


Potential apple growers here had two major fears: hail and wind. They found that trellises aided against the wind, and coverings protected against hail. This apple orchard is at the Meeks farm.

# **Carliss Woods** wins 3rd contest

# Apples are new crop in our area

There is an old saying that goes something like this: "When things are going well, you shouldn't upset the apple cart."

And after doing some research and interviews. I have seen first hand that things are going well and the apple cart is completely full...and it is showing signs that it will continue to fill up and stay full.

Apples are quickly becoming a staple crop around the area for a handful of area farmers. The sight of carefully laid out orchards of apple trees is now a familiar one around the twin cities region.

The agricultural industry that is such a mainstay in the region has been faced with some tough economic times in the last four years due to fallout prices for crops, higher seed prices and diminishing water resources. Because of these factors, many area farmers have been evaluating their farms and looking for alternative crops and ways of utilizing the land and water they have available.

David Meeks, a crop consultant in the area, had been hearing about the value and profits in the apple industry for some time. He began to see the handwriting on the wall for this region. Thus began his research and investigation into prospects of bringing some of the apple industry to this area.

He began by contacting growers and processors in the Kerville, Texas area. This region has been growing apples for quite some time and gave David some valuable insight into the industry. After some careful consideration, David contacted a few area farmers about the idea of planting apple trees in a few test orchards.

The first to try the crop were the Ware Brothers of Southeast Clovis. Randy, Stan and Kent Ware have been supplying large quantities of food crops for many years through their Ware Bros. company. They eagerly took the project on.

The trees did well in the climate and conditions and produced enough to prove that apples would do well in the region.

The next two farmers to plant apple orchards were David Meeks and Don Oppliger of Farwell. Soon after their orchards were planted and growing, three other groups of farmers made the decision to plant large orchards as a sideline crop.

# Sunray stops Wolverines

The Texico Woverines lost the Sunray Bobcats last Friday at Amarillo, 35-14. Texico is now 2-2 on the season and hosts Jal tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m. mst.

After a rough first half without a score, Texico fought back in the 4th quarter, scoring two consecutive touchdowns with a chance for a third.

"We had a chance to cut the lead to 7, but couldn't get it done. I was proud of the way we fought back," said coach Barry Partain. "We played a pretty good second half, but played poorly early. We learned a lot playing an excellent team and this will make us better."

The lead that Sunray built in the first half was just too much for the Wolverines to overcome. The final blow was a 35-yard TD in the last 33 seconds of the game scored by the Bobcats' Michael Hill.

The Bobcat's Cody McDow did most the damage early. He scored twice in the first period on runs of 3 and 5 yards. He then tallied in the second period on a 1-yard plunge as Sunray went into the half leading 21-0.

After a scoreless third period, McDow scored early in the final period on a 57-yard scamper. Then it was Texico's turn. at 10:47, Tobie Askew tallied on a 38 yard run. At 8:00, Mel Askew scored on a 5-yard run, followed by a 2-points after run by Tobie Askew.

Team statistics were: first downs, Texico 10, Sunray 15; rushing yards, Texico 202, Sunray 273; passing yards, Texico 41, Sunray 89; punting average, Texico 3 for 38 yards average (Sunray didn't punt); penalties, Texico 6 for 45 yards, Sunray 5 for 47 yards. Both teams recovered a fumble.

## Dear parents and school-aged children:

The city of Farwell and the Farwell schools make every effort to prevent gang activity or the establishment of gangs in Farwell. The police department conducts a field interview each time a suspected gang member is observed in Farwell. To date, contact has been initiated with gang members from **Clovis and Muleshoe.** 

Parents and children should be aware that Section 1, chapter 15, Article 15.27 of the Code of Criminal Procedure requires a police agency to notify a school of any arrest or detention of a student from that school. This information is confidential and cannot be released by the school.

Because of that confidentiality, parents sometimes are unaware of the fact that their children are associating with known or suspected gang members. Therefore, in all future contacts with known or suspected gang members, when Farwell children are involved, each child's parents will receive a letter from the police department outing the circumstances of the situation.

I cannot keep a gang member from coming to town but it is my hope that by working together we can prevent recruiting and the establishment of gangs in Farwell.

building as well as two coin-op laundries and built a car wash. In 1978, we purchased the Holiday Store building and expanded by joining the True Value organization. In 1980, we really went "big time" and bought a computer, to keep up with all the inventory and to do the statements. In 1983, Gwen opened Farwell's first flower shop adjacent to the store. Joe could run back and forth between the two and help make deliveries. After three years, we could no longer keep up with the combined heavy loads. The flower shop had to be sold. In 1988, we became a Napa Auto Parts dealer, giving us our second national affiliation.

And then came the vote! The Texas Lottery was going to be a fact of life. What would our customers here in the Bible Belt of the Southwest think if we sold "those" tickets? Our business depended heavily on irrigation for the farming community. Everyone speculated that in another 10 years the water would be depleted, and if so, we would need something else to sell.

We made a list of all the customers we might lose and decided the 5 percent commission would offset the loss. Our hours were increased and so were our sales. Saturday afternoon off became a thing of the past. In June 1993, a twolane driveup booth, complete with microwave oven and refrigerator, was added. We "car hop" in order to keep the traffic down. We sold a jackpot ticket for \$3.8 million in our driveup booth on Oct. 27, 1993. The commission on that ticket was shared among our employees, our church and our family. We expect to sell another soon!

On Jan. 1, 1994, we were ranked as the No. 3 lottery dealer in the state. We have made a lot of new friends and crossed paths with a lot of people we would never have known had it not been for the lottery.

## Apples

Troy, Vick & Todd Christian, Dub, Greg & Mark Howard and Bob & Robert Martin were the three groups of area farmers to go full fledge into the apple growing business. The Ware's also stepped up their orchards at this time as well. But it was not without careful research and planning.

These families invested the time to go and talk to growers and processors in Washington State, Oregon and California. These three states grow the most apples in the United States. Dub & Beth Howard and Troy and Lillie Christian also made a trip over to Europe to contact European growers and processors in Holland and Germany.

The style of orchard that was being tested and planned for in this region is called a "High Density Orchard." This type of orchard originated in Holland and then spread throughout Europe. It was a feasible type of planting for this area and the Howard's and Christian's gleaned all the information they could from their trip and the contacts they made while there.

The only problems that had to be addressed in planting orchards were the high winds and the hail that this region receives throughout the year. The growers discussed their options and decided to try a revolutionary style of trellising and hail netting. Because the trees are planted so close together on the acreage, they are able to basically support each other when the trees are in mature stages. But as saplings, the trellis system provides stability during the winds and then, in the latter stages, provides support for growing branches.

The hail netting has proved invaluable in protecting the trees from hail since the growers first began using it. It has also become a useful growing tool. I talked with Dub Howard about the netting and he explained that the netting actually serves as the impetus for the "Greenhouse Effect" on the orchards.

"The netting is black, so it is absorbing the sun." he explained. "The heat that is trapped in the netting is then diffused down into the orchard, keeping warmth around the trees. The sun light is also being diffused and thus keeps a good amount of light on the trees."

Too much sunlight can sunburn the apples causing them to fade or not make color at all. With proper sunlight and warmth, the trees will make perfect or near perfect apples all throughout the growing season. The hail netting is revolutionary to the apple industry and the Texas Hill Country Growers and other states are coming to our area in great number to see the netting for themselves.

The Howards, Meeks, Wares and Christians are also implementing misters and heaters into their orchards to aid in the apple growth.

Currently, three types of apples are being grown in the

area by these farms. "Gayla," "Cameo" and "Fuji" are the varieties growing. Gayla apples are harvested in the first weeks of August. They are a New Zealand Blush apple. Cameos are harvested around the second week of September and the Fuji's will be harvested around the second week of October. This is a Japanese dessert apple.

The Cameo apple is the first apple introduced to the world by the U.S. in a long time. It is considered to be a "chance seedling" due to how it was developed. It originated in Wenatchee, Wash. The Dole Fruit Co. will be the first to introduce the apple to the world through a large quantity introduction.


Apple trees are a very resourceful crop. A large quantity of trees can be planted on as little as 20 acres. Through drip irrigation, a 20 acre orchard only needs approximately 200 gallons of water to prosper. This very fact was one of the major reasons that these farmers decided to go into the business.

When the farmers planted their orchards, they realized that trucking the apples long distances would not be feasible. They pooled their resources and contacted several private investors to help put in a packing and shipping warehouse.

The "Top of Texas" Apple Growers Association was formed and the old fertilizer warehouse that is located behind Franse Irrigation in Farwell was converted to an apple shed.

A state of the art cooler and storage area was constructed and the proper cleaning and sorting machinery was installed.

Timing and temperature are of the essence of getting a quality apple to the consumer. Apples are hand picked and then brought to the shed. The apples are immediately put

Lowell Primrose for County Commissioner Prct 3 into cold storage. The core of the apple must be brought to 31 degrees in order to keep it fresh in the shipping and it gives it a longer shelf life. In fact, according to Dub Howard, for every hour and apple sits at room temperature, it loses one day of shelf life.


The cold storage at the Farwell shed holds about 25 acres worth of apples.

The entire process of getting apples from the orchard to the shipping stage takes anywhere from one to two weeks. The Top of Texas apple shed employs about 40 people during the apple season.


The markets for the apples are primarily through grocery store chains. Wal-Mart purchased the first shipments of apples from the Top of Texas growers. The Ware Bros. were also instrumental in establishing an agreement for purchase of the apples through H.E.B. Grocers out of San Antonio. This grocery store chain has stores primarily in mid to South Texas, but is among the largest in the state. They prefer to buy their produce from state and nearby regional producers.

Going into the apple harvest, the 12 local growers didn't have any contracts for purchasing their apples. But, they didn't figure that they would have any problem selling their apples because most of the grocery chains prefer to buy locally and within the state.

The only way for the apple business in the area to go is up from this point. The markets are good, the prices are stable and the ingenious ideas and plans that these area growers are implementing will soon become core foundations for the entire industry.




Apples are brought to the plant in bins. This shipment is from Stan, Randy and Kent Ware.


