And that is exactly what the 1999 Texico Wolverines accomplished.

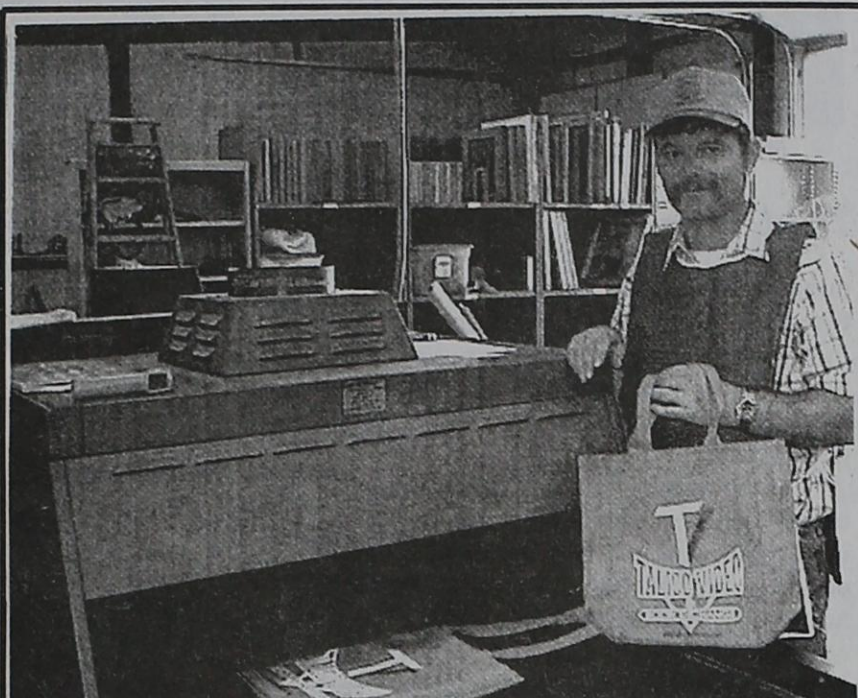
For that feat -- and the knowledge that will accompany those players for life -- I sincerely congratulate them on "a job well done!"

Doug Scioli opens screening business

Texico's Doug Scioli has opened "Southwest Sports & Screen Printing" in the shop in back of his home.

Currently, his new job is a sideline to his regular work -- being a fulltime Clovis firefighter. He also is a Texico volunteer firefighter, and takes Texico School sports photos for the Tribune.

He can make imprints on almost anything that takes ink -- t-shirts, shirts, jackets, jerseys, bags, hats, etc.

How does screening work? You take a picture of the logo (he has more than 6,000 logos in stock) and print the logo on clear plastic.

Then you put it on an exposure table, with a screen on top -- thus imprinting the logo onto the screen. It then goes on a press, where color is added. Finally, the product goes into the drier.

Treadway sentenced to die

Michael Treadway, 20, of Farwell, was sentenced to die by a Roosevelt County jury last Friday.

He had pled guilty to charges of first degree felony murder, armed robbery and conspiracy to commit armed robbery earlier during the trial in Portales.

It has been 23 months since Red Prather, a Farwell resident who owned and operated Play-o-Rama in Texico, was killed during a robbery.

District Judge Bill Bonem set the date for execution for Jan. 27, 2000.

Appeals of the sentence are automatic in New Mexico so it is unknown if or when the sentence will be carried out. No one has been exe-

cuted in the New Mexico criminal justice system for decades.

Previously sentenced in the murder were:

-- Ronald Armstrong, 19, of Farwell, had pled guilty last September to conspiracy to armed robbery, and accessory to armed robbery.

He was sentenced to seven years in the New Mexico Department of Corrections and given five years supervised probation after his release.

-- Billy Joe Galvan, 19, of Farwell, had pled guilty to accessory to armed robbery.

He was sentenced to nine years in the New Mexico Department of Corrections. Six years of his sentence was

Cemetery markers to be bought

The Texico City Council on Tuesday approved spending up to \$3,000 for new cemetery markers.

The council has been working on improving the cemetery recently. Up to 50 markers will be placed by Glaze Monument. Councilman Oran Jay Autrey will spearhead the project. The new markers will be placed on unmarked plots; some will simply say "unknown."

In other business, the council:

-- Approved the Texico firefighters to help sponsor the Region 3 EMS conference in Ruidoso, N.M., in April.

-- Had on the agenda "annexation of non-contiguous property -- landfill/welcome center/Brown property", but it was not discussed.

-- Heard Mayor Marie Christian report that several state legislators -- Billy McKibben, Patrick Lyons, Anna Crook and Stu Ingle -- have sent word to Texico supporting the city's stand to oppose Gov. Johnson's proposal to legalize some drugs. The city also received a letter from Gov. Johnson's office further explaining his position.

-- Heard councilman Dean Henninger report that the Ute Lake water project "is a go." The cost is estimated about \$200 million. Water will be pumped to Texico and other eastern New Mexico communities from Ute Lake.

-- Heard Mrs. Christian say that the stop sign at Anderson and Leftwich needs to be changed to be reflective.

-- Discussed next year's city election. Three posts will be on the ballot -- the city judge, held by George Herrington; and two council posts, held by Henninger and Eddie Dunsworth.

Texico hires financial advisor

The Texico School Board on Tuesday hired a financial advisor -- Dain Rauscher, Inc., of Albuquerque -- to help with the planned construction program.

A construction management service already has been employed. The next step

is for the board to decide on whether to have a bond issue, and when for a new gym.

In other business, the board:

-- Recognized Jacob AlderseBaes for being chosen to attend a youth leadership

FJH One-Act play takes first in district

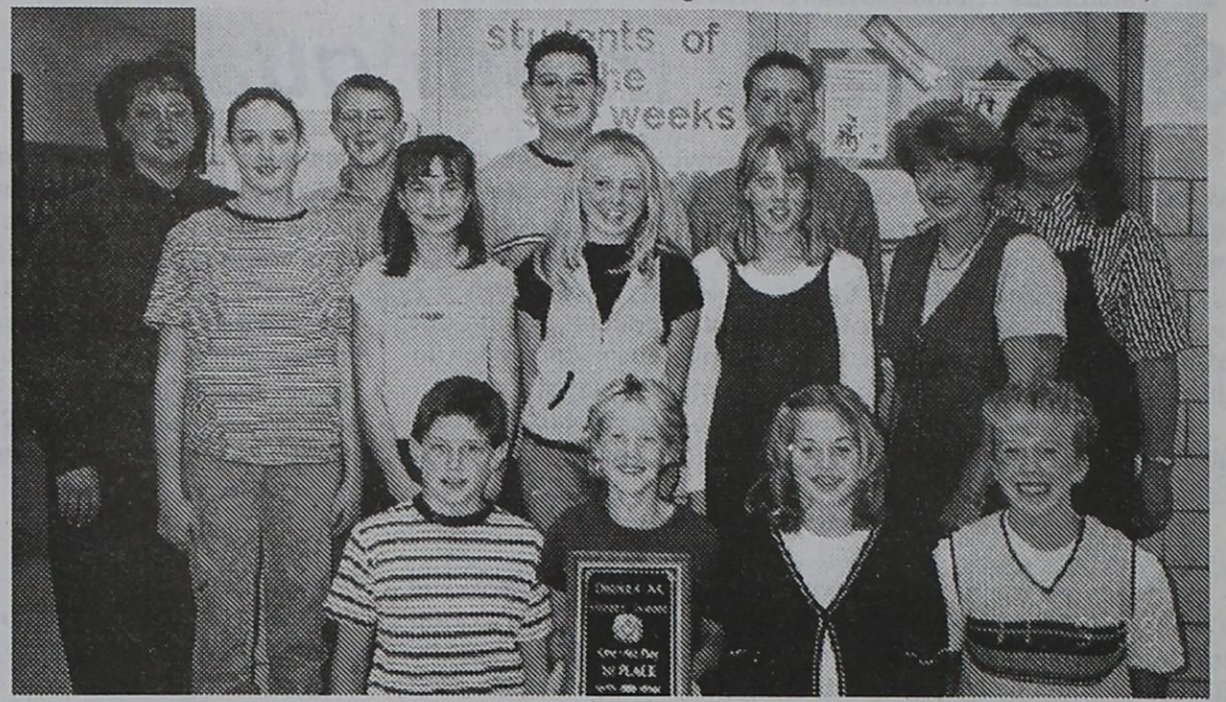

Steers rally in 4th quarter to beat Bovina

Once again, the Farwell Steers - Bovina Mustangs game was a close, thrilling one last Friday. And the Steers prevailed at home, winning 22-7 on a comeback with less than four minutes left to play.

The game boosted the Steers -- 4-1 in district and 8-2 overall -- into the state playoffs. The loss knocked Bovina out of a chance at the playoffs. Farwell finished in 2nd place in district with the top three teams going into the playoffs.

Farwell's first round opponent will be undefeated Stanton, at 10-0. The game will be played tonight (Friday) at 7:30 at Levelland's Lobo Stadium.

Stanton was the team that knocked Farwell out of last year's playoff.

The Bovina game started with Manuel Garcia tackling the kick returner at the Mustangs 25. Jourdan Nichols had a good tackle. Bovina had 3rd down and inches near midfield, but the defensive line, led by Clint Patterson, forced a loss, and a punt to the Steers 18.

Clint Corn ran for 20. A pass from Tyler Chadwick to Shane Roberts gained 9. But a penalty hurt, and Farwell punted into the end zone.

Bovina then broke off a long run up the middle to the Steers' 2, with the TD-saving tackle made by Derek Goettsch. Roberts then made a big tackle for a 2-yard loss, and twice Goettsch batted away passes in the end zone. On 4th down, Bovina attempted a 21-yard field goal try but the holder fumbled the snap and the Steers took over at their 9.

Farwell was held and punted to midfield. On defense, Isaac Nicolas had a good tackle. Cade Christian knocked down a pass and forced a punt as the first quarter ended.

On offense, Chadwick ran for 10, and Corn ran for 10 and 8. Thomas Ortiz gained 5 more. But another penalty hurt, and Farwell punted. Bovina was held, as Christian had a strong tackle. Kolby Kimbrough took the punt at midfield and returned it to the Mustangs' 20. But Bovina held as Farwell failed

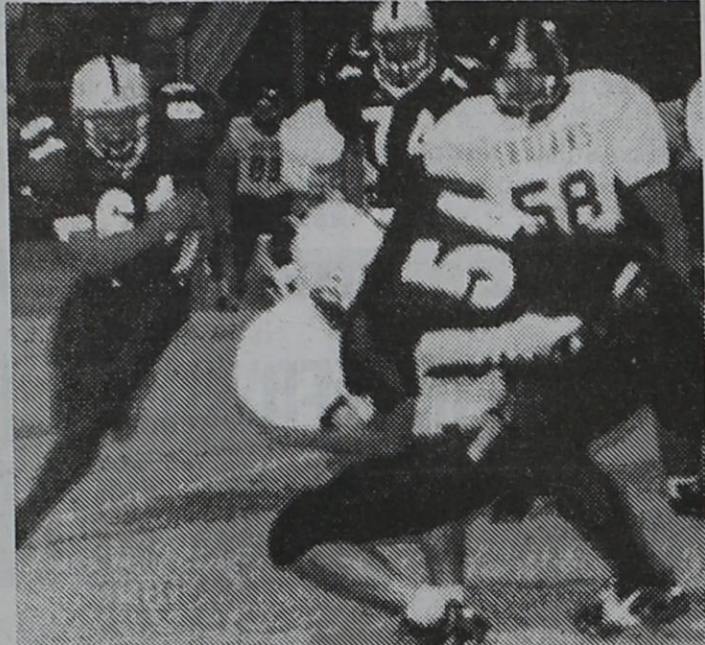
on a 4th and 2 run.

Then Bovina recovered a fumble, followed by Farwell's Grant Oppliger recovering a fumble on the next play. Chadwick ran for 28, but Farwell got hit with another penalty. Bovina intercepted as the first half ended.

Chadwick returned the kick to the Bovina 37 as the 3rd quarter commenced. Chadwick ran for 18, then Ortiz gained 7. On 4th and 7, Chadwick hit Nichols with a 33-yard TD throw at 7:30. The kick was wide and it was 6-0.

When the game moved into the final quarter, the action got hot. Bovina hit a beautiful long pass that gained 52 yards to the Steers' 1. The Mustangs scored on the next play at 11:36. The good kick made it 7-6 in Bovina's favor.

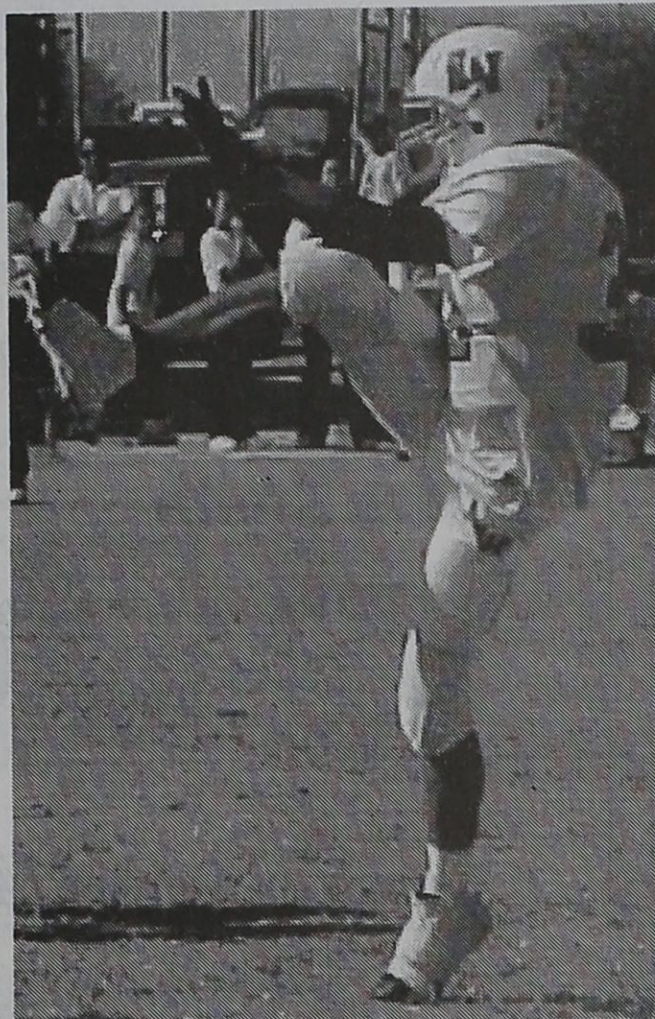
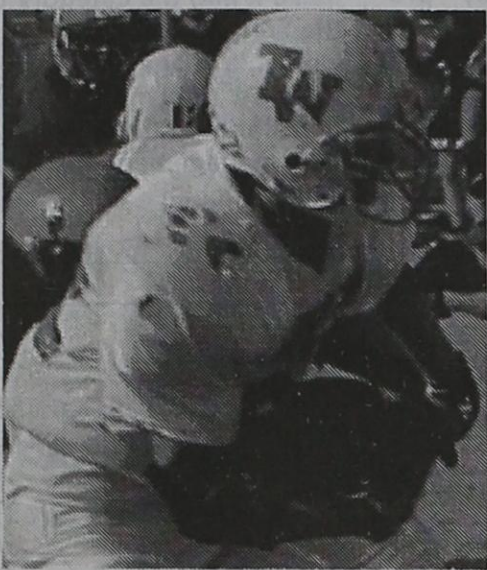

In the third quarter, Lordsburg tallied again, this time on a 43-yard run. The kick made it 21-8.


The Wolverines had trouble making any advancement on the ground during the 3rd quarter and had to punt. But they kept trying.

Teresa says 'lupper' solves a lot of problems around her house

What's for lunch?
The three words that evoke panic and aggravation inside of me.

I've always said that if I had enough money to have one really outlandish luxury in life, it would be a full time cook living in my home.

I enjoy eating. I enjoy shopping for groceries; I even

enjoy clipping coupons for groceries. I just can't seem to find that inner peace of true satisfaction with cooking or having to stop everything I'm doing to face my fear in the mid-afternoon.

We tend to eat lunch and supper quite late around my home due to the schedule of the dairy farm. I never actually know when we'll sit down to eat lunch, so I begin pre-

paring something usually around 12:45 p.m. - we're shooting for a 1:30 lunch break. If something causes Berny to miss the 1:30 time, my meal ingredients must be durable and re-heatable or able to withstand multiple withdrawals from the refrigerator and microwave. We're talking a lot of Hamburger Helper and tuna fish sandwiches here folks.

I propositioned my family about an idea that I thought would solve my fear of multiple cooking ventures and the time problem of eating on the dairy farm schedule. I proposed that we eat only one afternoon/evening meal. I called it 'Lupper' and stated the time to eat a proper Lupper was about 4:00 p.m.

"Isn't that what you called that casserole that took six hours to cook the other day?" my oldest son asked.

"Yes, and if you don't watch your mouth, I'll fix it again," I warned.

The Lupper idea solves a lot of problems around my house. We are not a farm family that does early morning chores and then gathers around the breakfast table for a hearty feast at 6 a.m. We go for a Pop Tart and a glass of milk and we're out the door by 6 a.m. We then feast on a mid-morning snack at our daily coffee/Dr. Pepper break at around 10:30 - 11:00 a.m. (If we have coffee at my

mother-in-law's home, this snack qualifies as a full course meal someday!)

Breaking again for a heavy lunch just seems so redundant to me; but then again I suffer from culinary malaise.

My oldest son hits the door from school at about 4:00 p.m. and is ready to eat the doorknobs off. He would truly benefit from Lupper. So would my two-year old. He's always grabbing snack when his big brother digs in the pantry after school.

I would be willing to serve bigger breakfasts for the sake of initiating Lupper. The key word here is "serve," that's why most breakfast foods

come pre-pared. Bacon and eggs are a favorite evening meal of ours and my eyes aren't open enough at 5:30 a.m. to crack eggs. They don't call me the queen of the heat 'em and eat 'ems for nothing.

Lupper would allow more time in the evenings for homework, family outings and projects. We'd eat at the table and discuss the events of the day just like the family professionals say you're supposed to do so maintain a healthy family relationship.

The health family part entices me even further because I truly worry about how my thrown together meals will af-
