



-- Billy Joe Galvan, 19, of Farwell, had pled guilty to accessory to armed robbery.


Stanton was the team that knocked Farwell out of last year's playoff.


on a 4th and 2 run.

Tabb's TD came on a 45yard punt return.







Texico knocked out of playoffs


to Marcos Loera, for the two- kick made it 21-8. point conversion. The gap was now closed to 14-8 in Lordsburg's favor.

In the third quarter, Then Autrey completed Lordsburg tallied again, this another nifty throw, this time time on a 43-yard run. The


The Wolverines had trouble making any advancement on the ground during the 3rd quarter and had to punt. But they kept trying.





We have square dancers coming to perform for the residents one evening this month. The date has not been set. These square dancers have danced for us before and the residents thoroughly enjoyed them.



Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church will have its annual Harvest Revival Sunday through Wednesday.


Rev. John Barrett, a 3-time recipient of the Bishop's Award for Evangelism and the founder of "On the Rock" Ministries will be the featured speaker.
