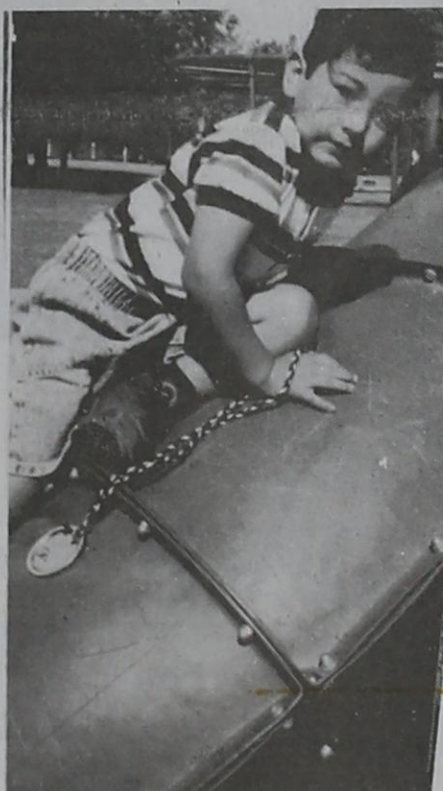

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## Farwell approves water rate hikes

The Farwell City Council on Tuesday approved a large boost in its water rates.

The council took action after water Supt. Dee Hammit reported that the city's rates "were the cheapest in Texas...all our equipment is worn out and costs are eating us up." Hammit said the water account is going into debt.

So Hammit presented water rate statistics from Muleshoe, Clovis and Friona to show that Farwell was far cheaper.

Texico's rates are \$14.75 minimum bill for four thousand gallons or less; then \$1.65 per 1,000 gallons for users of 5,000 to 6,000 gallons; and \$1.25 per 1,000 gallons for users of 7,000 gallons or more.

Clovis' rates are: \$8.03 per 1,000 gallons minimum; \$2.04 per 1,000 gallons thereafter.

Muleshoe's rates are: \$11.00 minimum (no consumption); \$1.30 per 1,000 gallons up to 10,000 gallons; \$1.55 per 1,000 gallons up to 20,000 gallons; and \$1.70 for over 20,000 gallons.

The council approved the same rates as Friona, to go into effect July 1.

The new rates will be:

- For the first two thousand gallons, \$5.60. Currently, Farwell residents pay \$5.40 for the first four thousand gallons.
- \$1.00 per 1,000 gallons up to 20,000 gallons. Currently, Farwell residents pay 55 cents for up to 50,000 gallons.
- \$1.25 per 1,000 gallons up to 30,000 gallons.
- \$1.50 per 1,000 gallons up to 50,000 gallons.
- \$2.00 per 1,000 gallons over 50,000 gallons. Currently, Farwell residents pay \$1.00 per 1,000 gallons over 50,000 gallons.

Other rate changes include:

-- Commercial rates have been a set 55 cents per 1,000 gallons. This jumps to 75 cents per 1,000 gallons. Commercial rates are for businesses and also includes the Farwell Convalescent Center and Farwell Schools.

-- Folks living outside the city limits but who are hooked up to the city water lines should add 15 cents per 1,000 gallons to each new rate.

-- Folks who drive tankers into Farwell to fill them up with water will now be charged \$5.00 per 1,000 gallons, up from the current \$1.00 per 1,000 gallons.

Hammit also reported on how the three wells are doing. The one on 3rd Street is pumping 306 gallons a minute. The one on the loop is pumping 306 gallons a minute. And the one near Kirkland Pump is pumping 185 gallons a minute.

Mayor Jimmie Mace reported on progress of drilling two new wells. He hopes work will begin within 30 days on the one just south of the post office. The city is looking for a second site for the other well. Jack Kirkland is helping with the wells' project.

In other business, the council:

-- Heard that David Cochran has requested that Avenue E between 5th and 6th streets be curbed and guttered. The city will sell letters to the property owners in that stretch to ask them to meet with the council about the water problem there.

-- Briefly discussed the issue of fireworks' bans due to the drought. Basically, the state makes the decision, although counties have some leeway.

-- Approved money for an extra uniform for police chief Roy McGaa.

-- Discussed with McGaa the problem of youths, many of whom are not from Farwell, congregating at night at the city park. A graffiti problem was discussed along with youths

The old cliché of "records are made to be broken" probably is true. But as an old-time baseball fan, I hated to see the Babe's mark go.

In my book, George Herman Ruth was the greatest baseball player of all time. No

Many forget that the Babe was a star pitcher with the Boston Red Sox before moving to the outfield. He held a World Series record for many years (I think the Yanks' Whitey Ford broke it in the 1960s) of scoreless innings pitched in a row.

I can think of no one else who excelled as both a pitcher and a slugger. The Babe was in a class by himself.

-- Discussed sub-standard houses that are still standing. Several persons cited last year still haven't done the work they have promised. The council decided to send a letter to all persons who haven't complied to ask them to come to the July council meeting and respond. If no response is given, they will be subject to fines -- \$25 a day up to 30 days. At the end of the 30 days, the city will hire someone to take care of the problem at the property owner's expense.

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## The Chief's Corner

The other day I experienced the pleasure of having a "man" in my office. While that may not be unusual, the fact that he was 17 years old was.

I am sorry to say that most of the people I come into contact with have a "modern" attitude. This attitude is reflected in statements such as "you can't prove it" and "someone else did it" and "I didn't mean to do it; give me a break," etc. Somewhere along the line too many males have forgotten or never learned what it is to become a man. Accepting responsibility for your actions is a mark of a man. He is honor bound and has the courage to do so.

Men make mistakes. The only way to prevent making mistakes is to do nothing and that makes for a worthless human being. A mistake is brought on by an error in judgment or a lack of knowledge. ## Commissioners don't support exemption

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday discussed a new law that allows counties to exempt from taxes vehicles specially equipped for the handicapped.

The matter was brought to the court's attention by the Parmer County Appraisal District.

Frona area commissioner Johnny Mars moved that this be done but his motion was not seconded.

Parmer County Judge Bonnie Clayton said the commissioners didn't support it because they thought it would cause too much confusion.

In other business, the commissioners:

-- Purchased four road graders from West Texas Equipment. Yellowhouse Machinery also bid. Bovina bought two road graders, and one each went to Lazbuddie and Frona.

-- Learned about a new state law that allows counties to claim a portion of unclaimed capital credits from electric cooperatives.

Bailey County Electric Cooperative informed them that they can claim up to 70 percent of a check for \$310 in unclaimed capital credits for Parmer County residents.

The kicker is that if Parmer County agrees to participate,

they can only use the money (in this case just over \$200) for a certain type of economic development -- the money must go toward recruiting minority business prospects and woman-owned businesses.

The commissioners voted unanimously not to claim their portion of the unclaimed capital credits but send the Bailey County Electric check on to the state.

### Police Report

Sometime between June 7 and 9, a miniature Schnauzer dog was stolen from the 200 block of 3rd Street.

The boy who said the beer was his was charged with minor in possession. The other juveniles were released.

## Lazbuddie hires two teachers

The Lazbuddie School Board hired two teachers on Tuesday.

Brian Hill, a recent Texas Tech graduate from the Abilene, Texas, area, is the new vocational ag teacher.

He replaces Jim Bob Bradley, who resigned after his wife was accepted into Texas A&M veterinary school. Bradley has gotten a job as a vocational ag teacher near College Station.

Ralph Welker is the new math teacher, replacing Chester Jones.

Ralph, who has been working as a computer programmer, also will coach junior high athletics.

His wife, Nancy, is Lazbuddie's assistant band director and elementary school music teacher.

In other business, the board:

-- Noted that the cafeteria turned a tidy profit this year. So the board gave fulltime cafeteria personnel \$1,100 bonuses and part-time helpers got \$800 bonuses.

-- Approved \$600 raises for auxiliary personnel, such as secretaries, instructional aides, custodians and the business manager.

-- Heard supt. Phil Warren report that approval has been received to let bids for the new well. OJD Engineers, Wellington, Texas, will ramrod the project.

-- Voted against approving tax exemptions for disabled persons' vehicles (see Parmer County Commission story for more details).

-- Received the TAAS scores. All of Lazbuddie's scores were well above average but Warren said math re-

sults need to be improved.

-- Viewed next year's preliminary budget. Most things will stay about the same but the state has mandated raises for the professional staff, which will cost more than \$30,000.

-- Approved several purchases, including blinds for high school classrooms, vocational ag shop and library; computers for the industrial arts room and elementary reading lab; and a copier for the superintendent's office.

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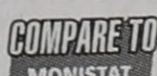
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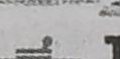


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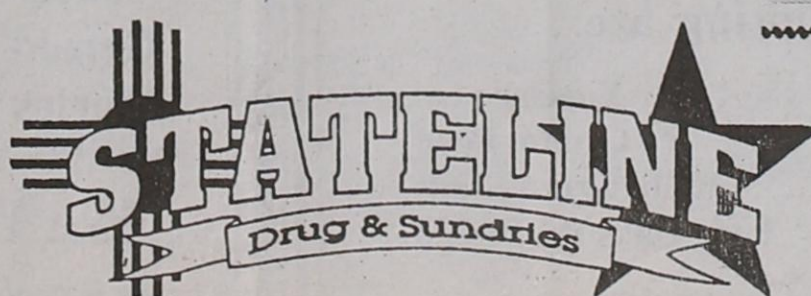
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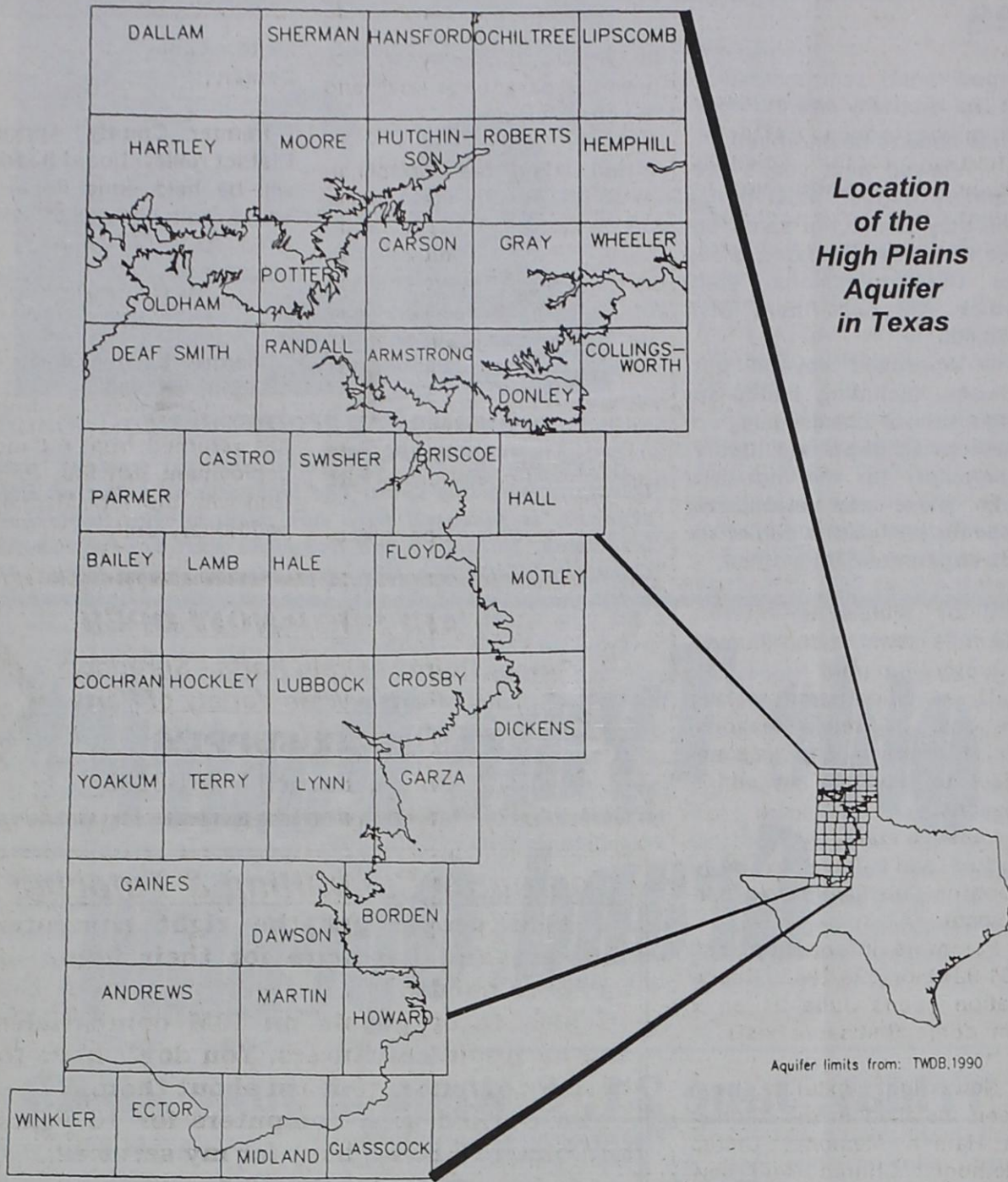
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## Deeper aquifer looked at

Continuing drought conditions have sparked a renewed interest in utilizing ground water from the deeper aquifers to augment that which is currently being pumped from the Ogallala Aquifer.

The feasibility of using water from the deeper aquifers is currently being examined by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District and the High Plains Ogallala Aquifer Regional Water Management Plan now being developed.

The water bearing areas of the Ogallala Aquifer are laterally connected except where the Canadian River has eroded through the formation, thereby forming the boundary between two separate flow systems referred to as the Northern and the Southern High Plains. Vertical hydrologic communication also occurs between the Ogallala and the underlying Cretaceous, Jurassic and Triassic formations in many areas and between the overlying Quaternary Blackwater Draw formation where present.

The Ogallala Aquifer is the sole source for drinking water to many communities, but approximately 95% of the water is used for agricultural irrigation.

The Dockum (Santa Rosa) Aquifer and the Edwards-Trinity Aquifer are the other two primary water bearing units in the Texas High Plains region and these two underly the Ogallala.

## Some more rain falls

Some more rain fell on the area Monday and Tuesday nights as a set of thunderstorms plowed through.

A tornado was sighted Monday night near Cannon Air Force Base and it headed southeast. No damage was reported.

Fred Chandler at Sherley-Anderson-Pitman in Farwell reported a trace on Monday and .35 hundredths on Tuesday.

Lonnie McFarland, at Sherley-Anderson grain elevator in Lariat, said nothing on Monday but sand, and 3 tenths on Tuesday.

John McFarland reported 4 tenths at his home in Farwell Tuesday.

And Shirley Steinbock at the Sherley Anderson elevator in Lazbuddie reported 1 tenth of an inch of moisture on Tuesday.

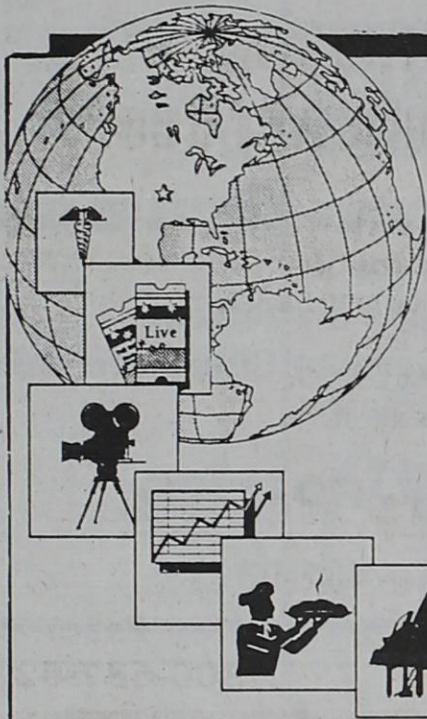

-- Agreed to buy new software, hardware and furniture for the new science lab.

-- Heard Richards report that some football field area sprinkler heads have been moved to improve the watering situation. But the problem still exists in other areas and is being worked on.

Cain recently passed out campaign materials which Laney has criticized as inaccurate. Cain stands by his materials, which he said listed part of Laney's record:

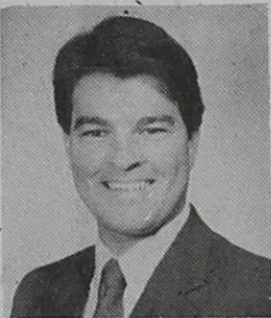
