





The Farwell Convalescent Center, which opened Aug. 9, 1976, is located at 305 Fifth St. The phone number is 481-9027. It has 75 employees in various departments.

The convalescent center's owner is the Farwell Hospital District. The Good Samaritan Society manages the center. Current administrator is Ron Kilgore.

Presently, health care is an issue concerning every individual regardless of age. At the center, the theme is "In Christ's Love, Everyone Is Someone." Based on this Christian philosophy, the center is dedicated to helping elderly persons, who are served with respect, dignity and love.

Good friends are always around for support, reassurance and for a kind word. And that's no different at the center, with quality staff ranging from social services, activities, dietary, environmental services, and nursing.

Services offered include 24 hour licensed nursing care, physical therapy, and recently the opening of Jericho Road - the only licensed Alzheimer's Unit in the Texas Panhandle.

These services, including many others, allow the center to offer top quality nursing care to its residents and top quality training to its staff.

The 1990s saw the opening of Heritage Square Garden Homes, adjoining the center, which featured independent living units for senior citizens. Six units are filled, with three more to open this summer.

The center's history started with the Farwell Development Company organized on March 5, 1974. It was formed as a non-profit group in order to attract industry and development to Farwell. The first item considered was the construction of a nursing home.

In an election held on June 24, 1975, the Hospital District was authorized, and the issuance of \$750,000 in bonds was approved by voters for construction of a nursing home. Ground-breaking occurred on Jan. 27, 1976.

The original Farwell Hospital District board of directors were Don Williams, president; Caroline Anderson, secretary; R.W. Anderson, Charles Aycock, Jim Berry, Prentice Mills, W.T. Perry, Claude Rose Jr. and Maxine Williams.

Current board members are Jerry Monk, president; Tom Nichols, Mike Ratke, Joe Haseloff, Peggy Sudderth, Troy Christian, Bert Williams and Jack Allen Kirkland.

38 businesses participate in merchants' giveaway



Charlie "Sugartime" Phillips and the area's top western band, the "Sugartimers," will be playing a benefit dance at the Clovis Holiday Inn July 29 at 9 p.m. cdt.

This is the 7th annual benefit dance for the Farwell Convalescent Center at Border Town Days.

The five member band consists of Jimmy Young, fiddle; Vick Ashmead, steel guitar; Frank Hardcastle, lead guitar; Chet Calcote, base guitar, and Ted Czahowske, drummer. Young and Calcote once played with the legendary Bob Wills and the "Texas Playboys." Young is a member of the Western Swing Hall of Fame.

Phillips became famous for writing and recording the No. 1 hit in 1958 "Sugartime." His original version was recorded at the Norman Petty Stuidos in Clovis. Buddy Holly played the lead guitar on the original recording. It hit the top of the country and western charts, but the McGuire Sisters' pop version gave it worldwide recognition.

Phillips was a teen-ager in Farwell High School when he wrote "Sugartime" while driving a tractor on the family farm. Since then, he has recorded a number of country and western hits. In the 1960s, every record he made was on the national charts. He has performed on the Grand Ole Opry and toured with Johnny Cash, Willie Nelson, Brenda Lee, Jim Reeves and Marty Robbins.

a sigh of relief this week thanks to some much needed rain in the region.


Sherley-Anderson Pittman Grain Elevators in Farwell reported 1.65" in their guage after the storm that passed through the city on July 18.


The Chief's Corner


He also gave the city council copies of the law concerning the registering of motor vehicles in Texas.
