Gifts from my parents, older brother and other relatives helped with another year. A loan (which took 10 years to repay) and an assortment of jobs took care of the rest of the cost of my bachelor's degree.

-- Recently I watched a cooking show on TV. The chef put a small mound of purple sweet potatoes in the center of a huge plate. He topped it with a variety of tropical vegetables I've never heard of, a small piece of

grilled fish and some fried taro root. He then decorated the plate with three oriental

sauces. The plate still looked empty.

Years of serving weight conscious women had taught the chef to mount the food in one tall pile so that it didn't look like so many calories. There were lots of exotic flavors to tempt jaded palates, and yet the whole meal appeared to be light and very low calorie.

I don't know what the fancy hotel charged for the chef's tower of exotic palate teasers, but I'd guess that the price tag would probably be in hte \$10 - \$20 range. The dining room had cloth table cloths, crystal and silverware.

Perhaps I'm just showing my country-bumpkin nature for guessing so low. I had the feeling that the chef was trying to put his whole staff through college with each meal sold.
