Candidates announce

Next year is an election year in Parmer County - and that means now is the time to announce your candidacies.

The deadline for filing for county posts is Jan. 3.

Announcing for re-election this week are the following Democratic candidates:

* Louise Hancock is seeking a second term as the Justice of the Peace for Pct. 3, the Farwell area.

The Farwell resident also has worked in the county tax assessor's office. She was appointed to the office by the county commissioners after Albert Smith announced his retirement in 1989. She then won election in 1990.

* Tom Ware is seeking a third term as the Parmer County Commissioner from the Bovina area.

* Raymond McGehee is seeking a fifth term as the Parmer County Commissioner from the Lazbuddie area.

* Bonnie Clayton is seeking a second term as Parmer County Judge.

The Bovina resident was among five Democrats seeking the post four years ago when Judge Porter Roberts retired. Mrs. Clayton won a primary run-off over B.K. Buske.

* Anne Norton is seeking a third term as Parmer County treasurer.

The Nortons farm northeast of Farwell. She has worked in the county tax assessor's office and for an accounting firm, also. Active in 4-H and church work, she was selected as one of the Outstanding Young Women of America.

* Marjorie Watkins is seeking a third term as District Clerk.

The Farwell resident has also worked in the county tax assessor's office, the Aldridge law firm and the Jim Berry CPA firm. "If re-elected, I will continue to fulfill the duties of this office in an efficient and responsible manner and will seek to serve the residents of our county to the best of my ability," she said.

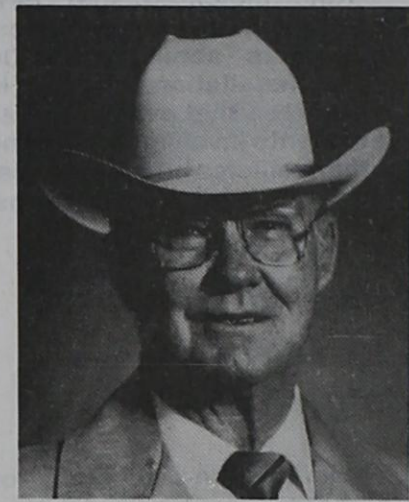
* Jack Young is seeking a fourth term as District Judge.

He was appointed by the governor to be district judge when the 154th Judicial District was divided in 1981. He then won election in 1982. He was district attorney for 20 years before then.

* Bonnie Warren, Parmer County clerk, was on vacation earlier this week but is expected to announce for a seventh term next week.

To file, Democratic candidates need to contact county Democratic chairman Wendol Christian at 481-9538. Republican candidates need to contact county GOP chairman Phil Garrett at 825-3164.

To run for a statewide office, you must file with the state Democrat or Republican chairmen.

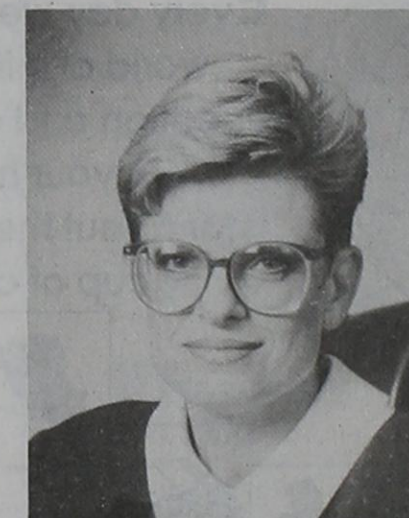

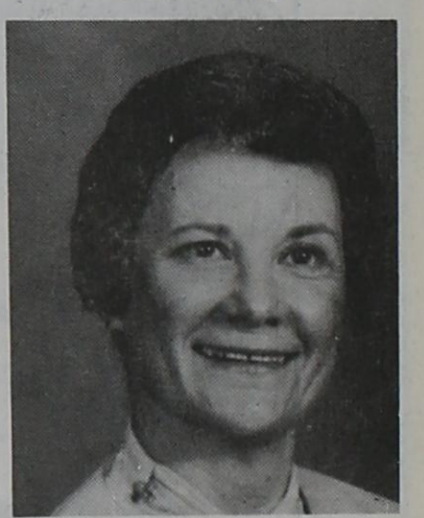

Texico students attend national FFA convention

Five Texico youths attended the National FFA Convention in Kansas City.

Chad Cochran, son of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Cochran; John Stephens, son of Mr. and Mrs. Daryle Stephens, Jr.; Cody Drager, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Drager; Justin Meeks, son of Mr. and Mrs. Steve Meeks, and Derek Dictson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Dictson, went along with FFA sponsor Ken Taylor.

On the way to the convention the FFA members enjoyed a trip to the Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City. "We saw John Wayne, Marshall Dillon and Miss Kitty, and a whole lot of stuff," said Justin Meeks.

About 26,400 people attended the convention including representatives of all 50 states, Puerto Rico, Washington, D.C. and the Virgin Islands. The Texico FFA members were able to meet fellow FFA members engaged in quite a variety of agricultural activities. All shared a common bond of agriculture, but not all of them did the same kinds of work. Meeting other people involved in the same profession is always a big help in a profession.

Speakers instructed the youngsters on a variety of topics including environmental issues, nuclear waste, the greenhouse effect, and toxic chemicals. Entertainment at the convention included Lee Greenwood, the Gipson Miller Band, Miss America, and Emory Austin.

One thing that was missing from this year's convention was a speech from the President of the United States. "He's the only one since 1966 that hasn't been at the convention," said one FFA member.

A highlights of the trip was the Royal Stock Show. There were thousands of animals to see including some that the Texico students don't see everyday. "There were llamas and the Budweiser Clydsdales, and all kinds of animals," said Meeks.

"The quality of the animals was a whole lot better than what we see around here," said Drager.

Another FFA member added that he observed that the tails of the show swine were clipped off completely.

The Texico FFA members watched the stock show judges closely. They have been involved in judging teams. The judges at the stock show seemed to look for the same kinds of things that they look for around here. The percentage of fat to lean muscle seemed similar and, "they look for a big frame with a lot of body capacity," said Meeks.

The trip wasn't simply a learning experience. The youths went ice skating at an amusement center complete with a bowling alley, an arcade and pool tables while they were there. For some of the FFA members it was the first time that they had been ice skating. "It's pretty cold when you slide across it and get your pants wet," said Stephens.

On the way back the group stopped at the Lazy E Ranch in Guthrie, Okla., which they called the largest privately owned roping arena. The national team roping finals are held there.

They also saw some of the areas in Kansas where flood water had been earlier this year. They drove past the areas of the Kansas and Missouri Rivers that had reached flood levels.

Santa Fe explains crossing arm situation

The Tribune recently asked the Santa Fe Railway what was needed to be done so that a crossing signal with an arm that lowers could be erected at one of the railway crossings here - the one by the Dairy Queen.

Six people have died in Parmer County in vehicle - train accidents in about a year's time.

Graham King of Operation Lifesaver, replied that neither the Santa Fe nor any railroad dictates what equipment will be used at any crossing. The state decides what equipment is needed, and the federal government appropriates the money for the project.

He suggested that people interested in changing the equipment at any crossing contact the Texas Railway Commission and other state and local government agencies to request an upgrade of equipment.

King indicated that new equipment for a guarded crossing costs about \$125,000 plus installation costs. He also noted that over half of all accidents involving trains and other vehicles occur at crossings that have crossing arms.

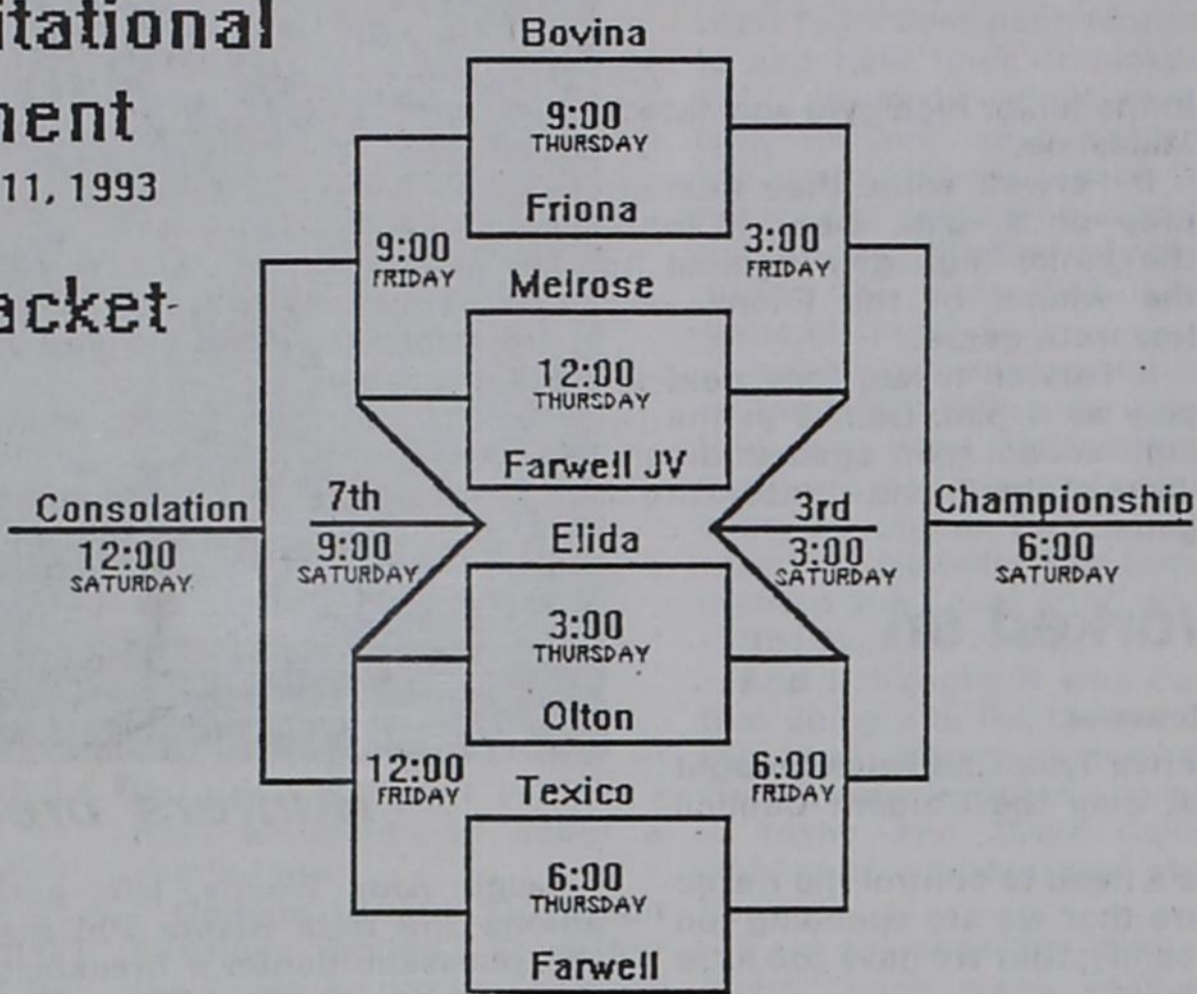

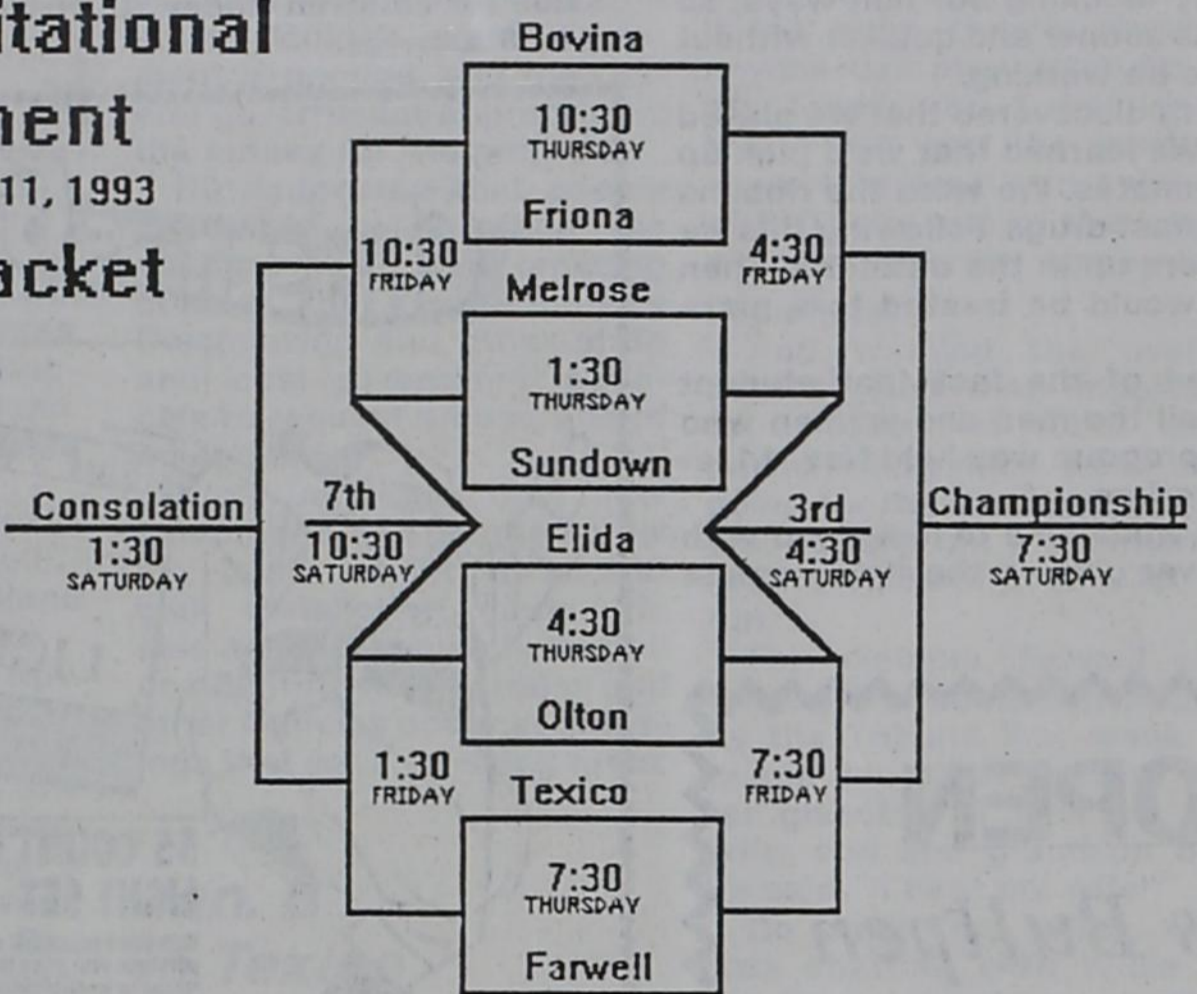

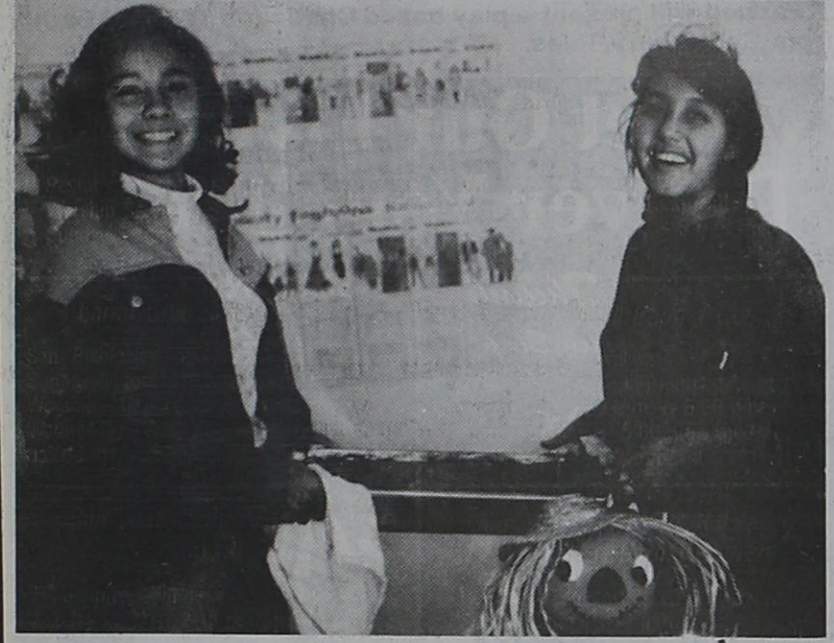

Texico Schools release accountability report

The Texico Schools' annual accountability report for 1992-93 has been sent out to district patrons. Some highlights include:

- The enrollment trend has been in an upward spiral. In 1983, 1984 and 1985, the enrollment hovered around the 400 mark. But starting in 1989, enrollment has gone up each year, where it currently edging near the medium 500s.
- The school's drop-out rate continues to be well below the

state's rate. For 1991-92, 2.5 percent of Texico's students dropped out, compared to 7.4 percent for the state. Also, the 2.5 percent rate for Texico is below its' own previous rates of 3.5 percent in 1990-91 and 5.3 percent in 1989-90.

- A followup on 1992-93 graduates broke down this way: college, 38.2 percent; technical - vocational, 23.5 percent; fulltime employment, 26.5 percent, and other, 11.8 percent.

- Student enrollment by ethnicity (all grades) shows these percentages: Anglo, 63.3 percent; Hispanic, 31.6 percent; Black, 5 percent.

- On the high school competency exam, Texico is right in line with the state - 84 percent for New Mexico and 83 percent for Texico. Texico ranks 55th in the state in 1993. As for ACT composite test scores, Texico ranks 37th in the state.

- Here's a breakdown on the major expenditures in Texico: direct instruction, \$1,092,854; instructional support, \$249,960; administration, \$109,413; operation and maintenance of plant, \$171,812; fixed charges (such as retirement, Social Security, insurance), \$376,263; non-instructional student support (such as athletic salaries, benefits and other activity expenses), \$39,434; community services (such as salaries for adult education and summer school benefits and supplies), \$2,300; pupil transportation, \$172,633; and capital outlay (land, building and equipment), \$81,898.

- Concerning administrative costs per student, Texico ranks 44th in the state. The administrative cost per student in Texico is \$212; the state average is \$100.

- On expenditures per pupil, Texico ranks 35th in the state.

- The percent of 1992-92 net operating budget spent for various salaries: teachers, 51.1 percent; non-certified, 7.2 percent; administration, 2.7 percent, and support personnel, 9.3 percent.

- Revenue sources show: state, 95 percent; federal, 4 percent, and local, 1 percent.

Kube attends national fire course

David Kube has attended a one-week course at the National Fire Academy in Maryland.

He represented the Texico Volunteer Fire Department. He studied Fire Command Operations and was the only person selected from New Mexico to attend this particular course.

Fire Command Operations uses the incident command system as a basis for managing fire suppression delivery. This course addresses fire and other emergency situations and offers an opportunity to practice incident scene management using simulated major emergencies.

The incident command system consists of procedures for controlling personnel, facilities, equipment and communications.

It is designed to begin developing from the time an incident occurs until the requirement for management and operations no longer exists.

This system can be utilized for any type or size of emergency, from a minor incident to a major emergency involving several different agencies.

The National Fire Academy offers courses year-round with approximately 350 paid and volunteer firefighters attending any given week. Selection criteria are stringent. However, the cost to cities and fire departments is minimal as the federal government pays for transportation and lodging is provided.

Local bands top rated

The Farwell Steer Band and the Lazbuddie Longhorn Band were awarded Outstanding Musical Performance Awards at the Wayland Baptist University Pioneer Marching Festival when they competed against 19 class 1A and class 2A bands in the event.

Muleshoe and Hale Center were the other two schools to receive this award.

Lazbuddie also won the Outstanding Color Guard Award.

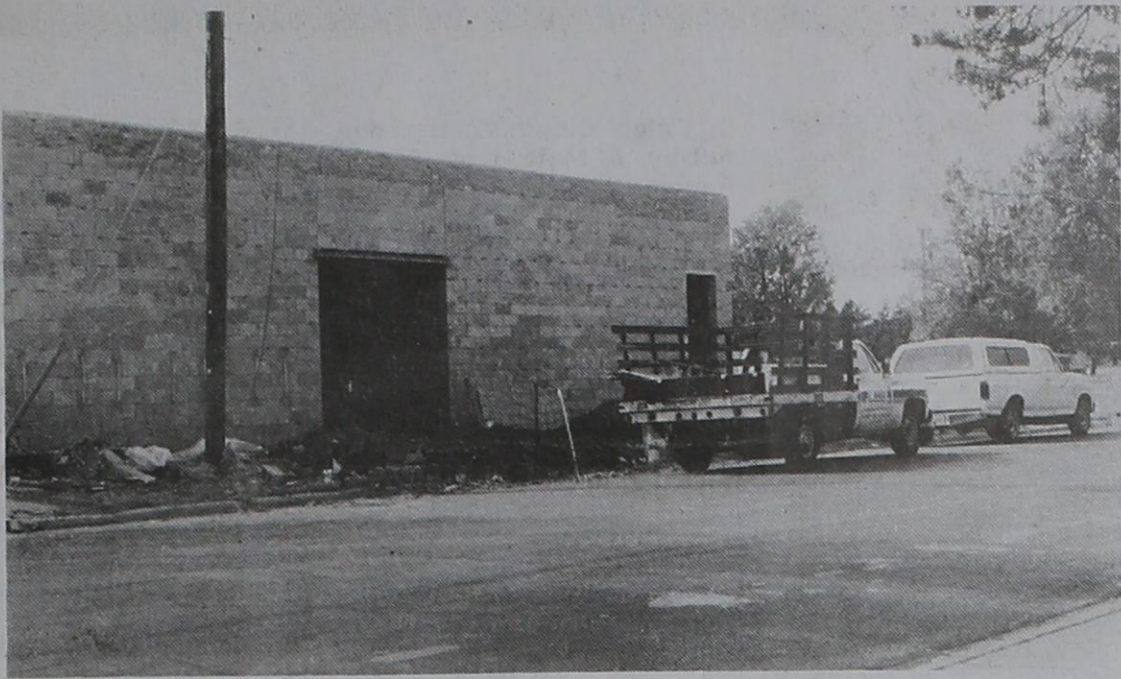

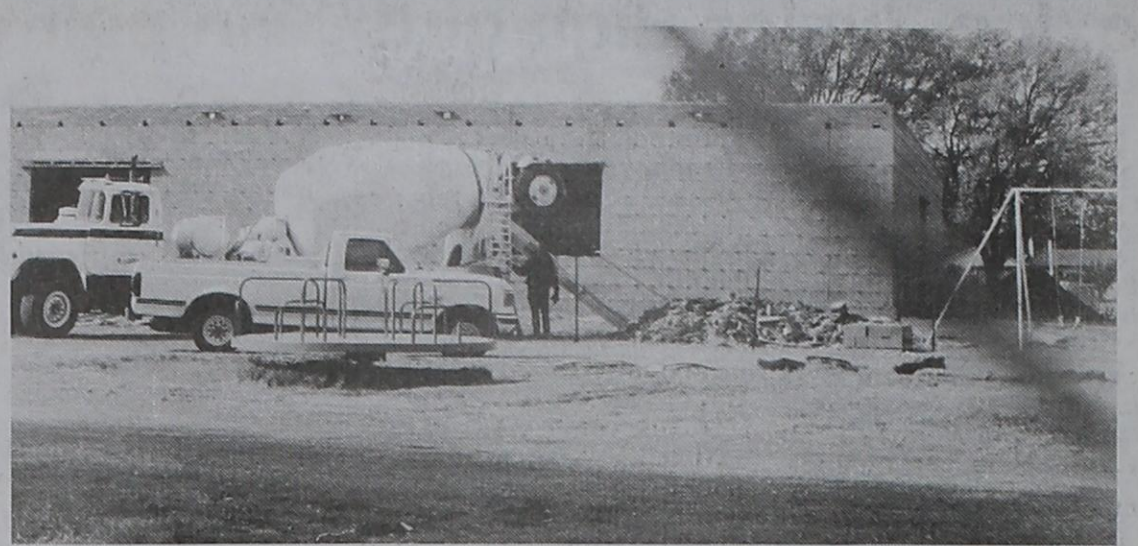

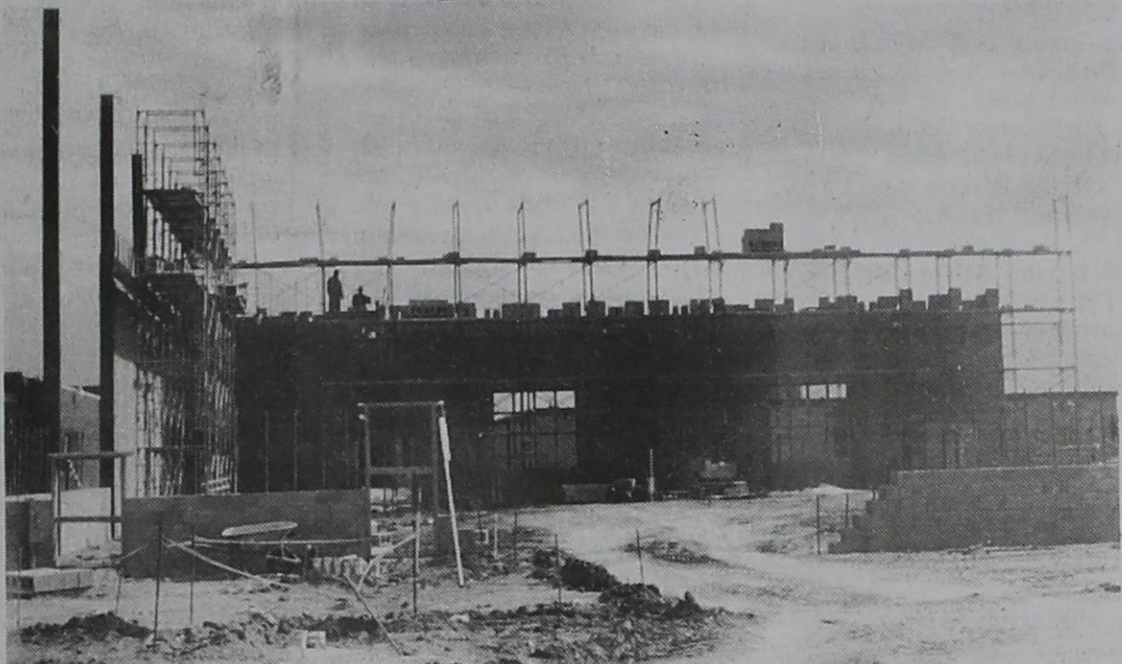

Burrows' lease former local baseball fields

The former Twin Cities' baseball fields at the end of State Line Road were discussed at the Texico City Council meeting on Nov. 23.

Several years ago, the site was turned over by the Texico-Farwell Lions Club to the Farwell Youth Commission. A couple of years ago, the youth commission attempted to donate it to the city of Texico, but this didn't occur.

Texico officials were now told that Jim and Carolyn Burrows, who own adjoining property where they graze their horses, are leasing the property from the Santa Fe Railroad, which owns the site.

Mrs. Burrows, a Texico councilwoman, said the ball fields, which haven't been used since last year, have been vandalized. Part of the fences have fallen down, there have been fires set, and the announcer's booth has been torn down. Also, it appears someone had been living in the concession stand, which also was vandalized severely.

Mrs. Burrows said she and her husband probably will use the property for grazing purposes. Also, they will do some cleanup and lock the

gates.

She also said she was told that the Farwell Youth Commission has removed usable items from the ball fields and donated them to Bovina.

In other business at the meeting, the council:

- Approved the contract with the city of Clovis to use its animal facility. Now, the Clovis City Council must sign it for it to go into effect. Once this is done, Texico plans to seek an animal control officer.

- Was told that the city has signed an easement for Cook Oil Co. The city is waiting for Cook to sign it before it goes into effect.

- Heard Mrs. Burrows discuss a standing water problem on South Garwood.

- Signed a Joint Powers Agreement with Eastern Plains Council of Governments. This basically deals with Texico using a regional landfill. Mayor Butch Sharp will be Texico's representative to EPCOG.

- Heard that deputy marshal Larry Garrison will attend the Law Enforcement Academy in Santa Fe early next year. It's a 10-week course.
