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A Will Anderson adventure

...it was the most powerful typhoon ever

(Editor's note: U.S. Navy Commander Will Anderson, a Farwell High graduate, is the son of Bob and Carrie Anderson. Periodically, over the years, he has sent articles about his postings as features for the Tribune. Currently, he is stationed in Guam.)

Super typhoon Paka savaged the island of Guam on Dec. 16th and 17th, inflicting damage the length of this small island (about one-third the size of Parmer County).

With sustained winds of 146 miles per hour and gusts of up to 236 miles per hour, this was the most powerful typhoon ever recorded anyplace in the world, and it was remarkable that there were no fatalities during the storm itself. However hundreds of homes were damaged or destroyed, thousands remain homeless out of population of about 120,000, and the most precious items on the island these days are block-ice, kerosene oil, bottled water, and canned food.

Typhoon season is from mid-July to mid-November in this part of the Pacific, and all the storms of the 1997 season have not been spectacular, passing well to the north or south and saving their fury for the Philippines or Okinawa. Based on this, I was not that concerned about an out-of-season weak tropical depression named Paka which was forming over the Marshall Islands when I flew home for Christmas leave in Texico/Farwell on Dec. 12th.

However, the bad news began to mount with each call back to my office on Guam. The "tropical depression" was upgraded in status to "storm" and later to "typhoon" as the winds began to rise, and it was upgraded again to "super typhoon" the day after that. Its projected path originally looked as if the main part of the destruction would pass some distance from Guam, but each new update indicated that it would pass closer and closer.


The total storm was several hundred miles wide, with the eye of this typhoon being more than 50 miles across, and its path was actually directly over the top of Guam as the storm tracked west-northwest. Since storm systems in the Northern Hemisphere rotate counter-clockwise, the island was battered by winds from the north and the east for hours as the leading edge of the storm swept over it. There was almost an hour of flat calm and clear skies as the eye passed over, and then the winds arose with renewed rage from the west and the south as the trailing edge of the storm came over.

At the same time back in Farwell, my parents had to leave the basketball game on Tuesday night (Dec. 16th) and drive me to the airport in Lubbock to begin my return flights back to my office and personnel here on Guam. I was fortunate in that my aircraft which landed here about 30 hours later, happened to be the first flight allowed to land on Guam following the storm, and the only flight allowed for the next several days due to the damage to the Guam International Airport.

Guam was declared a Level V disaster area, and relief teams began to arrive the day after my return. Most of the homes are built like concrete blockhouses to survive typhoon season, but many that have managed to survive storms here since World War II were destroyed by Paka. Some of the senior naval officer housing is on the top of Nimitz Hill, overlooking the northern beaches which the Marines invaded in 1944, and two were blown to pieces and down the face of the cliff.

One of them was temporarily vacant, but the Commanding Officer of Naval Hospital Guam was weathering the night at home with his family when he sensed that his home was beginning to shift in the roaring winds and rain. He led his family out into the typhoon to the lee of a neighbor's wall, and from there, they watched their home disintegrate and plunge down the cliff behind them. Outside the base perimeters, all of the villages were crippled, from Merizo in the south to my village of Yigo in the north.

Guam was savaged by Typhoon Omar in 1992, and the next day was hit again, this time by an 8.2 earthquake. In those

double disasters, all the wooden utility poles carrying electrical power lines and telephone lines were snapped like match-

In the years since, Guam Power Authority put up massive concrete utility towers the length of the island, but Guam Telephone Authority dug ditches and put all of its lines underground. After Paka, the island telephone system remained fully operational on GTA emergency generators. All of GPA's concrete towers remain standing, but the power lines between the towers were snapped clean away. Bit by bit and section by section, power is being restored to the island as new power cables are hoisted by the emergency crews. To its credit, GPA also put emergency diesels on the island water wells after Omar, and that foresight probably saved lives this time since water service was restored right away.

The days now revolve around cleaning up, hauling away, or salvaging what can be saved. The ice-plant survived and is in operation on emergency diesel generators around the clock,

and ice is as precious as gold these days. Everyone on these islands always has large stores of bottled water, canned food, charcoal, and kerosene lamps.

Blankets and clothing and shelter are provided to those families who lost everything by the churches and relief teams, and fresh supplies of batteries and food and water come every day by ships or planes. Guam's commercial airport and Andersen Air Force Base both have operational runways now. Water was restored to residences for bathing (but not drinking) almost immediately, so there are no people in extremis, no threats of epidemic disease or starvation.

For my part, this is a fairly comfortable Level V disaster, my return was very good. I found my office still standing and all of my personnel accounted for and unhurt, the trees which crashed all missed my house, and my Jeep was unscratched despite having the roof of the garage torn off directly over her.

Guam was hit by an earthquake again this time, the night I returned, but it was less than 5.0 and did no additional damage. Even our days of shared labor on the work-parties are fun (of course, carrying two tons of rooting meat out of the Base Exchange freezers was no that great, it reminded me of the days sharing a locker room with Larry Erwin, Brett Hargrove, and Eddie Meeks, years ago.)

Twilight is the best part of the day, by far. At the end of the workdays, families sit outside their front doors up and down

Autrey withdraws from council race

The Texico City Council learned Tuesday that Ray Autrey has withdrawn from the race for city council.

Autrey cited his health situation as the reason. He had signed up last week to oppose Dean Henninger for a council post. With the withdrawal, it means the current three councilmen up for election -- Henninger, Oran Jay Autrey and Eddie Dunsworth, are unopposed.

The only race then on the March 3 ballot will be for mayor -Marie Christian or Max Carter.

In other business, the council:

-- Approved a stricter set of guidelines for folks using the city parks. The parks will now be closed between midnight and 7:30 a.m. daily. The vote was 3-1, with Autrey opposed.

-- Discussed the planned veterans memorial to be placed at the community cener site. Mayor Nathan Tharp has received a drawing from one firm and is seeking others. He will continue to check into this and report back at the next meeting. The council has \$5,000 budgeted for the project. The memorial will list the names of Texico area servicemen who died during wartime; the list was compiled by the Tribune.

-- Agreed to discuss the landfill in executive session. Texico is part of the High Plains group that is suing the state over funding to place a landfill in the Tucumcari area.

-- Approved election workers for the March 3 election -- Delores Edwards, Vicki Chumley, Merced Rojas and Bessie

-- Approved the annual audit report.

-- Voted to replace the personnel manager (the mayor has been serving in that capacity) with a personnel board consisting of three persons -- the mayor and the two councilmen with

In all ways, Guam will return to its business as usual.

But not tomorrow morning, not this Christmas. The sun will dawn here on an island filled with people who are grateful just to be here to see it. The typhoon passed without killing anyone, the island will recover, everyone in this island community is putting a shoulder to the load, and the small gifts from our Lord which are so often overlooked are obvious everywhere in abundance. This will be a great Christmas after all.



GENERATION OR REGENERATION?

Most people are products of generation. They are what they have been taught. Generally, children make the same professions made by parents. They hold to family beliefs and practices. Whether faith results will be determined by the condition of the heart. whether the heart is classified as wayside, rocky ground, thorny ground or good ground (Luke 8:5-15). But is not a direct stroke from God necessary to purify the heart? No. The heart is purified by faith and obedience (Acts 15:9; 1 Pet. 1:22).

The believer has been begotten again (1 John 5:1). When faith becomes strong one is led to baptism (Acts 2:38). Water baptism, to the penitent believer, is the new birth (John 3:3ff). It is the "washing of regeneration" (Titus 3:5).



Notice of Property Tax Reporting Requirements Property which was valued in 1997 in this county by the county assessor is not required to be reported or rendered for 1998 or

subsequent years, EXCEPT FOR: 1. mobile homes

2. livestock, and

land used for agricultural purposes

If, for any reason, your property was not valued last year and it is subject to valuation this year, you are required by law to report it to the county assessor on forms provided either by mail or at the assessor's

All nongovernmental entities (property owners) which claim to be except from the property tax must report their property and claim their exemption for 1998 if the exemption was not claimed in 1997.

Reports for mobile homes, livestock, land use for agricultural purposes, property not valued last year and claims for exemptions by nongovernmental entities must be completed and mailed or delivered to the county assessor not later than the last day of February.

If you made improvements to your real property and:

1. the improvements cost more than \$1,000 and a building permit for the improvements was not issued;



Texico Schools do some belt-tightening

Texico Schools are doing some belt-tightening this year.

At Tuesday's school board meeting, Supt. R.L. Richards reported that the budget shortfall is about \$88,000, due to about 34 less students than last year. There are 528 students at Texico this year.

Richards attributed the lower student enrollment to two

1) There is more screening done now of out-of-district students who wish to come to Texico. Only 3 or 4 new students entered this year under the policy.

2) Due to new state welfare policies, a lot of persons living in Eastern New Mexico have left to try their luck at finding jobs in other parts of the state or elsewhere. Richards said every school but two along the Eastern New Mexico corridor were reporting lower enrollments this year.

Fortunately, Texico has a strong cash balance to handle the financial shortfall, but all equipment expenditures have been cut, too, said Richards.

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Watchful care climaxes at local stock show time

While some local kids may be moping about with the after-Christmas doldrums, for others the busiest and most exciting season of the year is just opening up. After months of preparation and hard work, its finally here -- stock show time!

Many area residents may not be aware of the intense preparation young people invest in their animals long before the

shows in early winter and spring. The shows are only the final step in a long process and a good deal of reponsibility and dedication is required to reach that step.

Often raising animals for show becomes a family project and cooperation from every member contributes to the final level of success. The Michael DeLeon family of Farwell is one such example. Not only do they raise pigs to show, but they recently acquired the facilities to breed swine as well, so there is plenty for each of the 5 children to do. Swine is the main interest of the DeLeon's, but they raise show steers as well.

A typical year begins in early fall for the DeLeons. "In about October, we buy the pigs and immediately put them on a high-protein diet," Michael Deleon said. "The most important things are clean bedding (keeping the pens clean), clean water, and maintaining the diet."

Then in November, they start weighing the pigs about once a week. They should be gaining about 1 1/2 to 2 pounds a day, DeLeon noted. Meanwhile, the kids continue to keep the pens clean and occasionally exercise the animals.

The long weeks of watchful care climax in early January when the local stock shows begin. Before the big day, the pigs must be thoroughly washed, clipped, and beautifed before being weighed and classified. The local shows provide

an opportunity for the kids to learn about their animals and see how they will fare in the bigger shows.

"Going to Houston is the best part," Erica DeLeon stated emphatically. The big time shows in San Antonio and Houston draw participants from all over the state and this is where the money is made. The overall winners in these shows take home thousands of dollars and makes all the hard work pay off, both financially and in the mental satisfaction that comes with such success.

"Before the show, these kids need to think about all they've done and keep that in their head as they show," Michael said. "It's a competition just like eveything else."

But perhaps more important than just winning is the lessons learned from such projects.

"It's definately a learning experience," Erica said. "It gives you something to be responsible for and at the end it can be very rewarding. You also get to meet a lot of people and have a lot of fun. All the work is worth it in the end."

So as the DeLeons and other area participants continue to prepare their animals for show, they will not only be learning lessons for immediate success, but lessons that will help them succeed in whatever path they choose to take in life as

Warren's contract extended

The Lazbuddie School Board on Tuesday gave Supt. Phil Warren his annual evaluation, then extended his contract to 2001.

The board also gave itself its annual self-evaluation. The two areas the board will try to show improvement are:

1. Indicate clearly to the superintendent what is expected of him and by what standard he will be measured during standard evaluations.

2. Make staff and employees aware of the esteem in which they are held.

In other business, the board:

-- Approved a resolution for the school board to participate with the Texas Association of Small School Bands at regional competition in Lubbock.

-- Approved adding a parttime position for an aide to help in the secondary offices and in special ed. No one has been hired yet.

The post of high school secretary had been eliminated at the start of the current school year due to budget cutbacks after it appeared the school would receive less funds than expected due to lower enrollment.

But September figures showed 16 students enrolled above the number anticipated. With the state applying \$3,700 per student, this extra \$59,000 went a long way toward helping with the cutbacks. Last summer, the board had approved about \$90,000 worth of cutbacks.

Because of those extra funds (plus more funds for special ed students), Lazbuddie was able to expand the school day to 9 periods this year, which improved the school's vocational education enrollment.
