## High Plains Aquifer allows us to survive

Ten million years ago, the Rocky Mountain range was created as a result of volcanic eruptions and earthquake force movement of the earth in the region. Due to the climatic changes and erosion that were occurring in the region, the Rocky Mountain range began depositing water into a wide, deep underground formation that is now known as the Ogallala Formation - the aquifer that, to this very day, supplies the water to the region in which we live.

During the aquifer formation, channels were dug out by the water flow that became known as the Pecos and

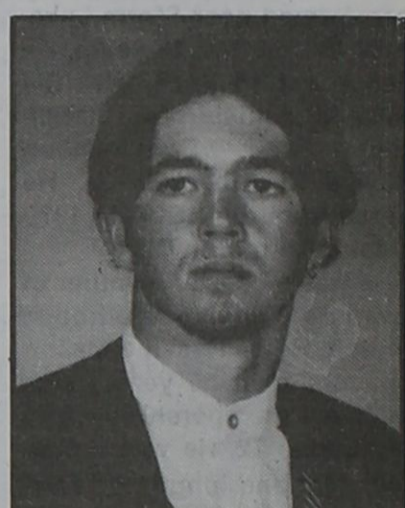

## Farwell, Clovis Community College to join forces

An agreement is nearly complete so that Farwell High School students can begin "concurrent enrollment" at Clovis Community College this fall, Farwell School Board members were told May 9.

High School Principal Larry Gregory reported that Farwell students will be able to attend CCC classes between noon and 2:30 p.m. each day.

These classes will count toward high school graduation requirements, and also are transferable to other colleges, such as Texas Tech and West Texas A&M.

This allows Farwell High students to participate in more advanced classes, an area Gregory has been working on to improve.

Subjects which will be available include: chemistry, algebra 1 and 2, psychology, micro-biology, speech communications, anatomy and physiology 1 and 2.

All told, high school students conceivably could accumulate 26 college hours while still in high school.

Also, Farwell Schools will pay for the tuition and books of its students.

However, if a student drops out or flunks out, the school may ask for financial reimbursement.

One reason this extra money is available is because the school is not replacing chemistry teacher Larry Smith, who has resigned.

Other Farwell High teachers will instruct biology and physical science, while chemistry will be taken at CCC.

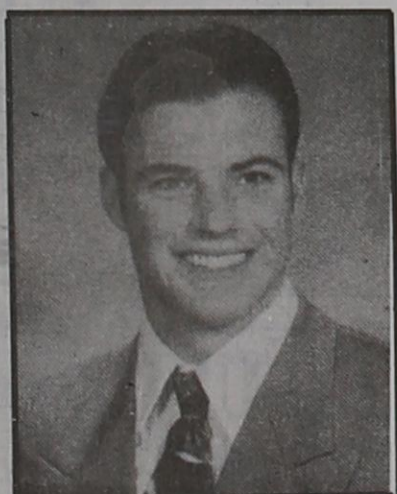
Gregory complimented CCC officials for their willingness to work with Farwell High on this project.

-- Agreed to have the inside of the old high school gym painted. It's used for junior

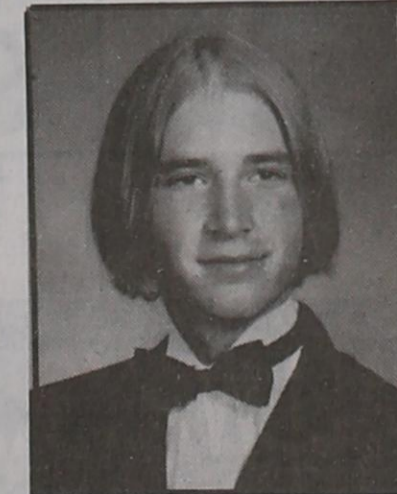

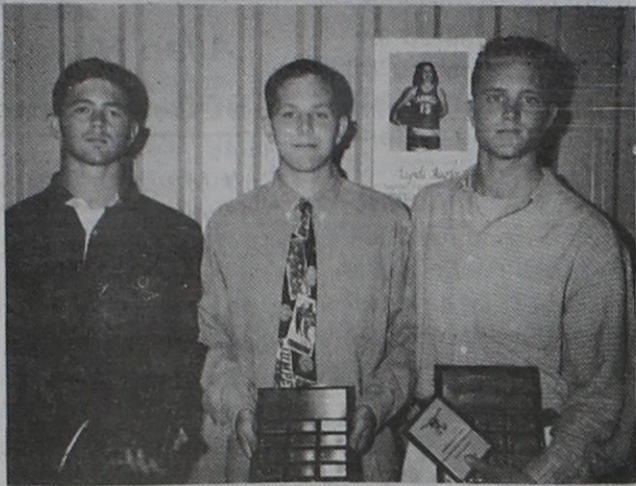

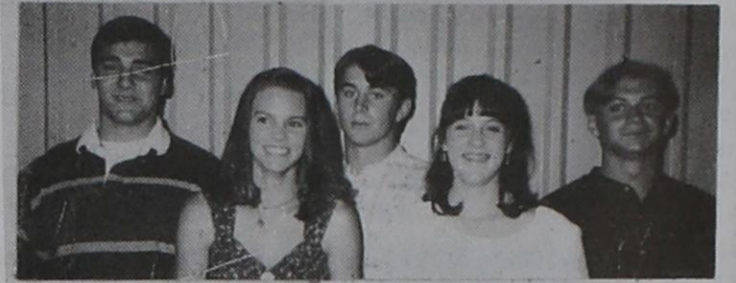

### Marshal's Report

A newly approved brucellosis vaccine, RB-51, can cut producers' concerns about vaccinated cows getting false-positive results on brucellosis tests.

TAHC officials said the vaccine protects without the risk of false-positive tests. Ideally, vets should give the vaccine to heifers when they are 4 to 8 months old.

Brucellosis is a bacterial disease that can affect heifers when they become adults, resulting in weak calves, abortions or reduced milk production.

For years the weapon against infection was Strain 19, a vaccine which can cause false readings on blood tests.

## Texico School Board approves pay raises

The Texico School Board Tuesday approved the 1996-97 budget. It included average pay raises for teachers at 4.1 percent and average pay raises for hourly employees at 3.9 percent.

- In other business, the board:
  - Hired Terry Cone, CPA, Portales, to do the annual audit.
  - Heard that ag farm work will start soon. The state has told Texico it doesn't have any money right now to provide the access entry to the farm that the school board wants for safety reasons. This is a problem the board will continue to look at.
  - Received the resignation of pre-school aide Bernadette Askew. She has received a degree from Clovis Community College and taken a job in Clovis.
  - Hired Lori Stanley to work part-time this summer, and Indolina Meza as a pre-school aide.
  - Passed resolutions commending the school FFA teams and girls' athletic teams for their fine showings at state.
  - Heard a presentation from Mrs. Maben and Mrs. Liethen, who attended a seminar on technology in Denver. The science labs at Texico will be upgraded so that computer software will be used to do experiments. The state has given Texico funds for this, to be implemented in the next school year.
  - The annual Quality of Education survey will be sent home with students on May 16. Parents should watch for it.
  - Heard that Roosevelt County Rural Telephone (which is buying the Texico exchange from US West) plans to make it a top priority to run fiber optic lines to Texico Schools. They have received a federal loan for this. This will allow Texico to enter into the "interactive education" revolution -- having access to other schools, colleges, libraries, etc.

## Aquifer

Canadian Rivers. These river formations caused the High Plains region to be somewhat isolated from the aquifer due to the ground formation, soil and silt types and various other geological factors. The water ran deep however, in the beginning and it seemed like the region had a never-ending water source.

The "never-ending" is soon to be a myth if we do not become better stewards of our water resources.

"High Plains agriculturalists are among the best stewards of water in the world," Wayne Wyatt firmly stated. "But the fact of the matter is that we all have to become even better at protecting and using what water we have left."

The High Plains Aquifer is what our portion of the Ogallala Aquifer is known as, and the characteristics of this portion are very different than in other sections.

The aquifer is not a homogeneous aquifer. What this translates to is that it is not even in its layout and it really doesn't "flow" like some would expect it to. Water within the High Plains Aquifer flows at 150 feet per year on a gradient of 10 foot per mile. "It's very, very slow," said Wyatt. "It would take one drop of water approximately 35 years to flow another section of the aquifer."

This should also serve as a warning to agriculturalists. The famous gripe that is heard around the region is that "that farmer down the road is pumping out all my water!" The truth is however, each section of land has water underneath it and the water that is there, is basically all that will ever be there. So, if Farmer A conserves his water supply more than Farmer B, his water supply will be in much better shape. Farmer B is not pumping out Farmer A's water at all.

The underground formations play a large part in determining the aquifer depths on an individual's land also. The clays, silts and rock formations vary by the foot under any given acre of land. Farmers and ranchers are basically "cutting their own throats" if they do not conserve their water now. From studies that the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 and Texas Tech

University have conducted, average well yields that are pumping 600 to 800 gallons of water per minute will quickly drop to 100 gallons a minute if usages are at their present rate across the region.

There have been various rumors going around at how the farmers in Nebraska have been diverting the water that would recharge the Ogallala Aquifer enough to raise our water levels. I asked Mr. Wyatt about these rumors.

"They are just rumors and there is no fact to them at all," he stated. "The facts are that farming and irrigating in Nebraska is a whole lot different than it is here in the High Plains. And their soil types are different and water is closer to the top of the ground than it is here."

The agriculturalists in the High Plains began pumping water out of the aquifer sources almost four decades before farmers up north did. High Plains farmers used furrow irrigation for many years because this was the only technology available and it worked well for crops in the region. Then came the onset of Center Pivot Irrigation Sprinkler systems that, fortunately, are great water conservation systems. The majority of farmers in this region now use this type of irrigation.

But furrow irrigation never worked up north because of the soil and climate types and conditions. Center Pivot Sprinklers were the only way to really irrigate a crop up in those regions, plus they began these irrigation systems four decades after the High Plains region. Their water sources are thus more plentiful at this point in time.

Time will also tell as to the rate that the High Plains Aquifer is recharging, or if it will be recharging at all. The water sources that naturally recharge our water source are the runoffs from the area playas and surface rain absorption. The rain absorption factor is one of the critical factors in implementing a rain enhancement program.

Currently, our water situation in this region is very close to being "condition critical." Towns and cities across the region are asking residents to voluntarily ration their water usage and to be very careful to not waste water on unnecessary things. If these efforts are not effective, mandatory water rationing will be imposed in both towns and rural areas.

In our next issue: The trickle down effects that wash out business and industry as a result of a condition critical water resource.

## Texico continues dealing with zoning problems

The Texico City Council continued dealing with zoning problems Tuesday:

-- It was learned that a mobile home recently put in by H.W. Moore is not in compliance with the city ordinance due to setback requirements. Moore, who already has poured some concrete for it, was issued a stop work order and the council will have a special meeting May 20 to try and resolve the problem.

-- Approved an aesthetic review permit for a mobile home on Kindred for Raymond Tarrango. This apparently ends a problem that has been ongoing for some time.

-- Heard that councilman Rick Queener has proposed five persons for a zoning committee: Dean Heninger, Richard Hadley, Lewis Cooper and councilmen Oran Jay Autrey and Queener. After legal questions were raised about including two members who didn't live in town (Hadley and Cooper), the matter was tabled until Queener (who wasn't at the meeting) could choose two others.

-- Turned over a problem with trucks, debris and trash at the Pete Fuentes property, 622 State St., over to marshal Gil Holguin for action. Fuentes will be cited into municipal court.

In other business:

-- Decided against participating in the Summer Youth program. Youths hired in the past have been more of a hindrance than a help, it was stated.

-- Approved 8 business registrations. Businesses need to be licensed in Texico.

-- Agreed to seek a third policeman, to replace Tim Kelly who recently resigned.

-- Discussed a problem with a bill submitted by city engineer Bob Lydick. He will be asked to attend the next meeting to discuss it.

-- Added some surplus items to the school auction.

## Lazbuddie tax appeal OK'd by state

The Lazbuddie School Board received some good tax news on Tuesday. Their appeal of the state property tax board's appraised valuation was okayed, resulting in about \$50,000 more for the school district.

The state had valued the district at \$47 million, \$2 million higher than the county tax board. After the appeal, the state sent representatives here, who agreed on the county's \$45 million figure. This is the 4th straight year, the board has appealed the state figures -- and their appeal has been accepted all four times, said Supt. Phil Warren.

Warren also credited state Rep. Pete Laney's office for their assistance in this matter.

In other business, the board:

-- Reviewed next year's budget; no decisions were made.

-- Allowed Warren to again participate on state accreditation teams. He visited two schools this year as part of a state team.

-- Made a commitment to join other schools in the Five Area Cooperative Telephone area on interactive education. Thus, the schools (Olton, Muleshoe, Three Way, Sudan and possibly Springlake-Earth) can share teachers and training with Lazbuddie. A state grant is being sought on this. A person has been hired to write the grant request.

-- Discussed setting up a human sexuality class this fall. More information will be announced on meetings where the board and parents will get together and review this new class before it is taught.

-- Approved seeking a federal/state grant for a fulltime "reading recovery teacher."

-- Approved seeking a grant to join the Panhandle Information Network (PIN). This interactive program will give Lazbuddie access to other schools, colleges, libraries, etc., in the Texas Panhandle.

-- Re-hired all auxiliary personnel and secretaries.

- Hired Dean Black, Muleshoe, to teach driver's education.
- Discussed salaries and the overage schedule but no decisions were made.
- Received the resignation of ag teacher Jim Bob Bradley. He had been here one year. His fiance has been accepted into vet school at Texas A&M.
- Agreed to participate in the federal summer youth work program.
