

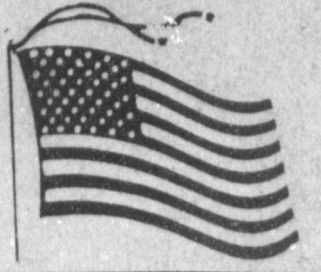

The remainder of the first quarter was marked only by a series of disappointing, incomplete passes and small yardage gains, except a 23-yard gain by Michael Dunham, No. 44.

On Wednesday afternoon, five invited guests from Muleshoe boarded a "VIP" bus for Lubbock. Bells Across America Ring Thursday

Next Thursday, September 17, local and area residents are encouraged to be on the courthouse lawn at the flag pole for the celebration of 'Bells Across America, when bells will be rung for 200 seconds simultaneously at 3 p.m.

This celebration will commemorate the 200th year since the signing of the Constitution of the United States.

In conjunction several days ago, Muleshoe County Judge Gordon H. Green and Muleshoe Mayor Darrell Turner signed proclamations commemorating the occasion.

"... And, We The People... owe a 'ringing tribute' to this great document..." reads the proclamation in part.

All citizens have been asked to join in 'Bells Across America' with bells, chimes and carillons in a 200 second ringing tribute to the Constitution of the United States at 3 p.m.

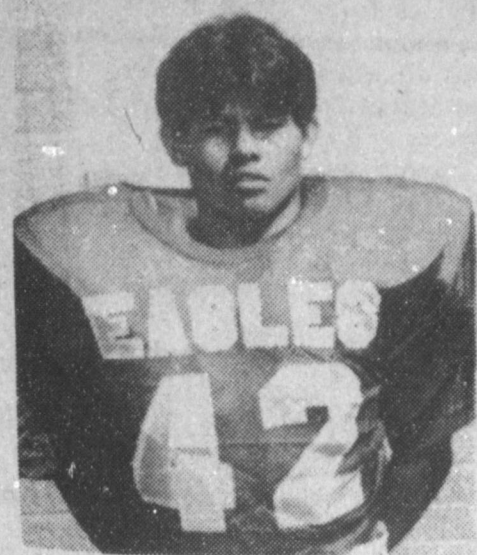
