### The law must be upheld

So the House of Representatives is going ahead with impeachment procedures against President Clinton.

Who do they think they are? Trying to uphold the law?

Don't they realize they are not dealing with a regular U.S. citizen, but the President? He should be above the law.

That may sound funny to you, dear reader. But a goodly portion of Americans really do believe that the Chief Executive should be above the law.

I know early polls show that it's doubtful that the Senate will vote to impeach.

That's doesn't bother me.

What is important is that our nation, founded upon laws, follow that legal structure. That's what counts.

I realize that a lot of us often get angry at lawyers and the legal system. They're often put in the same category with used car salesmen and newspaper folks!

But, in the final analysis, a nation that has a strong legal system is the best place to live. And our legal system, imperfect as it is, is the best in the world.

So the law will now take its course with Mr. Clinton.

Sure, cries of "partisanship" will be loudly raised. That's all part of politics.

Every time, you hear one of these politicians complain of partisanship during this inquiry, you are hearing a dummy talk.

Because the bottom line is that once a special prosecutor was hired, then the law must take its full and irrevocable course.

And that is what we are seeing, despite the partisan croaking by some.

I remember following the Watergate procedures on TV very closely. Those were times of high drama.

This won't be the same scenario. As I said, it's doubtful that the Senate will deem Mr. Clinton's woes as "high crimes."

But it's good for our system of government that the issues raised by the Starr Report be investigated, probed and debated.

That's how our system of government works. And support it.

100 percent.

I find it amusing that the National Basketball Association has a lock-out because the players are unhappy with their contracts.

I have to laugh as I write this. Heck, I'd be unhappy to earn that as an annual salary, too! Wouldn't you?

# Cooperative gin proposed for our area

A very positive meeting was held Tuesday at the Farwell Community Center concerning the issue of starting a Co-op cotton gin in the county.

More than 20 farmers heard the facts and figures on the feasibility of building and operating a Plains Cotton Co-op Association gin. The meeting was hosted by Mark Williams and Kendall Devault.

Williams began the meeting by stating the facts of cotton farming and marketing today and what the future looks like for the cotton industry. He and members of his family farming corporation have studied and researched all angles of ginning, milling and the textile industry during the last few years. And the answers for how to make more money out of a cotton crop point to joining forces with other area cotton farmers in cooperative ginning.

"The new technology and advances in ginning inevitably make the farmer more money," he stated at the beginning of the meeting. "What we're here to discuss is how to put back more of that money into our (cotton farmers) pockets. That is by directly owning a gin with other farmers in this region."

Representatives from the Plains Cotton Coop Association (PCCA) in Lubbock made presentations on the actual figures involved in ginning, marketing and warehousing and other options available to member farmers through PCCA.

The proposed gin would be a 30 bale gin, ginning 30,000 bales a year. Bids have been received from four gin manufacturing companies for a 3 Less 2 gin setup. This would enable the gin to start up with 2 gin stands with expansion capability for 3 stands. The gin would serve cotton growers in Parmer and Bailey counties in Texas and Curry and Roosevelt counties in New Mexico.

The PCCA cooperative structure flows through 25,000 plus member with ownership in their respective area gin to a delegate body of 156 current participating gins. From here all decisions go to a Board of Directors serving 11 districts to the PCCA Management Team. The next flow through is to the option divisions of Textiles, Warehousing, Electronic Marketing and Pool Marketing. All voting representation in PCCA is based on "one farm, one vote."

The financial bottom line that was proposed to the farmers attending the meeting was this: First preferred stock in the Coop Gin for a committment of \$40 an acre of their cotton acreage. From all of the research and actual pool and textile mill committments, this investment would offer a total of \$77.65 per bale back to the farmer in 4 to 6 years. The first year, a minimum return of 25% of their investment would be returned to the farmer. The First Preferred Stock will pay interest at 8% and all investments will be paid back before any book credits are paid to the farmer.

The requirement for building a gin of the proposed size is a minimum of 15,000 member acres. This would give 15% down towards a \$4 million dollar gin setup. This figure also includes the costs for trucks, storage, employee and management salaries. The gin would employee four full-time employees. During cotton season, the workforce would jump to 12 daytime and 12 nighttime employees.

By building and owning a PCCA gin, cotton growers would have the options of directing their cotton into Textile Milling, Warehousing, Electronic Marketing - TELCOT and/or Pool Marketing. All of these options will provide cash back to the farmer in lump sums or in standard percentage payouts, depending on the option(s) chosen.

"A member owned gin provides more of a value added crop and product," stated Williams. "The only way to continue to make money in the cotton market is by owning more of the processing and other options for our cotton crops. We've all seen that this region has been good for cotton and that good crops are currently being grown. This is a crop that will only continue to be grown due to the decreases in water. It is the perfect time to invest in and build a coop

Currently, it takes about six to eight weeks for permits to be in place and four months to build a fully operational gin. Interested area farmers are urged to contact Mark Williams at (806) 825-2444 or Kendall Devault at (806) 825-2828 for more information and/or acreage commitments by Nov. 1.

# Texico's trash pickup fee expected to rise

It appears that Texico residents will soon by paying a higher monthly fee for trash collections.

The Texico City Council was notified by Duncan Disposal, which handles the city's collections, that it needs a rate increase, effective Oct. 1. Duncan general manager Jackie Reid will meet with the council at its Oct. 27 meeting.

Duncan says that the hike, the first requested since February 1995, is needed because of (1) the higher Consumer Price Index, and (2) the higher Clovis landfill fee, which has gone from \$104 to \$191 (an 84 percent hike) for each 28-yard compactor truckload (like used in texico).

The current rate for residents is \$8.50 a month. Requested is \$9.43 a month.

The council also will discuss with Reid a list of alleys they feel are "messed up."

It appears the council will approve the request.

Other new monthly fees which would also go into effect are: commercial poly kart, \$14.46; 1.5 yard container 1 time per week, \$36.16; 2 yard container 1 time per week, \$47.51; 3 yard container 1 time per week, \$57.29; 4 yard container 1 time per week, \$69.35; 6 yard container 1 time per week, \$91.95; and 6 yard container 2 times a week, \$152.23.

In other business at the meeting, the council:

-- Allowed its police department to buy 100 cones for use in roadblocks. Texico is funded by the state for 5 roadblocks, and Clovis has been allocated 13, said marshal Kelley Brophy.

-- Okayed moving the deadend of the sewer line on Garwood from under the street since a crew will be upgrading Elva Street. Also, the water line west of Garwood will be pushed past Avenue F before that street is improved. The cost for both projects will total under \$2,500.

-- Heard Brophy say that 20-25 letters are being sent to property owners to cut their weeds.

-- Plans, at its next meeting, to change the name of Elva Street (or CR 8.5) to Avenue F to go along with the rest of the

-- Noted that the Avenue F improvement job must be under contract by Dec. 16 or the state funds to do it will be lost.

-- Authorized city attorney Marion Ty Rutter to write the state's Attorney General for an opinion on whether Texico can have a joint powers agreement with Clovis so that the larger community can provide building inspection services for the smaller one.

The state's Construciton Industries Division director has

# Recipe of Week

Salmon with Mustard Crust and Couscous\*

- 1/2 cup couscous
- 1 teaspoon non-salt herb seasoning mix
- 3/4 cup boiling water 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- 1 tablespoon water 1/2 teaspoon dried dillweed
- 2 tablespoons corn flake crumbs 1 (10 ounces) salmon fillet,
- 1-inch thick Fresh dill sprigs

In a medium bowl, combine couscous, seasoning mix and boiling water. Cover and let stand 5 minutes. Fluff with a fork to blend well. Cover and keep warm. In another small bowl, combine tablespoon of water, mustard and dillweed; stir in corn flake crumbs until well blended. Spray broiler rack

with vegetable cooking spray. Preheat broiler. Place salmon fillet, skin-side-down, on prepared broiler rack. Place rack on shallow pan. Press mustard mixture evenly over top of salmon fillet with a fork. Broil salmon 8 inches from the heat about 8 to 10 minutes, until salmon is cooked through. Remove from broiler and let stand 2 minutes. If top browns quickly, cover lightly with foil. Cooking time will vary with the thickness of the fillet. A thinner fillet will take less time. Do not overcook. Cut fillet in half crosswise; remove salmon with a spatula, leaving skin on the rack. Garnish with fresh dill sprigs. Serve with couscous.



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



He is an admitted liar and that is as bad as a thief.


In the six years, Clinton has been our President, the national debt has increased one trillion, 748 billion, 223 million dollars.

### Area cotton yields expected to be lower

From Plain Cotton Growers:

Overall, the area is expecting yields to be significantly lower than recent years. There are weak prices and widespread crop losses.

The Texas Ag Statistics Service estimates Texas Upland cotton at 3 million bales.

The High Plains, composed of reporting districts 1-N and 1-S, accounts for 2.07 million the total or 69 percent of the 1998 upland cotton estimate.

The estimate includes changes.

Harvested acres dropped 180,000 in 1-N and 10,000 acres in 1-S.

Reversing the effects of the acreage loss was an increase in the expected yields in those areas.

Estimated yield in 1N were upped 10 pounds to 596 pounds and yields in 1-S were upped 59 pounds to 491 pounds per acre.

The net result is no change in the projected size of the High Plains crop. That is not the case Beltwide, where the estimate cropped projected U.S. Upland cotton production from 13.1 million to 12.8 million bales.
