Or would you want a Veteran, who has sworn to defend his home, his kin, and his country, and would fight until the end?


He was a common Veteran, and his ranks are growing thin, but his presence should remind us we may need his



Texico Fire Chief Lewis Cooper stopped by the Tribune to alert folks to the dangers of open burning.

New Mexico has put out stringent guidelines governing smoking, campfires and open fire restrictions.

It's due to the lack of rain, plus the recent high winds and low humidity which have fueled wildland fires throughout the state.

So in New Mexico:

-- Open burning (fields, cropland, debris, weeds, etc.) is prohibited.

-- Open fires, such as campfires and fireworks, are prohibited in wildland areas. To get an exception, check with the state forestry department.

-- Smoking is restricted to designated areas, within structures, or within vehicles equipped with ashtrays while on paved or surfaced roads.

### Texico residents turn out to oppose planned dairy

The Texico City Council limits who want to come in. met Tuesday to discuss a proposal by Wayne Martin to build a dairy just outside the west city limits of Texico, near the Texico Cemetery.

More than 70 people attended the meeting to voice their feelings at the Texico Community Center. meeting was moved from City Hall due to the large turnout.

They were concerned with the new dairy causing various problems with odor, insects, dust, and most important the area water supply.

Letters addressed to the ground water pollution prevention section of the New Mexico Environment Department were handed out and asked to be returned.

Also, the question of the dairy lowering the cost of real estate was raised.

But the council's primary concern was the water sup-

Jim Paul, a citizen of Texico, stated, "I'm in the direct line of fire and I see how they lower our water supplies without leaving my yard."

However, although the vast majority of those present opposed the dairy, not all did.

Mark Howard gave the pro's of having a dairy here.

Farwell Mayor Jimmie Mace attended the meeting because he is concerned with the water supply in our area. He stated that he would help in any way he could to see that the permit for the proposed dairy does not go through.

The high point of this discussion came when councilman Oran Jay Autrey signed his letter to the environmental department and said, "Here's my letter. If you're with me to stop this, then give your letter to Teresa (Harth, the Texico city clerk)."

Some volunteered to go around the Twin Cities and explain what's going on and try to get as many people as possible to sign these letters to the environmental department.

Both City Halls will be taking letters through June 7.

All the letters will be sent to the New Mexico environmental deparment in asingle packet.

In other business the council:

-- Heard Autrey say that the city is ready to begin the process of annexing property along Avenue F.

City Attorney Ty Rudder will draw up a petition for annexation. There will also be a stipulation in the petition that states that landowners can continue to have livestock.

-- Discussed the possibilty of annexing non-contiguous property. It was said that the city cannot do so.

Autrey is working on a strip so that they are able to get to people outside the city



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
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### Sittin' in the Corner by Wade Carqile

After a while, Dermont would stoop to the ground and I would get excited, "Did you find something? What is it? Is it bear tracks?..." The questions would go on and on. "Shhhhhh! Be quiet!" Dermont sometimes didn't have much patience with me or Wilbur.

After a few minutes, Dermont would say, "I believe we're on the trail of some wild boars." Wilbur and me would get even more excited and begin pestering Dermont about the tracks.

"Just be patient and wait!" was all Dermont would ever say. We walked a little farther when wilbur saw some more tracks. "Hey Dermont, are these some more boar tracks?" Dermont would look at them and say, "I believe you're right, more boar tracks. Good work Wilbur." I looked at the tracks and could have swore they looked like the same tracks we were following last week, when we were hunting for birds.

A small insect, Lecanium scale, can pose a big threat to live oaks and now is the time to apply a pesticide to infested trees.

Lecanium scales are most prominent on twigs and small branches during the spring and early summer. A single infested twig may have more than 100 scales on it, although fewer scales are more commonly present.

These scales are hemispherical in shape and dark brown in color. They are about 1/8 to 1/4 inch in diameter.

Lecanium scales damage trees by reducting vitality and causing dieback of infested branches.

Heavily infested trees produce a sticky honeydew in late April which falls to the ground. While they are most damaging to live oaks, they occur also on red oaks. Eggs are produced underneath the hard-shelled female during the summer.

They migrate to twigs in the fall and overwinter there. There is only one generation a year.

Eggs are hatching now on the South Plains. Scale insects are most susceptible to control at this time, and insecticide treatments will be most effective if applied now.

Heavily infested trees may require two applications two

Insecticides recommended for control include cyflutin, orthene, dursban, sevin, malathion, and diazinon. Throrough coverage will improve effectiveness of sprays. Always read

and follow insecticide label instructions carefully

While carefully stepping over soem sticks, a convery of quail flew out of a bush nearby. It scared me and I hollered

"Now look what you've done. You've scared the wild boars away. I guess we'll have to find their trail tomorrow." I was embarrassed and ashamed. I tried apologizing to Dermont, but all he would say was "Don't worry about it, boy, am I getting hungry. Let's go back to the house and eat some chips."

Not one to argue with Dermont, I quickly agreed, as did Wilbur. On the way back, we asked Dermont, "How do you know the difference between boar tracks and other animals?" He'd reply, "it's simple. All you have to do is count the number of excursions in each paw print. A bear has four long protrusions in each paw, while a boar has four short ones. Birds, on the other hand, have three medium excursions in each foot. Possums and other anumals have from four to eight protrusions in each foot.

"You can tell them apart by the size of their palm prints, as well as the length of their legs..." Dermont would go on and on. I was amazed by his knowledge of animals. I loved going hunting with Dermont and Wilbur, except when Dermont said he was going hunting for chicks.

I always wondered why he would hunt for something he had in the hen house. What would be the fun and excitment in

Anyway, I still believed that Dermont was the greatest track star in our neighborhood when we were growing up.

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

## Growers try to stay ahead of the wind

Trying to stay ahead of the wind has been the most prevalent thought on most High Plains growers minds over the past week.

Dry weather has combined with record high temperatures and strong winds to make planting conditions less than ideal, even in irrigated fields.

Irrigated acreage, which accounts for about half of the High Plains' 3.75 million cotton acres, is estimated to be about 70% planted, while non-irrigated acreage is still only 20-25% planted.

Overall, the High Plains is expected to eventually plant between 3.75 and 4 million acres of cotton in 2000.

For the most part growers have lost the battle to stop freshly planted acreage from blowing and will have to wait and see whether or not the damage inflicted was severe enough to warrant replanting.

Many growers have started up irrigation systems in an effort to keep the ground moist enough to sustain newly emerged plants and to allow effective countermeasures to be implemented.

Typically, that means roughening the soil surface through tillage, or the use of sand fighters, to create clods that prevent soil from becoming airborne.

'In some extreme cases growers have reported freshly planted fields where the wind has removed so much soil from the top row that it is hard to tell which way the rows were originally laid out.

In these situations only two options exist: replant; or put soil back over the seed and hope for a normal emergence.

It saddens me that Lazbuddie made this exception. I have always been proud my child was there. He's had opportunities that he would not have had at a larger school, but my child and his graduating class was placed second behind graduation of a college elsewhere. Something that should not, but has affected the Class of 2000 graduation.

None of the class members I have spoken with are happy about this decision, either. Changing graduation day was wrong! Diplomas were already printed with the now incorrect date
