County Sheriff Williams explains why drug dealers can get away with it

the Tribune, Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams gave his views on the drug situation in the county.

The sheriff estimated there was probably close to 10 drug dealers in Texico-Farwell, 4 or 5 in Bovina, and 5 to 10 in Friona.

There are two major reasons why drug dealers cannot be targeted in a small county like Parmer, he said:

1) You need money for undercover police to use in drug buys. It would cost anywhere from \$100 to \$1,000 on a drug buy and the district attorney's office wants at least three "buys" made in order to have a good case, Williams explained.

The problem is there is no money available for drug

Williams added that if a drug dealer is arrested, some of the funds could be gotten back and some of his property could be seized.

2) Local law enforcement don't have the personnel to work on drug busts.

Williams said a fulltime person is needed for such work and local departments don't have the manpower for that.

Parmer County Chief Deputy Bryan Thurmond is the county's liaison to the West Plains Drug Task Force (Parmer, Bailey, Swisher and Castro counties), but he has other duties and cannot work drugs fulltime, said the sher-

Williams noted that the Parmer County Commissioners don't have the money to hire a sheriff's deputy to work fulltime on drugs. He estimated the cost for one person, plus equipment, insurance, benefits, etc., at about \$30,000.

The way to stop drug trafficking is to stop the demand, the sheriff said. "As long as there is a demand for drugs, someone will be out there selling it."

He also said education in needed. Teaching youths the dangers of drugs is one of the best defenses.

Until recently, County had been part of the Panhandle Regional Drug Task Force. But last month, Parmer County dropped out of it, instead hooking up with the West Plains group.

Williams said he did this because he was having a dif-



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

Jacquez pleads guilty

On June 20, Jose Jacquez, 52, of Texico, pled guilty in Curry County District Court to a charge of aggravated felony DWI.

He had received seven charges from Texico police on Oct. 5.

On the DWI charge, he was fined \$800 and costs; given 364 days in jail -- with 144 suspended and 144 under supervised probation; mandated to go before a Mothers Against Drunk Driving panel; and mandated to participate in an alcohol screening pro-

gram.

On a charge of driving on a suspended license revoked, he was fined \$400, and given 364 days in jail -- with 357 days on supervised probation.

On a charge of no insurance, he was fined \$50.

The other four charges -- no seat belt, open container, failure to maintain lane, and not giving identity to police -- were dropped under the plea agreement, the district attorney's office said.



Faith is confidence. It is trust. "Now faith is the assurance (substance) of things hoped for; a conviction of things not seen" (Heb 11:1; cf Eph 4:5).

Saving faith is based on evidence. It is produced by credible testimony. "So belief cometh of hearing and hearing by the word of Christ" (Rom 10:17). One may believe a lie and be damned (2 Thes 2:11,12).

Valid faith is active. It doesn't just stand there. It moves. It is faith "working through love" (Gal 5:6). Faith that doesn't act is dead. "For as the body apart from the spirit is dead, even so faith apart from works is dead" (Jas 2:26). Faith alone is dead! Faith apart from works is barren. James refers to Abraham: "Thou seest that faith wrought with his works, and by works was faith made perfect...Ye see that by works a man is justified, and not only by faith" (Jas 2:22,24). Indeed, genuine faith is so very active it is referred to as a work. "This is the work of God, that ye believe on Him Whom He hath sent" (John 6:29).

When Texico hired Rob Hollis as the new high school principal, they took on a man with the unusual quality of having experience in almost every facet of the public school system - and then some!



For most high school students, college is an option to be considered only in the distant future after the present goals of passing algebra and winning district and, of course, graduating are out of the way. Even then, a college education is an expensive and time-consuming process some may not be able to participate in. However, area students have a unique opportunity to bring a taste of college and future careers into their high school schedules as well.

Through the Clovis Community College Concurrent Enrollment program, Farwell and Texico students are able to earn both high school and college credit simultaneously. Credit earned at the college will go on the high school transcript to meet graduation requirements and then will later transfer to most four-year colleges and universities. Interested students have the potential of earning up to 28 college credits before even graduating from high school.

Last year was Farwell's first year to participate in the program with around 35 juniors and seniors taking upper-level academic classes such as chemistry, public speaking, intermediate and college algebra, trigonometry, psychology, and microbiology, four afternoons a week. These classes helped fill the need for more advanced options that small schools such as Farwell have difficulty providing.

This year Texico will join the program in a slightly different route. CCC has opened the Technical Career Center, a cooperative educational program sponsored by the area high schools and the college. It serves students by providing technical training options and career education in a variety of

Like the academic classes, instruction is offered on the campus, utilizing classrooms, laboratories and instructors used in college programs. All the programs provide at least one year of training; some programs have a second year option so that a junior student may enroll for a another year.

Fifteen Texico students have signed up to participate in a variety of classes including air conditioning, heating, and refrigeration, graphic art, building construction trades, business office administrative services, cosmetology, or welding.

Students enrolled in the Technical Career Center have the opportunity to earn credits toward a degree or certificate at

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money in the future.

CCC but will not transfer to other universities. However, after successfully completing the program, students will have a head start on the career of their choice.

One of the benefits of the programs is that all of this is offered to the student expense free. The school covers the tuition and books and other fees so that all the students need provide is minor supplies and transportation to the college for daily instruction. Of course, in return the school requires certain stipulations. If the student doesn't pass the class or has disciplinary problems, the parents are financially responsible. But in most cases, the program saves a good deal of expense and time.

After one year, Farwell has learned more than trig proofs and worked out some problems they encountered during the first two semesters. The classes were more demanding than the students realized, both academically and time-wise. But virtually all the Farwell students passed last year. They learned that, to be successful in the program, it takes a definite commitment and a careful scheduling of activities and time. However, many will agree that the extra work load will undoubtedly pay off in the future, even if it sometimes seems to be a pain in the neck now!

While Texico students will be experimenting in the Technical Career Center next year, Farwell students will continue on the academic program, enrolling in the upper level science and math courses. New additions to the curriculum will include Anatomy and Physiology I and II for the seniors.

The Chief's Corner

From Police Chief Roy McGaa:

This is the last article in the series and I don't believe I will attempt anything this lengthy in the future. Trying to condense 30 years of experience and training into a few paragraphs doesn't work at all well. At any rate, I hope some readers will appreciate the fact that when law enforcement is short changed on realistic and accurate training, the public is also short changed.

I do make the charge that some law enforcement instructors avoid fact and common sense in their teaching, merely because what is politically incorrect will get an instructor sued. However, a law enforcement instructor is the same as a peace officer, no one forced them to take the position. An instructor owes it to his or her students to give them the best possible training because their lives and the lives of innocent civilians can be at stake due to their actions.

If some of the statements I have made have caused concern about the Farwell Police Department, let me say this. "The 'entire' police department can shoot, has combat experience, and is supplied with enough ammunition to practice on a regular basis."

In closing out this series of articles I want to make this statement, "Law enforcement training should always be based upon what is real and what works, it should not be based upon what the uninformed and uneducated 'feel' about it."







Youths receive free summer lunches in Texico program


When school is out and busy moms are at work, a good lunch may be hard to find for some area youth. But the free lunch program in Texico helps solve that problem and provides a much-needed healthy meal for young people.

Lunch is served Monday through Friday from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. in KKR park in Texico and any children up to 18 years of age are eligible to receive a meal. The program is sponsored by Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church in Clovis but the state provides the funds.

Meals ranging from Lunchables, sandwiches, hoagies, and other items are prepared each day by a group of ladies at James Bickley Elementary School in Clovis. Drinks are also provided as the children are served chocolate milk three times a week and plain milk twice a week.

Texico is not the only feeding site as the program sponsors 11 other locations in Clovis as well. Around 2,500 kids are fed each day, including an average of 130 in Texico. The state provides a budget of \$298,000 for 45 lunch dates for the program, so volunteer work is vital.

The program began at the beginning of June and will continue providing meals for any interested children until school starts again.
