He is the step-son of Floyd Coates, formerly of Farwell and former local farm supply business owner.

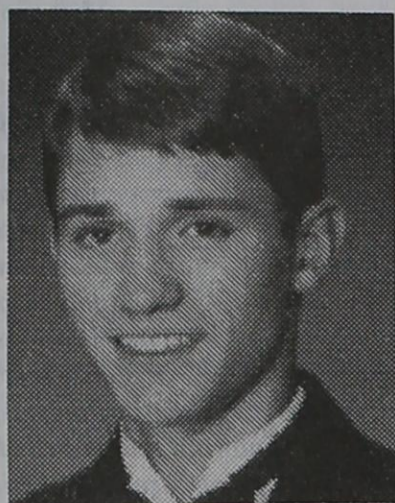
Joplin said neither Floyd nor Floyd's son, Kendall, are associated with the new enterprise.

Joplin and his wife, Pam, have two daughters, Ashley, 16, and Genna, 9. If all goes well, he will move his family here.

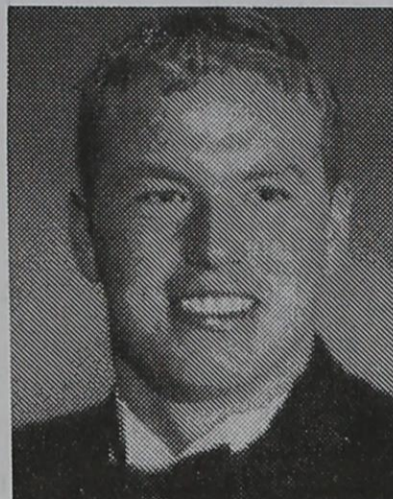

Saul replaces Gary Cates, who stepped down from the post but will continue to teach at Farwell Schools.

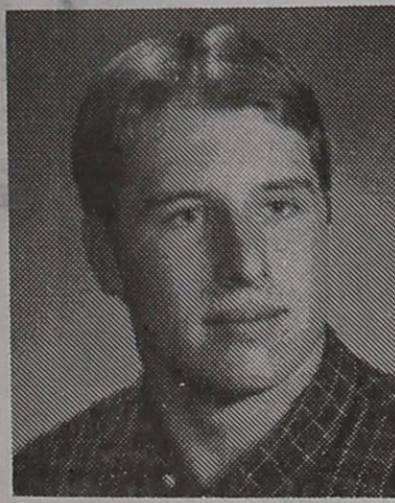
Texico eases activity trip procedures

The new policy calls for -- The child will attend the

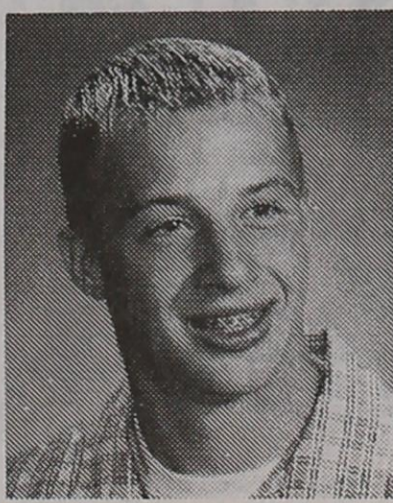

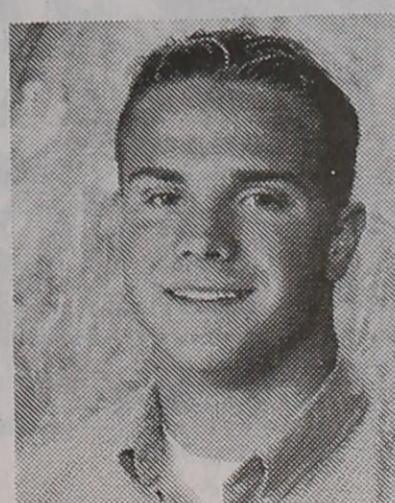

activity on the bus unless approved by the sponsor or coach.

-- Parents are urged to contact the sponsor or coach prior to the activity for permission to take their own child after the activity. Parents are to sign activity trip seating chart to release the child from the school's authority. Parents are urged to leave students for the entire activity and sign off at the time students are entering the bus for returning trip home.

-- Principals will provide sponsor with a list of students with permission to leave with parents.

-- Sponsor will allow parents to sign off at appropriate times. Sponsor will only allow child to be signed off by legal guardian or parent.

-- Coaches are to make sure parents have a copy of this policy. Coaches and sponsors will initiate a parent conference if continued leaving affects a team's unity or group cohesiveness.

-- Good judgment shall be used by all parties involved.

In other business, the board:

-- Heard a presentation by Roy King about state changes in the driver's ed law.

Youths in New Mexico used to be able to get their driver's license when they turned 15.

Under the new law, it's 16 1/2.

First, youths will have to have 50 hours driving with a parent in the vehicle, then take driver's ed with an instructor; then receive a permit which allows them to drive only if an adult is in the vehicle (for six months). If no violations, they receive their license.

Because of the law change, Texico will not offer driver's ed next year. The following year, it will be offered for high

school freshmen.

-- Discussed its Reduction In Force (RIF) policy to include non-certified staff.

-- Heard that the school auction raised about \$1,600.

-- Noted that the cafeteria budget is in the red about \$6,000, and staffing changes are forthcoming to get this budget back into the black.

-- Approved Terry Cone as school auditor.

-- Received no resignations. School officials are still looking for a new band director and special ed teacher.

-- Continued to allow students going to the Clovis Community College tech center, where they receive training in heating and air conditioning, nursing, graphic arts, building trades, cosmetology, electronics and welding. This program has worked out very well for Texico students.

-- Heard about school safety plans. Last December, the state asked school districts to prepare such plans, in case of a sniper, for example.

-- Heard that the student count is 518. A few weeks ago, it was 538, and has gone up and down a lot this year due to a transient population within the district.

-- Bought new computers and furniture for the high school lab. ENMR • Plateau Telecommunications is helping with this. The new high-powered computers will be networked with the Internet.

-- Plans to use federal money next year for more computers for the high school library, and for teachers' aides in English and math classes.

Council discusses closed Texico pool

Mayor Marie Christian said at Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting that the cost for repairing the municipal pool is far greater than that reported in the Tribune two weeks ago.

At that meeting city street Supt. Matt Meeks said a minimum \$5,000 was needed for repairs. Mrs. Christian said that amount was for materials and not labor, and that the true amount needed was closer to \$10,000 to re-open the pool.

Meeks had given these cost estimates: a leak under the concrete which could cost up to \$2,800 if not found quickly; \$450 for electrical work; \$340 for paint; \$124 for prep work; \$400 for a pump; and \$200 for filters. Also, the pool house roof was leaking and wood was rotting. Plus, work was needed at the bath house.

After the report on the last city council meeting appeared in the Tribune, publisher Mike Pomper received several comments from persons who had used the pool in the past, or who had their children use it. He reported on these at Tuesday's meeting:

-- A Farwell businessman pledged \$1,000 toward pool repairs.

-- A Texico resident who is a certified electrician said he would do that repair work at no charge.

-- A Texico resident who is a carpenter, and his wife volunteered their services at no charge.

-- Freda Neie, president of the Texico Chamber of Commerce, after discussing the problem with fellow Chamber members, sent a letter to the council urging it to repair the pool if it was repairable, and to budget money for repairs each year.

"It saddens me to read that you are planning to close the Texico swimming pool," wrote Mrs. Neie. "I understand that the pool is in need of many costly repairs. As a member of the Texico Chamber of Commerce and also a member of the community, I feel the need to express my concern. I feel that our community doesn't offer much for our youth to do during the summer. Many of the families in Texico can't afford a membership to the Farwell Country Club, nor can the youth

get to Clovis on their own. We all know that idle time causes people to do things they shouldn't. I strongly feel the need for the pool to reopen.

"I grew up in Texico and I can remember how much I enjoyed being able to ride my bike to the pool. I realize that dates the pool and that you can't expect something to last forever."

After Pomper's presentation, discussion centered around seeking a state grant; asking state legislators to budget funds for a new pool.

Mayor Christian noted it would be a major expense for Texico to fund the repairs on its own, adding, "How can you justify \$10,000 for two months of benefit?"

Councilman Rick Queener said funds for pools is very low on the state's priority list. Years ago, Texico applied for a Community Development Block Grant for a new pool and was turned down by the state.

The cost involved in a new pool was bought up, with estimates given of over \$100,000 or \$200,000. City Marshal Kelley Brophy, who said he built a pool at his Clovis home, noted it cost \$50,000 to \$60,000 just for the cinder block materials.

Brophy suggested that the Farwell Country Club might want to open its pool to everyone.

Queener asked if the city could buy a pool from a private individual. City Attorney Marion Rutter replied, "No, but you can lease it."

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey said he has been approached by several people about keeping the pool open. "What happens if the community comes up with half the money?" he asked.

Pomper brought up the idea of the school district, perhaps, building a pool. Queener asked Rutter if the school built a pool, could the city use it. Rutter said it was possible under a joint powers agreement.

On Wednesday, Pomper contacted Texico School Supt. R.L. Richards about the pool. Richards said he was amenable to the city and school working together on getting state funds for a new pool.

In other business, the council:

-- Approved Brophy buying stripes for the 4th police car (about \$200) and a computer for the 4th police car (over \$4,000). Funds will come from the forfeiture fund, which stands about \$10,000 said Brophy.

-- Heard that Autrey will check into costs for a new well and sprinkler system at the cemetery.

-- Talked about building going in without proper permits. The city has had a problem with the state now allowing Clovis building inspectors to handle permits here.

Brophy said he has called for a state inspector on one building here but no one knows if an inspector came. He will call back on a building near the flea market.

-- Approved seeking a state grant for more trees to be placed in the new section of the cemetery. It's easy to qualify for this grant, said Mrs. Christian.

-- Discussed the successful cemetery cleanup last weekend with about 18 persons participating. Autrey was thanked for the use of his equipment. And the two community service persons who helped did a great job, it was stated.

-- Heard Mrs. Christian and Brophy announce that a seat belt crackdown was coming.

Brophy said the state has found that seat belt usage has decreased from an 87 percent average to about 81 percent. So the state wants police to crack down. Fines are \$35 for adults and \$60 for children.

Thus, folks traveling in Texico will be watched closely to see if they have their seat belts on.

8. If you plan to mow for a long period on a hot day, drink plenty of fluids.

'Unacceptable economics'

Farming on the plains of eastern New Mexico has always been a tough way to make a living, even before the Conservation Reserve Program and other price support programs began to disappear.

In a recent study, scientists with New Mexico State University's Agricultural Experiment Station found that neither reverting to dryland farming nor grazing yearling stocker cattle will produce acceptable economic returns on grasslands coming out of the CRP.

Funded in part by the Western Region Sustainable Agriculture Research and Education program, the research was conducted on test plots from 1994 to 1996. The project was coordinated by Rex Kirksey, superintendent of the Agricultural Science Center at Tucumcari.

"It doesn't appear to be very economical to graze stockers or to raise wheat," said Allen Torrell, an NMSU agricultural economist with the project. "Producers will need another option."

Authorized by the Farm Security Act of 1985, the CRP is a voluntary, long-term cropland retirement program developed to conserve land prone to soil erosion.

"Obviously, a lot of the cropping areas in eastern New Mexico qualified to participate in the CRP," Torrell said. "Many ranchers and farmers, especially the dryland farmers in Curry and Quay counties, realized that their highest returns were going to be in the CRP."

Under CRP contracts, nearly 1 million acres of land were planted in weeping lovegrass in New Mexico and the Texas Panhandle in the 1980's.

CRP acreage was originally planted in the nonnative grass because it was cheap, easy to establish and provided good soil stability, Kirksey said.

But as the 10-year CRP contracts came up for reevaluation, there was a new emphasis on lands that could sustain wildlife habitats, not a strength of the lands planted in weeping lovegrass. "It works well for erosion control, but it lacks the species diversity and nutritional quality of other grasses," Kirksey said.

Thus, much land did not qualify to be renewed in the CRP. That's why NMSU researchers have been studying other options.

"As the land comes out of the CRP, farmers can obviously go back into the crop production they had to begin with," Torrell said. "That would mean plowing out the weeping lovegrass stands and pastures and reseeding them into crops."

The researchers studied this option. Farm trials tested different crop combinations and tillage systems. With typical crop production and no government price support programs, research results show that returns would have been negative for most years in the test period, Kirksey said.

"When we did the cropping research, there were some severe drought conditions, but I think those conditions highlight what these farmers face every year in eastern New Mexico," Torrell said.

Research trials also considered five different grazing management strategies: 12-month continuous grazing, six-month continuous grazing, spring/fall grazing, spring/fall grazing with fertilizer application, and a six-pasture rotation scheme.

Results showed that returns are minimal for grazing stocker cattle on the weeping lovegrass.

"The primary problem is that the weeping lovegrass is not a very good forage crop," Torrell said. "Its quality deteriorates over the summer, and cattle begin to gain less weight on it."

The researchers will continue to look for other alternatives. One solution may be to let the land revert to native rangeland. "The former cropland will probably be very productive rangeland and very good for a cow/calf or yearling ranching operation," Torrell said.

The commissioners checked their findings against county maps. County Judge Bonnie Clayton reported that the spot check appears accurate.

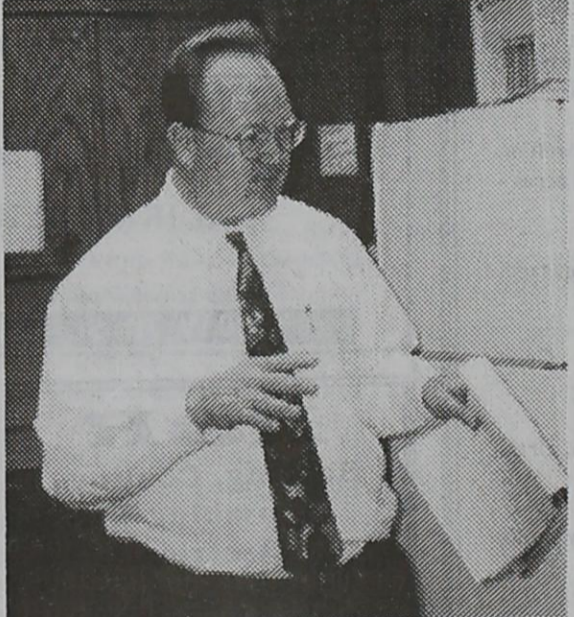

Capt. J. M. Kindred

The picture which we present above of Capt. J. M. Kindred is regarded as a good likeness. Mr. Kindred was born in Kentucky. He began life as a school teacher, served in the army for three years during our Civil war. Entering as a raw private, he was promoted for repeated gallantry in action, and emerged at the close of the conflict as Brigade Quarter-master.

On returning to his native town, more or less turbulence existed in the district, and the citizens, realizing the need of a fearless, conscientious officer, selected him as high sheriff of the county, a position which he filled most acceptably until the close of his term. Declining reelection, he removed to Louisville, Ky., and engaged in business there for several years. After this he visited Georgia and purchased hotel property, which he personally conducted for some time. Later on, hearing of the glories of the Texas Panhandle 20 years ago, he moved to Amarillo, Tex., at that time a mere hamlet on the line of the Fort Worth & Denver railroad. As the town developed into city proportions, the Amarillo citizens solicited him to become their postmaster, and following

their petition the U. S. Government appointed him to the office, which he held for a period of about nine years.

His stock farm near Amarillo is now worth many times the price he originally sold it for, but he has recouped handsomely on his Amarillo town property which has greatly enhanced its original cost.

Sometime ago Mr. Kindred removed to this point and after a short sojourn, he was offered and accepted the presidency of the First National Bank of Texico, one of our three fiscal institutions here.

Possibly no one has done more in an active but unostentatious manner, to advance the interests of Texas and its Panhandle than Mr. Kindred. During the World's Fair at St. Louis, which he visited at his own expense, he was indefatigable in his efforts to advertise the state and induce immigrants to come to it.

In social life Mr. Kindred is considered as a most worthy accession to any circle. A man of strong force of character and consummate diplomacy of disposition he makes his presence felt in any community. In addition to his position as Bank President he is a member of the Farwell Board of School Trustees and is an active officer in his church. Mr. Kindred is nearing the limit of three score years and ten and honored by the confidence of our citizens with positions of trust usually relegated to younger men. He can also look back with pleasure over a life spent in doing good whenever the opportunity presented itself.

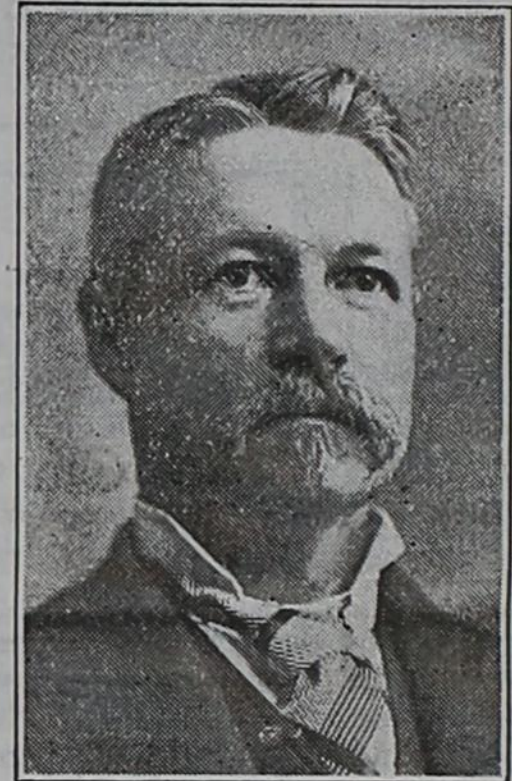

He remained with said firm, first in the house then on the road as traveling salesman, for several years. His business brought him to Texas about 20 years ago, where he bought land near Amarillo, and went into the cow business. In that line he was quite successful. When he sold out he owned one of the best improved small ranches in his section of the country.

He was afterward assistant post master at Amarillo, then city marshal and tax collector for the years 1904 and 1905.

He is now farming and owns one of the most choice and best improved farms in Parmer county, Tex., two and one half miles east of Farwell. He is also engaged in buying and selling real estate. He is a stock holder and director in the First National Bank of Texico, N. M., and has been vice president for more than a year past. He has great confidence in the future of the Texico-Farwell country.
