## Financial by Glen O'Rear

George Burns, the cigarsmoking comedian entertained audiences well into his 90s, had a lot to say about retirement. He once deadpanned, "Retirement at 65 is ridiculous. When I was 65, I still had pimples."

Most money managers suggest that you put aside 5 percent to 10 percent of your monthly income for longterm goals.

The investment vehicles you choose should depend upon your age and your goals. How many years do you have to save? The younger you are, the more aggressively you can invest. What kind of lifestyle do you want to maintain during retirement, and how long will you be retired? The amount you put away should be based on what you anticipate your expenses will be throughout those golden years.

## Recipe of Week

Pasta With Fresh Mushrooms, Ham, Tomatoes **And Artichokes** 

4 cups (about 8 ounces) bow tie pasta (farfalle), uncooked

2 tablespoons olive oil 2/3 cup diced onion

8 ounces fresh white mushrooms, sliced (about 3 cups) or a mixture of white and shiitake mushrooms

1 cup (about 4 ounces) diced cooked ham

1 can (14-1/2 ounces) chunky seasoned tomatoes for

1 jar (6 ounces) marinated artichoke hearts, drained

1 cup frozen peas 1/2 cup ready-to-serve

chicken broth 1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper

In a large saucepan cook pasta in salted water according to package directions. Drain and rinse under warm water; cover to keep warm. Meanwhile, in a large skillet over high heat, heat oil until hot. Add onion; cook, stirring occasionally, until translucent, 1 to 2 minutes. Add mushrooms and ham; cook, stirring frequently, 3 to 4 minutes. Stir in tomatoes, artichoke hearts, peas, chicken broth, salt and pepper; bring to a boil. To serve: In serving bowls place reserved pasta, ladle mushroom mixture over pasta; serve immediately.

Yield: 4 portions, 8 cups.

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## Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor,

New Mexico's electric utility industry is constantly changing with improvements in technology. Recent action by the State Legislature and Governor will certainly prompt additional changes in the way electricity is generated and sold in our state.

Without a great deal of fanfare in the press, when compared with the US West telecommunications bill, the New Mexico State Legislature approved Senate Bill 428, as amended, and was then, in turn, signed into law by Gov. Johnson. The bill, "Electric Utility Restructuring Act of 1999", provides a framework for implementing changes in the way electricity will be bought and sold in New Mexico.

Restructuring, also popularly called deregulation, is in various forms of implementation in a number of states, and the federal government is actively seeking to make changes on a national scale. These forces and those of large industrial consumers, eager to gain access to low cost electricity, have placed increasing pressure over the past few years on state legislators to consider changes here.

Electric cooperatives have worked together in New Mexico, and electric cooperatives nationwide are working at the national level in an effort to make sure small communities, residential and small commercial consumers do not end up paying more for electricity so that large industrial customers can receive lower cost power. Cooperatives have always maintained that one of the dangers in restructuring is that adequate provisions to protect small customers could easily be overlooked.

Over the past six years, New Mexico's electric cooperatives and other groups representing large utilities, large industry, potential power marketers, residential and small commercial, environmental and others have worked with key legislators in

developing the ideas that went into SB 428, authored by Sen. Michael Sanchez. No group saw their complete "wish list" included in legislation.

So how will this law affect Farmers' Electric and the members we serve? Currently, Farmers' Electric purchases wholesale electric power from a generation source, and distributes that power over the cooperative's system (poles and wires) to each member's home or business. Under SB 428, the distribution of electric power will continue to remain regulated by the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission. The generation of electricity will be deregulated, or made competitive, and consumers who wish to be able to "shop" for the best deal among generators and power marketers. Those consumers who are unhappy with phone calls in the evening asking them to switch long distance phone companies or credit card calls probably won't like this either.

This law recognizes that consumer owned utilities, electric cooperatives and municipal systems, are unique in their relationships to those people they serve, and should be allowed to "participate in the restructured market in ways that differ from rules applicable to other participants that are not customer owned." The Law allows Cooperatives to choose from four business models ranging from staying exactly where we are today, buying wholesale power for all our members in aggregate, to allowing every member to make their own "deal" for the generation only portion of their electric bill. In short, the members of Farmers' Electric, through their elected Board of Trustees, will determine how, and to what extent Farmers' Electric will participate in the restructured utility industry in New Mexico.

Because lawmakers are skeptical that competition will benefit small consumers, they elected to give them, and public schools, the first opportunity to participate, beginning January 1, 2001. Industrial customers will have to wait an additional year. The Law also contains some provisions certain to be unpopular with consumers, including stranded cost recovery and a systems benefit charge. Stranded Costs are loosely considered to be those investments made by utilities in electric generation resources which generate at relatively high costs, and are therefore not competitive in a deregulated market. For utilities like Farmers' Electric, which do not generate electricity, but, have long-term power purchase contracts with a generation source, stranded costs could be an issue if these long-term contracts for power were higher than the available market rate for electricity. Under this Law, utilities with stranded costs are given an opportunity to recover some of those costs. Farmers' Electric does not own any generation resources and does not see stranded cost recovery as an issue for our members, due to the fact that our wholesale power supplier, Southwestern Public Service Company, is one of the lowest cost producers in the region. Those utilities with stranded costs will be allowed to recover between fifty and one-hundred percent of their stranded costs from their customers over a five-year time period. However, under the rules stipulated in the Law, it will be difficult for utilities to recover substantially more than fifty percent. This is unique, in that every other state thus far, has guaranteed utilities onehundred percent stranded cost recovery! It may seem unfair to allow utilities to recover stranded costs, but remember, before restructuring, utilities were required by law to make adequate provisions for electric generation to power our growing economy and increasing appetite for electric powered products and gadgets.

In Section 13 of Senate Bill 428, beginning January 1, 2002, a System Benefits Charge in the amount of \$.0003 per kilowatt-hour (kWh) will be charged to all customers in New Mexico. For the average residential customer of Farmers' Electric,

this will be an additional charge of roughly twenty-one cents per month. While this charge does not place an enormous burden on consumers in the beginning, the charge doubles January 1, 2007, and certainly could be amended, increased or decreased, by law in the future. Monies generated from the System Benefits Charge will be used as follows;

1) no more than \$100,000 per year for administration of the

2)\$500,000 for customer education and administration of the Electric Utility Industry Restructuring Act of 1999;

3) no less than \$500,000 for low-income energy assistance; 4) no more than \$4 million dollars annually to encourage the use and development of renewable energy resources;

5) no more than \$4 million annually to develop electric services to a community, Indian nation, tribe or pueblo, where limited or no electric service is currently available.

Any monies not expended during the fiscal year are transferred to the general fund.

While Senate Bill 428 provides a framework for restructuring, it will be the responsibility of the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission to promulgate rules for implementation of restructuring and customer education and protection.

The Law is not perfect, at least from Farmers' Electric's point of vies; and, we are still skeptical that restructuring will provide any real benefits to the majority of the Cooperative's members. On the positive side, the Law does contain provisions whereby the membership can decide, through their elected Board of Trustees, how they will best be served in the new restructured electric utility industry. Making difficult decisions about how Farmers' Electric operates is nothing new for the Cooperative's Board of Trustees. We fought long and hard in Santa Fe for options to let us tailor our strategies to the unique needs of our members. Now we must recognize the increased responsibility we face under Senate Bill 428. Not only must we evaluate the circumstances and future of Farmers' Electric, we must communicate the results to our members so they understand and support our decisions.

Will restructuring ultimately benefit New Mexico's consumers? Only time will tell, and this Law is only one more step down the road to a restructured electric utility industry.
