Bobby Winegeart has surgery date established

Bobby Winegeart of Texico has been scheduled for his surgery on Nov. 10.

He will leave for Ecuador on Nov. 7 and will return on Nov.


Bobby's mother, Linda Thompson, called the Tribune to report that his date for surgery has been set and that he'll also have to undergo an additional surgery on his left hip.

Bobby will have to have a total hip replacement a week to nine days after his spinal surgery. The hip replacement was decided upon by Dr. Carl Kao, the spinal surgeon, after reviewing recent x-rays of Bobby. An orthopedic surgeon will travel to Ecuador from Idaho to do the surgery.

"This makes for additional costs for Bobby, but it's the only way that he'll be able to walk again after the surgery," Linda

Payne pulls over truck; county picks up \$16,000

It was one of those once-in-a-lifetime traffic stops for Parmer County Chief Deputy Sheriff Keith Payne last Friday

He pulled over a truck that was speeing along the Amarillo nighway as it approached the Texas-New Mexico state line.

When he interviewed the driver, from El Paso, and the codriver, from the Dominican Republican, he found inconsistencies in their stories. So he got approval from them for Flip,

the county drug-sniffing dog, to check out the truck's interior. Flip starting barking when he came across two items -- a briefcase and a satchel, said Payne. Inside each were \$8,000 --

Payne noted that Flip can smell items which contain traces of narcotics.

Payne said the two drivers signed a disclaimer turning over the \$16,000 to Parmer County, and they were sent on their way. No arrests were made or charges brought.

County Sheriff Gary Blair said the money will enter the sheriff's department seizure fund. After a court hearing, a formality, the money will be used by his office for equipment and/or training.

County finances improve

There was excellent news to report from the annual audit report presented by Kirkland, Kirkland & Co., CPA, at the Parmer County Commissioners' meeting on Monday.

For much of the 1990s, the county's financial picture was weak, as expenditures outweighed receipts.

This financial situation finally got turned around in 1998 when general fund receipts outstripped expendi-

tures by about \$76,000. The report for 1999 was even stronger. The audit showed general fund receipts at \$1,434,362, with expenditures at \$1,349,416 -- \$85,000

to the good. Taking a look at the overall county picture, it even looks better. In 1999, revenues were about \$271,000 stronger than expenditures.

So the county ended the year with reserves of \$1,805,323. This was about \$257,000 more than what the county started with at the beginning of 1999.

One belongs to the Farwell Schools, for \$13,296; and the other is pro-rated among the county's four schools, for \$18,800.

-- Some auditing deficiencies were noted (but corrections have already been made to some). These include the minutes of commissioners' meetings not being detailed enough; docket books incomplete in some county offices; certain contracts expiring and no evidence of re-



Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor,

We have all seen or experienced smog in large cities, such as Dallas, Albuquerque, Los Angeles, or New York. The air is brown, has an odor that defies description, and it makes the eyes water and burn. How often does a small community have to deal with such trauma? The answer lies below.

On any given evening, in Farwell, Texas, or Texico, New Mexico, the air can be a musty brown, with the distinctive odor of manure mixed with dust; or it can be a near total brown-out situation as is often seen in dust storms. The cause? Two feed yards situated less than two miles south of town. During the daytime hours, the dust and stench is not as bad as during the evening hours. Evenings, when the cattle are being fed, the animals mill around more, creating a cloud of dust that fills the air for as far away as ten miles.

This cloud of dust and stench that hangs over the two communities of Texico and Farwell is dangerous. Allergies, asthma, and other breathing difficulties can arise from this pollution. Our Environmental Protection Agency wants to clean up the air, and while only a few thousand people are affected in this region -- as compared to millions in the big city -- a good place to begin would be here, in the western Panhandle towns of Texico and Farwell.

Imagine putting in an eight-hour day at work, stopping by daycare to pick up your child, and then rushing home -- to smell the feed yards! A back yard barbeque is out of the question. Who wants to eat while smelling cow manure and breathing dust? People in these two towns are prisoners in their own homes on days when the dust and wind are especially bad.

Driving between the two feed yards, even with all vents closed and blowers turned off is unpleasant enough. The smell and dust infiltrate every crack and crevice. Clothes often collect the odors, even in the few minutes it takes to pass between these two lots. Imagine wearing an evening gown,

driving into town or to Amarillo for some event, and arriving smelling of manure and dust. Not a pretty thought! Imagine how a person in a convertible, with the top down, must feel. No matter how this issue is seen, first and foremost, it is a hazard to health, property, and vehicles. There have been times when the dust is so thick, that driving through with the lights on, the visibility is less than three feet. This is an accident-causing environment, and one will happen if something is not done.

Before one says that this is the problem of these two communities, though, the facts should be looked at. Extensive care for those with allergies and asthma, or other medical illnesses that are worsened by this dust and stench are usually paid for, in part, by the general public. This means you. Your tax dollars go to help subsidize the healthcare of many of these individuals -- no matter in which state you live. Tax dollars go, also, to keep in repair, a road that is sometimes not safe to drive on, and always unpleasant to traverse. Not only that, but which communities will be affected next? Will this dust cloud and horrible smell work its way further north as the feed yards expand? Most probably. Will your community be next? Likely, if you live north or northeast of Farwell or Texico. People laugh and say the smell is that of money -- but at whose expense? The five-year-old who develops severe asthma because of this dust and odor? Or the elderly person who cannot sit on the porch in the evenings because the air is too thick to breathe? Are you the next victim? Or is it someone you love or care about?

Financial Focus by Glen O'Rear

Adequate savings are a vital part of financial security. If you don't have about six months' worth of living expenses saved up, t hen you may need to dip into your investments to pay for emergencies or unexpected situations. And when you're forced to tap into your investments, you're hurting their ability to grow for the future which means less money for your long-term goals, such as

To make sure you have the savings you need, try "paying yourself" first. From every paycheck, put away a designated amount of money into a savings vehicle that offers safety and accessibility. To make it easier on yourself, have your bank deposit the money directly. You can, of course, put your emergency savings in a passbook account, but you may want to consider money market funds instead. These funds are highly liquid, and they pay a better rate of return than a basic passbook savings account. Furthermore, rising interest rates over the past several month have resulted in higher yields for money market funds.

If you are ever forced to reach into your investments to provide emergency funds, do so as carefully as possible. For example, you may be tempted to take out a loan from your 401K. You can typically get the money quickly, and you'll be paying yourself back, with interest. Making this move usually isn't ideal, because you're probably better off leaving the money in your 401K, where it will grow on a tax-deferred basis. On the other hand, taking out a 401K loan may more sense than liquidating a growth-oriented mutual fund. This move can be especially harmful if your fund's value happens to be temporarily down. As a general rule, you don't want to sell mutual fund shares when the price has fallen sharply.

You also may be able to get emergency funds from other investment vehicles. Some types of insurance policies have loan provisions, and you can make taxfree, penalty-free withdrawals from your Roth IRA under certain circumstances.

I was surprised at the level of questioning they did. With Varig I had three interviews, one in English and two in Portuguese. The job offer still stands with both airlines but I must wait until I am 21 to start international flights.

While I have not yet decided the plans for my future I do know that the giant country with even bigger hearts is included. I can see myself there one day helping the economy that is growing and bettering everyday and loving every min-

I also took Meghan to Rio de Janeiro where it was freezing, or so they thought since it was winter (82 degrees). We went to the beach, the zoo and exploring whatever came our way. I returned to Belo Horizonte for another interview and Meghan wanted to go to Sao Paulo, the 5th largest city in the

I had my doubt about letting her, if you recall I was in a car accident there in May of 1999 and didn't take a liking to the city very well -- and neither did Meghan. She came back telling stories of pollution and too many cars.

I just smiled and told her it was another experience for her to add to her journal. I could hardly believe it had almost been a month and my time was almost up. I tried my hardest to find ways to stay but there were too many obstacles and I figured it was God's way of saying "Be patient my child you will be here permanently sooner than you can imagine."

Not to mention it was almost time for my grandmother's 80th birthday and I had so many things to help prepare for.

Meghan cried and I stepped back and looked at the people and the country that loved us so much. They opened their arms every time I come and I can't imagine how they are so loving.

Maybe we can all learn a lesson from them. Even though the differences between people and their lives are so great, we can love each other with that same amount of difference. I guess I will write again on my return visit. I hope all of you enjoy my letters and learn to live with open minds and hearts. Thanks for all your support,

Farwell School Board keeps tax rate the same

The Farwell School Board on Tuesday unanimously approved a budget of \$3,618,767 for the coming school year.

Supt. Lary Gregory said the total is about \$422,000 less than last year's.

It was cut due to fewer students enrolling, and the fact that the board did not want to increase the tax rate.

The proposed tax rate will stay the same -- \$1.24 1/2 per \$100 assessed valuation.

Gregory said Monday's enrollment showed 493 students -- down 20 from the end of the last school year.

Here is how the cutbacks will be handled:

-- Funds for a new track were taken out.

-- No money has been budgeted for new vehicles.

-- Four veteran teachers who retired were replaced with four first-year teachers.

-- 10 percent across the board cuts were made in lineitem budgets, like supplies, for example.

-- No funds are appropriated this year for new computer hardware. Since May, 25 new computers have been

purchased, though.

-- The band program was discontinued, with a savings of about \$70,000.

However, Gregory stressed that if students had shown an interest in participating in the band program, it would have been kept.

"Money was not the reason for ending this program," he



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
