Golf course expansion plans moving along

Plans are moving along on the proposed expansion of the Farwell Country Club from its current nine holes to 18, reports club president Johnny Actkinson.

Recently, Randy Ware, who bought Dr. Johnson's property to the north and east of the country club, suggested he might be willing to give a portion of that property to the club for expansion.

In return, Ware would subdivide the lots adjacent to the course for home sites. If the country club was expanded to 18 holes, it would

dramatically increase the value of adjacent properties.

Ray Hardy, of Granbury, Texas, who designed the back nine holes at Colonial Country Club in Clovis, has designed nine more holes for the Farwell Country Club.

All nine will be east of the current course, and would include a lake hazard.

The "back nine" are spread out more than the front nine to allow homes to be built in adjacent lots.

The design for the "back nine" has been shown to

Farwell councilmen seek loop improvements

Farwell City Council members R.C. Davis, Ysleta Kirtrell, John Carlson and Jerry Stover attended the Texas Department of Transportation meeting in Littlefield on April 22.

The officials were receptive to the Farwell proposals, mainly improvements to the loop. The city would like to see curbs and gutters on the city side of the loop, plus good repairs at the intersection with Avenue A.

Funds for these improvements will not be available until fiscal year 2002.

The councilmen brought back public comment forms for citizens who would like to respond. A state official said it would be good to have comments received and placed in their file. Copies of those forms are available at city hall for anyone who would like to come by and pick them up.

Texico city pool to remain closed

The Texico City Council voted unanimously on Tuesday to keep the municipal pool closed this year due to financial reasons.

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey said the pool was built in 1946. Repairs are needed and city officials said they don't have money to do the work. "We need to look at building a new pool," said Mayor Marie Christian.

Street Supt. Matt Meeks reported cost estimates for the pool repairs, including: a leak under the concrete, which could cost up to \$2,800 if not found quickly; electrical work, \$450; paint, \$340; prep work, \$124; pump, \$400, and filters, \$200. Also, he said the pool house roof is leaking and the wood is rotting. Plus work is needed at the bath house. A minimum \$5,000 was needed, it was said.

Councilman Dean Henninger at first stressed the importance of the city pool for youths, but after the financial discussion voted to close it, too.

Meeks later said that usage has decreased in recent years

Local elections scheduled Saturday

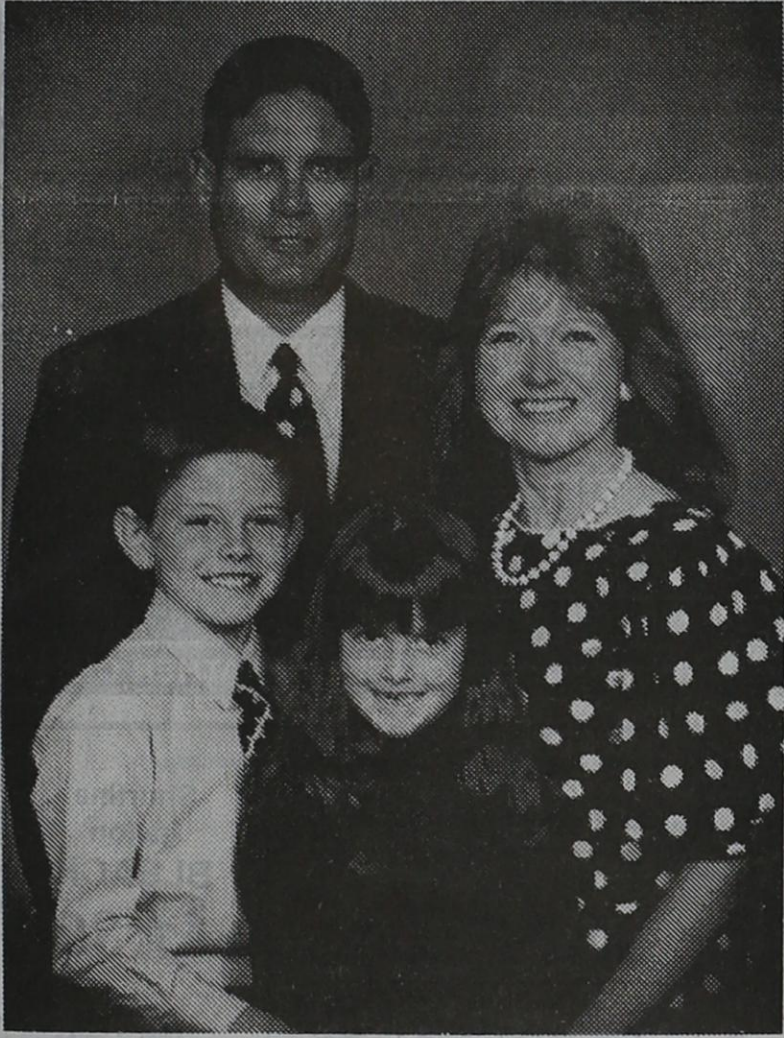
May 1 is the day for local elections in Texas.

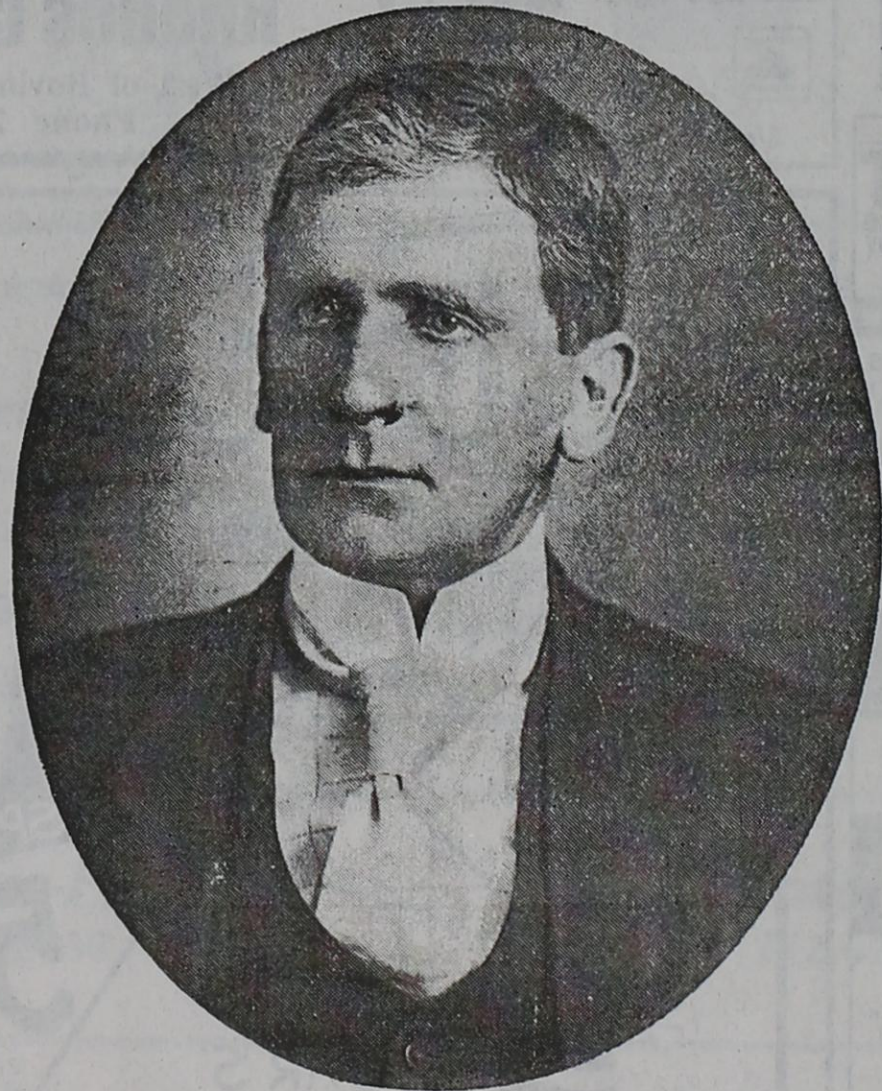

The above sketch is a snapshot likeness of one of our busiest citizens.

J. D. Hamlin was born near Louisville, Ky., about thirty-five years ago. About fifteen years back he located at Amarillo, Texas, where he conducted a large private school or college. During this period he was studying law, and was admitted to the Amarillo bar where he practised for several years, holding at one time the office of prosecuting attorney.

The construction of the Belen railroad Cut-off brought him to this section where he located the

town of Texico, and later was employed by the Capitol Syndicate Company to handle their lands, and open up the town of Farwell. Practically he may be considered the founder of each of our twin cities.

During his residence here he has accumulated a large amount of choice property. Possessing a mind of wonderful resourcefulness and activity and a most impartial judgment, he is considered a safe adviser on most any subject his mind is directed to.

With an amiability almost angelic, he is regarded by all of our

citizens as a personal friend. Generous to the extreme and accommodating to the last degree he has unconsciously made friends even among those who regard his interests as antagonistic to theirs.

He is a director in two of our National Banks and a member of several corporation Boards. In fact he is engaged in such a multiplicity of enterprises, it would be difficult to single out any one of them as his specialty, but we can safely say that there is no higher authority on real estate values and investments than J. D. Hamlin.

In other business, the council: -- Scheduled work days to clean up the cemetery starting at 8 a.m. on May 7 and 8. Everyone is invited to help.

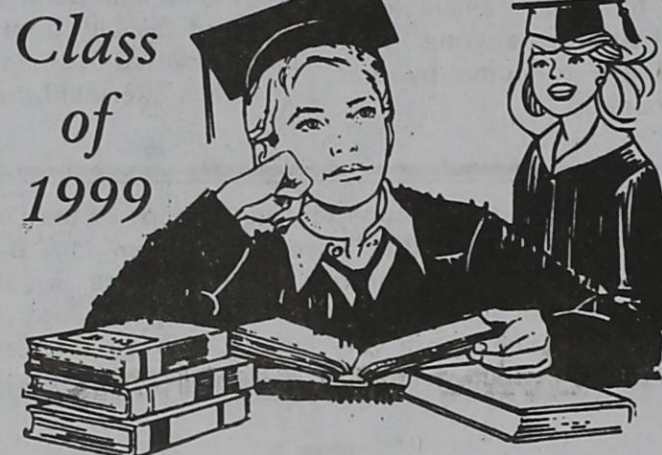

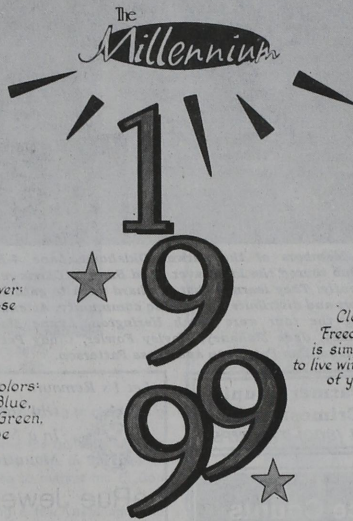
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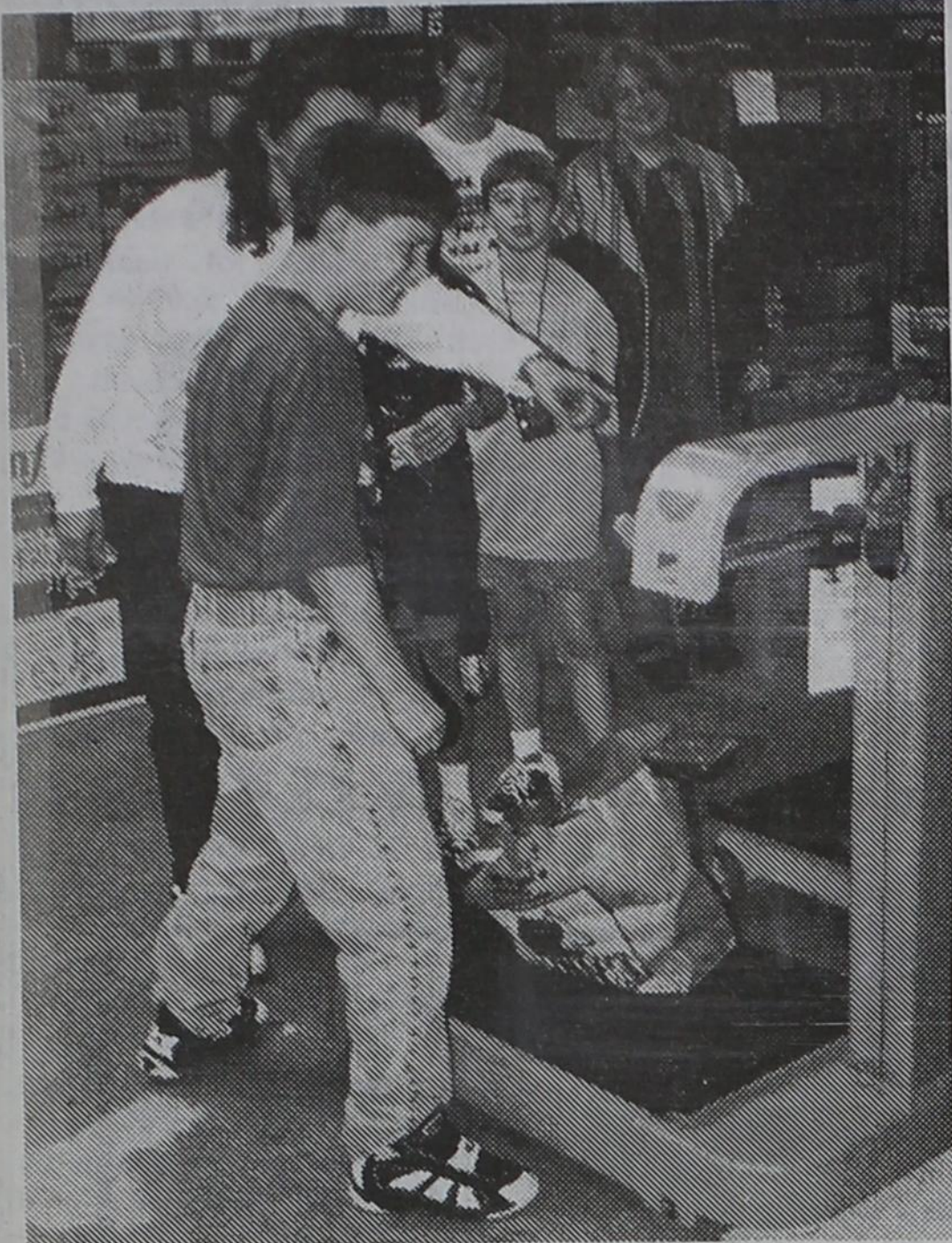

TURKEY & NOODLE DINNER

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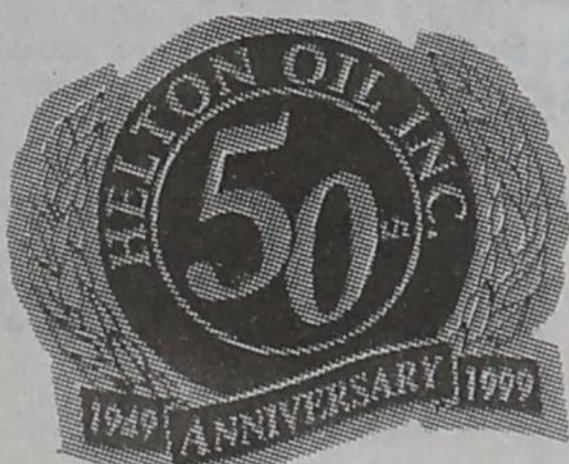


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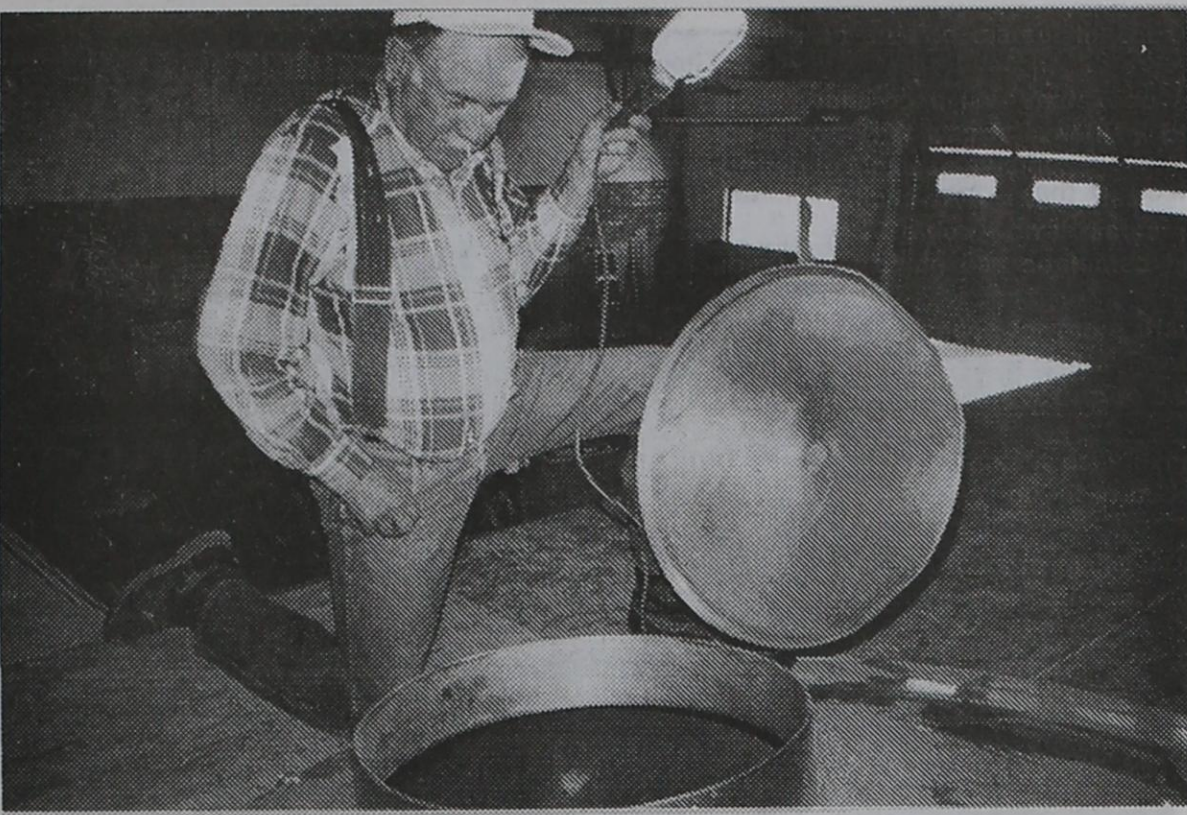

New business begun in Farwell

There's a Farwell businessman who's trying to make it big on the national level.

Virgil Reed lives in Clovis and owns the building on Avenue A in Farwell which houses Barb's Cafe. In the back of that structure, he is building an area to market his El Don Malcome enchilada sauce mix.

Virgil bought the Farwell building a few years ago and opened a doughnut shop there. That was followed by BBQ and pizza. Now he has turned to Mexican cuisine.

Currently, Reed said several Clovis stores stock his product, including Foxy's Drive In and Golden Corral restaurant. He said Albertson's Supermarket chain has contacted him, also.

Reed said he has been selling his sauce for more than a year. He plans to put in a production line in his Farwell building, which would include a holding tank for up to 3,000 pounds of mix.

He said his sauce is really special because it uses expensive ingredients, like cumin and oregano. "I buy it in bulk to keep the cost down," he explained.

Reed recently has sent his sauce to folks in Malaysia and Saudi Arabia in the request of folks here who had relatives in those far-off places.

Lazbuddie Homemakers to host book fair

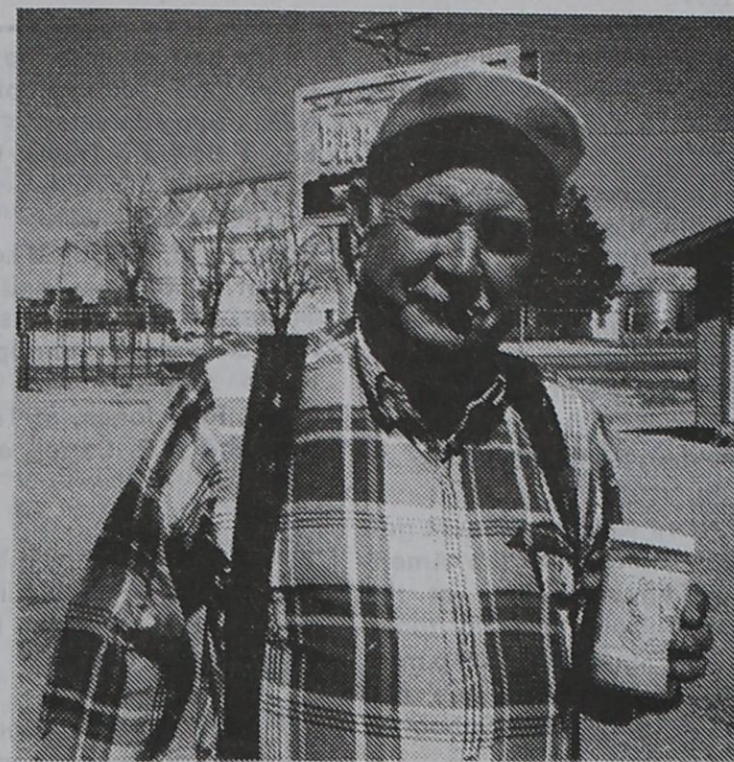
The Lazbuddie Young Homemakers met April 6.

The Association developed a cook book with recipes from each of the members and sold them to fund the scholarships they grant each year.

The wives attend seminars on how to handle the stresses of family and coaching, time management, real estate, fashion on a budget, home decorating and much more.

Members are asked to bring door prizes from their region or city that are given throughout the conference. They also play bingo, have extensive arts and crafts sessions and they play football and basketball games. The emphasis is on learning from each other and on having a great time together.

"We are all coming from the same circumstances, whether you're a football coaches wife or a basketball coaches wife," said Fay. "It's refreshing to hear that I'm not alone, and that our kids aren't alone, in having a husband/daddy gone so much of the time during the season."

The Terry family are in support of each other and Brent has been very encouraging of Fay to be an active member of the Wives Association. Bill and Amy like the fact that their mom is involved too!

Several of the other Farwell coaches wives have joined the Association in the past years. Last summer, Jill Boyd and Kathryn Scott attended the conference with Fay and they had a great time together.

"We made spirit shirts together and wore them at the conference," said Fay. "It was so much fun being there together and bringing that unity back to Farwell."

The Farwell coaching staff has been a model of unity for quite some time. The attitude is that "coaching is a family thing." The group of coaches are a family and their families are extended families to each other.

"We have dinners together and go to school and community functions together," said Fay. "Our group of families here in Farwell have become very close-knit and it's a wonderful support system in itself."

Fay is looking forward to the next Texas High School Coaches Wives Association conference this July. From the

schedule of events that she has in hand, the guest speaker will speak on the topic **Real Women Know Football**. Fay Terry is a shining example of this fact, yet she is much more.

She not only knows football, she knows about every sport, loves every sport, is in the bleachers rooting on the kids and the coaches of every sport and manages to run a home, a family and a teaching career. But she couldn't do it without the support of her husband and family...and the hundreds of Texas High School Coaches Wives behind her!

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Cotton producers hear from the experts

Most cotton producers on the Texas Plains saw their crop management strategies lead to naught last year, due to the withering drought. If dry conditions persist again this year, producers should think about "retooling" their crop management strategies, two agronomists and an irrigation specialist told farmers at a March crops conference-expo here.

"I wouldn't be too pessimistic about the chances for a repeat of last year's drought...not yet anyway," said Dr. Dan Krieg, South Plains farmer and a Texas Tech University professor of plant and soil science. "We didn't receive much winter rainfall, but we normally average less than 5 inches of rainfall from November through April in the Lubbock area.

"What we count on is getting up to 13 inches of rain between May and October, right during the cotton growing season. But even in the best rainfall years, keep in mind that our evaporation potential is four times greater than our normal average rainfall."

Do you get annoyed by letters instead of numbers on ads of phone numbers to call to order something? "If you want our product, call 1-800-YOU CALL."

Let's decipher that. The "1-800" is easy to remember, but the rest? You have to have your phone in hand to read the letters anyway, so why not go ahead and give us the numbers? The last thing I want to do all day is remember some letters or words for a phone call I need to make. And by the time I get to a phone (if I still remember the letters), I have to look them up to get the numbers, then make the call. At this point, I have forgotten who or why I called. Frustrating!

I once heard a way to get all the latest Aggie jokes -- call 1-800-AGGIE-IQ. I tried to figure out the numbers and finally realized that no phone has the letter "Q."

I once saw a TV ad about a neat product I really desired. They gave letters instead of numbers (naturally) and by the time I figured out the numbers, the company had either changed names gone bankrupt or was bought out.

On our last vacation, we saw billboards with all kinds of phone letters to call. What a way to spend a vacation! We don't remember seeing any sights ... all we did was try to figure out the numbers that matched the letters.

My youngest daughter once came into our living room while I was watching TV. There was a TV ad about a toy she wanted. She screeched, "Daddy! I want one of those 1-800-Play-Toy." I had no idea what it was she wanted. I hope Santa does.

You ought to go to a big city and stand on a street corner and listed to a conversation between business associated.

"Have you heard of the new computer components that 1-800-NEW-COMP has available? I think it will enhance by 1-800-SCREENDO on my 1-800-DISCMET."

What I have finally done is to shop from a magazine, where all the products' descriptions and prices are right there on the page in plain language. When I call to order something, though, the operator always seems to ask me, "Did you find out about the product from our 1-800-SHOPPING catalogue or in our 1-800-NEW-PROD catalogue?" Here we go again!

I'm considering getting a new phone line just so I can aggravate phone solicitors. My numbers -- or letters -- will be 1-900-FORGET IT."

Most South Plains soils can hold 15 to 20 inches of moisture in the four-foot soil profile, Krieg said. But the Plains' high evaporation potential means producers should water their crop wisely and do all they can to preserve their land's limited moisture-holding capacity.

"Cotton reaches its peak water demand 90 to 100 days into the growing season, when the crop is in peak bloom," he added. "With average rainfall and a well capable of pumping 3 gallons per minute per acre, we can meet that water requirement.

"But there is no benefit in watering beyond peak bloom. In fact, research on the South Plains has shown that watering after peak bloom, when the first bolls begin to open, actually lowers the crop's yield potential."

Retrofitting center pivot sprinklers to maximize irrigation efficiency and increase a crop's water use efficiency also aids crop survival during dry years, said Dr. Leon New, a Texas A&M professor of ag engineering and Extension irrigation specialist based in Amarillo. "If you haven't yet adopted Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) technology on your pivots, I encourage you to do so.

"A LEPA pivot equipped with drag socks on its drop lines, running in a field with furrow dikes, achieves 95 to 98 percent irrigation efficiency. In other words, it loses only 2 to 3 percent of the water pumped to evaporation -- it's the most efficient system we have."

LEPA systems equipped with bubble-mode nozzles are second in irrigation efficiency, followed by LEPA systems equipped with spray-mode nozzles, he said.

"Skip-row watering (irrigating every other row) is another good water management strategy. And if you are concerned about watering the crop uniformly, I recommend installing pressure regulators and pressure gauges on a pivot's drop lines," New said. "Pay close attention to the pivot's nozzles, too. You may get better results simply by re-nozzling one or two drops, or an entire pivot."

Re-evaluating all crop inputs is another way producers can stay competitive and survive another dry crop year, said Dr. Randy Boman, cotton agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Lubbock.

"Don't buy and apply unnecessary fertilizer. Know what's in your soil (run a thorough soil test) and apply only the nutrients your crop needs. Your soil test should check for nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, sulphur and zinc," he said. "Remember that it takes 50 to 60 pounds of actual nitrogen to produce each bale of cotton in your yield goal. And be sure to credit residual soil nitrates against the crop's nitrogen requirement. Don't apply more nitrogen than the crop needs."

Furrow diking, using a cover crop such as wheat during the fallow winter season, or practicing minimum tillage in dryland fields are good individual practices to conserve soil moisture, improve yields and boost returns per acre, the agronomist

said. "Take a good look at your seeding rate, too. Higher rates mean higher cost. Higher seeding rates also produce more barren plants -- plants that use fertilizer but produce no lint," he noted. "If you are seeding more than 20 pounds per acre, think about cutting back. Cotton seeded at 15 pounds per acre returned the best yields in our 1998 seeding rate field trial in Swisher County."

Boman also encourage producers to plant at least two or more adapted cotton varieties and to make objective performance comparisons when selecting varieties to plant.

But I dwell too much on these two sick people. I should emphasize the positives. the heroes.

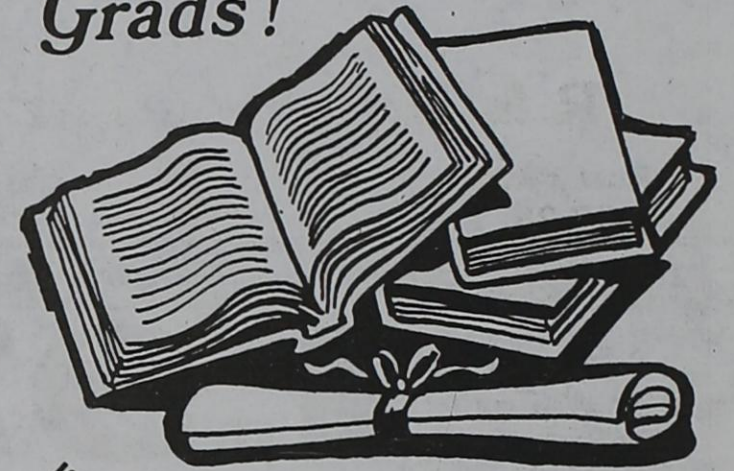

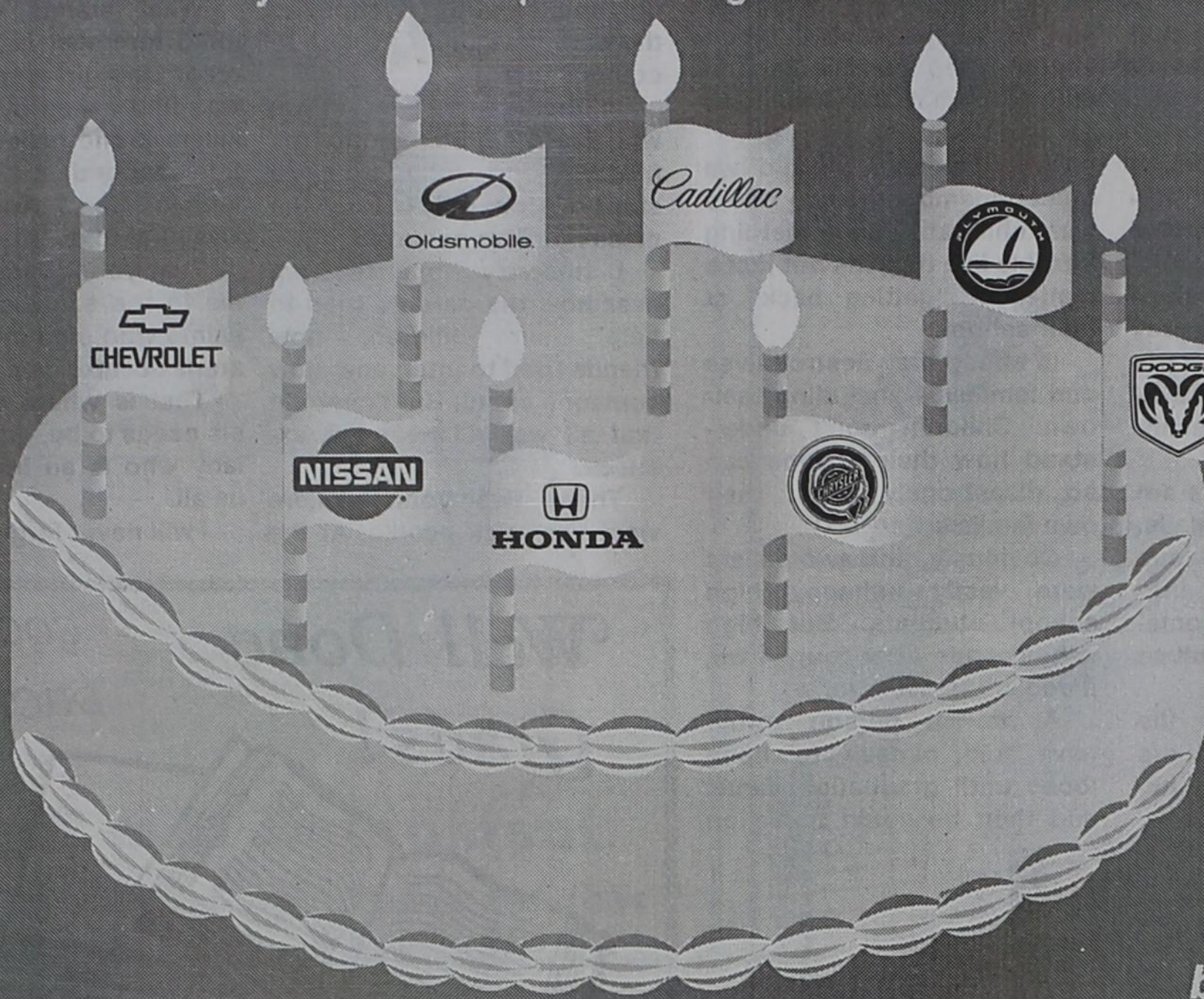

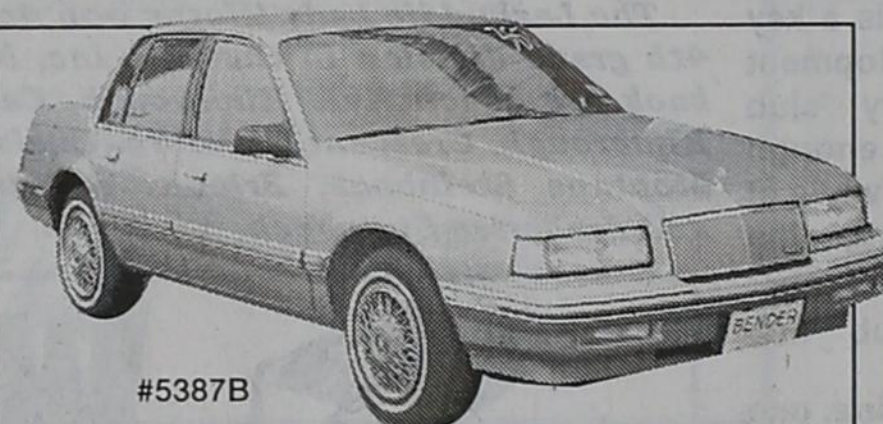
