

11 year old battles cancer

Cancer. Just reading or hearing the word brings out our biggest fears. It's the one disease that more people worry about than any other.

It has caused changes worldwide in diets, habits and lifestyles.

It is a monster and something that has to be battled with a vengeance. We most often think of the adults who have to deal with the disease and the effects the disease has on their lives. But, right now in Farwell, there is an 11-year-old girl fighting the battle.

Leigha Foley has cancer. Her cancer has a name - Wilms' Cancer. This type of cancer is one of the most common childhood cancers and Leigha has been dealing with it since she was 6 years old.

Leigha hasn't had to fight it alone, though. She has a strong, supportive family that stands by her and fights it just as hard as she does.

Terry and Cindy Foley came to Farwell in the summer of 1992. Terry works for the Santa Fe Railroad; Cindy is a homemaker. Their children are Jeremiah, 12; Leigha, 11; Joshua, 8 and Mary Sara, 6.

They were living in Moffett, Colo., when Leigha first became ill. Terry and Cindy never expected that cancer would be the verdict.

"Leigha complained of not feeling very well and that her stomach hurt," Cindy recalled. "She wasn't hungry for about 10 days and her abdomen started swelling. We took her to the doctor and she tested positive for mononucleosis. They took more tests and the results showed that there was something else besides the mono."

They were sent to Denver Children's Hospital where Leigha had to undergo more extensive testing. She was found to have a tumor on her right kidney. The doctors gave the Foley's much encouragement as to Leigha's prognosis. Wilms' Cancer has a very high cure rate and with the surgery and aggressive chemotherapy, the cancer didn't stand much of a chance.

Leigha went through the surgery and the tumor and kidney were removed. Later in the year, another tumor grew back into the same spot where the kidney had been. She had been going through chemotherapy and had to have it stepped up with more aggressive chemicals.

Cindy explained that the doctors then discovered a spot in her lungs about six months after the treatments had ended.

"She had this spot removed in Iowa City, Iowa. The surgery went fine, but we never really found out what the spot was. The doctors told us it wasn't cancer, but they never said what it was. We were just relieved that it wasn't cancer," Cindy said.

The Foley's moved to Farwell and the kids started to school. They are all strong and athletic. They got involved in sports and the usual school projects. Leigha made friends very quickly and was caught up in the life of an elementary pupil. The cancer seemingly was part of the past.

However, the past came back to haunt the Foley family last Thanksgiving.

Leigha had been down with strep throat and the flu and was not feeling well. She complained to her father that her stomach was hurting and bloated.

"Terry told Leigha to lay down and he pressed around on her stomach. He felt something and explained to Leigha that they should probably have her checked out," Cindy said. They took Leigha back to the Denver Children's Hospital.

"The symptoms were all too familiar and we were more comfortable bringing her back to the doctors and place that had treated her originally," said Cindy.

The cancer was back.

It was another tumor, but this time it had hit in her liver. "There is good news and bad news to this bout," Cindy said. "The doctors say that it is not good that the cancer has come back, but the good news is that since the tumor is on the liver, this is the organ that most can most readily stand to be operated on. The liver can rebuild and regenerate itself."

Leigha was referred to the Hodges Cancer Center at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock and was set up for another round of extremely aggressive chemotherapy. The chemo is in preparation for surgery to remove the tumor and damaged portion of her liver. With all hope, the tumor will be shrunk to a much smaller size thus, making it easier to see how much of her liver is damaged and has to be removed.

She has had to endure losing her hair and the other side effects of all the chemicals in her body. She has had to have blood transfusions and test after test.

- Approved seeking bids to build two new tennis courts. Local funds will be used. No decision has been made yet on where to build them.

The old tennis courts had been torn down to make way for the new gym. A controversy arose with state officials, who said they hadn't been notified before the demolition although they were supposed to have been because state funds had been used to build the original courts. So the state said they wouldn't give Farwell any state funds to re-build the courts.

Texico to stress cleaning up the community

The problem of cleaning up Texico was again addressed at Tuesday's meeting of the City Council.

Basically, it's the council's consensus to move ahead and clean up the community, including the removal or repair of dilapidated housing, removal of junked vehicles and cleanup of properties that need it.

Marshal Gil Holguin presented the following report: He said he cited four persons in January for cleanup violations. All of them went before Municipal Judge George Herrington, who gave them five weeks to comply. That deadline is March 1.

Holguin said it doesn't appear any of these residents have made efforts to comply with a cleanup. If so, they will be re-cited and returned to municipal court.

The council discussed actions it might take, such as foreclosing on properties or placing liens on them. In one case, the violator apparently lives on property owned by his father. It was stated that it's the property owner's responsibility to be in compliance and foreclosure proceedings could commence against him.

"We have a few landowners with large amounts of trash," said councilwoman Carolyn Burrows.

Concerning dilapidated housing, three houses have been targeted by the council. Fire Chief Lewis Cooper reported that one structure may be boarded up, and he hasn't contacted yet the owner of the other two; this owner lives in Grants, N.M.

In other business, the council:

- Heard that the new animal control officer is doing a good job picking up animals. She is picking up so many, it seems, that the Clovis animal pound, where the dogs are taken, have limited her to bringing in six a day.

- Passed a revised animal control ordinance, which puts the fine system more in line like those given for traffic citations.

- Passed a revised bulk water ordinance, lowering these fees.

- Heard that the cemetery road has been improved and that Mrs. Paul Skaggs donated caliche for it.

Cooper, cemetery board president, said someone to work at the cemetery 2 or 3 days a month to fix it up is needed. The council will look into hiring someone.

- Heard councilman Oran Jay Autrey report that someone has offered to donate 7 large trees to KKR Park. Autrey said he can move them here with his equipment. The council gave him the go-ahead.

- Heard mayor Butch Sharp report on the project to curb and gutter, and sidewalk College Avenue. He started on this a year back. It looks like the state grant Texico sought for this project is out of reach and Sharp said a different state grant will be sought.

- Heard Holguin report on the federal grant for a new city policeman. The feds will ante up \$53,400 over 3 years, and Texico must supply \$13,000 a year for that period. This will give Texico 3 fulltime police officers.

Farwell didn't seek the federal grant.

- Heard Lewis report that state Rep. Earlene Roberts said

"The doctors are really stumped as to why the cancer has come back, especially after 3 1/2 years," Cindy stated. "We have listened to and researched all the facts that the medical field has given us. We give credence to what they say, but we know that every case is different. Now we're just concentrating on how Leigha is ... not how others did or didn't do. Hers is a mysterious case, but we don't dwell on it."

Wilms' Cancer is both a genetic and environmental cancer. The Foley's questioned the doctors as to whether they needed to have the other children tested. Leigha's case has been considered to be environmental. The question is still as to exactly what may have caused it.

The Foley's have gained much strength from the support that the community has been showing to them and to Leigha in particular. "We know that people have been concerned and also curious as to what she has. We just so appreciate all that has been done for her," Cindy exclaimed. A fund for Leigha has been started at Security State Bank in Farwell by Epsilon Sigma Alpha sorority to help with medical and transportation expenses.

Leigha will continue with the chemotherapy until the spring. She is tentatively scheduled for surgery in April in either Dallas or Houston.

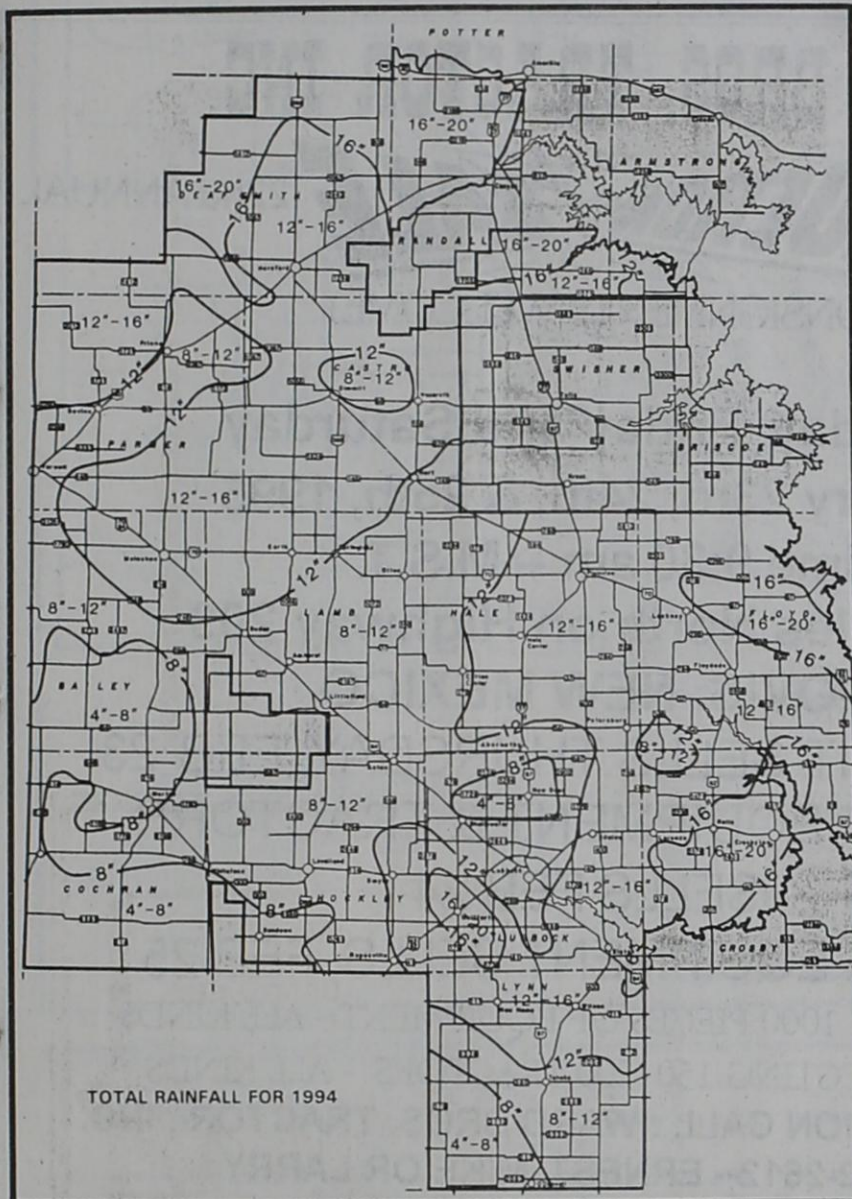

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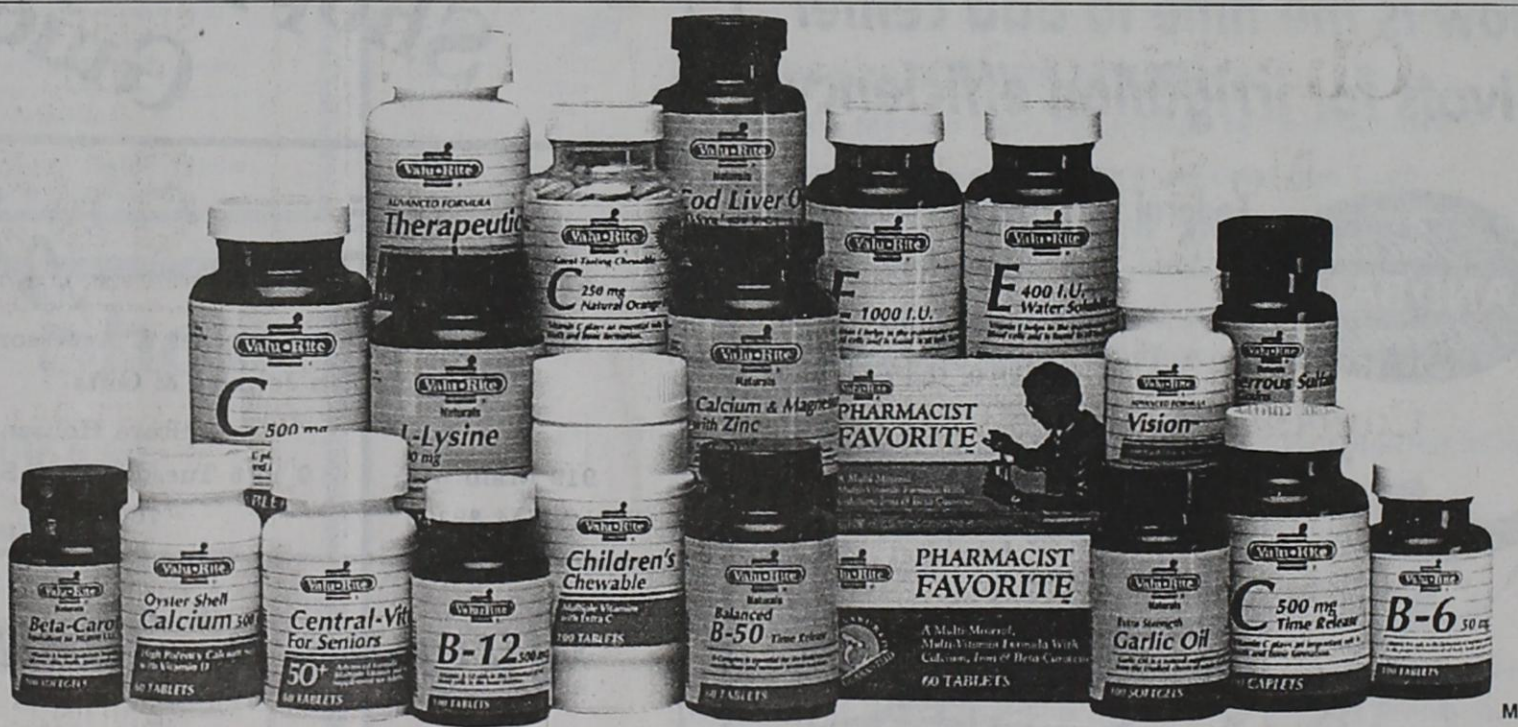


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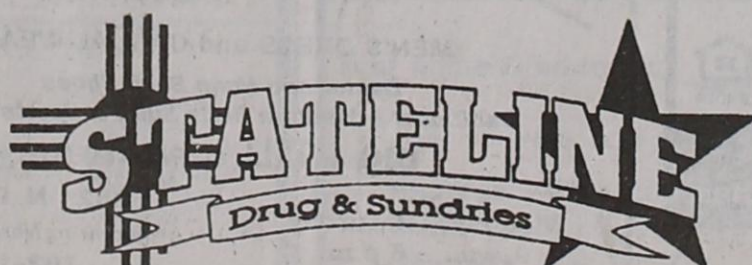
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Texico varsity teams end district play unbeaten

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Seales retires at 5 Area Co-op

Don Seales, who has represented the Lariat area on the Five Area Telephone Cooperative board of directors for the past 12 years, including serving as board president the past two years, has retired from that position.

The new director, elected at Saturday's annual cooperative meeting, from the Lariat area is Norris Conklin. The other candidate for the post was Nancy Barrier.

In the only other board election, board vice president L.G. Layman was re-elected to the east Lazbuddie area post. The other candidate was Hilbert Wisian.

Other board members are Joe Sowder, Mickey Sowder, Kirby Burch, Billy Tiller and Ernest Trull.

Cooperative members also approved by-law changes. Seales was honored with momentos at the meeting.

The cooperative reported a net income for 1994 of \$1,073,683.

Co-op manager Hubert Kidd discussed Five Area's decision to buy the GTE exchanges in Muleshoe, Springlake, Earth, Olton and Sudan. This system has been grouped under "West Plains Telecommunications," a wholly-owned subsidiary of Five Area.

Kidd called the purchase "a must" and "a lifesaver" for Five Area. He noted that it adds 4,500 customers to the overall system.

Kidd said that Five Area in 1980 served 1,600 customers. That total had dipped under 1,400 currently. He noted that a lot of extra farm phones had been discontinued due to the rise of the popular cellular phones.

Also, Five Area is a part-owner of Plateau Cellular Network with 5 other area telephone companies. Each owns an equal share. This operation serves over 12,000 customers in 10

And Five Area Systems, a wholly-owned subsidiary of Five Area, provides service in the deregulated area of telecommunications, such as sales and services of telephone equipment outside the cooperative service area as well as to co-op members.

While discussing all the phone services that are now available, Kidd pointed out that the \$1.50 a month extra charge for touch tone phones has been eliminated.

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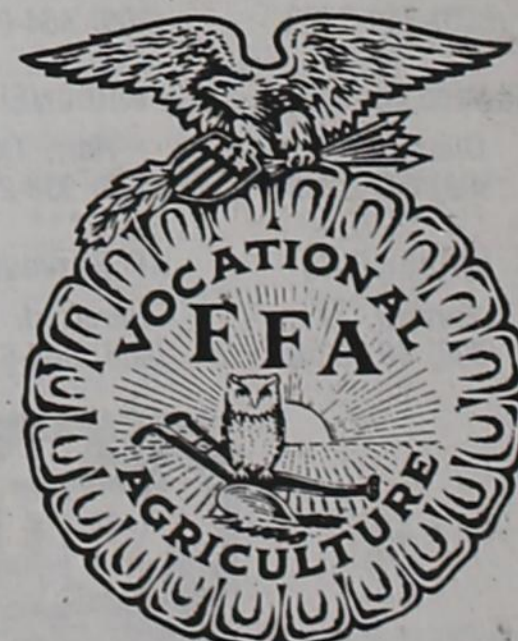
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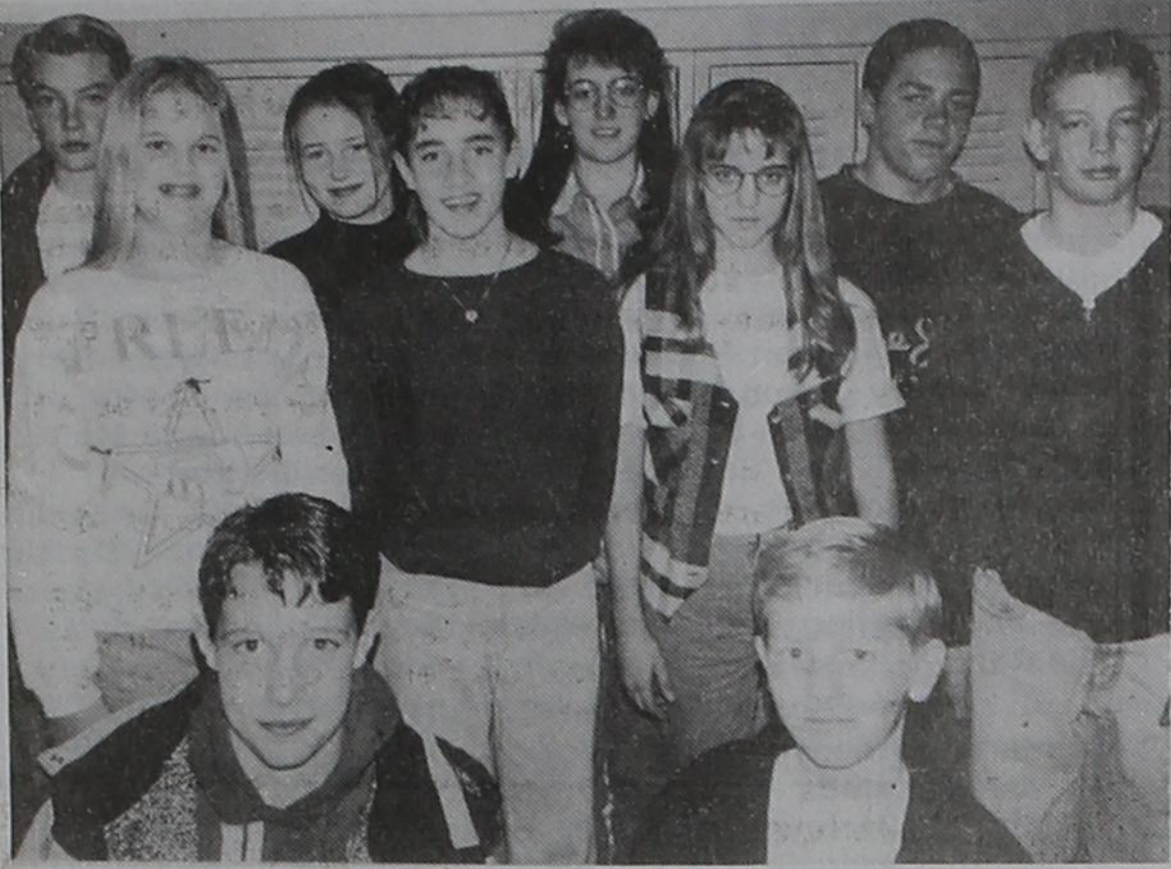

Farwell students participate

Eleven students from Farwell Junior High recently participated in the Duke University Talent Identification Program.

The group of 7th graders went to Lubbock Christian University on Feb. 4 and took the ACT test. This test and the SAT test were originally designed for college-bound high school students, but for several years they have been used for the TIP Talent Search to measure the verbal, mathematical and general reasoning ability of highly able seventh graders.

Leslie Cargile, Chelsi Kaltwasser, Jourdan Nichols, Erin Norton, Grant Oppliger, Shane Roberts, Matthew Schwertner, Marni Lunsford, Tyler Chadwick, Lindsey Rich and Lorissa Littlejohn were eligible for this program based on their high TAAS test scores.

Their results from the ACT test will be used in aiding the teachers in the Junior High and High School levels to establish a challenging and accelerated curriculum for these students. This curriculum has been established through the Gifted and Talented Program at Farwell Junior High.

According to Carol Sullivan, counselor for Farwell schools, students who have participated in the Talent Search will usually take the SAT or ACT test on a yearly basis to improve their testing ability and scores.

Farwell has had considerably large groups of 7th graders who have been eligible to participate in the Talent Search, but the group of 11 students this year was the largest representation that Farwell Junior High has ever had.

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Here's where agricultural exports go

According to the U.S. Feed Grains Council, 66 percent of total U.S. agricultural exports went to the following 10 countries in 1994:

Japan - \$9.2 billion or 21 percent of U.S. exports; the European Union - \$6.6 billion or 15 percent; Canada - \$5.3 billion or 12 percent; Mexico - \$4.1 billion, up from \$3.4 billion or 9 percent.

South Korea, Taiwan, the Netherlands, the former Soviet Union, Hong Kong, Germany and the United Kingdom rounded out the top-10 with shares below 6 percent.

The Uruguay Round of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT), the historic trade agreement signed last spring, is projected to increase U.S. agricultural exports by \$1.6-4.7 billion (4 to 10 percent) in the year 2000 and by \$4.7-8.7 billion (8 to 15 percent) in 2005, reports the council.

Additional information on the implementation of the Federal Crop Insurance Reform Act of 1994 should allow producers to move forward with their plans for 1995. The new requirements are a major change from previous years. As reported earlier this year, all producers intending to

participate in USDA programs in 1995 must purchase at least a minimum catastrophic risk protection (CAT) policy to be eligible. Required insurance coverage must be purchased before the March 15 insurance sales closing date.

Producers can purchase the CAT policy at either their county Consolidated Farm Service Agency (CFSA) office or through any agent authorized to sell Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC) multi-peril insurance. Additional coverage policies can only be purchased from an agent authorized to sell FCIC multi-peril insurance.

The insurance requirement for eligibility includes 1995 price support and production adjustment benefits, CRP benefits if the producer also has an interest in an insurable crop and FmHA direct farm operating, guaranteed operating, farm ownership and emergency loans approved or revised after Oct. 13, 1994.

If producers are still unclear about how the new requirements will affect them, they should contact their county CFSA office for further information.
