## No pay raises; no county annex

No pay raises for most county employees, and no county annex in Friona. Those were a couple of the hard decisions coming from Monday's meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners during its budget discussions.

The annex, which basically would add a county tax assessor's office in Friona, has been avidly sought by the Friona Chamber of Commerce the past two years. But county officials have estimated that such an office would need an

extra full-time employee, at a rough cost of \$18,000 a year. Thus, the county commissioners were being asked to start a new program -- a county annex -- at a time when they were looking to make cutbacks.

Commissioner Johnny Mars, of Friona, moved that the county put the annex in Friona, as the Chamber had proposed, but it was not seconded. The commissioners then voted 3-1 to not to establish the annex.

The county employees have been receiving 3 percent pay raises for the past few years. But this year, county judge Bonnie Clayton reported, there won't be raises except for four employees who will get higher wages to be "equalized" with others. Three dispatchers will get higher salaries to be in line with the 4th dispatcher. And the county attorney's salary will be upped to be more in line with other county attorneys of counties the size of Parmer.

Another hard decision the commissioners will have to face deals with the county's tax rates. Since 1987, the rate has gone up 3 percent a year. Prior to that, it had been quite awhile since county taxes were raised. This hurt the county because inflation coupled with unfunded state mandates raised costs during that period but the county's tax rate remained the same, helping cause today's dilemma, said Mrs. Clayton.

Each year, the county department heads submit budgets. After the commissioners received this year's requests, they asked the department heads to trim whatever they could from them. Mrs. Clayton said the department heads were very cooperative in this effort.

Mrs. Hughs will be attending a seminar in mid-September for county chairmen. She will learn the new election rules, and also meet with other GOP officials to plan strategy for the 1996 elections Mrs. Hughs has two early goals: -- To increase the number of GOP polling places in the primary election from 4 to 9 (the number that the Democrats have).

Think about that...

#### From Teresa:

We got a call the other day out at our dairy from a local farmer that we have contracted corn from.

His message was straightforward and simple: "The corn has dented!"

It took me several years to understand that this was not a bad thing. It hails the beginning of one of the busiest times of the year on our dairy - corn silage time.

Growing corn and cutting it for silage is a precise science. Some feed lots contract corn to be cut as high moisture corn silage, others like it a little drier, but not much.

Dairies like it another way, so the condition of the corn must be watched very carefully. Farmers must be very precise in watering the crop or in not watering it - and a whole lot of other technicalities go along with growing it.

As a result, she said the commissioners didn't make any cuts in their requests during the workshops so far.

But the shortfalls have continued the past few years. County Treasurer Anne Norton said the shortfall in 1994 is about \$104,000. She anticipates a projected shortfall for 1995 of about \$177,000. Currently, the county has just over \$1.4 million on hand in all accounts.

In order to eliminate those continuing shortfalls which have seen the county's "carry-over" of funds shrink the past few years, the commissioners are looking at possibly approving a higher tax rate for 1995-96.

As stated, the hike has been 3 percent for several years, but this year they are looking as high as 7 1/2 percent. the 3% cent hike adds about half a cent (per \$100 valuation) to county residents' tax bills. If the rate was hiked 7 1/2 percent, for example, it would add just under 2 cents (per \$100 valuation) to the tax bills.

No decision will be made on the 1995-96 tax rate until the public budget hearing on Sept. 25. The county's tax rate for 1994-95 is .3246 cents.

In other business at the commissioners' meeting:

-- A bid from Yellowhouse was accepted for a new motor grader for the Lazbuddie precinct. West Texas Equipment also bid. These funds are paid from individual commissioners' FM funds -- they don't come from the general fund where the financial problem lies.

-- Election judges were appointed for the fall election -voters will vote on constitutional amendments.

They have a certain rhythm going in keeping up with the chopper and in timing their loads. I tried driving a silage truck one year...actually it was only one time. That was all it took to see that my style of driving a big rig, didn't exactly meet the standards of a silage truck driver.

I either drove too fast or too slow. More silage was dumped on top of the truck cab, the field and on the bumper of the truck than into

the wagon. I quickly left this position and went to one that better suited my talents and the cows' best interest.

Aahh, silage season! It's here and the hum of choppers can be heard in fields all across the region. It's big business and a very busy time. But once the pits are filled and packed tight, we can all rest a little bit and look forward to next year. But most importantly, the beef and dairy cows of the area can all be assured of a good supply of filling feed for the next year.

### Insects threaten cotton crop

From Plains Cotton Growers:

Protecting the potential that exists for the 1995 High Plains cotton crop won't be easy.

Dr. Jim Leser, Texas ag extension service entomologist, reports the combined threat posed by late-season build-ups of the boll weevil, beet armyworm, bollworms and aphids could have become a very costly bullet to dodge for many producers.

Leser warns producers across the area to keep a close eye on their crop and advises them to step up their scouting efforts for each of these pests. He notes that newly emerging boll weevils are continuing to cause problems for producers south of Lubbock and that several counties north of Lubbock that are considered to be "threatened" will have cotton treated for weevils before the growing season ends.

Leser notes that fields as far north as Edmonson, Hale County and Kress, Swisher County, have already been treated for weevils this year.

Producers are advised to do everything they can to get their fields past the point where weevils can damage their crop or else face the possibility of up to six insecticide applications to get them through.

Anyone who wants more complete information about boll weevil management can obtain a pamphlet titled "Boll Weevil Management in the West Texas High Plains" from their county extension agent.

Leser adds that the threat posed by the beet armyworm is also significant enough that producers will need to keep a close watch on their crops. The key to beet armyworm control is early detection and treatment. Later planted, lush fields or fields with skippy stands are the most vulnerable to this pest.

Routine scouting for boll weevils and bollworms are not adequate for beet armyworms since egg masses are located

on the underside of leaves.

He notes that beet armyworm egglays are currently widely scattered across the entire High Plains region. So far they have not swept across the area with the same ferocity that devastated the Lower Rio Grande Valley or, more recently, the Southern Rolling Plains area around San Angelo.

More information about the beet armyworm can be found in a pamphlet at the county extension office.

A Section 18 for American Cyanamid's insecticide Pirate has been approved for the High Plains. Whether or not enough of the product will be available for use in the area is still unknown. PCG officials are working on this.


ness and leadership training workshops and seminars, corporate tours and the election of national officers.

### **Cool temperatures make a difference**

Most of us don't mind the cool temperatures in the spring and the fall, but for local farmers it can mean the difference between a bumper cotton crop and one that's not.

Dr. Norman Hopper, an associate professor of agronomy at Texas Tech University and a cotton research scientist at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station here is studying cold tolerance of cotton under grants funded by Cotton Incorporated and the Texas State Support Committee. In addition, he is looking at a seed coating which may improve seedling emergence under cool conditions.

The high elevation in this area of over 3000 feet above sea level means that this area may experience very cool temperatures during the spring and fall of the year.

"One of the problems we face in this area is that we have a short growing season. It is not particularly short in terms of the number of days from last frost in spring to first frost in the fall. We have an adequate number of days in terms of our growing season," Hopper said.

"When we talk of a short growing season, we are talking about it in terms of total heat units that are available to mature the crop. Because we often have these low spring and fall temperature conditions, this narrows us in on the number of heat units available," he explained.

In order to use as much of the heat units as possible to grow and mature the crop, we have to plant early. When planting early, we often run into cool spring temperatures, especially at night, Hopper said.

Cotton is basically a crop of tropical origin, and it likes warm temperatures.

When cotton is planted under cool conditions, it slows germination, emergence, establishment, and growth.


Hopper and his research team are trying to improve the emergence of cotton under cool conditions.

"There are several ways to approach this, and one is through genetics. We try to select lines that have what we call cold tolerance. That means they can germinate and emerge under cooler temperatures than, say, other lines and we can use those in a breeding program," Hopper said.

"We try to incorporate genes for cold tolerance into lines and varieties that will eventually have the genetic capacity to germinate and grow under cool conditions," he explained.

The second way is to look at some kind of physical method that will enhance germination and emergence.

"One of the things we are looking at is trying to identify why these early season cool temperatures tend to hurt germination and emergence. We know that as a dry seed imbibes (absorbs) cold water, cellular damage occurs, primarily to the membranes," Hopper said.



When seed membranes are damaged, one of two things will happen. If enough damage occurs, the seed will never germinate. The second, is that the seed will receive a certain amount of chilling injury.

It may or may not germinate and emerge. It will depend on how much injury there is. If the seed is injured, it is going to emerge slower than if no injury occurred.

"So one of the things we believe is happening is that as dry seeds imbibe cold water too fast, the membranes in the cell are cold and not very elastic. Since the membranes are cold and not very stretchable (brittle), they may rupture, Hopper said.

One of the things Hopper is looking at is polymer film coating. Polymer films form a coating on the seeds, slowing the water uptake and letting the cells stretch slowly instead of quickly under the cold conditions.

"Now we don't want to slow the imbibition a whole lot because this would also slow emergence. Slowing emergence would have the same effect as delaying planting and thus not utilizing the entire growing season," Hopper warned.

When cells rupture they are dead. If enough of the cells rupture, then the seed dies or doesn't have the capacity to germinate. Anytime a seed is damaged but not killed, the vigor is reduced.

"The amount of vigor loss will determine whether the seed will survive and live. Anytime we've ruptured those cells like that, it may not be enough to keep it from coming up: meaning it can still go ahead and emerge," Hopper said.

Anytime a cell is ruptured the contents of the cell actually spill out into the seed environment and because the contents are very rich in amino acids and sugars, the contents become the perfect media for pathogenic organisms (such as fungus and bacteria) to grow and invade that seed and cause it to die.

"So what we are hoping to do with the polymer coating is to slow imbibition, thus, causing less damage to the seed, what we call imbibitional chilling injury. In addition, we won't have those cellular contents in the soil acting as a media for pathogenic organisms, both of which should give us a higher emergence," Hopper said.






