must choose 12 teams they think will win the selected games.

Local youths go on mission to Russia

"I think we touched a whole lot of people," said Derrick Haseloff of his trip to St. Petersburg, Russia.

Three Farwell students, Sharla Lingnau, Luke Diaz, and Haseloff, were among 82 Texas youngsters who visited St. Petersburg July 15-30. The three-year long mission will see groups of youngsters traveling to the former U.S.S.R. each year to spread the word of God.

Part of the trip was an inspiring missionary experience, and part of it was just plain fun.

"The first day we were up over 36 straight hours. We slept four hours, and then we went all day until midnight," said Lingnau. Traveling from Lariat to Lubbock to Dallas to London and on to St. Petersburg, and traveling through 9 time zones, the group stayed constantly on the move the first day or two. During the summer it only gets dark in St. Petersburg from about 1 - 4 a.m., so the group had plenty of daylight hours to sightsee and to work.

One of the exciting highlights of the trip was attending the opening ceremonies of the Goodwill Games. They were part of a group of 80,000 at the ceremony. They saw all of the athletes and heard Boris Yeltsin speak.

The mission experience was very important to these youngsters. More than half of the trip was spent working on mission activities.

While in St. Petersburg, the Farwell youths helped to weed and clean a 6 acre Lutheran Cemetery which had not been cleaned in years. They also presented a puppet show and sang to children attending Vacation Bible School, and they passed out Bibles and religious pamphlets printed in Russian.

"It was a beautiful, beautiful cemetery," said Haseloff. There were Nobel Prize winners and other famous people buried there. Years of neglect had taken its toll. The group spent many hours weeding and hoeing.

"Next year it will be better than when we left it," he added.

The Texas group took 10,000 Bibles with them. They passed out between 3,000 - 4,000, and left the rest for Russian Christians to pass out later. The Lariat youngsters passed out 256 by themselves in three hours' time.

"The Russians don't like taking gifts, so some people gave us things in exchange. We got vodka - which we didn't drink - raspberries and blueberries," the youths answered in chorus. Participants had signed a covenant not to drink, smoke or use drugs before they left home.

"Most people want the Bible," said Haseloff. But, the young missionaries were honest enough to say that they had encountered a variety of responses. "Some people were rude; some were scared, and some were drunk, but most of them wanted it," he added.

Visiting several churches, and seeing what had happened to them during the past 50 years was an important part of the missionary experience. Some churches had been damaged during World War II, and some had been torn up during the Communist era when mother churches in the West were unable to send staff to keep the properties up.

The group visited Kennalljarvan, a church without a roof, and St. Peter's, which had been transformed into a swimming pool. Another church, St. Michael's, had been turned into a factory to make soccer equipment.

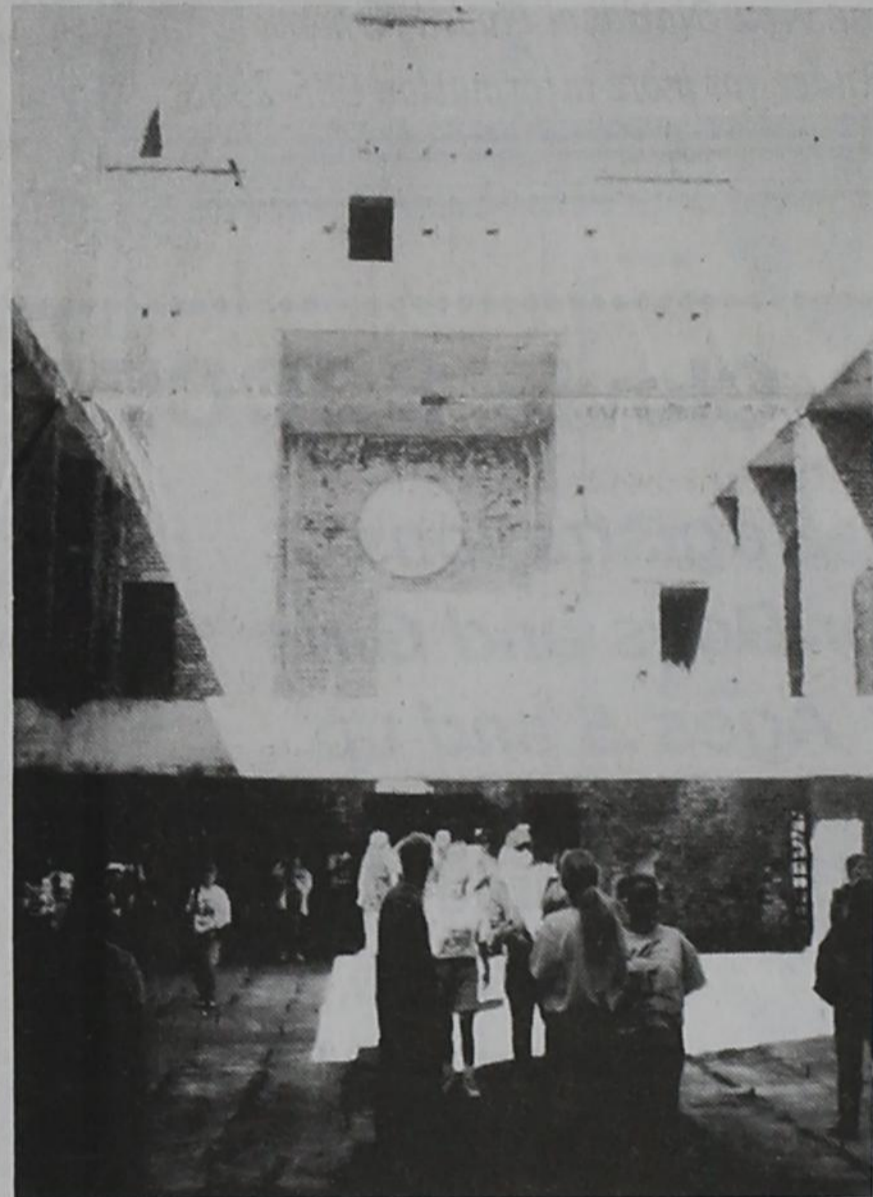
"I don't remember what year they told us it happened, but at one church they said that the church was all decorated for Christmas, and the Communists went in on Christmas Eve and tore it all up," said Lingnau.

"All they kept was the silver and gold, and they melted it," she added.

"Communism changed a lot of people's lives," said Haseloff.

They visited a Catholic Church where the altar is underneath a plastic drop cloth while the dome above it is being repaired. And they also saw a "Church of the Blood," a Russian Orthodox Church which has already been restored. And they visited a convent.

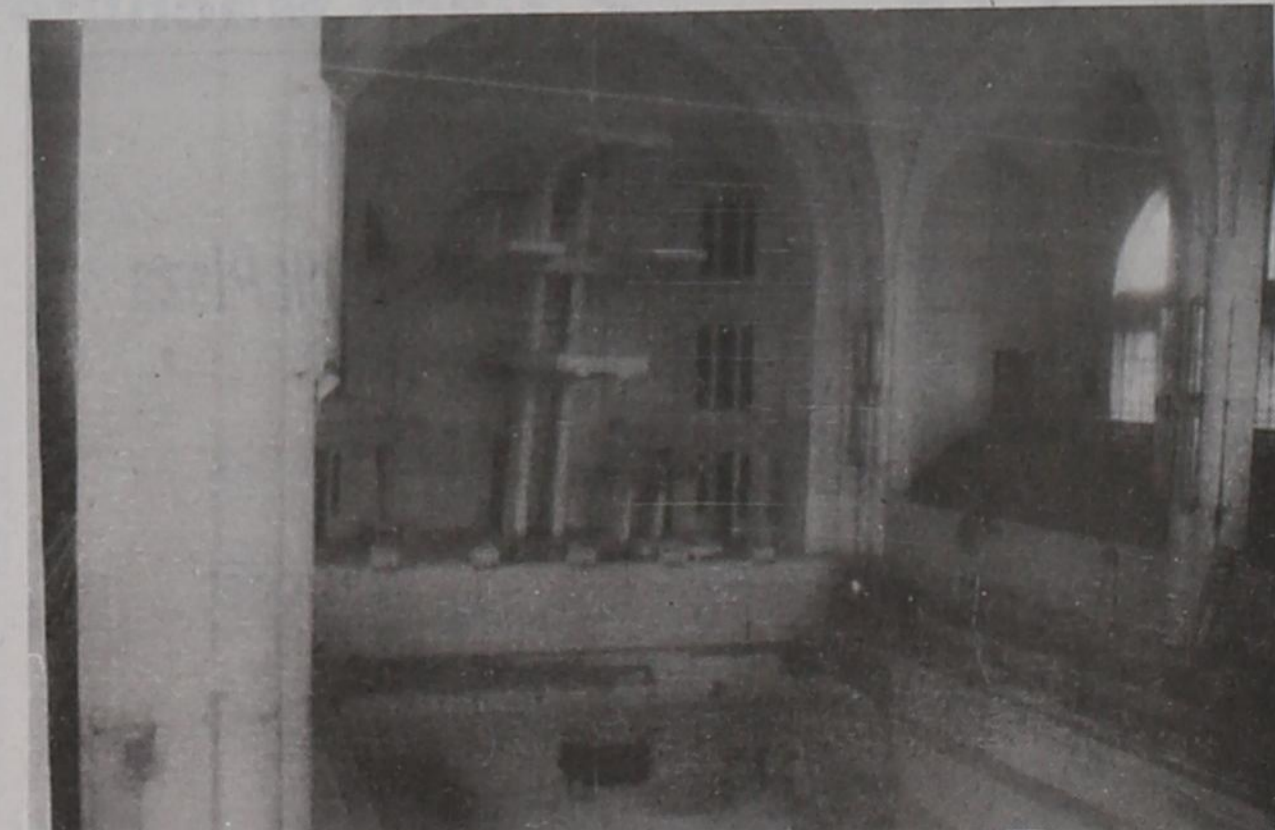

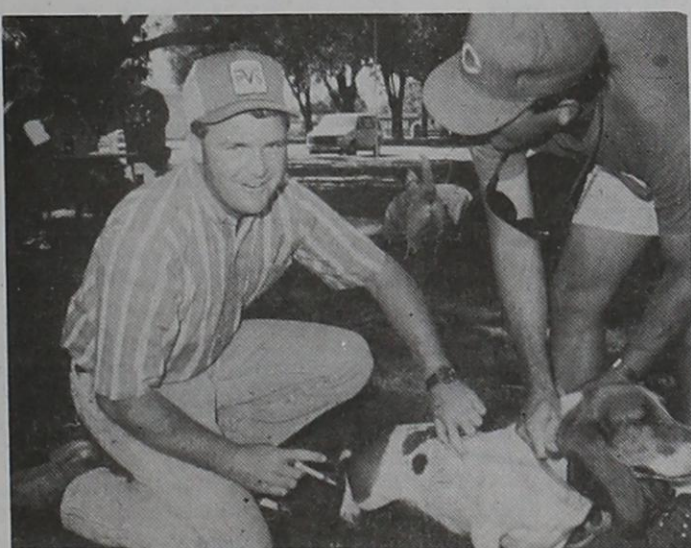
Recipe of Week

Pineapple -Honey Fruit Pops

1 can (15 1/4 oz.) crushed or chunk pineapple in its own juice, undrained
 3 3/4 c. canned unsweetened pineapple juice
 1/4 c. clover honey
 Process undrained pineapple in blender until smooth; mix with pineapple juice and honey in large measuring cup or pitcher. Pour fruit mixture into 24 small paper cups (4 oz. size) Place paper cups on a cookie sheet; place in freezer. Freeze until fruit mixture is slushy, about 4 hours; insert popicle sticks into mixture. Freeze for about 8 hours or until firm.

"We don't have a lot of numbers, so we've got to stay healthy," said Head Football Coach Mark Scisson.

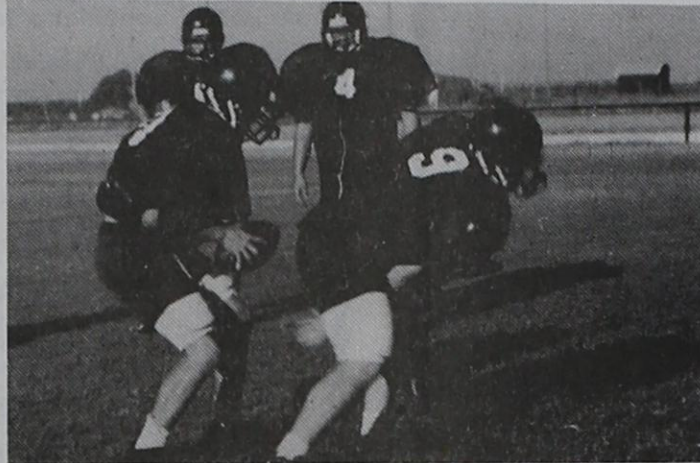

 - Approved the student handbook, and state mandated school board policies concerning sexual harassment.
 - Accepted the milk bid from Bell.
 - Discussed the new school additions. "There are still a few minor things that need to be done yet, but we are moving in," said Supt. Richard Boothby.
- Boothby said building the project when they did saved the school system a substantial amount of money in construction costs and financing costs over current costs. "It would have cost us at least 15 percent more to do this project today than it did," he stated.

You tell me: Do you feel good that millions of Americans have been terminated from middle class jobs, with health care and pension benefits, only to find new employment as part-time clerks at stores like Walmart, without those benefits?

That's what the news media doesn't say when it announces the government's stats. And, obviously, the government isn't about to let out the bad news. Shows how the stupid news media can be manipulated.

Congress has been in the news recently, debating lots of bills, such as for crime and health.

I like all our senators and representatives (except for Ohio Sen. Howard Metzenbaum, who I consider a jerk).

Their power is limited. As I've written, many seek these offices for sex, power or money. That's fine. It keeps them from causing too much harm.

The real power belongs to the federal bureaucrats. Those are the fellas who can really hurt us because they interpret the laws.

Remember, I lived in the Washington, D.C., area for 4 1/2 years before coming here. All my neighbors were bureaucrats. They made it very plain over what was important to them - their salaries, their homes, their families and their neighborhoods. And the more laws, rules and regulations, the bigger the bureaucracy and the higher their salaries.

These folks used to snicker

at folks (like you) who lived outside the Washington Beltway. If folks in the U.S. understood the disdain that the federal bureaucrats have for them, there would be a revolution. But folks don't.

You'll never see big-time columnists write something like I just did. It's not that they aren't aware of it. They simply can't bite the hand that feeds them. The bureaucrats pass out info to these columnists; the two work hand in hand.

So regular folks just walk around with quizzical looks, wondering about all these regulations that can strangle businesses, families, middle class folks and others. They wonder how it can happen.

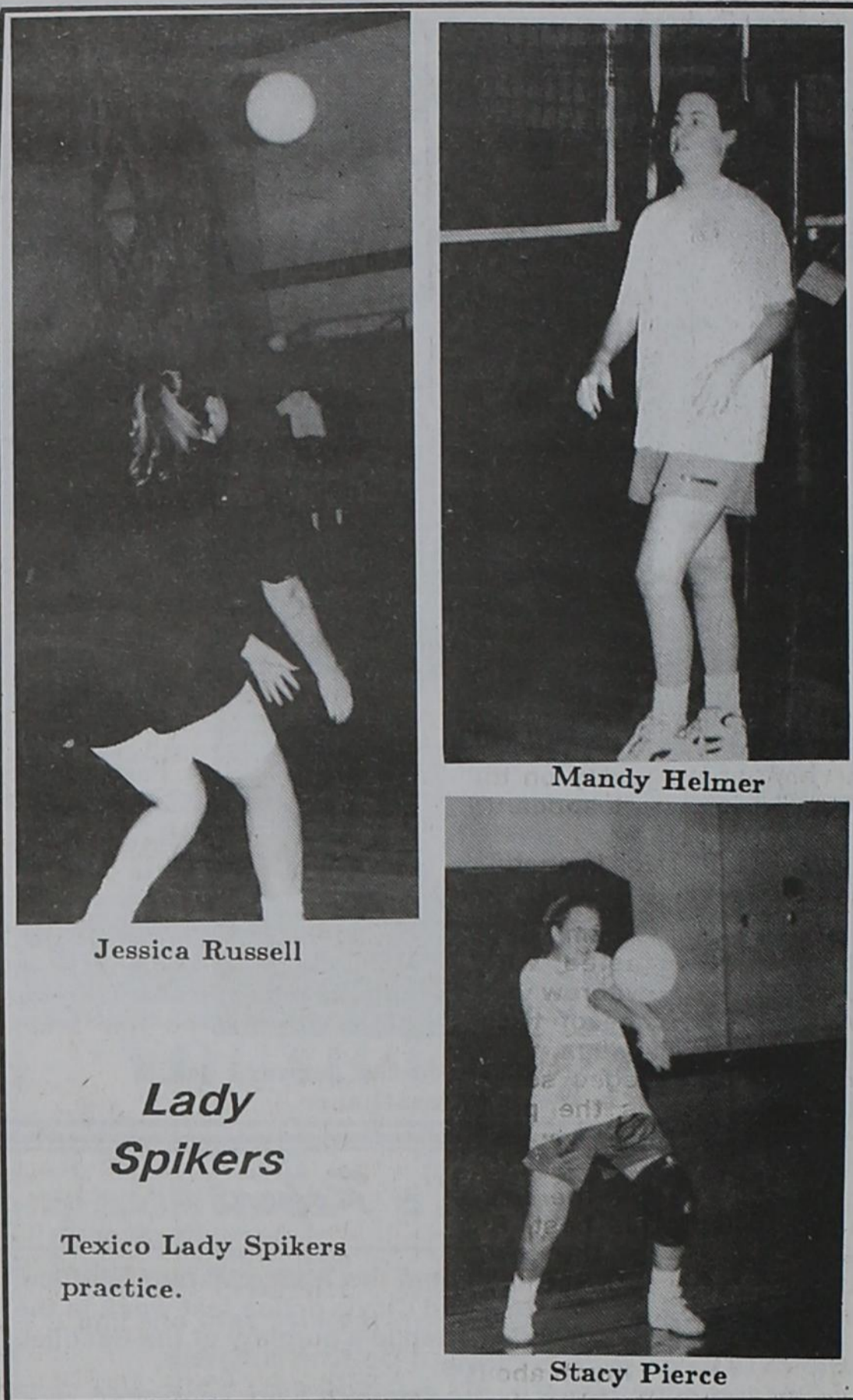

After practice they all enjoyed watermelons together.

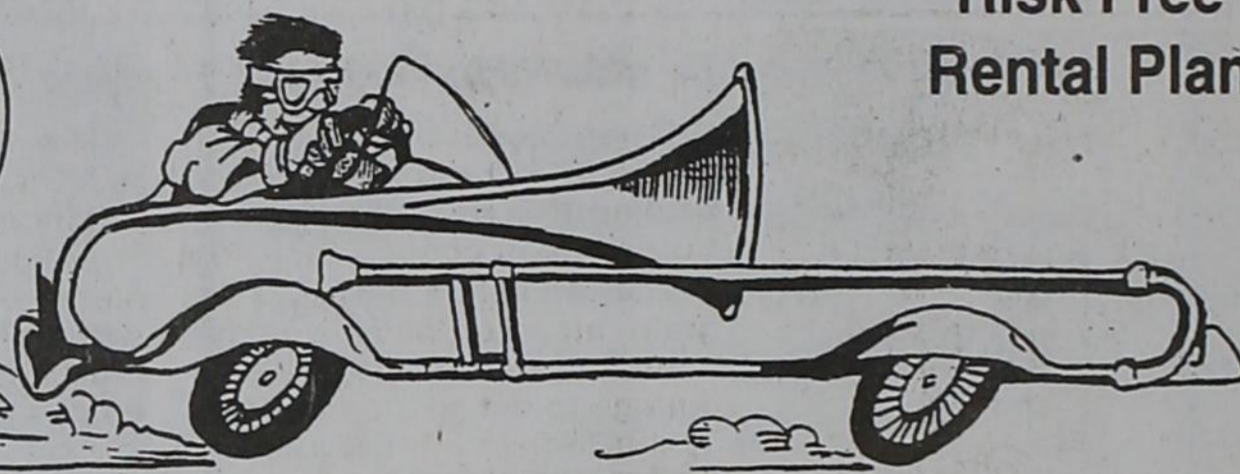

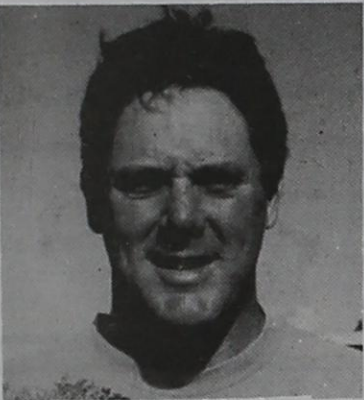


Farwell lines up for a drill.

Farwell to take action on dogs running loose

The Farwell City Council voted Aug. 11 to take action against dogs running loose.

Richard Stag, a city resident, complained that dogs running loose were a major problem, especially at night. One morning at 6:30, he said he counted 13 dogs running loose within a six-block area.

The council authorized Mayor Chris Gikas to talk with folks about contracting with the city as an animal control officer. Gikas plans to talk with Dan Walterscheid, a Farwell resident who was hired a couple of months ago as the animal control officer for Texico.

The salary and hours will be negotiable.

Currently, city employee Joe Servin has been picking up animals and several citations have been written, said water Supt. Dee Hammit. If a citation is given, the fee in municipal court is \$30 for the first conviction, then \$60 the second time, and so on.

In other business, the council:

- Awarded the street seal coating contract to Eastwood Construction, Clovis, for \$29,504. A Lubbock contractor also had been on the project, and had put in a lower bid. But he didn't want to pay the performance bond so he withdrew his

bid.
- Adopted the 1994-95 budget. City Clerk Cynthia Thigpen said Farwell's taxable value is \$23,287,000. The current tax rate is .23221 per \$100 assessed valuation.

- Heard Daren Sudderth, of Sudderth Realty, talk about damage being done to his parking area by motorists making U - turns in the 100 block of 5th Street. Traffic has picked up there, especially on Wednesdays and Saturdays, due to folks buying lottery tickets at Hughes True Value.

The Chief's Corner

Color codes of danger

by Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa

One of the courses I teach is called "Handgun Combat for Peace Officers." A portion of that class deals with awareness, and you may find it interesting. Being aware of your surroundings may save your life, or may prevent you becoming a victim of crime.

Condition White: (Aware of No Danger) Concerned with self and thoughts may be focused on a particular idea, problem or person to exclusion of all else. A person in condition white may cross the street without looking, may walk down the dark side of the street at night, rather than on the lighted side.

This person may return home late at night and enter their house without noticing that the door lock has been forced. This person assumes that breaking glass at 2 a.m. was caused by the cat. This person flashes a large amount of money in a business and does not notice the three shady individuals watching him, and following him out to the parking lot.

Condition Yellow: (Aware of Possibility of Danger) Is being aware that you could be hit by a car if you don't look both ways. Muggers hide in the dark, not in the light. That forced lock may indicate that the burglar is still in the house. That breaking glass may not have been caused by the cat. Studies have shown that a person can live their whole life in condition yellow, without harm.

Condition Orange: (Aware of Likely Danger) Gang types sitting on your car in the parking lot.

Condition Red: (Danger Certain) A peace officer is paid to enter the area of condition red - you are not.

Using the example of gang types sitting on your car, a person in Condition White may approach his car and order those punks to get off, and immediately be placed in certain danger. The same person, in Condition Yellow, will recognize a Condition Orange and call the police, avoiding the possibility of certain danger. Let old age be the cause of your death, not stupidity.
