## Thomas, Brown, Foster named Lazbuddie's Outstanding Athletes

Once again, the Lazbuddie School cafeteria was beautifully decorated as the annual school athletic banquet was held on Saturday night before a large crowd.

It was a great year for Lazbuddie athletics as the football team recorded a 12-2 mark on its way to being a state semi-finalist in 6-Man football. Coach Mark Scisson noted that the defense gave up 210 yards a game, while gaining 423 -- 232 via rushing and 191 through the air. The Longhorns recorded 16 interceptions and 22 fumble recoveries, and punted less than once a game.

Meanwhile, the boys' basketball team finished 18-8, winning district and the area championship. Jason Thomas earned All-State honors.

The girls' basketball team finished 14-14 but were in nearly every game they played, noted coach Carey Sudderth. He said

They have upped the prizes this year too.

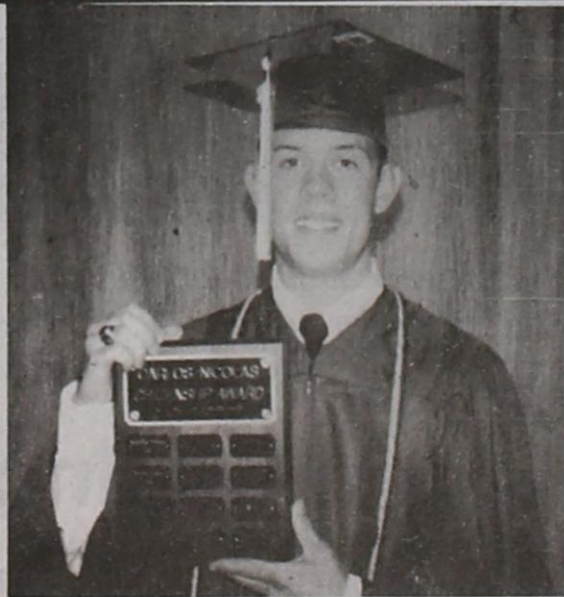
The drawings will be held at Border Town Days.

 -- The topic of scholarships has been on the lips of many of the graduates and their families recently. What should a youngster study? Where should they go to

college? How is the family going to pay for it? I've heard these questions many times in the days before graduation. I was blessed with two scholarships when I went off to college, and I'm thankful to the State of Illinois for them. They took care of one year of

college.  
 Gifts from my parents, older brother and other relatives helped with another year. A loan (which took 10 years to repay) and an assortment of jobs took care of the rest of the cost of my bachelor's degree.

-- A few days after high school graduation I began the first of those jobs: waiting tables at a dime store lunch counter. I made \$1 per hour plus tips in 1962 -- about one fourth of what my dad earned.

One of the most popular meals on the menu was the hot turkey dinner. For \$1 customers could get turkey, mashed potatoes, gravy, dressing, cranberry sauce, a tossed salad and a roll.

My boss would go around yelling: "Fill the plate up with lettuce and mashed potatoes, they're cheap. You want people to think they're getting their money's worth."

-- Recently I watched a cooking show on TV. The chef put a small mound of purple sweet potatoes in the center of a huge plate. He topped it with a variety of tropical vegetables I've never heard of, a small piece of

grilled fish and some fried taro root. He then decorated the plate with three oriental sauces. The plate still looked empty.

Years of serving weight conscious women had taught the chef to mount the food in one tall pile so that it didn't look like so many calories. There were lots of exotic flavors to tempt jaded palates, and yet the whole meal appeared to be light and very low calorie.

I don't know what the fancy hotel charged for the chef's tower of exotic palate teasers, but I'd guess that the price tag would probably be in the \$10 - \$20 range. The dining room had cloth table cloths, crystal and silverware.

Perhaps I'm just showing my country-bumpkin nature for guessing so low. I had the feeling that the chef was trying to put his whole staff through college with each meal sold.

-- Mother's Day brought a

special gift to me. It was a cookbook called "Chicken Soup for the Soul Cookbook: 101 Stories with Recipes from the Heart" by Jack Canfield, Mark Victor Hansen and Diana Von Welantz Wentworth.

The book is filled with stories about special meals that each of the authors and their families and friends have shared. It is full of foods that the authors think heal the body and the soul: chicken soup, homemade bread rich in olive oil and spices, dipped in chocolate and

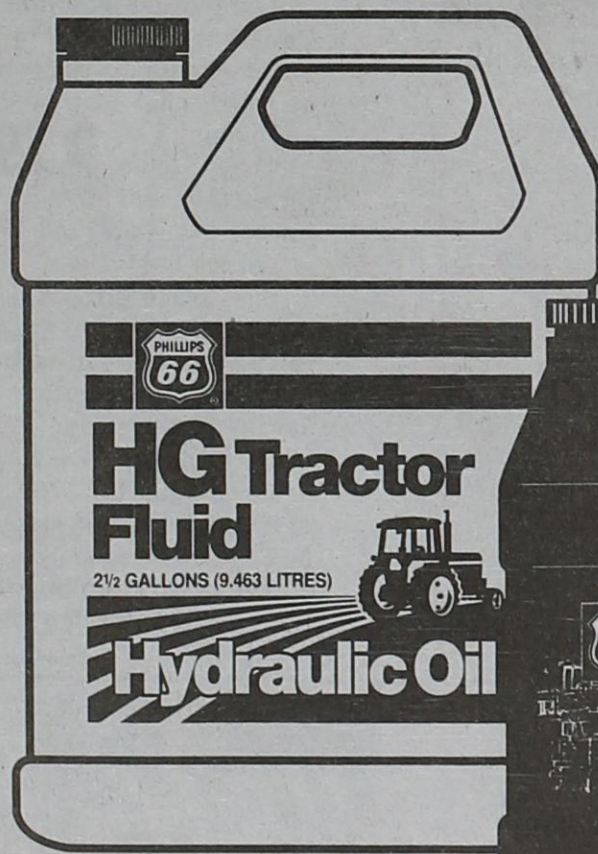

# ENMR announces new name

Eastern New Mexico Rural Telephone Cooperative has announced a new name and presented a new logo.

Effective June 1, the cooperative will be known as ENMR-Plateau Telecommunications. The new logo and name are products of a company-wide reorganization begun in 1997. The changes include a new log, identity and image. The new image represents the Cooperative's continued commitment in providing high quality, reasonably priced, state-of-the-industry, telecommunications services to its customers and members. Along with the new image is a new slogan: "People you know, communications you trust."

The changes are made possible through Telecommunications Act passed by the US Congress in 1996. Before the passage of the Act, traditional telephone providers were restricted by regulations regarding the types of products and services they could offer customers. Nonregulated products and services were separated from regulated services. Non-regulated services were delegated to subsidiaries and other companies.

Under the new Act, many of these restrictions have been lifted, allowing providers to easily enter a competitive environment under one name. As a result, ENMR-Plateau is looking ahead to offer a variety of products and services under one identity. The first step in the process was the development of the new look, which is now complete.

As stated by ENMR-Plateau General Manager Tom Phelps, "During this time of rapid change and increased competition in the telecommunications industry, it is essential that innovative thought and improved practices position the Cooperative in a favorable light. -- Plans to seek janitorial services for the community center.

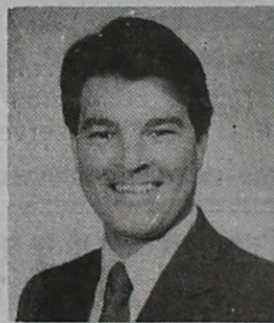

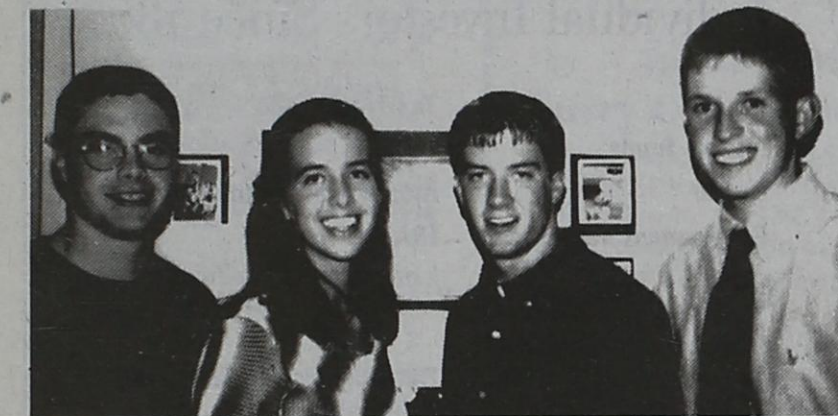
