## No pay raises; no county annex

No pay raises for most county employees, and no county annex in Friona. Those were a couple of the hard decisions coming from Monday's meeting of the Parmer County ComThe annex, which basically would add or's office in Friona, has been avidly sough by tax asses Chamber of Commerce the past two yors. But county Chamber of Commerce the past two years. But county off
cials have estimated that such an office would need an extra full-time employee, at a rough cost of $\$ 18,000$ a year. Thus, the county commissioners were being asked to start a new program -- a county annex -- at a time when they were looking to make cutbacks.
Commissioner Johnny Mars, of Friona, moved that the county put the annex in Friona, as the Chamber had proposed, but it was not seconded. The commissioners then ed 3-1 to not to establish the annex.
The county employees have been receiving 3 percent pay raises for the past few years. But this year, county judge four employees who will there won't be raises except for with others. Three dispatchers will get higher salaries to be in ine with the 4th dispatcher. And the county attorney's salary will be upped to be more in line with other county attorneys of counties the size of Parmer.
Another hard decision the commissioners will have to face deals with the county's tax rates. Since 1987, the rate has gone up 3 percent a year. Prior to that, it had been quite awhile since county taxes were raised. This hurt the count because inflation coupled with unfunded state mandates raised costs during that period but the county's tax rate remained the same, helping cause today's dilemma, said Mrs Clayton.
Each year, the county department heads submit budgets. After the commissioners received this year's requests, they asked the department heads to trim whatever they could from them. Mrs. Clayton said the department heads were very co-

As a result, she said the commissioners didn't make any But heir requests during the workshops so far
But the shortfalls have continued the past few years about $\$ 104,000$. She anticipates a projected shortfall for 1995 of about $\$ 177,000$. Currently, the county has just over $\$ 1.4$ million on hand in all accounts.
In order to eliminate those continuing shortfalls which have seen the county's "carry-over" of funds shrink the pas few years, the commissioners are looking at possibly ap proving a higher tax rate for 1995-96.
As stated, the hike has been 3 percent for several years, but this year they are looking as high as $71 / 2$ percent. the $3 \%$ cent hike adds about half a cent (per $\$ 100$ valuation) to county residents' tax bills. If the rate was hiked $71 / 2$ percent, for example, it would add just under 2 cents (per $\$ 100$ valuation) to the tax bills.
No decision will be made on the 1995-96 tax rate until the public budget hearing on Sept. 25. The county's tax rate for 1994-95 is .3246 cents.

## Insects threaten cotton crop

From Plains Cotton Growers
Protecting the potential that exists for the 1995 High Plains cotton crop wont be easy.
Dr. Jim Leer, Texas ag extension service entomologist, reports the combined threat posed by late-season build-ups of the boll weevil, beet armyworm, bollworms and aphids could have become a very costly bullet to dodge for many producers.
Leer warns producers across the area to keep a close eye on their crop and advises them to step up their scouting efforts for each of these pests. He notes that newly emery ing boll weevils are continuing to cause problems for pro Lubbock that are cold "threatened" will have cotton treated for weevils before the growing season ends
Loser notes that fields as far north as Edmonson, Hate
County and Kris, Swisher County, have already been treated for weevils this year.
Producers are advised to do everything they can to get their fields past the point where weevils can damage their crop or else face the possibility of up to six insecticide applications to get them through.
Anyone who wants more complete information about bol weevil management can obtain a pamphlet titled "Boll Weevil Management in the West Texas High Plains" from their county extension agent.
Leser adds that the threat posed by the beet armyworm is also significant enough that producers will need to keep a lose watch on their crops. The key to beet armyworm con troll is early detection and treatment. Later planted, lush fields or fields with skippy stands are the most vulnerable to his pest.
Routine scouting for boll weevils and bollworms are no adequate for beet armyworms since egg masses are located

He notes that beet armyworm egglays are currently widely scattered across the entire High Plains region. So far they have not swept across the area with the same ferocity that devastated the Lower Rio Grande Valley or, more recently the Southern Rolling Plains area around San Angelo.

Cool temperatures make a difference

Most of us don't mind the cool temperatures in the spring and the fall, but for local farmers it can mean the difference between a bumper cotton crop and one that's not.
Dr. Norman Hopper, an associate professor of agronomy at Texas Tech University and a cotton research scientist a he Texas Agricultural Experiment Station here is studying cold tolerance of cotton under grants funded by Cotton in orporated and the Texas State Support Committee. In addion, he is looking at a seed coating which eeding emergence under cool condions.

peratures during the spring and fall of the problems we face in this area is that we have
"One short growing season. It is not particularly short in terms of the number of days from last frost in spring to first fros the fall. We have an adequate number of days in terms of our growing season," Hopper said.
"When we talk of a short growing season, we are talking about it in terms of total heat units that are available to mature the crop. Because we often have these low spring and fall temperature conditions, this narrows us in on the num ber of heat units available," he explained.
In order to use as much of the heat units as possible to grow and mature the crop, we have to plant early. When planting early, we often run into cool spring temperatures especially at night, Hopper said.
Cotton is basically a crop of tropical origin, and it likes warm temperatures.
When cotton is planted under cool conditions, it slows germination, emergence, establishment, and growth.
Hopper and his research team are trying to improve the
"Thergence of cotton under cool conditions.
"There are several ways to approach this, and one is "Trough genetics. We try to select lines hat have what we便 merge under cooler temperatures than, say, other wes e can use those in a breeding program," Hopper said
"We try to incorporate genes for cold tolerance into lines and varieties that will eventually have the genetic capacity
The second way is to look at some kind of physical method that will enhance germination and emergence.
"One of the things we are looking at is trying to identify why these early season cool temperatures tend to hurt germination and emergence. We know that as a dry seed imbibes (absorbs) cold water, cellular damage occurs, primarily to the membranes," Hopper said.

When seed membranes are damaged, one of two things happen. If enough damage occurs, the seed will neve erminate. The second, is that the seed will receive a certain It may or may not germinate and emerge. It will depend on how much injury there is. If the seed is injured, it is going to merge slower than if no injury occurred.
So one of the things we believe is happening is that as dry seeds imbibe cold water too fast, the membranes in the ell are cold and not very elastic. Since the membranes are cold and not very stretchable (brittle), they may rupture, Hopper said.
One of the things Hopper is looking at is polymer film coating. Polymer films form a coating on the seeds, slowing he water uptake and letting the cells stretch slowly instead quickly under the cold conditions.

he amount of vigor loss will determine whether the seed will survive and live. Anytime we've ruptured those cells like meaning it can still go ahead and emerge," Hopper said.
Anytime a cell is ruptured the contents of the cell actually spill out into the seed environment and because the contents are very rich in amino acids and sugars, the contents become the perfect media for pathogenic organisms (such as fungus and bacteria) to grow and invade that seed and cause it to die.
So what we are hoping to do with the polymer coating is to slow imbibition, thus, causing less damage to the seed, what we call imbibitional chilling injury. In addition, we won't have those cellular contents in the soil acting as a media for pathogenic organisms, both of which should give us a higher emergence," Hopper said.
