline in extreme eastern New Mexico March 27. As the storms moved east into Texas one of the thunderstorms developed into an HP supercell. A tornado (F2) developed in the thunderstorm and touched down just northwest of Farwell. At this location the tornado damaged two residences. A NWS survey revealed evidence of small to large missiles.

West facing windows were completely blown out from both residences. In one of the homes, the wind moved through the attic areas and pushed out through a ceiling located in the garage. At this same residence a large tree was uprooted and a travel trailer was upended and destroyed.

As the tornado continued northeast, it destroyed power lines and power poles. Seven miles northeast of Farwell, the tornado completely totaled an old wood constructed home. Further to the northeast the tornado lifted a quonset type barn completely over and to the west of its foundation. Several pieces of heavy machinery inside the structure were left unharmed.

The tornado lifted just south of Bovina, but before doing so, outer winds tore the roof off the Caprock Feeders building just south of Bovina. Throughout the 10 mile path length. wheel type irrigation systems were overturned.

As the thunderstorm continued moving northeast, quarter size hail was reported in Friona. Then, a second tornado (F1) developed and touched down briefly just west of Friona. Power lines were downed and a grain storage facility was destroyed. One of the tin metal silos was lifted into the air across a major highway and came down to rest some 400 yards to the northeast.

#### Bond issue topic

The planning for a bond issue was discussed at the June 11 meeting of the Farwell School Board.

Supt. Richard Boothby reported the findings of the District Improvement Council, which met June 8. He discussed the school system's needs as expressed by community members.

What the bond issue would cover, and its cost, are still to be determined. Probably planned is a new gym along with several other improvements. The range likely would be between \$1 million and \$2 million.

Currently, the school system has no bonded indebtedness. Sschool officials would like to either keep the tax rate the same or at a small hike.

The board reviewed two old building plans that the school system had on file. Neither quite matched the proposals the Improvement Council suggested.

It was suggested that the principals and administrators be involved in the planning. A meeting will be set up with an architect, board members and administrators.

Boothby reviewed the legal steps which must be followed for the school system to hold a bond issue election, and he discussed the financial procedures.

"I was told that Farwell would get a AAA rrating," said Boothby. "We need to find out what we are going to do, and what it will cost."

Charles Christian suggested it might be possible to fund classroom building projects as they are needed instead of having a bond issue. He proposed using some operational funds along with CED funds and County School funds to finance the cost of adding three or four classrooms without either a bond issue or tax increase.

"If we could be comfortable with just classrooms and pay for them as we go, it might be better in the long run," said Christian.

Byrd mentioned that the project began with the expressed need for a new gym, a project which would be much more costly than adding a few classrooms. He suggested meeting with the administrators to find out what the school really needs.

"We've got to get rid of those portable buildings," said Boothby. "It's against a new federal law. They say we cannot have special education children where no other children go."

In other business, the board: - Funded 19 1/2 of its 44 teachers on the career ladder. Some weren't funded because they weren't eligible

Sometimes, Ehlo had his head turned to the left when Michael went that way. Other times, Ehlo had his head turned to the right when Michael went that way.

Talk about quickness. Talk about hang time. Talk about a 6th sense. Talk about Michael.

Michael is the greatest basketball player I have ever seen. And I've been watching college and pro ball since the mid-1950's.

In the pros, George Mikan dominated at first. Then, came Bob Pettit. And Wilt the Stilt vs. the Boston Celtics. The shot blocking timing of Bill Russell was a thing of beauty. And there were the Big O (Robertson), Elgin Baylor, the long-range shooting artistry of Jerry West, the drive off the wing by Dr. J (Erving), the magic of Johnson, the great all-around game of Larry Bird.

But Michael Jordan simply is better than any of them. And that's a fact.



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


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#### Letter To The Editor

To the Editor:

Since Friday, May 29th, the citizens of Farwell and Texico have been confronted with a new ethical question: "Shall we play the Texas Lottery?"

Evidence shows that many have chosen to play the Lottery. Lottery tickets sold in Parmer County during the first week of sales amounted to \$51,000. Statewide, sales climbed to \$102,400,000. A total of 14,712 Texas retailers are selling lottery tickets. Citizens have answered, "Yes, we will play the lottery!" But have these same citizens really thought about the question?

This is a question of ethics and morality because the lottery is gambling! Gambling "is the act of risking what is yours in order to get what belongs to another with nothing given in return." Every aspect of this definition applies to the Texas Lottery. If gambling is immoral and the Lottery is gambling, then the Texas Lottery is immoral. The Texas Lottery is not necessarily ethical and moral merely because it has been legalized by civil authority!

In truth, gambling and the Texas lottery must be deemed immoral because they exhibit a desire to take what belongs to another without giving a fair return. This is the real appeal of gambling. It offers an exciting "hope" to the gambler that he or she will sometime get something for nothing. The desire to have what belongs to another is called covetousness. Taking what belongs to another without giving a fair return is stealing.

Gambling in the Texas Lottery is also immoral because it seeks gain without productive labor. In this regard, citizens of "lottery states" have been sold a truck load of "lotto baloney". We have been sold the idea that life's dreams can be fulfilled through chance rather than through hard work, education, and saving for retirement. A Higher Authority has written, "Let him who steals steal no longer; but rather let him labor, performing with his own hands what is good, in order that he may have something to share with him who has need."

Playing the Texas Lottery is unethical because it also victimizes the citizens, families, and resources of the State. Texas Gambler's Anonymous received 2,500 calls in the three days following May 29th. The Texas Council on Problem and Compulsive Gambling received 5,300 calls during the first week of sales; half of these calls were from distressed victims. Newspapers reported about the man who spent his \$1,500 paycheck on lottery tickets and had nothing left to pay his bills. A mother broke into her daughter's piggy bank in order to play the Lottery. A Houston mother could not feed her children because she spent her grocery money on tickets.

Two Duke University economists, Charles Clotfelter and Philip Cook, have authored "Selling Hope: State Lotteries in America." They present evidence that state lotteries hit hardest those with the lowest incomes. Their study of the Maryland Lottery showed that people earning less than \$10,000 per year buy more tickets than any other income group.

When lottery players like those above squander their earnings, who will feed and care for their families? You and I will through taxation and government welfare programs. Then what will these gamblers do with their welfare benefits? The addiction will be fed before empty mouths! Here begins a vicious cycle that the gamblers, family victims, and society can ill afford!

This is simply a plea to the citizens of Farwell and Texico to think soberly about the Texas Lottery. It is not a threat to boycott local retailers who sell Lottery tickets, but a request for self examination. It is a plea for citizens and retailers to act in the best interests of our families, our society, and our souls. The Texas Lottery is unethical and immoral!

#### Sheriff's Report

Here is the weekly report from Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams:

The Parmer County Sheriff's office and Texico Marshal's office joined law enforcement agents from the Curry County Metro Drug Task Force Sunday morning for an areawide drug raid.

The raid concluded a 3month undercover operation and resulted in 75 arrest warrants with charges ranging from the distribution of marijuana to trafficking cocaine and the seizure of nine vehicles.

Warrants were issued on 36 persons, including three local residents:

- William A. (Bill) Sanger, 34, 701 State, Texico, charged with one count of delivery of a controlled substance, marijuana.

- Peter Moncoya, 25, 815 Lamar, Texico, charged with one count of delivery of a controlled substance, marijuana.

- Leopoldo Gonzales, Jr.,

33, Farwell, charged with two counts of delivery of a controlled substance, marijuana, and 1 count of possession of over 2 oz. but less than 4 oz. of a controlled substance.

Williams said area law enforcement agents met in Clovis before 7 a.m. Sunday to coordinate the raid.

"They wanted everybody to hit them at the same time. We had two teams out. We tried to hit here and Texico and Clovis all at the same time," said Williams.

On June 12, Montgomery Bisig, 30, Bovina, was arrested by the Texas Highway Patrol on a charge of DWI 2nd. The case is pending in county court.

On June 13, Angel Espinoza, 18, Amarillo, was arrested by the sheriff's office on charges of theft and carrying a prohibitive weapon. The case is pending.

On June 15, Mario Gomez, 35, Bovina, was arrested by Bovina police on a charge of cruelty to animals. He was fined \$75 and court costs.

#### Recipe of Week

Cumberland Apple Tart

Crust:

1/2 c. (1 stick) butter or margarine, softened

1/2 c. brown sugar

1 c. Martha White All Purpose Flour

1/4 c. quick oats

1/2 c. finely chopped pecans (optional)

Filling

2 large Golden Delicious apples, peeled and thinly sliced (about 3 cups), tossed with juice of half a lemon

1/2 c. sugar

1/2 tsp. cinnamon

Preheat oven to 375 F. Lightly grease a 9 - inch pie plate. To prepare crust, cream butter and sugar with electric mixer in large mixing bowl. Blend in flour, oats, and if desired, pecans. Form dough into ball. Dust fingertips with flour. Press into bottom and up sides of prepared pie plate. Arrange apple slices evenly over crust in circular pattern starting from outside edge working toward the middle. Fill in any gaps until all apple slices are used. Combine sugar and cinnamon and sprinkle evenly over apples. Bake 35 to 40 minutes, or until crust is lightly browned and apples are tender. Cool on wire rack. Store covered in refrigerator.





Then she had the challenge of finding an especially good piece of meat in Lovington for the recipe. Her meat market supplied her with a round steak that weighed more than 2 pounds without any fat or bone on it.

Then all she had to do is assemble all of the necessary ingredients, transport all of them including the meat to the contest in a portable icebox, and keep the ingredients cool until contest time, and cook her recipe in front of the judges.




