A rugged restaurant

If you've ever heard stories about the American Cowboy and the days of the big cattle roundups and drives, you've most likely heard mention of the chuckwagon and the trail cook, or "cookie" that supplied their meals for them.

For these cowboys, the chuckwagon was a place to rest from a long day on the trail and to get some hearty food that would fuel them for the next stage of their journey. It was a rugged restaurant and the food was just as rugged; but to many a cowboy, the chuckwagon was a very important part of their life.

Today, there is a chuckwagon that has become just as important in the life of R.C. Davis.

And, with the help of others, this chuckwagon may very well change the lives of many modern day cowboys that will gather around it.

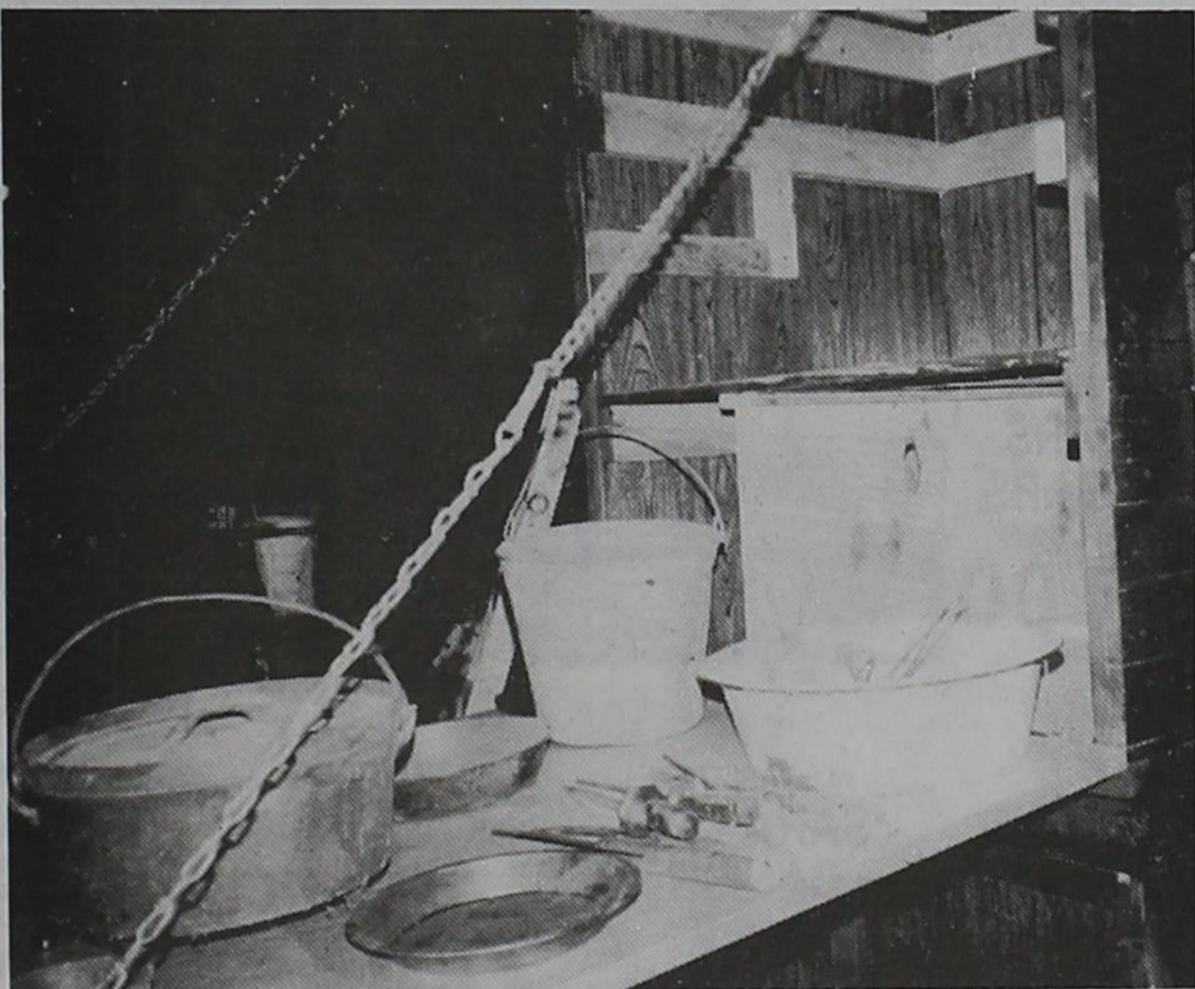
R.C. purchased the wagon from the estate of Mrs. Lawrence Cooper and has been restoring and renovating it into an old-fashioned Chuckwagon. The original wagon was built sometime between 1840 and 1850 and it was used as a grain wagon. It was part of the Centennial Ranch in Colorado and helped carry that ranch family and their belongings up to Center, Mont.

R.C. purchased the wagon as part of the new direction that the Lord has turned his life towards.

"After I got hurt and was unable to farm and do the work that I had been doing, I asked the Lord to direct me. I thought I was being called to go to some far away places like Africa, so I got kind of frustrated when cowboys and cowgirls were being sent my way," R.C. said. "I was trying to put my wants before what the Lord really wanted. But once, I realized what was going on, I said O.K. let's do it!"

R.C. and his wife Verna are members of the First Baptist Church of Farwell.

CHUCK WAGON ETIQUETTE

These unwritten rules were strictly followed:

1. No one eats until Cookie calls.
2. When Cookie calls, everyone comes running.
3. Hungry cowboys wait for no man. They fill their plates, fill their bellies, and then move on so stragglers can fill their places.
4. Cowboys eat first, talk later.
5. It's okay to eat with your fingers. The food is clean.
6. Eat with your hat on.
7. Don't take the last serving unless you're sure you're the last man.
8. Food left on a plate is an insult to the cook.
9. Don't even think of going back to work without putting your dirty dishes in the wreck pan (the dish pan).
10. No running or saddling a horse near the wagon. And when you do ride off, ride down wind from the wagon.
11. If you empty the water bucket, refill it—pronto.

Rain! Rain!

The primary topic of conversation around the Twin Cities these days is the weather.

This region has been blessed by some much needed rain and the forecast shows that the area will receive more in the coming days.

Fred Chandler at the Sherley-Anderson-Pitman grain elevator in Farwell has measured a total of 3.2 inches for the 4 rains that have come into the city during the past 7 days.

"That's just super!" said Chandler.

The Sherley-Anderson elevator in Lazbuddie has reported 2.50" as a total for the rains that fell from May 24 to May 28. They also received an additional .10" on Tuesday night.

Sherley-Anderson in Lariat report a total of 1.33" as

of May 29 and they also measured an additional .16" during the showers that fell Tuesday night.

In addition to the rain, the region has also been subject to some hail and extremely high winds.

The farmers around the Farwell area reported light hail falling, but it wasn't harsh enough to damage the crops.

Residents in Oklahoma Lane have also reported extremely high winds and light hail. No damage to crops or structures have been reported to this date.

The northern section of Lazbuddie has been the hardest hit by hail, high winds and small tornados.

Last weekend, several storage and grain bins were damaged by a small tornado that

And Tom, believing that his work is done, opted not to seek re-election last month.

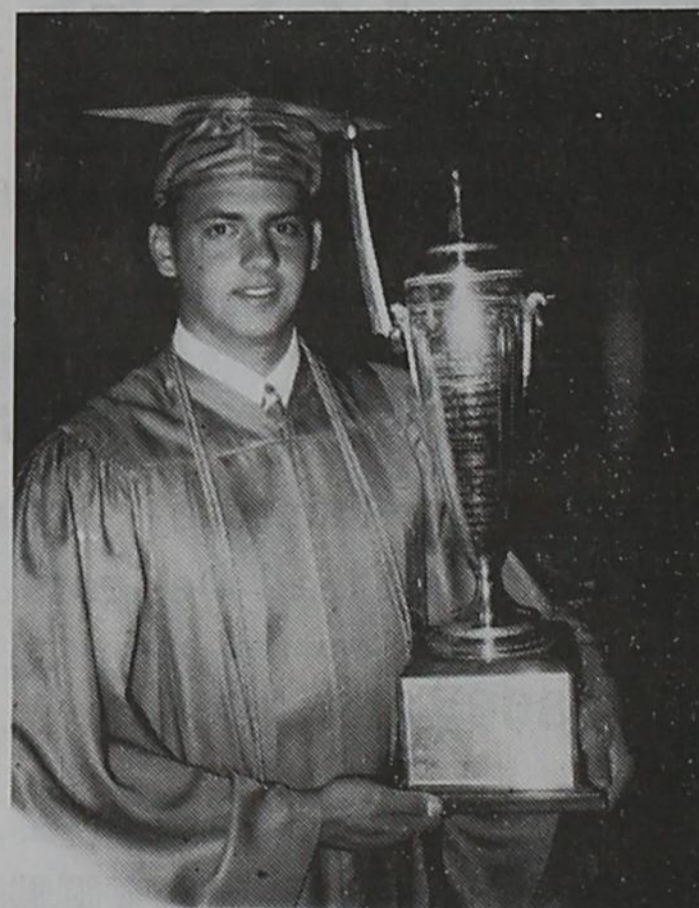
That's the kind of civic leadership that needs to be appreciated.

sent us:
 "Back to the days when America could deliver ahead of time and under budget, the 100-Day Republican Contract with America came in at Day 92, with \$100 billion in budget cuts.

"Historic First Day changes by the new GOP Congress eliminate congressional committees, slash staff size and apply all laws to Congress. As promised, we delivered; proposing laws with common-sense demands that federal regulations help more than hinder, freeing poor families and taxpayers from the welfare trap and moving power from Washington bureaucrats to the local folks.

"After 40 years of having it the Washington way, the Old Guard is losing their grip on government's bureaucracy and they do not like it. From starting food fights over school lunches to dubious claims to protect bu-

reaucrats by scaring the children, they cling to defending a system that has failed families at the expense of generations. Even with the hyped-up hysteria, more than half of Americans polled by Time Magazine approve of the job done by the new Republican Congress.

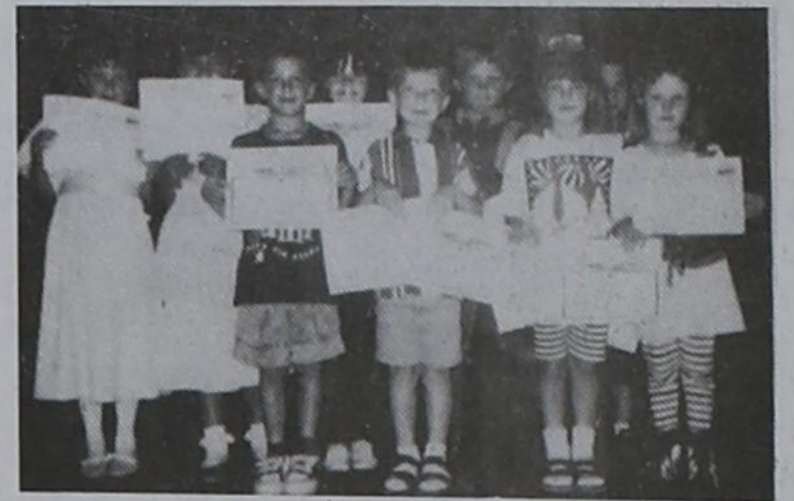

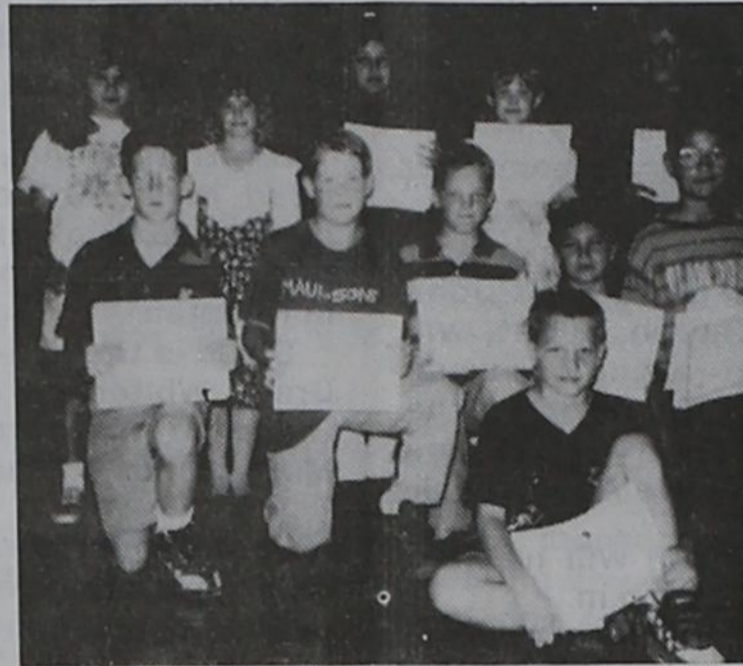

Towns receives award

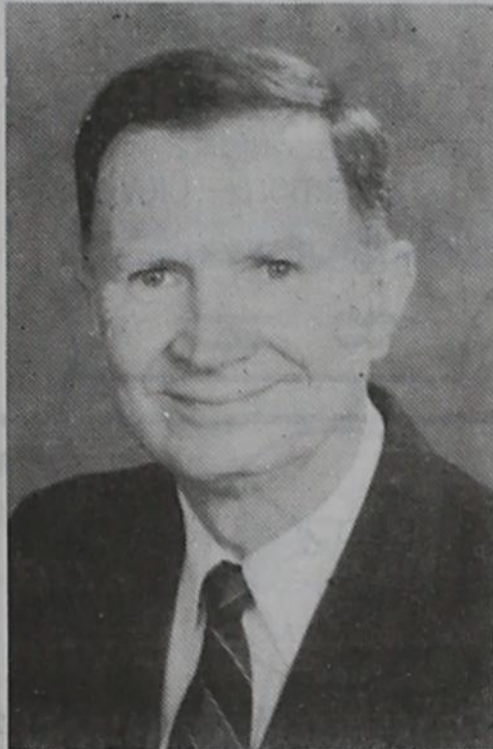
Dr. Jim Towns was awarded the Regents' Professor Award at Stephen F. Austin State University in Nacogdoches, Texas on May 13.

Parmer receives insurance relief

Parmer County residents are getting some insurance relief.

Benchmark rates for homeowners and renters insurance are going down, the Texas Insurance commissioner announced Tuesday.

This means that Parmer County homeowners will see a 6.8 percent drop in their insurance. And the renters' benchmark rates will be reduced 25 percent.

Statewide, the average decrease for homeowners is 3 percent and the renters benchmark is down by 25 percent.

Benchmark rates are set for 23 separate geographic territories and rates vary

depending on factors such as construction material and local fire protection.

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

YOUR RIGHTS CONCERNING CUSTOMER PROPRIETARY NETWORK INFORMATION

Working with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) and in compliance with the Commission's Substantive Rule 23.57, ENMR Telephone Cooperative is providing this notice to advise you of your rights concerning your customer-specific Customer Proprietary Network Information (CPNI).

In the normal course of providing your telephone service, ENMR Telephone Cooperative maintains certain information about your account. This information, when matched to your name, address, and calling or originating billing telephone number, is known as your customer-specific "Customer Proprietary Network Information," or CPNI for short. Examples of your CPNI include the type of line you have, technical characteristics (like touch tone or rotary service), class of service (business or residential), current telephone charges, long distance and local service billing records, directory assistance charges, usage data, and calling patterns.

The PUC has adopted a rule which states that, upon your request, we may not use your customer-specific CPNI to market certain telephone services or features to you. In other words, if you request that your CPNI be considered "restricted," ENMR Telephone Cooperative would be prohibited from using your CPNI to market to you certain telephone services or features that may be available to you from other sources. The only exception to the above prohibitions is if you, the customer, initiate contact with us and inquire about these services or features.

It is important to note that restricting your customer-specific CPNI will not eliminate all of our marketing communications with you. We may continue to use your customer-specific CPNI to contact you regarding telephone service and features we offer that are not available to you from another source. We may also continue our marketing contacts that are not based on your customer-specific CPNI.

If you wish to have your customer-specific CPNI considered "restricted," please call our Business Office at (505) 389-5100 or 1-800-432-2369 or stop by our office at 7111 North Prince Street, Clovis, New Mexico, and talk to one of our service representatives during our normal business hours. Simply tell us that you wish to restrict the use of your customer-specific CPNI. He named a committee of Lee Hutchins, Robert White, Edward Greenthauer and Mike Pomper to lead this effort.

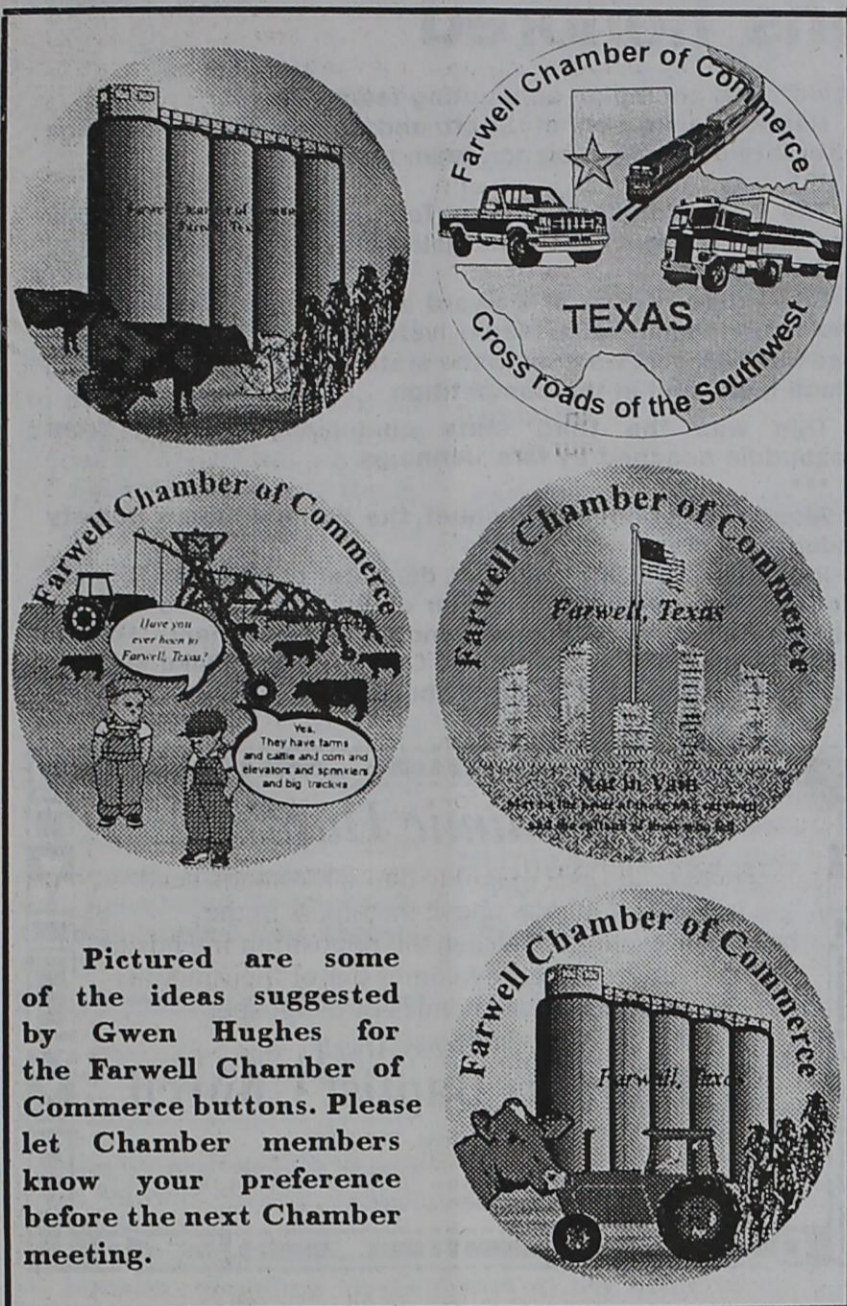

Recipe of Week

Vegetable oil spray
 1/2 cup margarine
 3/4 cup sugar
 1 egg, well beaten
 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
 1 tablespoon freshly grated nutmeg or 1 teaspoon ground nutmeg
 1 cup low-fat buttermilk

Nutmeg Bread

Pre-heat oven to 350 degrees F. Lightly spray a 9x5 inch loaf pan with vegetable oil.

In a mixing bowl, cream margarine and sugar with mixer. Add egg and mix well.

In a separate bowl, sift dry ingredients together twice. Add flour mixture and buttermilk alternately to egg mixture, beginning and ending with flour.

Pour batter into prepared loaf pan and bake 45 to 60 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool 10 minutes and remove bread from pan to cooling rack.

Note: This bread freezes well. Serves 16; 1 slice per serving.

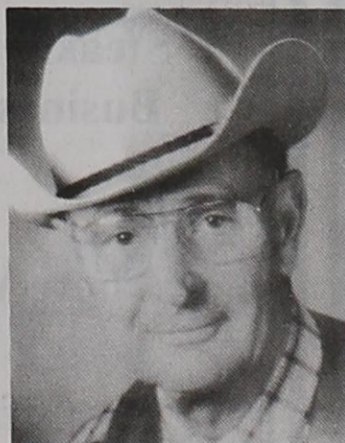

Last year's event proved very successful and proceeds were used to give out two \$1,000 scholarships to Texico high school seniors.

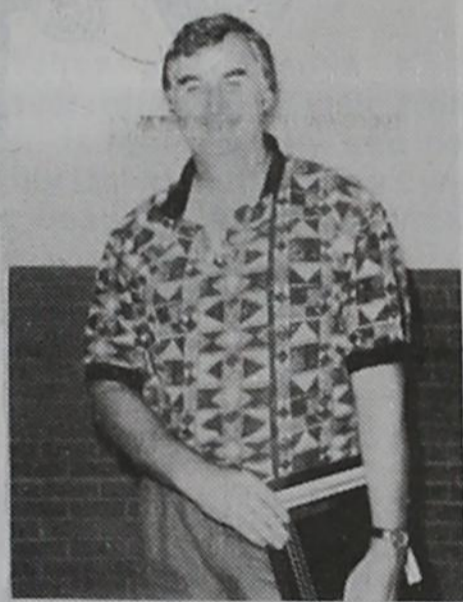
The project is spearheaded by Ronnie Warmuth. And it already appears this year's event will raise even more money than last year.



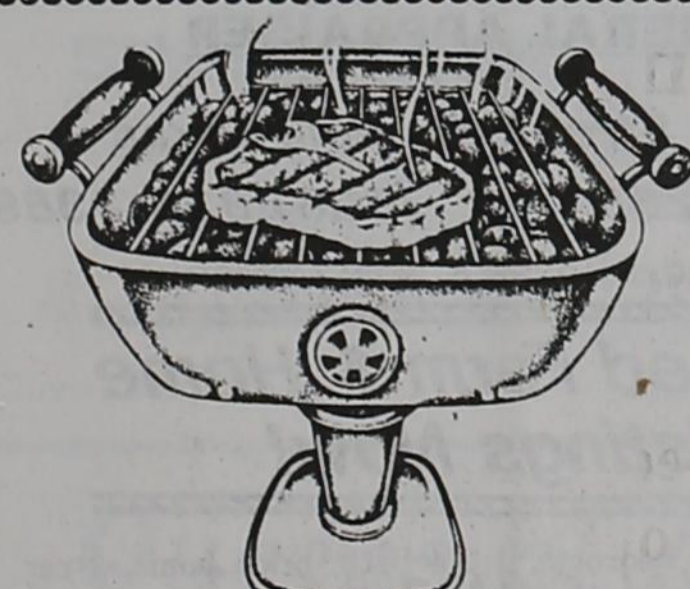

R.C. had been visiting with Pastor Rick Sullivan about how to minister to the cowboys of the area. He had been involved in the Cowboy Camp meetings and knew there were a lot of cowboys and cowgirls in the area that needed and wanted the Lord in their lives.

R.C. said that many cowboys and cowgirls just don't feel comfortable in a formal church setting. They desire and feel more at home worshipping and learning about the Lord in the outdoors and around their element.

From this, the project of the Chuckwagon began. The wagon has been turned into an authentic chuckwagon that will be brought to the Cowboy Camp Sunday on June 4 at Farwell City Park to serve food.

The restoration has involved sealing and painting the original wood on the wagon and building an authentic chuckbox that stores the pots and pans and the food. The bows that hold up the canvas tarp were donated by the Lee Ross Hammond Ranch. There will be an authentic wooden water barrel from Tennessee and chuckwagon tools on board. The tools belonged to R.C.'s father, R.C. Davis, Sr.

Earl Hurd helped make the chuckbox and Bill Pennington helped paint the wagon.

The wagon is painted a bright red. Most chuckwagons were this color or green. Some were just stained wood, but they all carried the same kind of supplies and tools. One interesting thing about the chuckwagon is that the pin, that pins the doubletrees and singletrees to the team of mules, also serves as a wrench to take the wheels off of the wagon.

But the most important tools on the wagon are the pots, pans and utensils. This wagon will be outfitted with authentic cast iron Dutch ovens and skillets and tin cups, coffee pots and more.

The wagon will bear signs that read "The Bread of Life for Cowboys and Friends." It will be used at area Cowboy Camp meetings and it is available for Boy and Girl Scout meetings, and any other clubs and churches that would like to have it brought out as a part of their camp or meetings.

He also needs a few things to complete the equipment on the wagon. Currently, he is seeking a wagon jack and



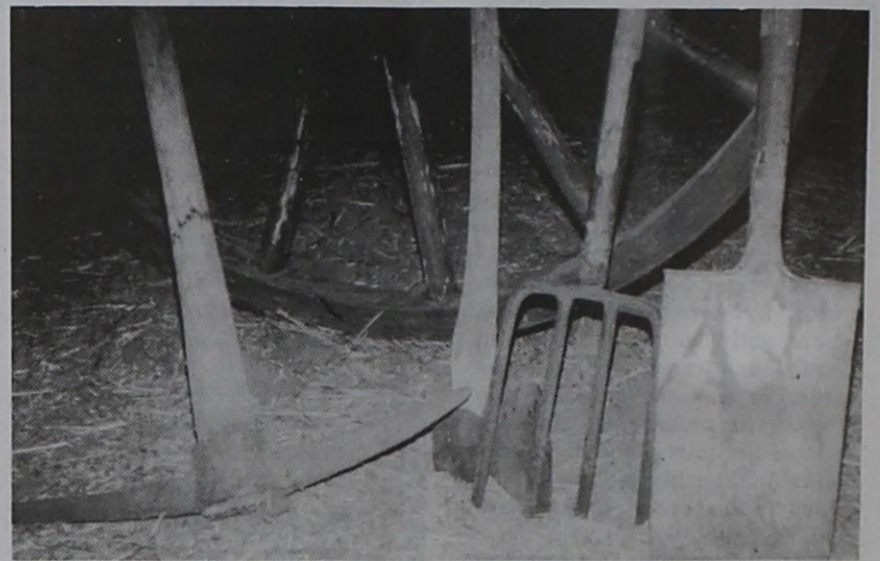
The chuckwagon's portable cookstove, complete with a cowboy coffee pot and dutch oven.
