Postal Rate Increase Proposed

The Post Office Department has proposed parcel post and catalog rate increases totaling \$123 million to help meet the added costs of pay increases in recent years.

Facing a \$2.5 billion postal revenue deficiency in the coming fiscal year, the Administration recently asked the Congress to increase postage rates for first- and third-class mail 33 per cent and second-class by 48 per cent.

John Snider, son of Mr. and Higher parcel post rates (zone-rated fourth-class mail) are also needed to comply with legal requirements that these services pay at least 96 per cent of their fully allocated costs.


> No increase has been asked for educational materials (packages containing books and phonograph records).

Under the proposals, minimum postage for parcels mailed for local delivery would be increased from 50 cents to 60 cents.
