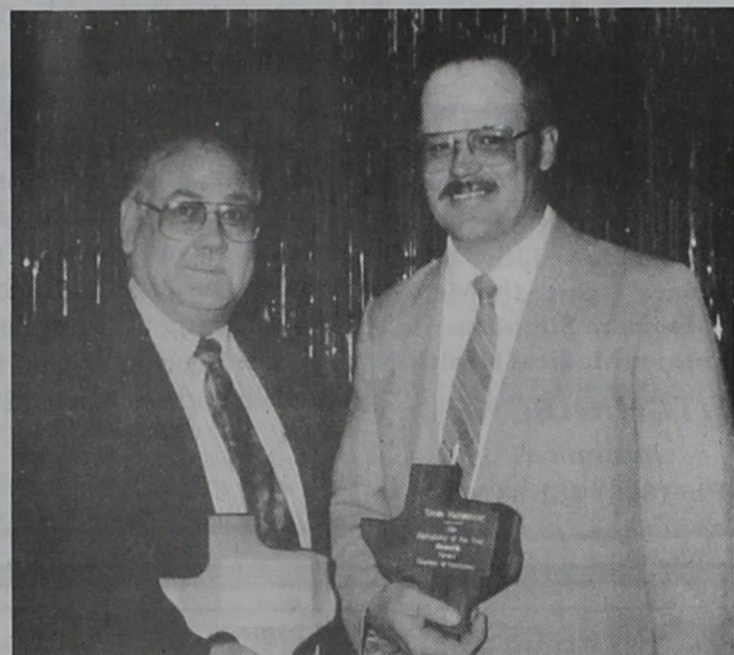

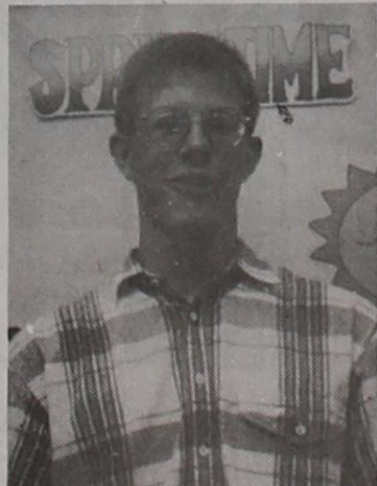
ESA is well known for its many charitable projects. Its main fund-raiser is the pheasant hunt.

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2nd police officer urged for Farwell

Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa gave the City Council Tuesday a status report, and indicated the need for a second police officer.

He presented several groups of statistics, including:

- Of 20 cities in Texas the approximate size of Farwell, 18 have either 2 or 3 police officers, while only 2 have one fulltime police officer. The national average is 2.3 police officers per 1,000 people.

- Deterrence, at this point, is not a factor to be considered by criminals here since they can tell when McGaa is not on patrol. Also, the amount of paperwork involving reports is very time-consuming.

- It's not just traffic work that McGaa is involved in. In the past 11 months, he has worked on burglaries, criminal trespass, sexual assaults, assaults, thefts, domestic violence, terroristic threats, etc.

- He has put in many volunteer hours in order to do the job he feels is needed here.

McGaa also suggested that another police car would be needed, too.

Mayor Chris Gikas said he will check with mayors of nearby large cities about the possibility of them donating a police car to Farwell.

As for hiring another police officer, Gikas said, "I don't feel we have the money at this time. But we may have to dip into our budget and look at this seriously."

In discussing the crime situation, McGaa said a Hereford gang has contacted a Bovina man about expanding the gang into Parmer County. He also said there are active drug dealers, involving cocaine and marijuana, in Farwell.

In other business, the council:

- Tabled discussion to either demolish or renovate the former Rose Drugs building until after next month's council election.

At the last meeting, the council had asked residents to give their views on which way to go.

City Clerk Cynthia Thigpen said four residents had called City Hall: 3 in favor of re-roofing, one in favor of tearing it down.

Gikas and councilman Martin Kube said they had received several views supporting the re-roofing because if the building were torn down, it would leave an unsightly gap between other buildings.

- Approved a building permit for Robert Vidaurri to build a storage building at 109 8th St.

- Approved city employee Joe Servin attending a 3-day "water school" next month to get his certification in that area.

- Told Ramon and Cecilia Quesada that a mobile home they have at 300 9th St. must be removed within 30 days. They had signed a building permit last year saying they would remove the mobile home after a house was placed at the property - zoned for one-

family dwelling. Instead, another family has been living in the mobile home. About half a dozen nearby property owners were on hand to support the law being obeyed.

- Approved the annual pest control bid with High Plains Pest Control.

- Okayed a 2-car garage and house remodeling at 506 2nd St.

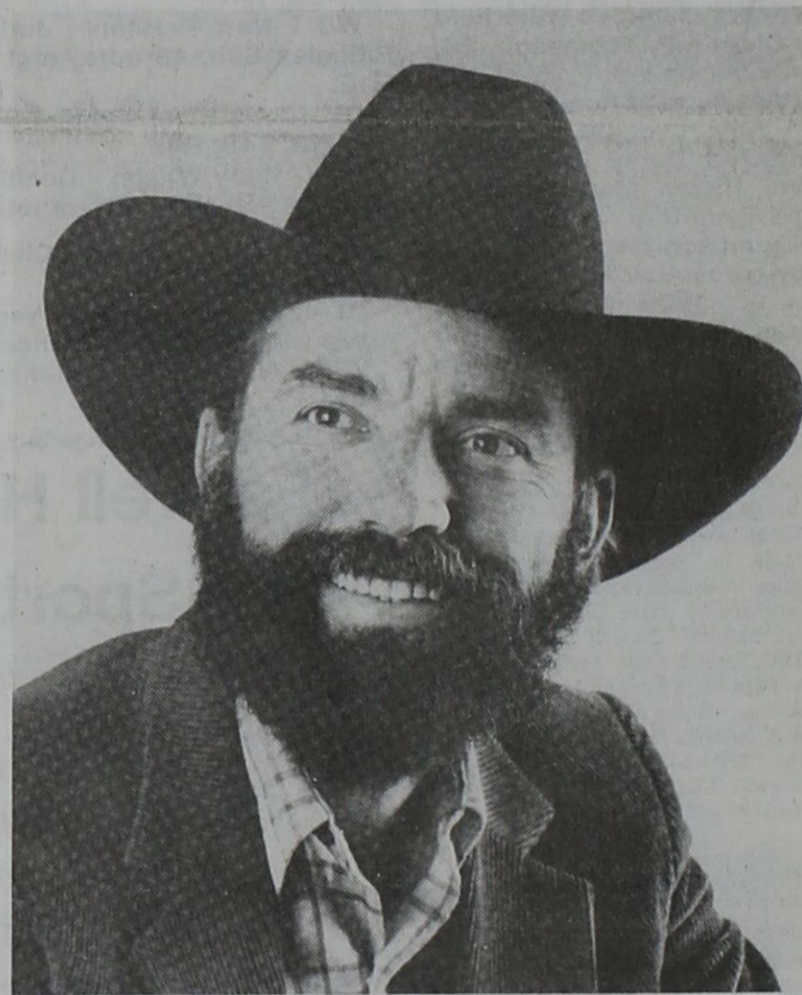
- Told Mike Sosa that he can't place a house with wooden siding at lots he bought in the 100 block of 2nd Street because it's a fire zone. Sosa bought 3 lots from Johnny Stewart, 2 of which are in the fire zone. The one lot out of the zone was too small for the house.

- Told McGaa to check on the junked vehicles next to the drug store. The vehicles were to be removed by now.

- Heard city councilman Royce Bethel ask McGaa to watch for hot-rodding pickups after school lets out.

- Heard McGaa present his monthly report for March, including 8 warnings issued, 34 citations given and 1 arrest.

They included 1 accident, 2 sexual assaults involving juveniles (one was found to be an illegal alien and deported to Mexico), 1 child abuse, 2 terroristic threats, 1 criminal trespass, 1 firearm violation, 7 parking violations and 27 traffic violations.

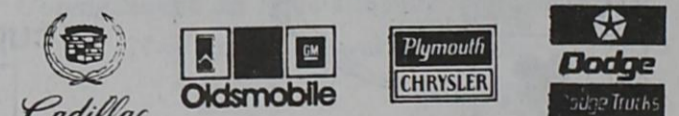

The bride-elect is a 1993 graduate of Texico High School. Leslie is a student at Texas Tech University.

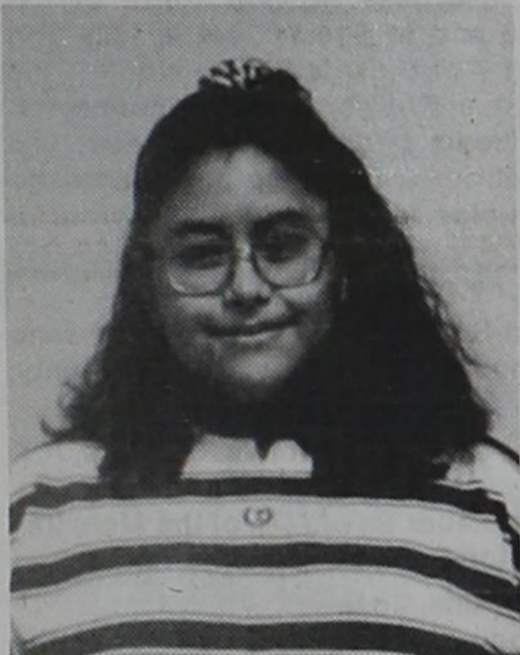
