Well the 1998-99 school year is history. It's been a really special one for our area students, with many achievements and honors.

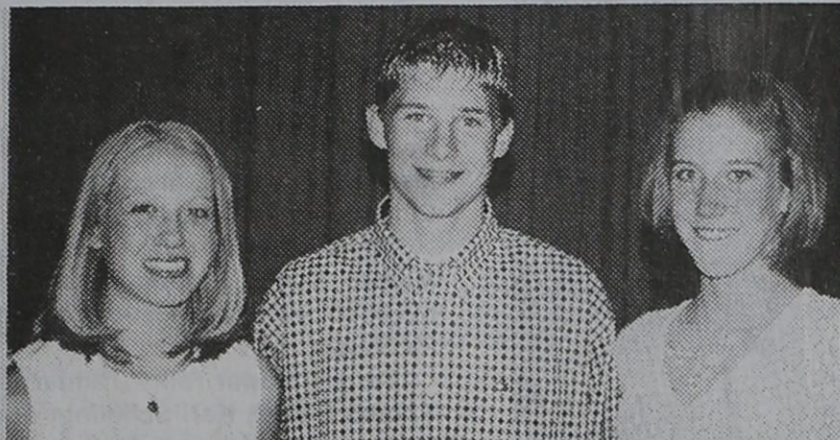
I have to admit that I'm glad when it's done -- eating all those free steaks is not easy!

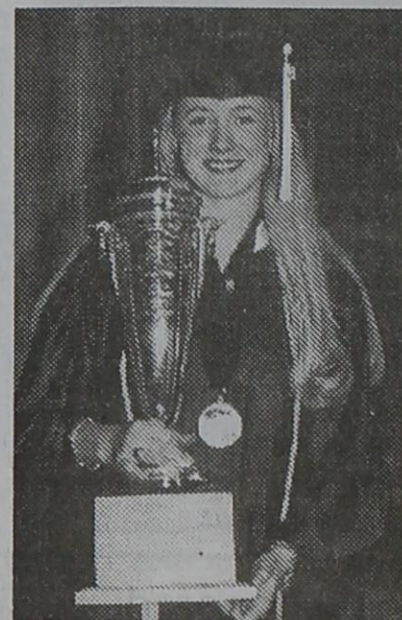

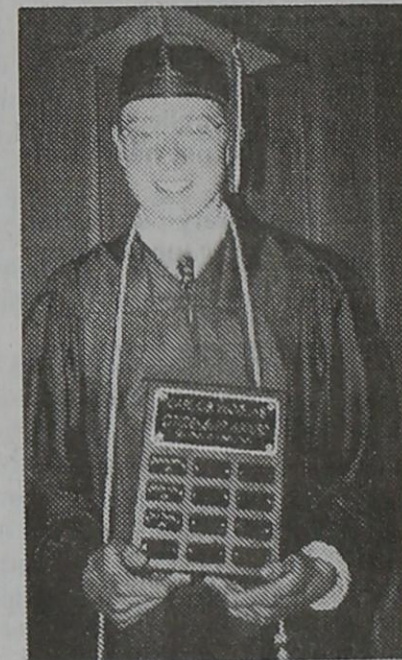

In other business, the council:

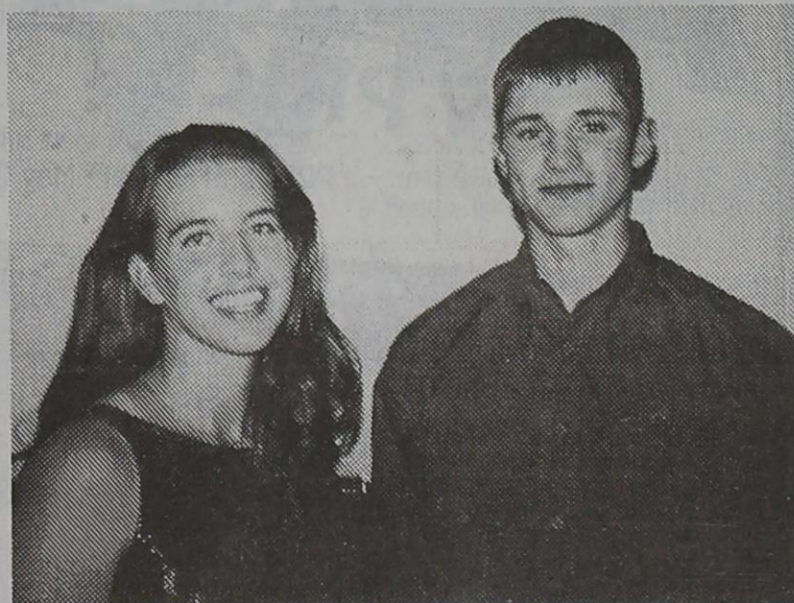
-- Continued updating the personnel policy handbook, and placed the animal control officer under the city marshal's supervision.

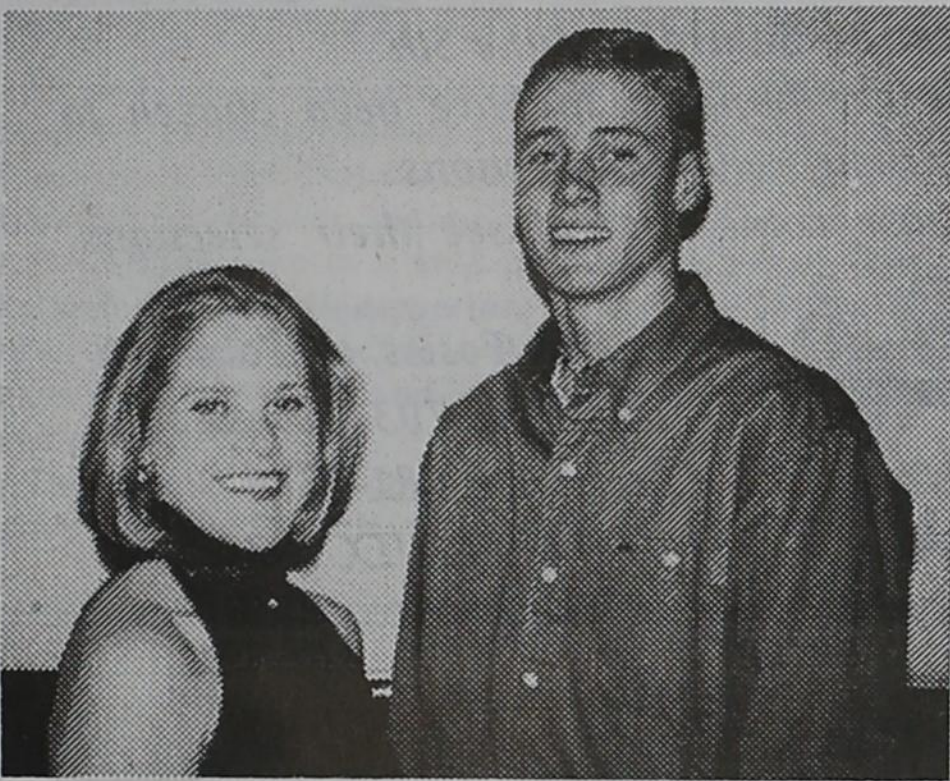

-- Brandon Foster and Cade Morris will play in the 6-Man All-Star basketball game in July.

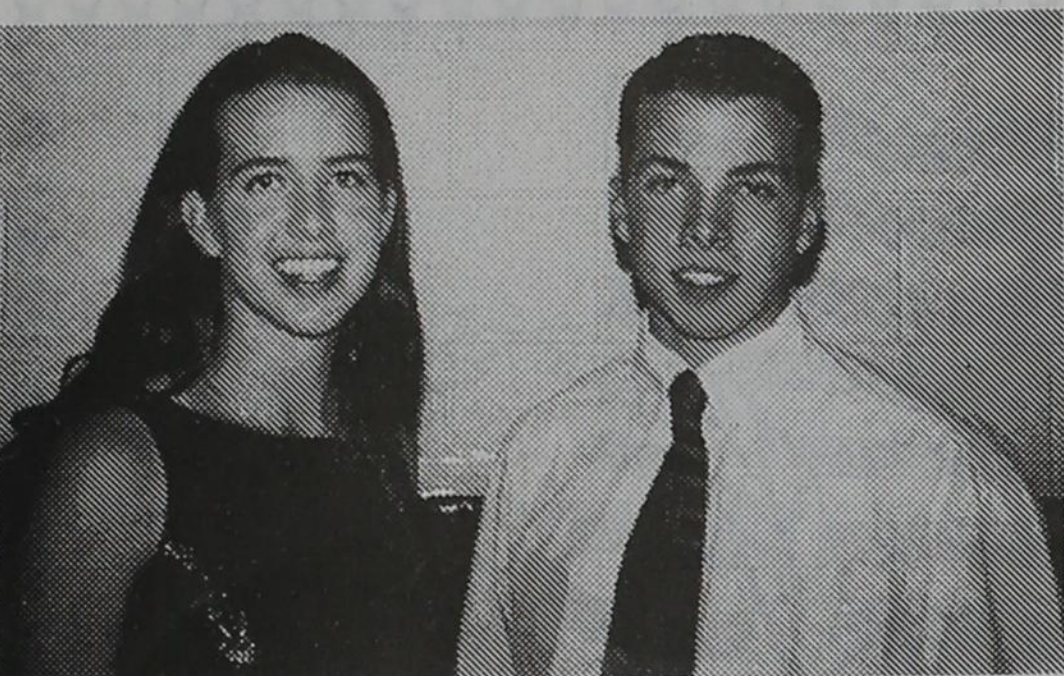
-- Josh Morris was named All-State by the 6-Man coaches association.

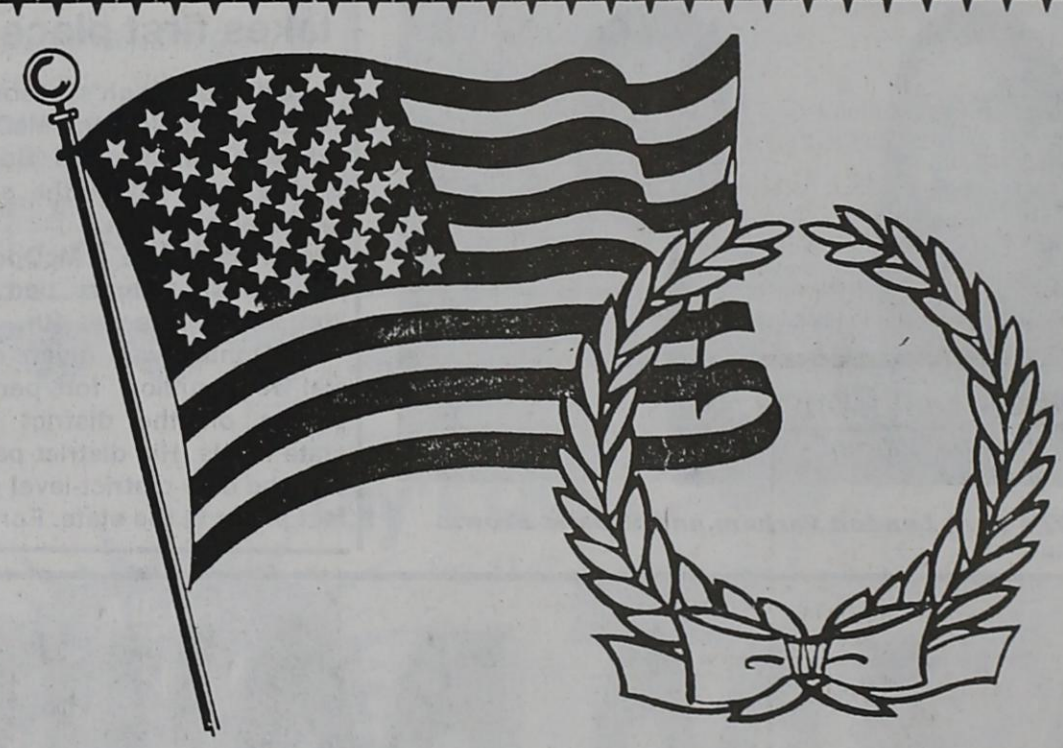

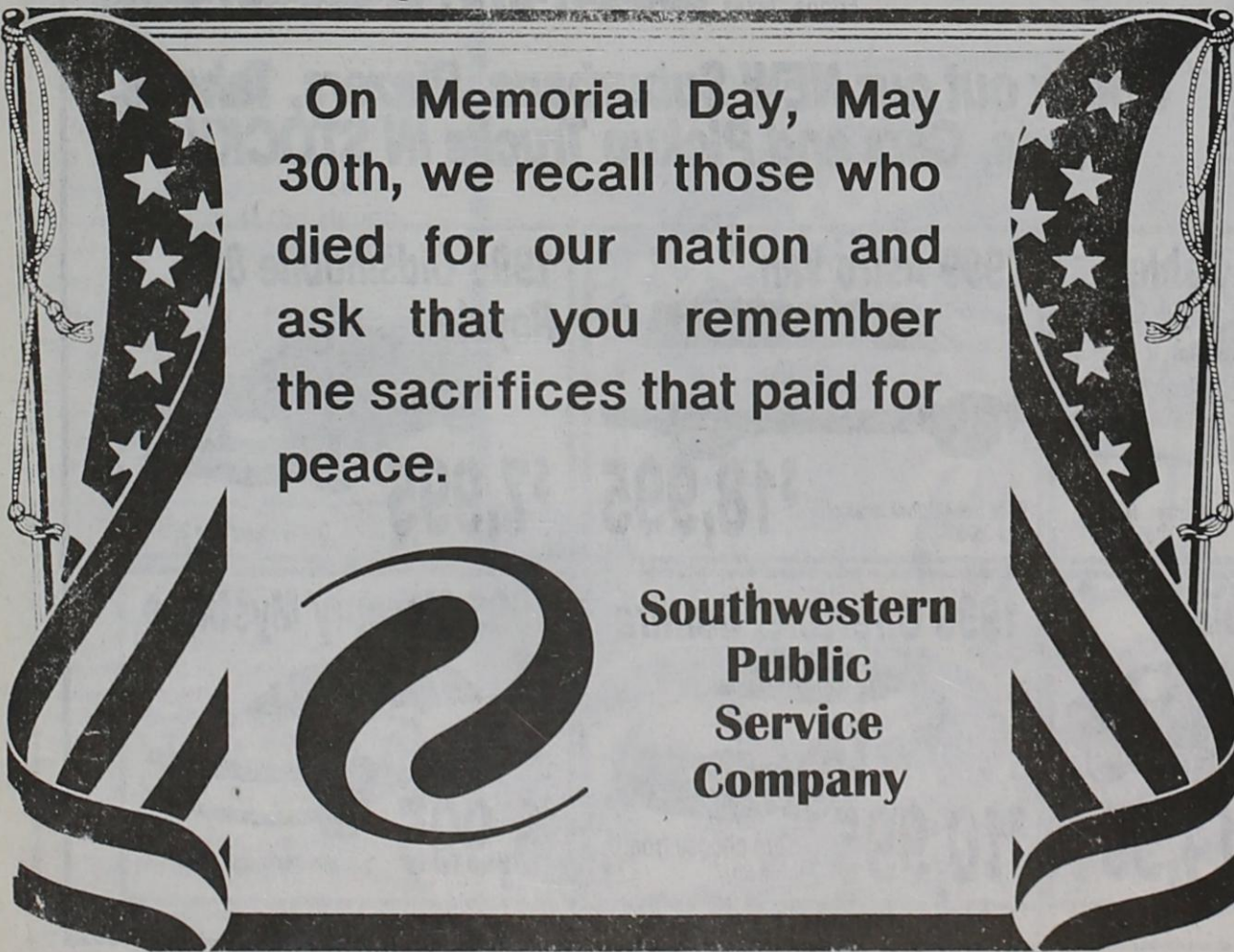

### Recipe of Week

#### Savory Egg Skillet Supper

3 to 6 servings

- 1 teaspoon cooking oil
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/4 cup water
- 2 teaspoons low-sodium instant chicken bouillon
- 2 cups shredded zucchini (about 3 small)
- 2 cups shredded carrots (about 2 large)
- 2 cups (about 6 oz.) frozen Western-style hash brown potatoes
- 1 1/2 teaspoons dried dill weed
- 6 eggs

In 10-inch omelet pan or skillet, cook onion in hot oil until soft, about 3 to 5 minutes. Add water and bouillon. Stir until dissolved. Stir in vegetables and dill. Cover and cook over medium heat until heated through, about 10 minutes. With back of spoon, make 6 indentations (about 2 inches in diameter) in vegetable mixture. Break and slip in eggs. Cover and cook until whites are completely set and yolks begin to thicken but are not hard, about 8 to 10 minutes.

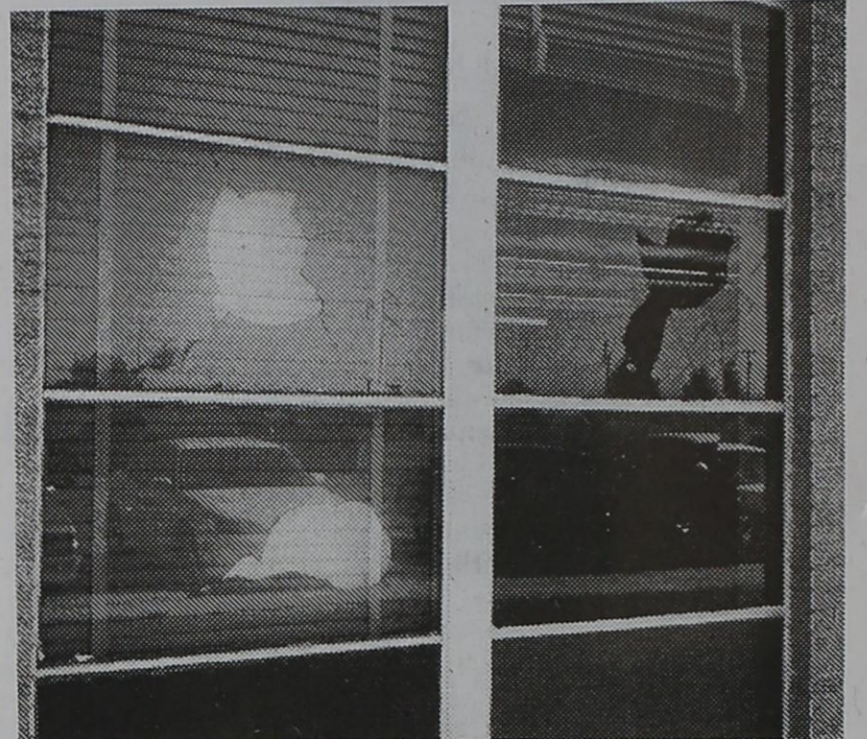

## Letter To The Editor

Dear Mike,  
Usually, I would not write a letter to the editor. Most of the time when I have a problem with the school, I go to the school. At this time, though, I would like to thank Teresa Mesman for having the courage and initiative to bring the problem of the Farwell band program to the public's attention with the editorial. I have conveyed this message to her in person.

As a parent of children in the Farwell schools, I am very concerned with the choices offered to them for their education and realize the importance that this will have on their future lives. I have had children in the Farwell school system for 11 years now. I have had two go through the 6th grade and 6th grade band programs under two different band directors.

Having been in band throughout junior and senior high school myself, I was excited to get my children interested in band. However, when I was told that the program was mandatory for 5th grade, I was angry. At the time our oldest started 5th grade band, we could not easily afford to purchase an instrument. We went to the meeting arranged by the band director to meet with the music store representatives and see what options were available and "what instrument would fit our individual student."

Our first choice was a saxophone. This was completely out of the question because of the extremely high cost even to rent one. We asked about instruments the school might have available to borrow. The answer at that time was, we will have to see what is left over after the high school and junior high bands have been given their instruments. The most likely instrument that would be available was a French horn or tuba.

Mouthpieces have to be purchased by the parents of the student for those instruments. The price tag for the French horn mouthpiece was approximately \$50. What do you do with a mouthpiece after you leave band and do not own the horn? We finally looked at the new and used instruments we could rent to buy. These were also more than I was willing to spend

on a program we were being told we had to do, not choosing to do.

We got a flute at a pawnshop and had it overhauled. We were out about \$200. The next year, the flute was overhauled again for about \$75. During 7th grade, my daughter was told by a visiting "flute instructor" that she would never be good at the flute and should try something else. She did. She went to Theater Arts. Switching instruments at this time would have put her far behind and required a lot of after school study with the band director, she was told.

As the next one came along, we again faced the same situation. Our second daughter did not want to play the flute so we chose a rent to own clarinet. We now own both a clarinet and a flute, which I am sure their brother will not want to play. The only time the clarinet was played was at school. Somehow, though, she managed to learn what was taught and played in 6th grade band. The band did not seem to be moving so fast that she had to bring her horn home to practice. I never did understand that, since the clarinet is the same instrument I played all through my school years.

I tried to convince her to stay in band in her 7th grade year since we had finally gotten the horn paid for. She broke down in tears and as best she could, explained to me why she could not stay in that class one more day. We chose to take a loss on the horn and drop band going into 7th grade. I visited with other parents of students in the junior high bands to see if the

story I got was unusual. I can only say I was unhappy with my findings. If behavior is the problem, it should be dealt with appropriately. Yelling at young beginning band students may be the way some band directors work, but I do not see its benefits in our band today. (What was occurring) does not breed a love of music or create an atmosphere for learning any lesson I want to see taught.

Now, please do not think that I blame the band director solely for the poor band program. I do not. After the students leave 6th grade and enter 7th grade, they are faced with several other conflicting interest. The biggest one, in my opinion, is athletics. From way back, coaches and band directors have had a conflict of interest when it comes to their students. The exception might have been Farwell's famous Mr. Burton. Many of the parents who have kids in Farwell schools today remember the size and strength of those bands.

As for the statement that music students score higher on tests -- that may be true. But why do the fine arts offered have to be band using a band instrument? The basic notes, rhythm and count could be taught on a beginner level using Tone-ets. Can Farwell not offer choir, art, piano or some other choice to its students to stimulate their minds and learning skills? Many of our students are taking private piano, voice, guitar, flute and possibly other instrument lessons. Their success has very little to do with any instructor in the school system and a whole lot to do with parents funding lessons and those providing the lessons. Rachel Cantu, who was mentioned in our article, is a good example of what much individual talent and private lessons can do.

I feel terrible for the students who want so badly to be part of a high school marching band, jazz band or concert band. When a program is good, when the leadership in the program is respected by the students and morale is good between the students and community, band can be awesome. The problem of a failing band program cannot be fixed with force feeding it to 5th, 6th and 7th grade students. That may or may not be the intentions of the schools, but it looks like it might be.

I hope a lot of thought and planning will be put into whatever programs are implemented in our schools. From band, to athletics, to academics, our students are depending on us to give them the very best possible. Our instructors, administrators, school board members and school curriculum should all be selected with care, thought, and prayer. Our children will pay the price, not us.

# Farwell band issue explained further

The Farwell Junior High faculty and administration met for a workday on May 24 to go over the recent TAAS test scores, standings and other issues pertinent to the close of the school year.

At the request of the administration and faculty, the State Line Tribune was invited to attend the meeting to discuss the article that appeared concerning the seventh grade band class.

The faculty and administration felt that the article presented only one perspective, namely the perspective of a few parents whose children took band as sixth graders this past school year. They were concerned that this viewpoint was not accurate and based on preliminary, and premature information.

The Tribune had been contacted directly by six parents that were extremely concerned over a proposal to make band class mandatory for seventh graders for the 1999-2000 school year.

At the meeting, the faculty wanted to make it clear to the Tribune that the junior high schedule had not been finalized at the time the article was written. An explanation of the scheduling process was given at the meeting that brought out key points to the decision making process the faculty and administration must go through in order to facilitate upcoming classes, matriculating students, teachers and other resources.

The curriculum that has been offered at the junior high level has changed significantly in the last two years. For instance, Spanish 1 is now offered for high school credit, a speech/technical communications class has been added and this coming year, Algebra 1 will be added as a class. It is also eligible for high school credit.

The eighth grade band members have been part of the high school band for the past year and the seventh grade band has been a very small class by itself. The sixth grade band is also a class by itself.

The Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) for each curriculum area also mandates that computer/technology skills be incorporated into all classes.

The junior high faculty will also be having to face a larger class of sixth graders coming into the school this fall. This larger class necessitates the addition of five more core classes that will have to be taught by the same number of teachers currently on staff. This, plus accommodating the schedules of the teachers that come into the junior high from the high school makes for a very complicated scheduling process.

To finalize a junior high schedule, the entire faculty and the scheduling team, examine very closely the needs of the students and the resources and teachers available to meet those needs. The junior high scheduling team began working on the 1999-2000 schedule last November. The schedule is then looked at and discussed by the administration and staff before it is finally set.

The final schedule for junior high students is usually not set until immediately before school starts. This is due to the fact of staff changes over the summer and last minute schedule changes. The schedule is then set with an arrangement that the junior high faculty feels addresses the most needs with the best resources available.

As part of the process for setting schedules for the upcoming year, surveys were sent home with the seventh grade students during the spring semester. This survey was an all-schedule survey that was designed for parents to help their children decide which classes they would take during the eighth grade for the upcoming school year. This survey was to be helpful in lining up classes, teachers and to set the timing for the electives to be offered. The junior high faculty felt this survey helped to address the concerns over the band program and, in a statement issued to the Tribune, stated that "if the students were not going to take band, we needed to know so we could adjust classes accordingly."

However, the surveys were not directed to the upcoming seventh grade class, nor dealt with the issue of their elective offerings, which is the basis for the previous article. In rebuttal to the first article, the faculty and administration wish to state again that the junior high schedule had not been finalized at the time.

"Some parents who had been to the school the week before the article was printed had asked about their child's schedule next year and expressed concern over band. They were told that we were still looking for a solution, and the information they had received was preliminary," as stated by the faculty and administration statement.

For the 1999-2000 school year, Theater Arts will be offered as an elective course. In the previous article, Farwell School Superintendent Larry Gregory had made a statement about the Theater Arts program not being effective. This statement was misinterpreted by the Tribune to mean that the class was ineffective as a whole. However, after talking further with Mr. Gregory and the junior high faculty, it was clarified that his original statement was meant along the lines of being ineffectively scheduled in the day at the same time as band for the seventh grade class.

The Theater Arts class at Farwell Junior High is a very in-depth class that offers a wide range of subject research and participation. Topics and projects such as Puppetry; design of, history of and presentation of puppets are taught; Shakespeare, the life of William Shakespeare, the works of and the impact of the his works on modern literature, theater and culture are also taught in addition to the plays, one-act presentations and other performances and projects. The class has a comprehensive textbook and the students are given tests throughout the semesters. They also attend major productions and presentations throughout the region as part of their studies.

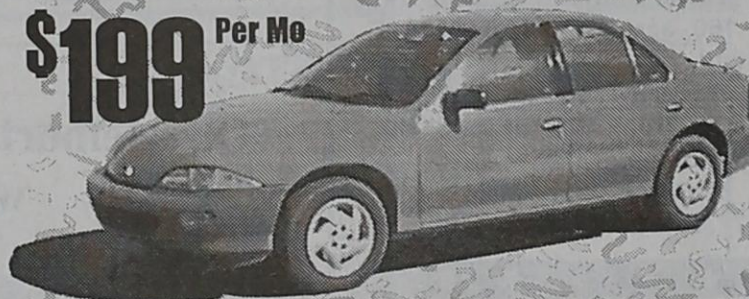
