Although Mrs. Klump has no experience in the floral business, Mrs. Kirkland worked for about five years at A Touch of Country before it closed.

Now I know what you are thinking: "Where did they get the name." You see, they wanted something original for the name of the shop. They even thought about combining their name and calling it "Kirklump," but that didn't sound too good.

So they took their nicknames and combined them to make the name. Mrs. Kirkland's is pansy and Mrs. Kump's is potpourri. The third name, posies, was from a lady that was going to go into business with them but chose to do otherwise.

Three charged in Texico shooting

A Texico teen-ager died of a gunshot wound to his torso last Friday and three persons riding in a van with him are facing charges.

Curry County Sheriff's Sgt. Sandy Loomis said Phillip Ortiz, 18, of Texico, and three friends were riding in a van on State Line Road just north of Texico when the shotgun discharged.

Loomis said the group had been firing the shotgun out the van as they drove on county roads.

After being shot, Ortiz was driven into Texico where authorities were called. Texico Marshal Kelley Brophy said once the first call was made the fire department ambulance was on the scene within three minutes.

Ortiz was taken to Clovis hospital, then airlifted to University Medical Center in Lubbock, where he died about 8:15 a.m. Ortiz had attended Texico Schools, but had dropped out during the last school year.

On Tuesday, Ninth Judicial District Attorney Randy Harris announced that his office have filed charges against the other three persons in the van, all who live in Texico:

-- Aureliano Munoz, 22, -- shooting from a motor vehicle, felon in possession of a firearm, involuntary manslaughter, negligent use of a firearm, and filing a false report.

-- Marcus Hill, 15, -- shooting from a motor vehicle, tampering with evidence, negligent use of a firearm, and unlawful possession of a firearm by a minor.

-- Joel Ortiz, 19, -- filing a false report. Ortiz was the van's driver.

"Our office takes very seriously all situations where juveniles and firearms are involved," said Harris. "Young people, moving vehicles and firing guns is a very volatile combina-

Farwell council to discuss damage caused by truck traffic

The damage that heavy trucks do to city streets will be on the July agenda for the Farwell City Council meeting.

At Tuesday's session, new councilman R.C. Davis noted that fully loaded trucks (mostly grain) take 5th Street through town. He asked if the city had an ordinance on this but was told no -- the council had looked into the problem years back but truckers showed up at the meeting and the council backed off. Councilman Jerry Stover suggested that the city make truckers use a truck route, such as the loop to go around

In other business, the council:

-- Approved a building permit for a carport at 811 2nd St.

for Dennis Hardisty.

-- Approved letting bids for the annual seal coating project for city streets. Third and Fifth streets, Avenue H and the Farwell Community Center lot will be priorities.

-- Heard water Supt. Dee Hammit report on the lack of rain. The city is not looking at rationing water -- yet. Hammit said 18,911,100 gallons of water were pumped in May and 11,811,700 in June (through the 16th). Folks are not cutting back on their sprinkler use, he said. Will rationing be needed? "No tellin", he said.

Hammit noted that some folks are going to have very high water bills this month. He said more than 30 residents have used over 100,000 gallons each -- meaning their bills will be over \$160 apiece.

Speaking of the drought, councilman Don Geries joked, "I haven't missed farming yet."

-- Mayor Jimmie Mace reported that he plans to get a group together to plan the Farwell Community Center renovation soon. More than \$19,000 has been raised to cover it.

-- Hard Davis say that folks have complained to him about Farwell residents with New Mexico tags on their vehicles, thus avoiding paying local taxes.



Recipe of Week

SOUTHWEST SHEPHERD'S PIE

- 8 ounces lean ground beef ½ cup chopped onion
- 2 cups packaged instant mashed potatoes (enough for 6 servings)
- 2 cups water
- 34 cup skim milk
- 16 ounce can kidney beans, rinsed and drained 10¾ ounce can no-salt-added whole-kernel corn,
- drained 4 ounce can chopped green chili peppers, drained 1/4 cup water
- teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon black pepper 1/4 cup shredded low-fat cheddar cheese

Preheat oven to 375° F. In a large skillet over medium-high heat, cook ground beef and onion until meat is brown and onion is tender. Meanwhile, prepare potatoes according to package directions, but use 2 cups water and 3/4 cup skim milk and omit butter or margarine and salt.

Place cooked meat mixture in a colander and rinse under hot water. Drain well. Wipe skillet with a paper towel. Return meat mixture to skillet over medium heat. Stir in remaining ingredients, except cheese and heat through, about 7 minutes.

Transfer meat mixture to a 2-quart casserole. Drop potato mixture in mounds on meat mixture. Bake, uncovered 25-30 minutes or until hot. Sprinkle with cheese.

Changes announced for cotton appraisal procedures

Final decisions about the future of some one million acres of dryland cotton appears to be in the hands of crop insurance adjusters and companies.

Officials at the U.S. Department of Agriculture Risk Management Agency, which oversees regulatory aspects of the Federal Crop Insurance Program, announced a deviation from normal appraisal procedures for drought affected cotton in Texas, New Mexico, and Oklahoma June 10.


According to the deviation, affected cotton acreage that receives no moisture between planting and the seventh day after the applicable final planting date can be released on the basis of plant count at the time of appraisal.

If "measurable" moisture is received between the time of planting and the seventh day following the applicable final planting date the acreage may not be released until the fifteenth day following the final planting date.

According to USDA officials it will be the individual insurance companies who will determine whether or not "measurable" moisture has been received.

It is evident that some companies are interpreting this language in different ways. Some will enforce the additional seven day waiting period if rainfall is received that was measurable with a rain gauge. Others have determined that recent storms, which dropped generally one-half inch of rain this past week, were not adequate and will go forward to release acreage as quickly as possible.

Only time will tell what effect previously dry conditions and this most recent round of rainfall received this week, prospects are not improved for some one million acres or more of dryland cotton, some areas may see stands established although how much is still in question.
