

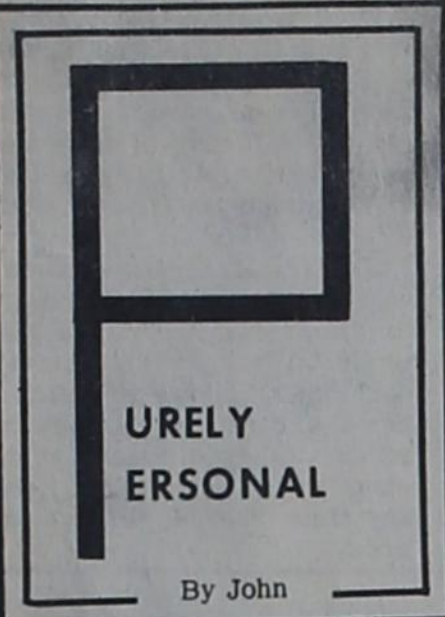

Rev. Perry will be serving the Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church as pastor, coming to the Twin Cities from San Jon, N.M.

Born at Houston, Rev. Perry is a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Perry. He is married to the former Virginia Pearl McNeill of Fort Worth. They are parents of three daughters, Mrs. Cal Crenshaw of Tulsa, Mrs. H. H. Calwell, Jr. of Lubbock and Nancy Perry, a sophomore at Eastern New Mexico University. They also have three grandchildren.

Educated at Southern Methodist University and Perkins School of Theology, Rev. Perry has held pastorates at San Jon Circuit, Grady-Rosedale, Wesley-Albuquerque, Artesia, assistant pastor of the Center Street church at Tucumcari and Asbury at Hobbs, prior to coming to the local church.

He has been active in community and civic organizations as a Rotarian and Lions club member, serving as secretary of the former group in Hobbs for five years. While in Hobbs, Rev. Perry received the only two awards ever given by the Hobbs Rotary Club for outstanding service.

A member of the Masonic Lodge, Rev. Perry has been active in several New Mexico lodges and was presented an award from the Nara Visa Lodge last year, observing membership in the Masonic Order for over 25 years. A sportsman, he prefers fishing and hunting, and is also interested in golf.

In the New Mexico Annual Conference he is a member of the Board of Education, director of Health and Welfare Ministries in the Clovis District, one of the statisticians of the New Mexico Conference, member of the District Program Council, and member of the Board of Directors of the Wesley Foundation at Eastern New Mexico University. He has also served as secretary of the Clovis District and for 13 years was director of the New Mexico Conference Laboratory School, a training school for church school workers.

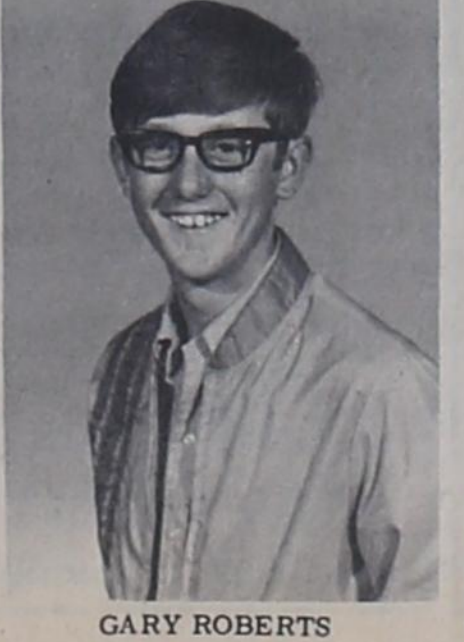
# Receives Physical Fitness Award

Young Roberts, a freshman, was the lone Seminole boy to score high enough on the President's physical fitness test recently to qualify for the youth fitness achievement award.

His individual scores were 100 per cent for sit-ups; 95 per cent for pull-ups, shuttle run, standing broad jump, 50-yard dash and 600-yard run; and 90 per cent for the softball throw.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Roberts of Seminole who still own a home in Farwell. While living in Farwell Gary was a member of the school band and played football and participated in track.

His citation was given "in recognition of physical fitness proficiency demonstrated by meeting the national standards established by the American Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation in its Youth Fitness program."

A score of at least 85 is required to be eligible for the President's award. Roberts averaged 94 per cent for seven events.

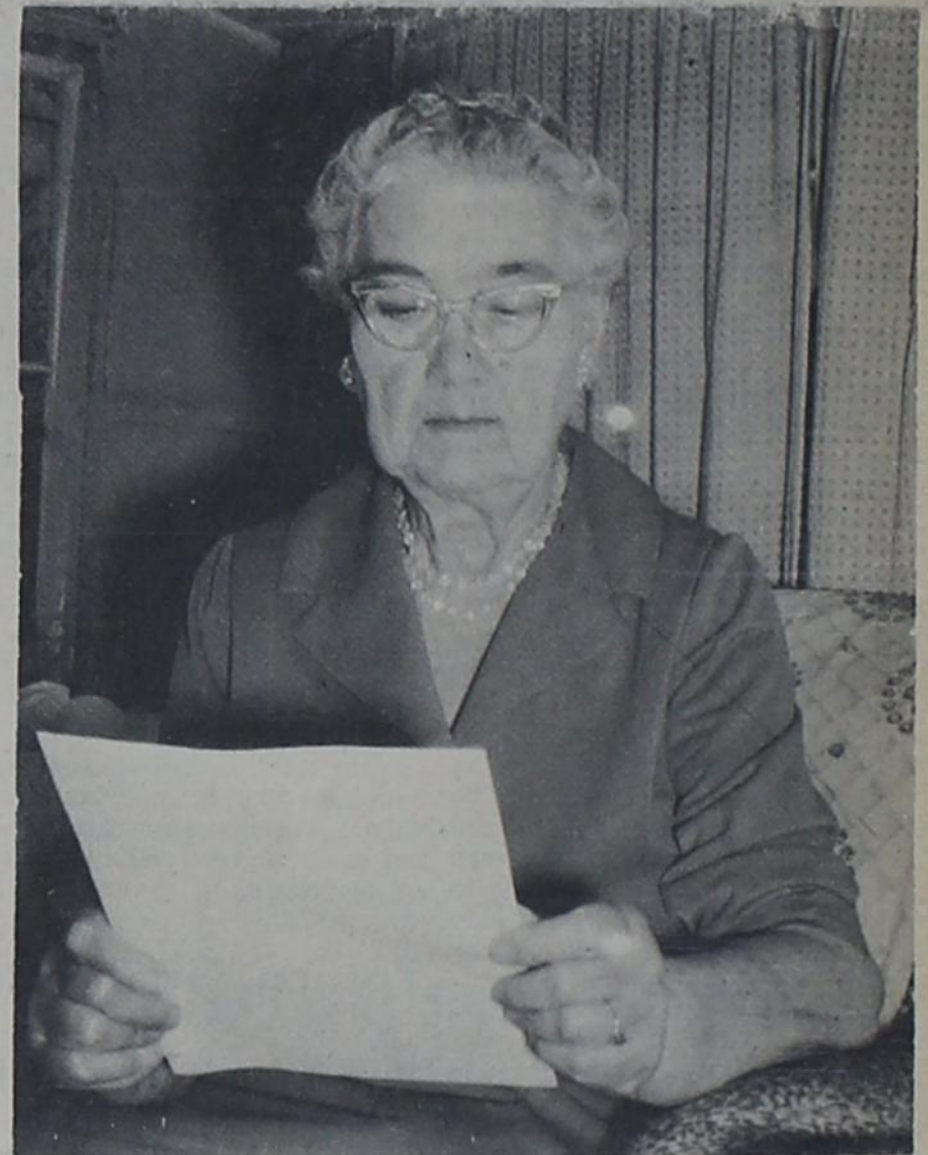

## Brother Succumbs

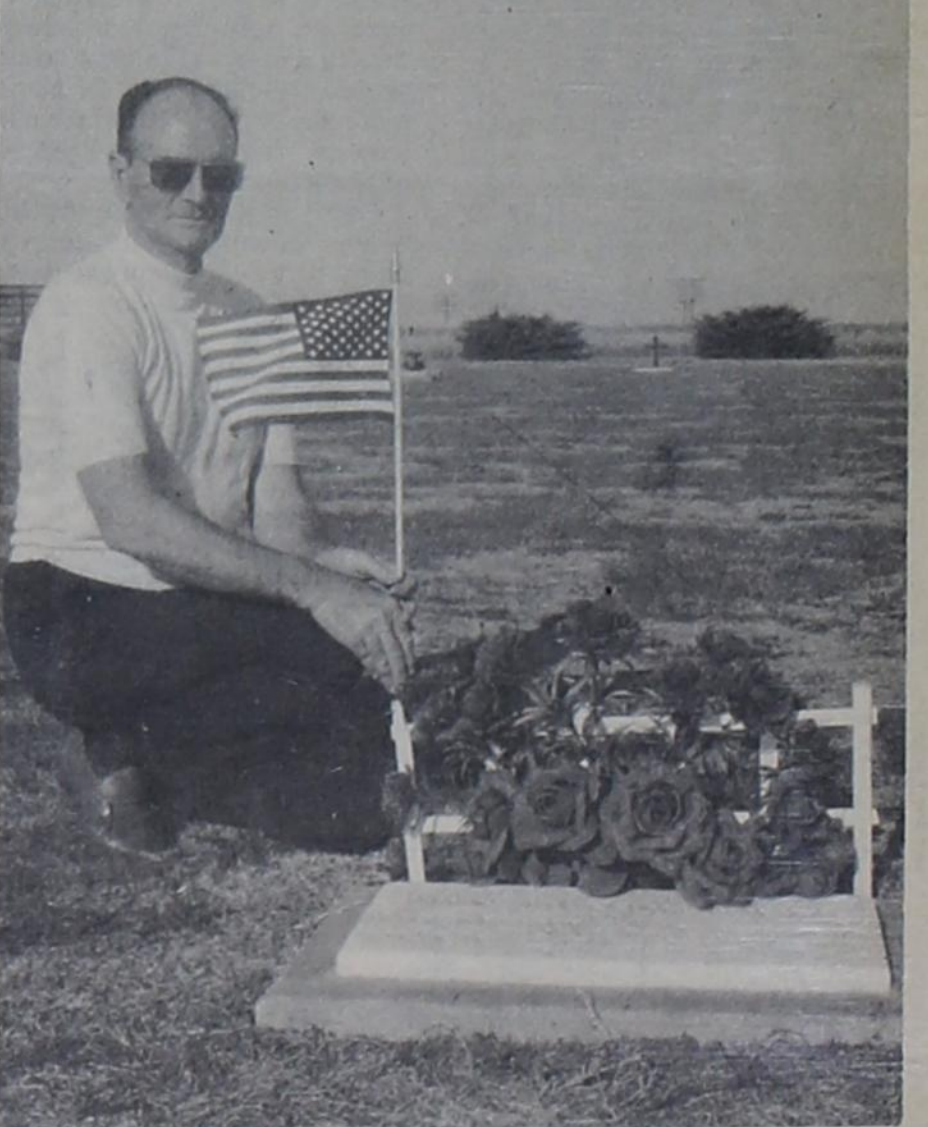
Funeral services were conducted in Pampa last Wednesday for Carl Smith, brother of Mrs. Ray Tharp, who passed away early last week from a heart attack.

bought around 1907-08 by the late Mrs. Ida Temple for the handsome sum of \$40, a part of which the purchaser had to borrow. "Oh, that \$40 seemed awful big and we thought it would be hard to pay the borrowed money back, but by scrimping and saving we had paid off the loan in no time," reminisced Ruby, as she told how her late father, Judge J. C. Temple, then bought another three-room house for \$50, moved it to the original homestead and connected the two parts to make a five-room house.

Some time in the early 1920's after the widowed Ruby had moved back to the Temple home to live with her two small sons, the family again added rooms to the house to provide additional space for the growing family. Later another room was added to complete the eight-room house in which Ruby still makes her home. Ruby quips, "It was about 1942 when we finally became modern and added a bathroom to the house... but it is home and I wouldn't be happy living anywhere else" she concluded.

The house is filled with replicas of the past when Judge and Mrs. J. C. Temple, their invalid daughter, Laura, and Ruby Dixon and her sons, Jim Cleve, now of Santa Fe, and Harold of Albuquerque, lived there.

Some of the most treasured items include antique iron beds, a mahogany sideboard, a marble topped dresser, a bookcase, antique dishes and a cabinet which her father built from lumber brought home from jobs of carpentering. Ruby tells how her father built the cabinet in his spare time with the left-over lumber.

"Mamma thought that it would cost too much to buy varnish to finish the cabinet so for many months the cabinet was not painted, but finally papa brought home some left-over varnish and painted the cabinet," reminisced Ruby. After the cabinet had been varnished it had much loving care from Mrs. Temple and her daughters, as they took great care to shine it with kerosene every day to its highest sheen. "Oh those were good days," reiterates Ruby as she tells of some of the hard times which overcame the family, but always there was the hope of a brighter tomorrow... and that tomorrow always came.

In addition to writing poetry, Ruby spends much time in her "doll hospital" restoring dolls of every size and kind to some of their original beauty. The dolls are brought to Ruby from far and near by persons who have heard of her ability to restore the dolls... and also by persons who have found her almost able to perform miracles with her needle and thread on their dolls, and who have a sentimental reason for keeping a certain doll.

Other hobbies of this industrious lady include rock hounding... she has rocks from many places and in many sizes and shapes; handwork of several kinds; and "just visiting with friends or offering a cheery word to others who have not been so fortunate."

In former years Ruby has spent much time "baby sitting" but lately, ill health has prevented her from doing this chore of which she had become so fond. However, this young woman of 72 summers who has such a delightful outlook on life has found a new and challenging hobby in writing poetry and no matter how badly she might feel or how dark the day she always finds a ray of sunlight as she looks into the future... where there is eternal day.

## 'Food Fun' Classes Open For 9 To 12-Year-Old Girls

Beginning in June, Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative will again offer a summer program for elementary school-age girls. Food Fun for Juniors is designed to teach 9 to 12-year-old girls principles of basic food preparation, good kitchen management, meal planning, basic nutrition, table setting, and hints about table manners.

Food Fun for Juniors classes will be conducted in the high school home economics departments of the six towns in the cooperative's service area, including Nazareth, Dimmitt, Hereford, Friona, Bovina and Farwell. The two and one-half

hour classes will run for five days in each community, from 9 to 11:30 a.m. For those girls attending afternoon classes, the time will be from 1:30 to 4 p.m.

Girls completing the week-long course will be honored at a graduation party and presented with a diploma.

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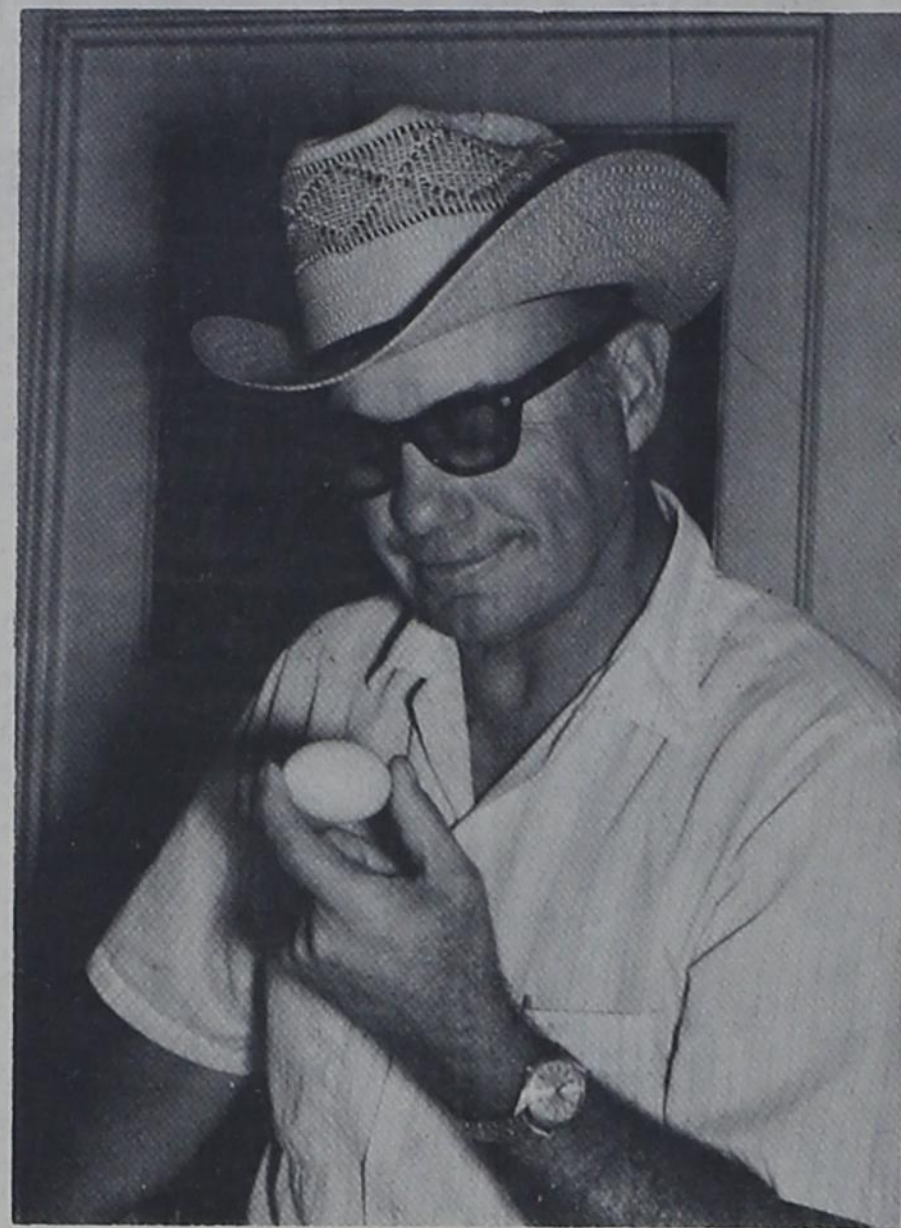
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## R&F Steak House

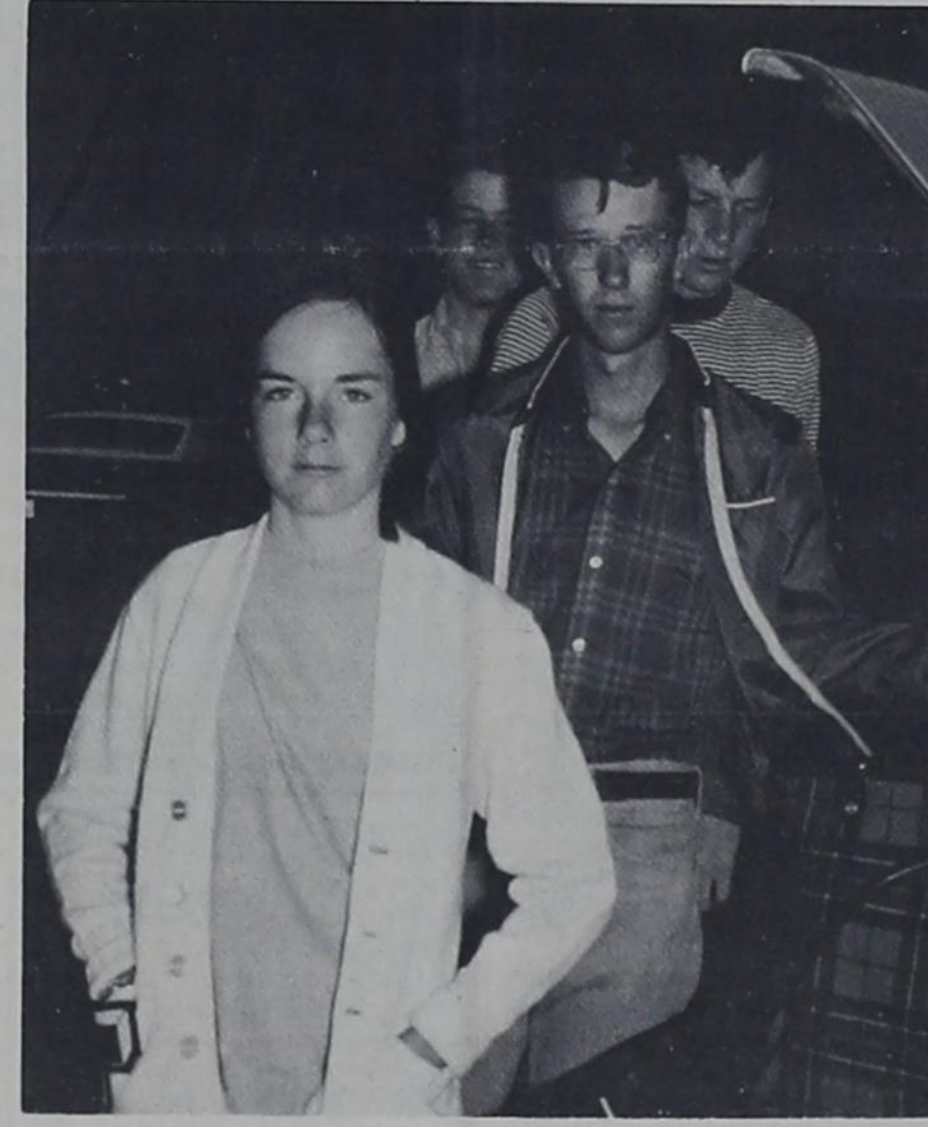

### Postal Rate Increase Proposed

The Post Office Department has proposed parcel post and catalog rate increases totaling \$123 million to help meet the added costs of pay increases in recent years.

Facing a \$2.5 billion postal revenue deficiency in the coming fiscal year, the Administration recently asked the Congress to increase postage rates for first- and third-class mail 33 per cent and second-class by 48 per cent.

Higher parcel post rates (zone-rated fourth-class mail) are also needed to comply with legal requirements that these services pay at least 96 per cent of their fully allocated costs.

No increase has been asked for educational materials (packages containing books and phonograph records).

Under the proposals, minimum postage for parcels mailed for local delivery would be increased from 50 cents to 60 cents.

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## On The Farm In Parmer County

### GREENBUG GETTING OFF TO EARLY START IN GRAIN

Greenbugs, those little green aphids which have been attacking grain sorghum on the Texas High Plains for the past few years, have recently been observed infesting small grain sorghum in several counties in the area.

Area Extension Entomologists Dr. Don R. Rummel and Dr. Bill C. Clymer report that greenbugs have been found in some fields in Oldham, Deaf Smith, Parmer, Castro and Bailey counties. "At present, infestations appear to be scattered and spotty," they point out.

"The main thing for producers to do right now is to keep a close check on their fields. Small grain sorghum up to about six inches in height is much more susceptible to greenbug injury than larger plants. Only a few greenbugs per plant will be necessary to damage small grain sorghum and damage in the seedlings state may result in stand loss."

The entomologists point out that the extent of greenbug damage depends on greenbug numbers, plant size, stage of growth, plant vigor, moisture conditions and the presence or absence of parasites and predators. Parasites and predators are generally still in low numbers but should increase rapidly as greenbug numbers increase.

"Be sure that greenbugs are present in damaging numbers before starting a spray program," caution Rummel and Clymer. "Several other species of aphids, such as the corn leaf aphid, commonly infest grain sorghum but seldom cause economic damage."

Insecticides recommended for controlling greenbugs include carbofention (Tri-thion), demeton (Systox), diazinon, disulfoton (Di-Syston), malathion and parathion. Disulfoton should not be applied as a foliar spray more than twice per crop season or as a granular application more than once per season. Malathion is recommended for ground application only. Methyl parathion should not be substituted for parathion.

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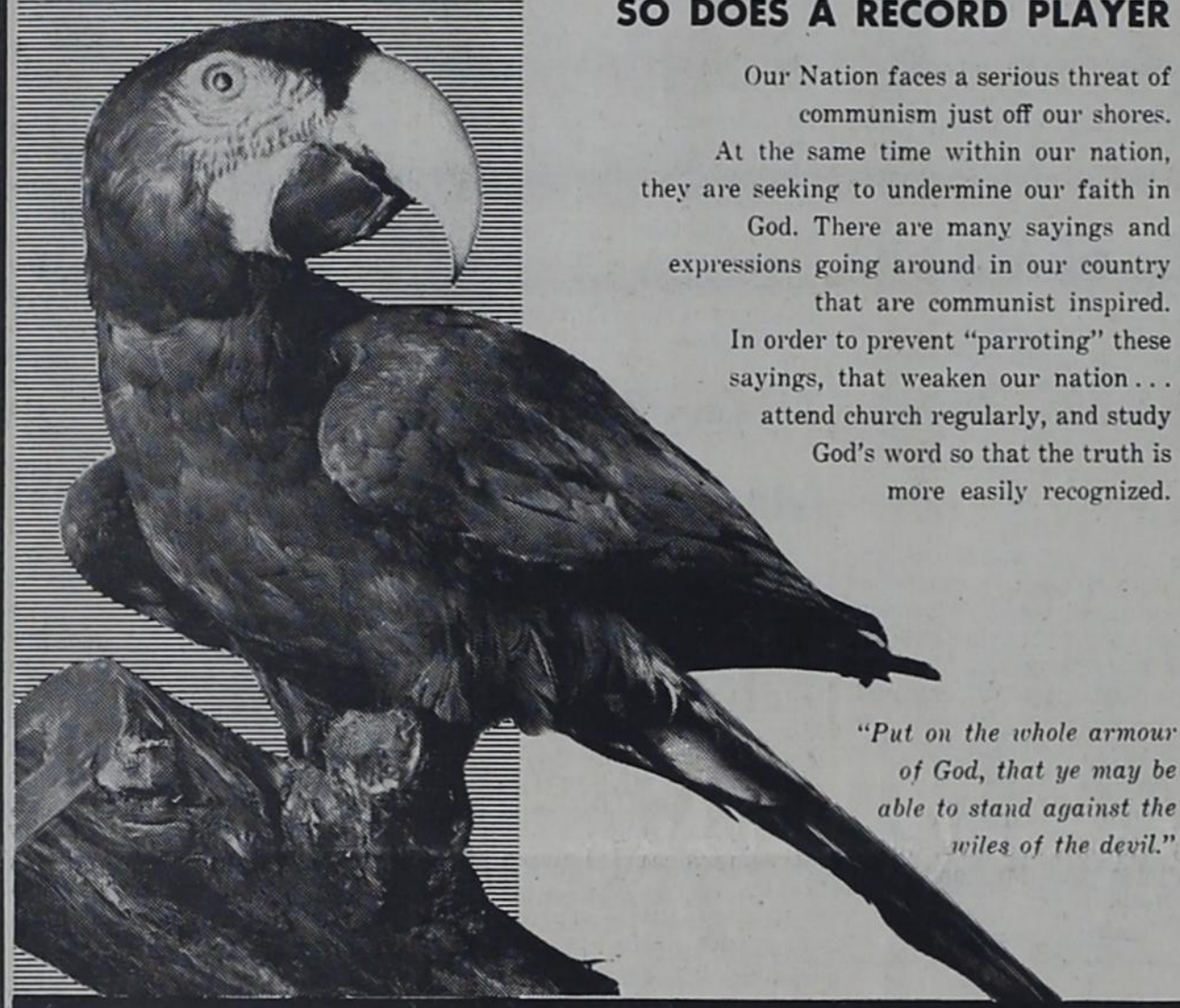

June 18 known as Dairy Month and milk and dairy products are listed on the USDA Plentiful Foods List. Here are some ways of using dairy products that you may not have tried before.

Add 1/4 cup dairy sour cream to every 1-pound can of BAKED BEANS in tomato sauce. Sprinkle with salt, pepper and garlic salt. Top each serving with a spoonful of sour cream. To take away from home, tightly cover baking dish and wrap in newspapers to keep the beans hot until serving time.

Try NO BAKE CHEESE CAKE for dessert. Combine in top of double boiler:

2 envelopes of unflavored gelatin  
6 tablespoons sugar  
dash of salt

Beat together and add to gelatin:  
1 1/2 cups skim milk  
3 egg yolks

Stir constantly while cooking over boiling water, until gelatin dissolves and milk thickens (about 6 minutes). Remove from heat -- add 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind, then chill. Whip 3 cups creamed cottage cheese into billowing lightness (3 minutes at high speed of electric mixer). Stir in -- 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Fold cottage cheese mixture in thickened gelatin.

Beat 3 egg whites until stiff. Add 6 tablespoons sugar and continue beating until stiff peaks are formed.

Fold egg whites into gelatin mixture and spoon into an 8-inch spring-form pan.

Sprinkle graham cracker crumbs on top and chill until firm.

Yields 12 servings.

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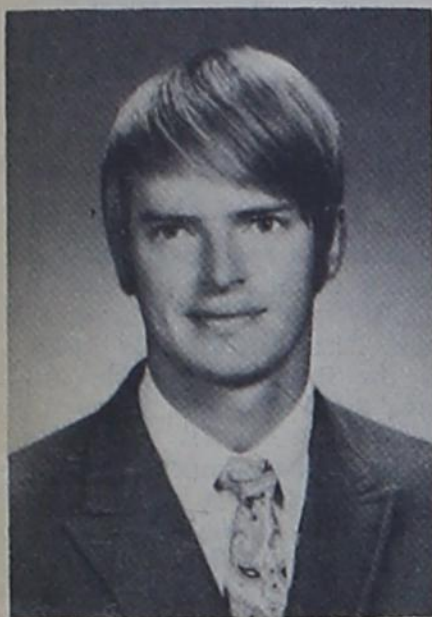
