These funds are needed to help buy the animals shown by Farwell area youths at the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show later this month.

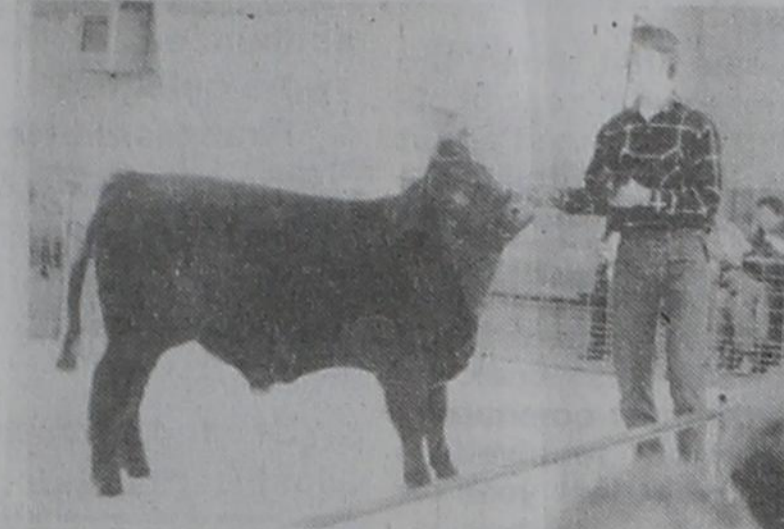
Robert works hard at contacting local businesses to get contributions. But there's always some folks (like YOU) who are not called, but can still contribute. I'd appreciate it if you did.

3rd Texico policeman sought

The Texico City Council Tuesday voted 3-1 to seek a federal grant to provide funds for a third police officer.

Ricky Qualls voted against seeking the three-year grant. It would provide 75 percent of the expenses. This means Texico would pay about \$8,300 a year if the grant is approved.

The current police force consists of marshal Gil Holguin and deputy marshal Larry Garrison. Holguin has stressed the need for a third officer.

In other business, the board: - Heard Fire Chief Lewis Cooper say he will call the owners of three properties on Turner Street to ask that they

Homecoming method changed

The Texico School Board Tuesday approved a change in the way candidates for Homecoming King and Queen are picked.

The new method calls for all academically eligible students to be eligible.

Previously, only students involved in the athletics at the time of Homecoming (it alternates each year between basketball and football seasons) were eligible, plus cheerleaders.

The change was recommended by the High School Student Council, and the student body also had approved it.

In other business, a bid for Kettler Juniper trees was accepted and they will be planted around the athletic field before spring break by students and the Soil and Water Conservation District.

The livestock show is open to any student at Lazbuddie Schools who has raised steers, lambs or barrows.

Grand and Reserve Champions, and Junior and Senior Showmanship Champions, will receive belt buckles. Grand Champions also will receive rodeo jackets, donated by Joe's Boot Shop.

be cleaned up. If not, condemnation proceedings will start.

Heard Holguin report that it's been proposed that the county jail charge \$45 per prisoner per day.

Holguin said this would be a big expense for small communities like Texico, which currently pays about \$3,000 a year to the jail.

Texico will voice opposition to the proposal at Tuesday's Curry County Commissioner meeting.

Heard Mayor Butch Tharp report that 21 applications have been received so far for the animal control officer post.

Until an officer is hired, Tharp said the city's police will answer calls involving vicious or mean animals running loose.

Tharp said that when the city had an animal control officer, folks complained about him. Now, he said, folks are complaining that there isn't an officer.

Heard Cooper report that the TCAO will meet with the architect this week on plans for the new community center. Texico received a \$200,000 grant last year for

it. Cooper said the architect's plans need to be scaled back, due to lack of funds. And he said state Rep. Earlene Roberts will help to try and get more funds from the state during this year's legislative session for the center.

Donated used city playground equipment to the Texico-Farwell Lions Club for use at Lions Park.

Agreed to buy a 2-inch meter to measure bulk water being sold.

Instructed the city attorney to redo the ordinance concerning bulk water charges. Currently, the city charges \$10 for each 1,000 gallons

sold, mainly to contractors who need water to put on city streets. It will be changed to \$2.50 per 1,000 gallons if the project is inside the city, and \$5 per 1,000 gallons if the project is outside. And if city equipment is damaged during the sale, the contractor will be responsible for it. And a deposit must be made.

Since the current rate is high, compared to other communities, contractors have been buying water from Farwell, the council was told.

The council had raised bulk water rates several years ago when city hydrants were being damaged through these sales.

ANNA SOUTHARD:

'...my first love was always teaching'

During Texico School's Christmas break, Anna Southard retired from her position as principal at Texico Junior High. She was one of those special educators who touches the lives of her students.

Mrs. Southard taught school for 32 years. She started her career in Amarillo, then moved on to Artesia, Floyd, Portales and Pratt, Kan. She started teaching elementary school in Texico in 1970, eventually becoming a principal in 1987.

She was married to the late W.N. Southard, who was a newspaper reporter and editor, eventually being named managing editor of the Clovis News Journal. Besides his writing accomplishments, he published five Western novels. And his wife helped him write those books.

Dedication and discipline are two key terms for Mrs. Southard.

"I always wanted to be known as a person who believed in discipline ... and I believe that students must be disciplined. I'm not talking about spanking and punishment; I'm also talking about having to adhere to the rules and

making yourself do the work that is expected of you - and enjoying doing it," she said. "I always taught my students that school must come before all else. I always said that school is the job and the report card is the paycheck."

Mrs. Southard urged her students to learn and understand what the world outside the school walls was going to be like and to know the importance of being organized.

"I wanted them to learn that they should always do what was expected of them; and I always had high expectations of my kids. I also stressed to them that if I taught them everything that I know, they still would not be prepared for the outside world," she stated.

Mrs. Southard inspired the teachers she worked with to instill respect and dedication in their students. She helped students to stop putting their belief in gossip, to believe in themselves and to become a person who can stand on their own two feet.

These are things she believes in and she was fiercely determined to teach others about their value. And she also believed strongly in fairness.

"I always tried to be real fair and give everyone the same treatment," she explained. "It doesn't matter to me if you're smart, pretty, rich or poor. I always tried my best to treat everyone fairly and I encouraged all my fellow teachers to do the same in their classrooms."

After becoming a principal, Mrs. Southard kept her hand in the teaching category. She loved teaching English, but also taught science, journalism and creative writing.

And what did she think about being a principal? "Anyone can be a principal. Not everyone can be a teacher - a good one," she said firmly. "I enjoyed being a principal, but my first love was always teaching."

Mrs. Southard, the veteran of Texico Schools, also commented: "You won't find better parents than those in Texico. I found out first hand at how supportive and caring they really are. When my husband passed away, I don't think I would have been able to make it with my children, my job and all that had to be done to raise three children by myself. The faculty and parents of Texico stepped right up and were there for me, any time and every time I needed help."

As for her retirement plans, her first goal was, as she put it, "to enjoy the heck out of getting to sleep in until 6 a.m.!" She moved a house onto the farm that she was raised on and plans to do a lot of working around the place. She also plans to do a lot of reading - Westerns, of course, and to take some classes in Spanish. And she hopes to travel and visit her three children and five grandchildren as much as possible.

The main plan, though, is for her to spend as much time as possible with her parents. Her mom is 81 and dad is 82. She wants to try to repay them in quality time spent together for the wonderful childhood they gave her.

"I feel like I owe them so much. I owe all my accomplishments in life to them because they were always so supportive and by my side on everything I chose to do," she said. "I plan to build buildings, fix fences and help my dad raise Charolais cattle. I love to work outside with him. And I hope to get to travel with my mother for awhile. There are a lot of places right here in the U.S. that both of us would love to see."

"And I love to shop - so I plan to do some of that, too!"

Adult CPR training set

Joyce McGehee, of Lazbuddie, is offering an adult CPR training session in Muleshoe on Feb. 4 at the Civic Center.

The course is open to any area residents. The training will consist of one-man CPR and obstructed airway management. Registration is from 7 to 8 a.m. Refreshments will be provided by the Bailey County unit of the American Heart Association.

The welcome starts at 8 a.m. Afterward, a film presentation will explain the risk factors and warning signs and a demonstration will show the practical application of how to perform CPR. After a short break, there will be skills practice on resuscitator manikins.

Lunch will be at 11:30 a.m. and consists of chicken or beef kabab, baked potato, vegetable and all the trimmings. Lunch will end at 1 p.m.

Skills practice and written testing will continue for the remainder of the afternoon, concluding between 4 and 5 p.m. Upon completion of the training, each person will receive a card stating their participation at this level of training. This is the Adult Heartsaver Course A.

The fee is \$20 per person. This includes the meal (you need to specify whether you want beef or chicken to let the caterer know), CPR manual, personal pocket face mask.

The departments also get paid later according to the number of their calls, except for Rhea's fire department, which just gets a flat \$5,000 allocation.

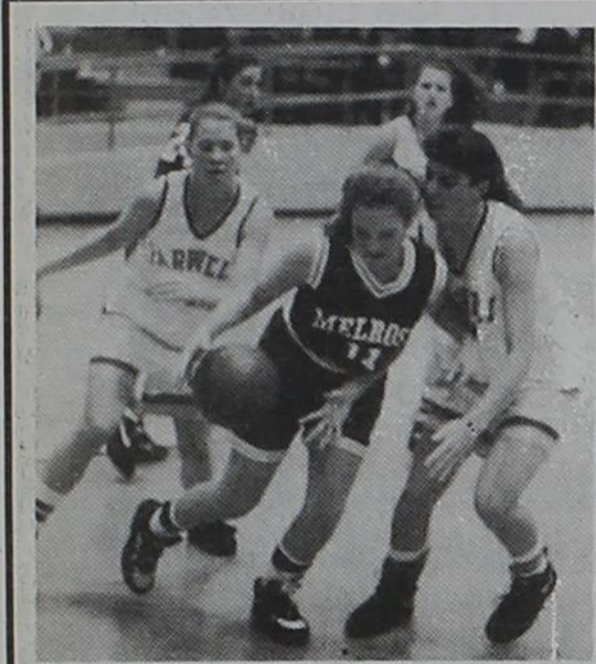

In other business, the commissioners appointed Sheriff Rex Williams to the Local Health Authority, a board required by the state health department.

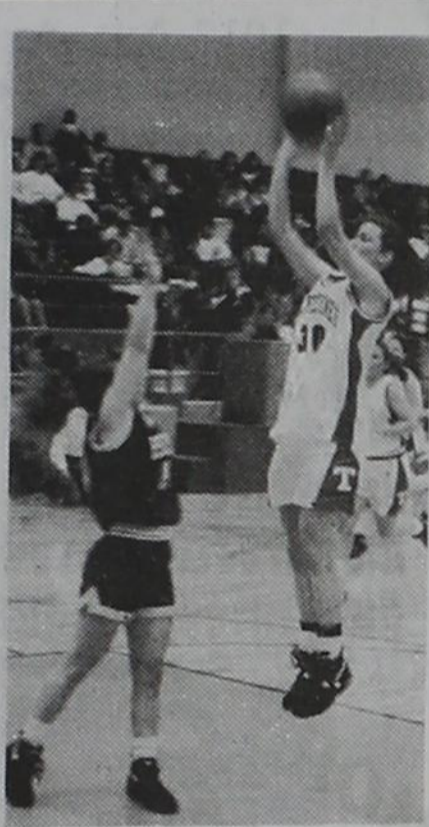
Williams is responsible for investigating animal bite and rabies cases outside city limits but within Parmer County.
