Time to attack the cause

Just like you did, I felt awfully good to see our jets intercept that plane carrying the terrorists and deliver it to Italy.


The problem of dealing with the Palestinians is most vexing. I can appreciate the need for a Jewish homeland and I support Israel, one of our nation's closest allies.

But I also feel that the Palestinians deserve a homeland of their own.

When hundreds of thousands of Palestinians fled the new nation of Israel in 1948 (or were booted out, depending on whose version of history you support), an international problem was started. The Palestinians were placed in camps in surrounding nations, like Jordan and Lebanon.

But they were -- and still are -considered foreigners by their fellow Arabs. And decade after decade they were kept in their isolated camps, a breeding ground for terrorists.

Eventually, Jordan kicked them out. And the Israelis, in their attack on Lebanon last year, pushed out the most militant of them. But those Palestinians still remaining in Lebanon and Syria and elsewhere -plus those who live under Israeli jurisdiction on the West Bank - feel the need for their own homeland. I feel that unless their needs are met, we can expect terrorism from that quarter to continue. Because it seems that's the only weapon the Palestinians feel they have to keep their cause in front of the world. Sad. I think we are seeing a movement on the part of Arafat's Palestinian faction, which to my way of thinking is the leading voice of the Palestinians, to accept the fact that Israel is here to stay. Once that occurs, I would hope that Israeli leaders and the Palestinians can sit down at the negotiating table and come up with a way of establishing a Palestinian homeland. Perhaps, an autonomous region within the West Bank might be an answer. I really don't know. I do know how suspicious the Israelis are of what kind of autonomous government might develop so close to them; considering the fact that Israel has fought several wars since becoming independent, that's understandable. But there comes a time when trust is needed. And current policies toward the Palestinian militants are not working. This is not to say that I condone terrorism. I definitely don't. But I am sitting in the safety of a peaceful community within the confines of the world's greatest democracy. Try putting on the shoes of a man who has spent 35 years living in a refugee camp, being given just enough sustenance to survive and being treated with contempt as a foreigner. Consider how your family would deal with that situation on a longtime basis. As I said, this is an ideal breeding ground for terrorists who feel there is no other way to gain their end, which they consider honorable: a home. There are other ways to deal with terrorism, of course. But most are reactions, not actions. The better way, I feel, is to take action at the root of the problem. In the case of the Palestinians, that means a home is needed. Until that happens, I'm afraid, hijackings of ships and planes will continue to be commonplace. Obviously, there are other terrorists abounding in the world: the Red gangs in Italy and West Germany, the Libyans, the Iranians. I just don't put them in the same boat with the Palestinians. To me, they are more short-term problems that can be dealt with effectively through other means. But the Palestinian problem has been with us for almost 40 years and will continue to be a major world concern until actions -- not reactions -- are taken. Summing up, I again applaud President Reagan for his decisive use of our air power to put the ship terrorists in a place where they can stand trial for their crimes. Now it's time for actions. ***



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Texico wins

Texico's Wolverines won a thriller over Hagerman at Texico's Homecoming last Friday, 20-17.

The win in overtime brought Texico's record to 5-2 on the season and 2-0 in district. The Wolverines play Melrose in an away game tonight at 7:30 MDT.

Against Hagerman, Texico opened the game with a quick TD with less than three minutes gone on the clock. After moving the ball downfield, Stanley Cross rushed for a 1-yard touchdown. The two point conversion was good on a Charlie Bibbs' run.

Hagerman came back a few minutes later, as Adan Ornelas scored on a 3-yard scamper. The run failed, leaving Texico ahead 8-6.

Still in the first quarter, Cross had a 4-yard TD run. His extra point kick was blocked, making the score 14-6.

Before halftime, Hagerman was able to tie the score as Manny Quiroz caught a 17-yard pass from Frank Salas. The two-point pass featuring the same duo was good.

The second half was a defensive struggle with neither team scoring. Hagerman missed two field goals, overcame them.

"I feel real good. The credit goes to the team. Also, coaches Roy King and Borde Williams did super. A coach is about as good as the players out on the field."

The Farwell Junior High football team lost to Vega 18-0, Oct. 10.


"We probably would have won if not for the turnovers, fumbles and interceptions," said Coach Gary Cates. "We had three times as much


yardage as Vega. The kids played well. We looked better offensively and defensively. The offensive line has improved."
