'Tombstone' realistic

From wife Judy:
Mike and I went to the movies recently to see "Tombstone."

Later, when I talked with my kids and my younger sister, I was asked the same question: "Was it really so violent?" They were all too young to have grown up with the story.

Yes, Tombstone really was that violent. Actually, Cochise County's history was probably a whole lot more violent than the new movie showed.

The movie compressed a lot of incidents that actually were spread out over more than a year. This made the killing seem more compressed than it actually was. Otherwise, the movie seemed to tell the OK Corral story just about the way I'd heard it told before.

The movie was full of historical trivia. Even the old jargon was mixed into the dialog.

One thing that surprised me was that the movie attributed the death of Johnny Ringo to shooting by Doc Holliday. I had thought Johnny Ringo was a fictitious TV character.

But I learned that there really was a John Peters (Dutch John) Ringo who was found dead July 14, 1882, in a grove of oaks near the Smith ranch house. The verdict was suicide, although the body was tied to a tree.

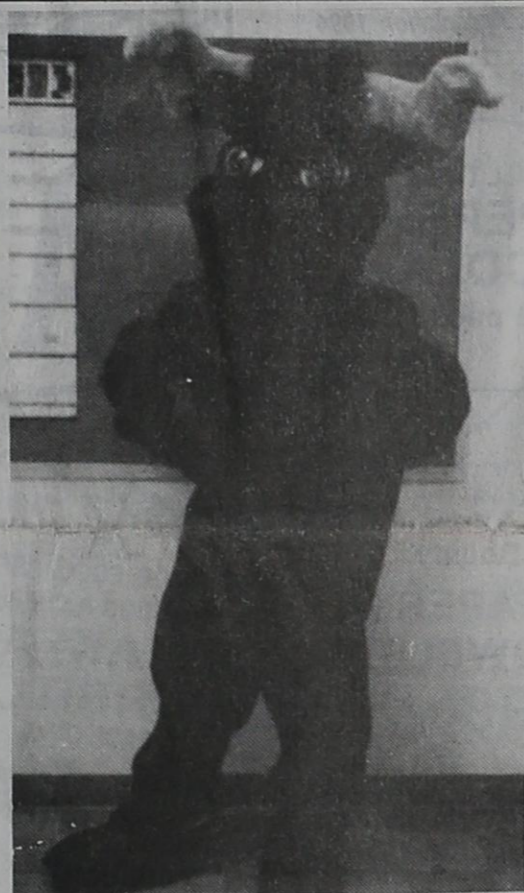
The suspects listed in that death were named Leslie, O'Rourke and Earp - not Doc Holliday, as the movie portrayed.

There was a Ringo - Holliday feud. Early in 1882, Holliday tried to get Ringo to take part in a stage coach robbery, but Ringo declined because of Holliday's unpredictable temperament. Later Ringo tried to get Holliday into a fight, and the two had to be physically separated by their friends.

The film showed a humorous scene inside the Birdcage Theatre where drunks shot off their six shooters right in the middle of the show.

It might have been a bit overdone, but one story tells that when "Uncle Tom's Cabin"

Parmer leads in pivot sprinklers

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 reports that an additional 1,507 center pivot irrigation systems have been put into operation between 1990 and 1993 within the 15-county High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 service area, according to a recent pivot inventory update by the District. This brings the total number of center pivot sprinklers in use in the District to 6,433.

The current tally shows Parmer County with 1,258 center pivots; Lamb County, 1,250; Castro County, 786; Bailey County, 671; and Hale County, 604.

The total in other counties in the District is: Deaf Smith, 433; Hockley, 349; Cochran, 347; Lubbock, 304; Lynn, 170; Crosby, 141; Floyd, 78; Randall, 39; Potter, 3; and Armstrong, 0.

The largest increase in center pivot use from 1990 to 1993 was found in Castro County where 230 new pivots were installed. This is followed by Hale County with 216; Parmer County, 197; Lamb County, 185; Lubbock County, 135; Deaf Smith, 109; Cochran County, 104 and Lynn County, 60.

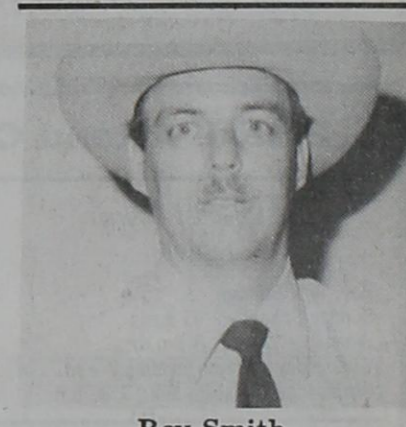
Farwell

Donna Hall appears on 'Geraldo' TV show

Donna Hall, formerly of Hub, appeared on the Geraldo TV show Jan. 26.

Mrs. Hall, 42, was found guilty in December in 287th District Court of aggravated assault.

She had been charged with pouring sulphuric acid on her husband, Kevin Hall, 37, in February 1993 during a domestic quarrel. It caused him to have third-degree burns over one third of his body. They have since gotten divorced.

Mrs. Hall had pled not guilty, alleging continued abuse by her husband. She talked

about this abuse on the Geraldo show.

Mrs. Hall was sentenced to 10 years' probation, a \$10,000 fine and restitution for her husband's hospital bills. At the time, these bills were thought to be over \$300,000. They actually amounted to \$109,000.

Mrs. Hall was given permission from the court to go to New York for the show. Her attorney accompanied her. Mrs. Hall now lives in Portales.

Proceeds from her TV appearance, believed to be between \$500 and \$1,000, will go toward the restitution.

Banter

was performed at the Birdcage in 1882, a drunk actually shot one of the dogs nipping at Little Eliza's heels as she crossed the ice flow. He not only had to go to jail and pay a fine, he also had to give up his horse to the dog's owner.

"Tombstone" had one scene showing a gunfight while a building burned in the background. As we watched, I asked Mike why that building was burning. He didn't know. The movie didn't explain why the building was burning or what the fire had to do with the story.

I later found that in June 1881 four blocks of downtown Tombstone burned to the ground. (They were rebuilt in two weeks' time.) Fires were a major problem in the desert southwest.

For example, in Jerome, Ariz., a copper mining town near Tombstone, a newspaper once reported: "Jerome Burns Again! Entire Business District of 24 Saloons and 14 Chinese Restaurants Destroyed!"

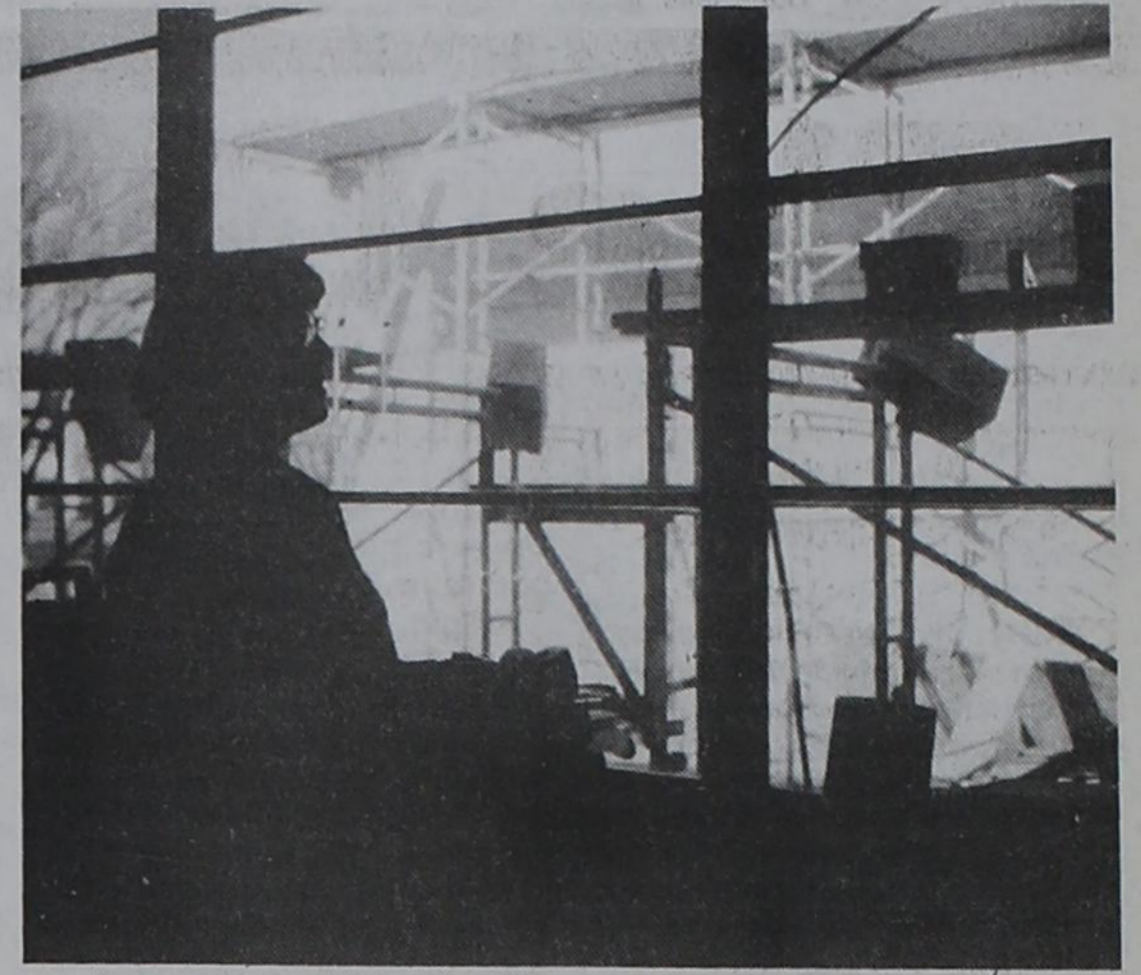

LEGAL PUBLICATIONS

NEW MEXICO NOTICE OF PROPERTY TAX REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

Property which was valued in 1993 in this county by the county assessor is not required to be reported or rendered for 1994 or subsequent years, EXCEPT FOR:

1. mobile homes
2. livestock, and
3. land used for agricultural purposes

If, for any reason, your property was not valued last year and it is subject to valuation this year, you are required by law to report it to the county assessor on forms provided either by mail or at the assessor's office.

All nongovernmental entities (property owners) which claim to be exempt from the property tax must report their property and claim their exemption for 1994 if the exemption was not claimed in 1993.

Reports for mobile homes, livestock, land use for agricultural purposes, property not valued last year and claims for exemptions by nongovernmental entities must be completed and mailed or delivered to the county assessor not later than the last day of February.

If you made improvements to your real property and:

1. the improvements cost more than \$1,000 and
2. a building permit for the improvements was not issued;

you must report the nature of the improvements and their cost to the assessor not later than the last day of February. These reports must be on forms provided by that assessor.

If you believe your property decreased in value during the preceding year, you must report, on forms provided by the assessor, a signed statement which:

1. describes the property affected,
2. states the cause and nature of decrease in value, and
3. states the amount you contend the value has decreased.

This statement must be filed with the county assessor no later than the last day of February.

If the veterans exemption was claimed and allowed in 1993 no new claim for that exemption is required to be filed. However, if that exemption was not claimed and allowed in 1993 and it is now claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor the form provided by the assessor.

If the head-of-family exemption was claimed and allowed in 1993 no new claim for that exemption is required to be filed. However, if that exemption was not claimed and allowed in 1993 and it is now claimed, claim must be made by the last day of February by filing with the assessor the form provided by the assessor.

Beginning in the 1982 tax year, taxpayers are responsible for declaring their property classification to the assessor, as residential or nonresidential. When the declaration is accepted by the assessor, it shall remain as such and need not be made in subsequent years unless the classification changes. If a taxpayer has not declared their property to be residential in 1993 and desires that classification for 1994 they must complete a declaration of residential classification and return the signed declaration to the county assessor's office by the last day of February, 1994.

Certain mineral property and personal property of contractors operating in more than one county are required to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division of the State of New Mexico in Santa Fe. Information about property to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division can be obtained from the county assessor or the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division, Central Assessment Bureau, P.O. Box 630, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87509, Phone: (505) 827-0893.

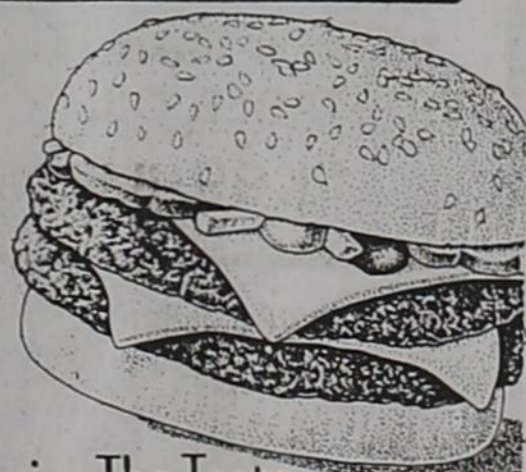
