As the Serbs committed horrifying atrocities and genocide against civilian populations, public opinion finally forced the U.N. to send in peace keepers.

A noble idea, but it only works when both sides want them. The Serbs, winning the war, didn't want them.

So the peace keepers have been at a loss. They have been very ineffective at achieving their mission.

Instead, TV audiences are treated to a display of Serb gunfire while the peace keepers duck their heads.

And now some of those peace keepers have been taken hostage.

Meanwhile, the Great Powers continue to try to figure out what to do.

So often we've seen over the past few decades that the Great Powers are so helpless when squabbles involve tiny states.

Where the Great Powers (I'm referring to the U.S., England and France, basically) went wrong was that they should have openly supported the Bosnian government when the first stories of atrocities by the Serbs appeared.

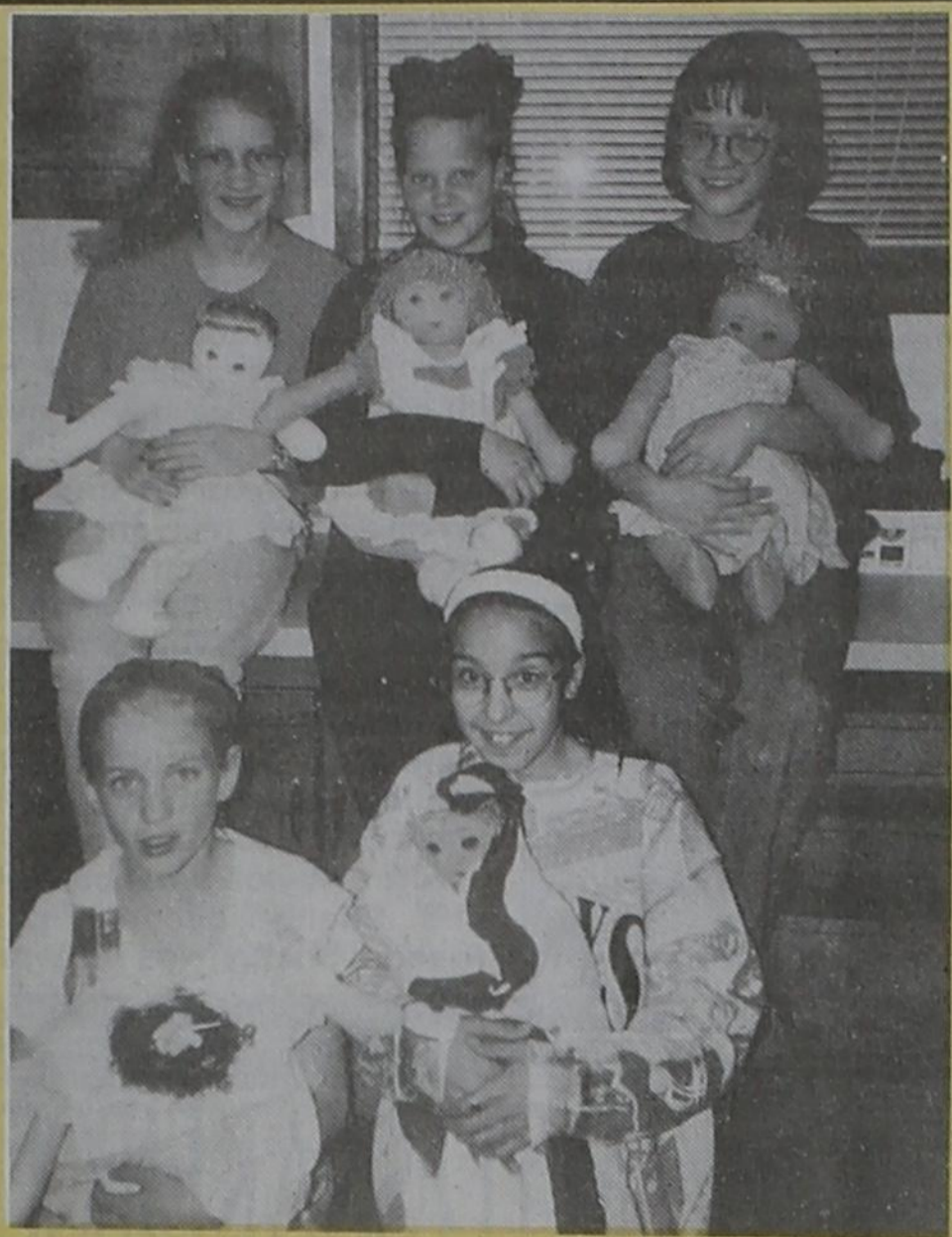
In these post-Communist days, it's up to the world's great democracies not to countenance genocide. But, in this case, they waffled.

The Parmer County Extension Office organized a Babysitter's Club to address the issue of strengthening families, says Debbie Pollard. This issue was identified by key leaders within Parmer County as the No. 1 issue in the Long Range Extension Program of work.

Ms. Pollard said these children have received training on child development, creative play, positive discipline, emergency medical care, financial management, and how to be a "super sitter."

"Not only have the children learned a lot but they will be able to use these skills in the community as they take on baby-sitting jobs," she said. "We hope parents will feel more secure about leaving their children with members of the baby-sitting club that have been exposed to this type of training. The club has done community service baby-sitting in order to gain more experience."

Their last activity of the year was the "carry-baby" project. Each member assisted in making the "carry-baby" dolls. Members were asked to carry the dolls for three days and keep a journal of their experiences. The project goal is to make members aware that babies are a 24 hour a day responsibility.

Van stopped with 20 aliens

When a disaster hits...

Once a disaster strikes, how can government help?

Here's what has occurred in Parmer County since the tornado viciously struck Friona on June 2, destroying several trailer houses and causing extensive damage to several businesses, city utilities and the cemetery.

First, County Judge Bonnie Clayton immediately declared a state of emergency for Parmer County. This order is good for seven days until the governing body, the county commissioners, votes to continue it. This was done Monday.

After the judge's declaration of emergency, a letter is sent to the state Department of Emergency Management. Then a letter is sent by the county judge to Gov. George W. Bush.

Next, a state team member is sent to Parmer County to evaluate the situation. The regional liaison in Lubbock came to Friona on June 3.

Meanwhile, Roger Field, the Friona emergency coordinator, also met with folks who suffered from the tornado, and began sending reports and updates to Austin. So did Denver Redwine, a Parmer County sheriff's deputy who doubles as the Parmer County emergency coordinator (for unincorporated areas).

What this has resulted in is a scheduled visit on June 14 by representatives of the Federal Emergency Management Administration, Small Business Administration and state officials.

They were here to assess the needs of folks and businesses. They then will report to Gov. Bush. If certain criteria are met, the governor will declare a state of emergency for Parmer County, as he has done for some other counties in Texas which were struck by tornadoes in May. Bush will petition President Clinton to make the county a national state of emergency.

If Clinton does so, this opens the possibility of low-interest loans and other programs the state and federal agencies offer that may apply to local needs.

Judge Clayton said there's a better chance this will occur if Parmer County is tied in with other counties struck by tornadoes.

Also, an assessment is done of damage to farm areas by the Consolidated Farm Services.

Judge Clayton added that State Rep. Pete Laney and his staff have been very helpful and attentive during the crisis, as have all state officials. She also thanked Shea Woodard, the regional director for U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, for her assistance. Ms. Woodard, a Friona native, is stationed in Abilene, Texas.

Texico pool vandalized

Della Stanton will manage the Texico Swimming Pool, it was announced at Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting.

The board approved buying a new pool blanket, to cost about \$350. The old blanket was in shreds. It's needed to keep folks out when the pool is closed.

The board also may add a light pole at the northeast corner of the pool.

It was noted that someone had thrown a lot of junk into the pool last weekend, including poles, pipe and trash cans. Police are investigating this vandalism.

Last year, some kids had etched their names into the bottom of the pool. They were found out since they had written down their own names.

In other business, the board:

- Noted that it's negotiating to buy a block south of the railroad tracks, off Garwood, from the Santa Fe Railroad for use as a proposed fire sub-station. The state has been asked to provide funds for the station.

The railroad agent has okayed Texico's offer, but the Santa Fe board must now approve it.

- Amended the curb cutting ordinance to include language to the effect that if the property owner damages city property while doing cuts must pay for the repairs.

- Appointed councilman Ronnie Warmuth as the board's representative to Eastern Plains Council of Governments.

- Discussed using the current community center as a new city barn. No decisions were made.

The new community center will open early next year.

- Heard that 12 persons had applied for the police officer's post that is being added. Of the 12, 2 were New Mexico certified. One took a job in Tucumcari and the other is out of the running.

Since the board had earlier stipulated that if it wasn't able to hire a certified officer, it would re-advertise the post, that's

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A van carrying 20 illegal aliens from Mexico was stopped in Texico Monday night by Texico deputy marshal Larry Garrison.

Garrison said he stopped the van, with Arizona license plates, for speeding. The driver, from Guatemala, was arrested on charges of speeding, improper use of registration and stolen license plates (found in the vehicle).

Garrison said he got an okay to check out the van and found 22 persons - 20 men and 2 women - laying side by side. Twenty of them were Mexican aliens and 2 were from Guatemala.

The U.S. Border Patrol was contacted and all occupants were held until they arrived.

On Tuesday, the 20 Mexican aliens were deported but the three from Guatemala were legally here. Of the three from Guatemala, only the driver was charged. He was put in Curry County de-

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Police break up 'pot' party

Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa reports that he broke up a party of 12 or more persons, several of whom were minors, at 402 Second St., early Sunday morning.

Ruben Ortega, 23, who lives at the address, was charged with possession of marijuana, possession of drug paraphernalia and contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

While on routine patrol about 1:20 a.m., he noted a pickup blocking the alley between 2nd and 3rd streets in the 400 block. Officer Keevin Hall was with him.

McGaa said he was met by Ortega at the back fence. After McGaa entered the yard, he saw about a dozen persons, half of whom ran away.

Hall and McGaa detained those they could. McGaa said Ortega gave him permission to enter. Inside, McGaa said he founds three pipes of the type commonly used to smoke marijuana, surgical clamps and a marijuana cigarette butt.

McGaa said he also detained 7 other persons - a woman from Clovis, a woman from Texico, a man from Bovina, a man from Texico, and three men from Farwell.

McGaa said he questioned the 7 - who said they knew none of the names of the ones who got away. He told each of them that if they are involved in another such incident, they will be charged and arrested.

Editor's note: The reason the names of the seven who were detained are not listed in this report because it is the policy of the Tribune only to report names of persons who are charged in police reports.

killed out on the dirt road in front of my house.

Many people understand what a faithful friend and companion that a dog can be and the loss that one feels when they are gone. My heart is saddened by Shelby's death, but I know that he's now in a much better place.

Shelby was an extraordinary dog. He was a Cocker Spaniel-Welsh Corgi mix with all the character in the world. When I got him, I was in my junior year at Texas Tech. My roommates and I bought a name book - one you would buy to find a name for your child.

We sounded out names to each other, with the determining factors of how it would sound being yelled out the back door and in training my precious new puppy. I found the name Shelby in the boy's section and it meant 'has a unique character.' This described him perfectly.

He was a great college dog. He wore a red badana around his neck and accompanied me to my intramural softball and soccer games. He barked from the sidelines like a cheerleader for my team. He rode in my pickup on the seat next to me on all my road trips home and helped me sing all my favorite songs on the radio.

He was an alarm clock and a mother hen. He honestly worried about me. He listened to all my boyfriend troubles and would give a heartfelt nuzzle and caring "Whuffmp" when I would be upset.

I cared for him like a little child as well. One time, he was at a softball game and got a softball hit right in his face - a very low and foul ball. He was hurt and

bleeding from his nose and mouth. His right eye swelled shut and we rushed him to the vet's emergency center. He had a cracked cheekbone and a bad concussion. The vet prescribed aspirin for the pain and said that he would probably have headaches for a time.

I always knew when Shelby had a headache. His eye would get red and I would give him an aspirin and then rock him in my rocking chair. He would fall asleep in my arms like a baby and sleep on the foot of my bed for a couple of hours.

When I graduated, he went through the post-graduate period with me. He listened to all the advertising copy that I wrote and the jingles for the radio commercials. When I would be at my parents', he was my parent's grandchild and was treated just like one.

On two separate times at my parents' home in Houston, Shelby ripped the carpet away from the door and chewed it and the pad to shreds. My father was furious and spanked Shelby like a child. After the second incident, I caught my father sitting with Shelby on the edge of their hot tub talking to

him about being a bad boy and that it didn't make them happy to have to punish him so severely.

Shelby was literally in the dog house and he moped for days.

When I moved to Farwell, Shelby had to become an outside only dog. He didn't take well to this at first. He was spoiled and he punished me for weeks by not rushing up to me and greeting me. He would stand off and turn his head away from me when I was talking to him. But he then took to his new outdoor life. Before the great outdoors became his backyard, Shelby was a beautiful specimen of care. His black coat of hair was always brushed, shiny and never tangled. However, a few weeks into the outdoors and he became a mess. He stayed a mess until his demise.

People would see him walking by and would ask "what is that?" It never mattered to me, I loved him just as much.

Shelby was a great source of comfort when my first husband died. He would sit next to me on the front step and watch the world go by. He listened to me, watched me and reassured me that I was going to be okay. He was also a great security measure.

He would always rush into my house before me - even though he wasn't allowed in the house. He would go from room to room and check my house out. Once he had made his rounds, he would go back outside and look back at me like "it's all clear in there, but I'll be right here if you need me."

After I remarried and was pregnant with my son, I would sit with Shelby on the steps and he would lay his head against my growing stomach. He would raise up and cock his head from side to side, looking at my stomach. He would bark and moan, like he was talking to the baby.

After Taylor was born, he and Shelby became good friends. Shelby was very protective of Taylor and that made me feel good.

I'm going to miss Shelby and all the things that he did with me and for me. But, I've got a lot of great memories of him. I know it may seem ridiculous to have gotten so caught up in my dog's life, but his life was a big part of mine.

I treated him with love and respect and he, in turn, treated me with love and affection.

I didn't have to be anything other than myself for him. I didn't have to have money or power or the best of everything to be his friend.

I think we could learn a lot about living together and being a friend from the animals we call Man's Best Friend.

On Tuesday, the Farwell 4-H Club brought balloons by to the area businesses that had shown support of them throughout the year.

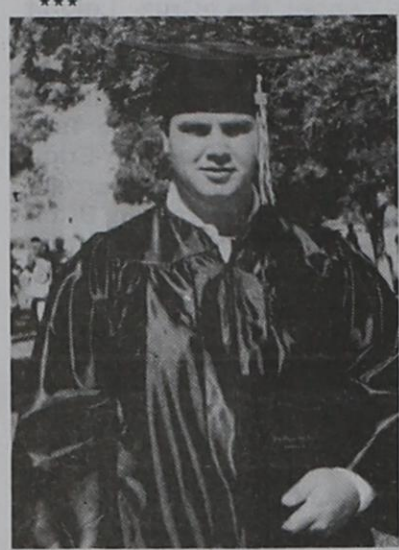
The Texico Community Activities Organization will have
