


Or they re-sign their stars, like the Braves have done.

Saul, the new head basketball coach at Farwell High, has been in a nip and tuck battle for the lead with Lezlie (Castleberry) Smith the past three weeks.



-- Jerry Davis, County **Commissioner for the Farwell** area, will seek re-election.


Davis, a Democrat, won his first term four years ago.

Parmer County voters go to the polls

1. The amendment to revise the provisions for filling of a vacancy in the office of governor or lieutenant governor. Divides the executive and legislative branches by preventing a lieutenant governor who is called upon to fill the office of governor from holding both offices at the same time.

For 222, against 89.

2. The amendment relating to the making of advances under a reverse mortgage. Conforms state law on reverse mortgages to federal law. Allows elderly homeowners to supplement their income with the equity they have built up in their homesteads.

For 151, against 162.

. 3. The amendment to eliminate duplicative, executed, obsolete, archaic and ineffective provisions of the Texas Constitution. The Texas Constitution becomes easier to use while no substantive changes are made.

For 223, against 83.

4. The amendment exempting property owned by institutions engaged primarily in public charitable functions from ad valorem taxation. Clarifies whether charities that receive tax exemptions may engage in auxiliary activities without endangering their tax exempt status.

For 180, against 132.

5. The amendment allowing state employees to receive compensation for serving as a member of a school district, city or other local government district. Increases the pool of qualified candidates for local elections.

For 133, against 180.

6. The amendment increasing the maximum size of an urban homestead to 10 acres. Gives more Texans the right to secure a home equity loan on their homestead.

For 211, against 96.

The amendment authorizing garnishment of wages for the enforcement of court ordered spousal maintenance. Garnishment of wages places the burden of collecting and paying spousal maintenance on an employer instead of an employee. Currently garnishment is allowed for the collection of court ordered child support. Expanding garnishment for spousal maintenance could result in moves to allow garnishment for the collection of taxes, other judgments or debts. We think this amendment sets a bad precedent.

8. The amendment to provide that the adjutant general serves at the pleasure of the governor. Increases the accountability of the adjutant general.

For 121, against 191.

9. The amendment authorizing the legislature to create a judicial compensation commission. Retirement benefits for lawmakers increase when district judges receive a pay increase. Unless rejected by either the House of Senate, the commission's recommendation would become final. This would do away with the governor's ability to veto judicial pay raises and increases in lawmakers' pensions. This amendment also sets bad precedent by granting an appointed commission limited lawmaking authority.

For 78, against 219.

10. The amendment to provide that the commissioner of health and human services serves at the pleasure of the governor. Increases the accountability of the commissioner of health and human services.

For 111, against 198.

11. The amendment permitting a political subdivision to purchase property and casualty insurance from a mutual insurance company. Creates competition that could result in lower premiums.

For 176, against 127.

12. The amendment to exempt from ad valorem taxation leased motor vehicles not held by the lessee primarily to produce income. Provides leased vehicles with the same tax treatment as personally owned vehicles.

For 118, against 183.

13. The amendment providing for the issuance of \$400 million in general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The state, which had \$11.7 billion in bond debt as of Aug. 31, 1998, should not provide public loans in competition with the private sector at favorable interest rates only available to the state when the private sector can meet the demand.

For 182, against 119.

14. The amendment providing that a state board or commission be governed by a board composed of an odd number of three or more members. Minimizes voting ties and provides flexibility to lawmakers in creating boards and commissions. For 219, against 79.

15. The amendment permitting the conversion of separate property to community property. Provides tax relief to spouses who convert property.

For 210, against 93.



Fort Sumner beats Wolverines for district championship

The Texico Wolverines had a rough game last Friday, losing to Fort Sumner's Foxes, 45-0.

The Wolverines finished district play at 2-1 while the Foxes won the district title at 3-0. Overall, Texico is 4-6 going into the state playoffs.

The Wolverines go to Lordsburg -- a 420-mile trip -- for the Class A state semi-final contest on Saturday at 2 p.m. mt.

There were not a lot of highlights for the Wolverines against Fort Sumner. Just seconds into the game, the Foxes scored on a 70-yard run. The kick was wide and it was 6-0.

Texico responded when Justin Minshew ran the kickoff back 30 yards to the Foxes' 45. Then, Ryan Autrey passed to Eric Smith for 15 yards. But a penalty and some incomplete passes forced the Wolverines to punt.

Texico got a break when Fort Sumner's punter fumbled and was tackled on his 13. But Texico was unable to penetrate Fort Sumner's defense and couldn't score.

Early in the second quarter, Autrey stopped a possible TD run by tackling the runner at the Wolverine 25 after a run of 55 yards. But three plays later, the Foxes scored on a 5-yard run.

The second quarter was a tough one as the Foxes put 26 points on the board, scoring four times overall. The Foxes then added two more Tds in the 3rd quarter. Both teams were unable to do much against each other in the final period.




The 4th period opened with a 2-yard plunge for a TD by Corn, followed by a Corn kick. And the Steers ended their




