

Muleshoe, Area Residents Special Guests At Airport

On Wednesday afternoon, five invited guests from Muleshoe boarded a "VIP" bus for Lubbock. Muleshoe Mayor Darrell Turner and Mrs. Turner; Muleshoe City Councilman A.V. and Mrs. Wood and Cleta Williams, joined city, chamber of commerce, college and military officials from Portales, and Clovis, N.M. and Littlefield on a special inaugural bus run.

On the bus was a public relations representative from Texas New Mexico and Oklahome Coaches, Inc. (TNM&O) and two hostesses representing the City of Lubbock. They greeted the guests and provided refreshments before the bus reached Lubbock International Airport (LIA).

This bus run was the first, or beginning of a special new service provided by TMN&O and LIA, along with the City of Lubbock.

Available, effective Wednesday, will be direct service from Portales, Clovis, Muleshoe and Littlefield to the front door of Lubbock International Airport. Two buses each day will be picking up flight passengers, and deliver them to the airport, and buses will leave Lubbock each day for a return trip from the airport.

Greeting the guests as they arrived were city, chamber of commerce, and airport officials, along with officers TNM&O.

During a celebration and reception on the second floor of Lubbock International Airport, brief remarks were made by Lubbock Mayor B.C. 'Peck' McMinn; TNM&O President Bob Greenhill and Chamber of Commerce President John Logan. City Council members at the airport included T.J. Patterson, Bob Nash, Joan Baker and George Carpenter, along with officers from Reese Air Force

TOUCH OF HISTORY

Halsell Family Among Earliest Area Settlers

(Editor's Note: The Mashed O Ranch, most of which is situated in adjoining Lamb County and which touches Bailey county, dates back to the early ranching days of the Halsell Cattle Company's first operations in 1901. The ranchland lies to the west and south of the town of Springlacke, which is some ten miles east of the old XIT Spring Lake, headquarters. The Mashed O Headquarters rests in an extensive grove of trees near the same spot of the XIT Spring Lake headquarters.

Ewing Halsell of San Antonio was contacted by The Journal and he wrote the following article for this 50th anniversary

Ewing Halsell was born in Wise County, the son of Alice and W.E. Halsell. When Ewing was about four years old, his father, who had been ranching in Texas, moved his family to what was then Vinita, Indian Territory, and started ranching near Tulsa, Okla. He established the Bird Creek Ranch just across from Mohawk Park and which is still owned by his children and operated by his

In 1901 his father bought 200,000 acres in Lamb and Castro Counties from the Capital Freehold Land and Investment Company, which was a part of the famous XIT ranch, near Muleshoe. This land was a part of the 3,000,000 acres given this company by the

State of Texas in exchange for building the present state cap-

The largest part of this 200,000 acre ranch was sold in 1924 to farmers and has been developed into one of the most prosperous farming communities in the state, just as Bill Halsell predicted.

At this time the elder Halsell

established the towns of Amherst and Earth building banks, hotels, lumber yards and other business houses, including large cotton gins, as he felt so strongly that cotton could be grown successfully there. The part he retained, the Spring Lake Division, still a sizeable ranch, some 100,000 acres, is still owned by the family and is operated as a partnership, ranching and farming operation. he Halsell family have through the years continued to develop and improve the Mashed O. herd which W.E. (Bill) Halsell started. Ewing Halsell has had the active management of this ranch since his father's retirement some forty years ago.

All of Halsell ranches were truly frontier ranches. The Commanche Indians were making raids in Texas during W.E. Halsell's employment at the Waggoner Ranch and during his partnership with his brother, Glenn Halsell. It was during this time an older brother George was killed by the Indians during one of their raids on the widely scattered ranches. Although at that time Bill

Halsell was quite young, still inhis teens, he partipated in the pursuit of the Indians.

About 1920 Ewing started acquiring land in Nowata County, Okla. He now owns and operates two ranches there consisting of about 25,000 acres.

In 1944 he bought about 100,000 acres in Maverick and Dimmitt Counties from the late Hal Mangum.

His plan and ideas was to bring his calves to south Texas, keep two years and back to Oklahoma and fatten on the grass, shipping during July, August and September. However, when the house wives started buying younger beef, this plan would no longer work, so it was necessary for him to start feed lots. He now operates feed lots at Earth, Tulsa and Lenapah, Oklahoma and Eagle Pass feeding two year steers and heifers.

On his Maverick County ranch he has cleared and put in about a 2,000 acre irrigated farm where he raises oats for grazing weaned calves and grain for the feed lot. He has made extensive improvements on this ranch, including roat plowing some 3,000 acres and seeding to blue panic and buffel grass. He also has built houses, repaired and built new fences and corrals. In connection with this ranch, he leases about 40,000 acres from the Chittim Estate.

Halsell is honorary vice-president of the Texas and Southwest Cattle Raisers Association and a member of the Blue Stem Cattle Raisers Association. He makes his home in San Antonio.

He moved there from Vinita, Okla., where he had lived most of his life. He donated to the Vinita Board of Education his home there, a three story brick mansion and on its grounds now stands the Ewing Halsell High School, a fitting tribute to a great man.
