

NOTEWORTHY SALUTATION

"All the churches of Christ salute you" (Rom 16:16).

Thus did Paul convey greetings to the church in Rome; greetings from many other churches scattered throughout the world.

The church in Rome was outstanding. In Paul's day, Rome was the hub of the wheel; the capital of the world. It was strategically located and enjoyed commercial intercourse with many provinces. Rome is perhaps more closely interwoven with the history of civilization than any other city. It appears that all the threads of ancient history were gathered in Rome and from Rome issued many of the single threads of modern history.

It is likely that "sojourners from Rome," in Jerusalem when the church was established, composed the nucleus of the church (Acts 2:10). Christianity took root in the city among the Jews. (Pompey established a Jewish colony, 63 B.C.) In the outset, the mass of Christians were of obscure and plebian origin; but soon Christians were found in the upper crust, even in Caesar's house

(Phil 4:22). The church in Rome became famous. Their faith was spoken of far and near -- "throughout the whole world" (Rom 1:8). It was a good church. It was an informed church (Rom 15:14). Moreover, it was an obedient church. "For your obedience is come

abroad to all men" (Rom 16:19).

Paul was the most famous herald of truth in the apostolic era. He made three great evangelistic tours and established churches in many areas. Paul did not establish different kinds of churches. He did not establish one type of church in Derbe and another type in Corinth. Far from it! He did not advocate denominationalism; he was definitely opposed to divisions and sectarian strife (1 Cor 1:10f). He preached the doctrine of seven ones (Eph 4:4,5). He made Christians and Christians compose the church. Churchanity (denominationalism) did not exist until after the 16th century.

So it was but natural that the most famous apostle should offer greetings to the most famous church: "All the churches of Christ salute you."

Wolverines win season opener

The Texico Wolverines beat the Cloudcroft Bears 39-6 in their season opener last Friday at Dexter. Texico is now 1-0 on the season and travels again to Dexter tonight (Friday) at 7:30 mst. This time their opponent is Dexter.

Texico dominated the first half, jumping out to a 26-0 lead. Most of this scoring was made by Pecos Chumley, one of the key players of Texico's offense, scoring 27 of their 39 overall

The first guarter started off with the Wolverines kicking to the Bears. Texico's defensive wall kept them from going anywhere, forcing a punt. Tobie Askew returned the punt with a 50-yard run.

Only 3 plays later Chumley scored with a 13 yard run up the middle for a touchdown. Texico was ahead, 6-zip. when the extra point kick failed.

Then, two Texico posessions later, Chumley went for a touchdown again, scoring on a 70 yard gallop up the middle. He must have been coated with butter before the game because the defensive players were slipping off him left and right all night. The kick again failed and Texico was ahead, 12-0 at the first quarter end.

Mel Askew started off the second quarter with a 55 yard run down the sideline for another TD. This was followed by

The company said it needs more funds to keep pace with higher operation and maintenance costs, including 6 percent higher labor costs.







While they were there, they attended a "Footy" game. Australian Rules Football is a mixture of soccer, football and rugby. The players wear no pads to play this rough and tumble game. The ball resembles an American football. The players drop kick the ball to each other around an oval shaped field towards a goal during 4 - 30 minute quarters. The teams make no substitutions, even when a player is injured. The fans really get into the spirit of the game as well wearing their team colors and cheering for them.

The Footy game the Greenthaners went to was held in the Melbourne Cricket Stadium and was attended by 90,000 people. What makes this number even more amazing is that there were 5 other types of ball games being played around Melbourne that were each attended by at least 25,000 to 30,000

They also toured a new dynamic skyscraper that had just been built in downtown Melbourne. While they were there, they ran into a few people from New Guinea. Pastor and Arlene were missionaries there for many years and are fluent in "Pidgeon," the native languange. The people were very surprised, yet delighted when Pastor broke into a conversation with them in their native tongue.

The Australian language is very interesting to listen to and to learn. Although it is English, the Aussies have a many interesting nicknames and twists to the language. For instance, one does not rent a car, they "hire a car." They don't rent apartments, they "rent a flat." They don't play tick-tack-toe, they play "Knots and Crosses." And when one wants to fill their truck up with gas, they "pull the ute up to the bowser to get a little petrol."
