Texico to repair damaged alleys

The Texico City Council on Nov. 24 discussed repairing alleys that need to have their surfaces built up.

Mayor Marie Christian reported that the city can buy bottom ash for \$3 a ton from SPS's Tolk Plant near Sudan.

City officials will now contact Duncan Disposal, who handles the city's trash pickup, to see if they will pick up the bottom ash and deliver it to Texico.

Duncan, which received permission from the city earlier this year, to put its trash containers in the city's alleys, said at that time it would help if it could if problems arise from the new pickup method.

Mrs. Christian said some alleys are "getting real bad ... we need to move on this."

She wants the bottom ash brought to Texico and stockpiled. Then city employees can do the dirt work, followed by placing the bottom ash.

She wants the alleys in the worst shape to be worked on first. About \$7,000 is available now for this project.

A list of the "worse alleys" was carried in the Nov. 13 issue of the Tribune.

In other business, the council:

-- Received a report from councilman Rick Queener on the planned paving of Avenue F. If contracts are not okayed by Dec. 16, the state grant will be lost.

Queener said the engineering plans are done and will be presented to the Curry County Commissioners at their next meeting for approval -- so the state deadline can be met.

He said the county plans to make the road 24-ft. wide as long as they don't go on anyone's private property.

The road will slope to the north and a ditch will be put in.

-- Councilmen Queener and Dean Henninger are looking at small dump trucks for possible purchase by the city.

-- Approved city marshal Kelley Brophy attending a school in December in Las Vegas, Nev., on advanced homicide investigation.

The city will pay his actual expenses.

-- Okayed Brophy's request that the part-time clerk for the police department and municipal court have her hours increased from a maximum of 20 a week to a maximum of 27 a week. Also her salary was raised to not to exceed \$6.50 an hour.

Carolyn Johnson is the clerk.

-- Heard that Abel Navarette has had his time expired in which to move his trailers. A letter will be sent.

-- Received appraisals on the properties which may be involved in a transfer between

the city and To and From Bus Co.

Bus company head Rick Queener has proposed that the city buy his building on South Garwood and use as a new city shop building.

As part of the deal, the city would sell Queener property just north of Rip's Western Wear.

Mrs. Christian said the bus company property was appraised at \$60,000; the city property north of Rip's at \$15,000, and the city property north of Citizens Bank at \$12,000.

The city is interested in this deal since it doesn't have enough money to construct a new city shop building.

The matter was discussed in executive session following the open meeting.

In order for the deal to be approved, it must be supported by Mrs. Christian and councilmen Eddie Dunsworth and Oran Jay Autrey.

The other two councilmen - Queener and Henninger, work at the bus company and thus will not be allowed to vote on any transaction with the city.

Cotton crop looks fairly good

The rains and high winds that have hit the area have been the two problems that area cotton farmers have had to deal with in getting their cotton crops to the gins this year.

But with these problems, the crop is looking like it will produce as much, if not a little more than area producers brought in last season.

"The rains hurt the quality of the cotton, but the yields are staying up," stated Doyle Johnson, manager of the Farwell Gin. "We're going to be ginning more cotton than we did last year, from what we're seeing so far."

"The high winds blew out

quite a bit of cotton around the Lazbuddie area," reported Sandy Gregory at the North Lazbuddie Gin. "Many of the farmers have gotten the crews in with the equipment that can pick the cotton up that was blown off, so they're not losing as much as they would have."

The North Lazbuddie Gin expects to gin at least as much cotton as they did last year. However, the gin had baled 12,400 bales as of Nov. 30. That is an increase of over 3,400 bales since Dec. 1 of last year.

Folks at Muleshoe Cooperative Gin report that they

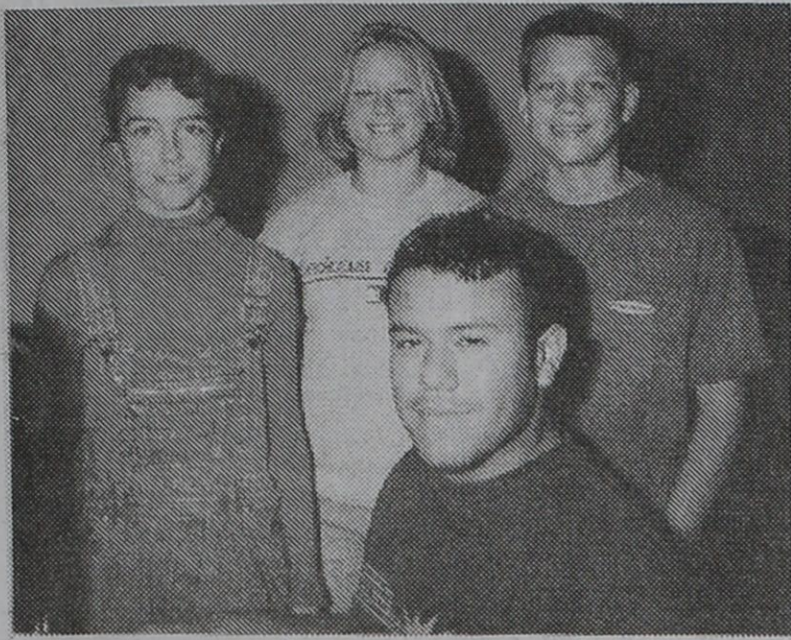

# Welcome to SHOT'S CHRISTMAS WONDERLAND

When I first moved to the area about 11 years ago, I was told that a visit to Shot's Winter Wonderland was a mandatory part of the holiday season.

The lights, the music, the displays and the chill in the air just seem to make the magic of the season more complete.

"Complete" is a word that only begins to describe the show at Shot's Winter Wonderland. Perhaps this is due to the fact that it is a Glen Shot project. He's the type of guy that can't do anything just half-way.

"If I'm going to do something, I'm going to do it big," confessed Glen.

The Christmas light display began 17 years ago at Shot's home on Cherry Drive in Clovis. The first display was a snowman in the yard with lights all over the trees and the house. It is now much more than that.

"I can't even begin to tell you how many lights we now put up, but I can tell you I buy at least 200 to 300 boxes of lights a year," said Glen. "The work begins about 2 months before we open, so in late September, early October, we're up in the trees, on the roof and cleaning out the barn to start setting up the displays."

Glen hires his sons Mike and Mark to help in putting the lights up each year. He is also helped by his longtime companion, Diane Jacobs.

"Diane works all day at her regular job and then works until late at night designing displays, arranging them and making things just right," said Glen. "I couldn't do all of this without her."

Two years ago, the Winter Wonderland opened up a heated barn with multiple displays in order to provide a place for the elderly and those that just can't take the cold night air, to enjoy the lights and decorations. This has been a great addition and has allowed for groups from the area nursing homes to be brought out to the festive setting.

When the Clovis Christmas Light Parade started back up a few years ago, Glen invited all the float participants to park their floats out at the compound.

"The groups work so hard to put a lighted float together, I thought it would be neat for them to show their work off for more time than just the parade," Glen commented. "They add a little more to the display, too."

Shot's Winter Wonderland has been an area tradition for the past 17 years, but for two of those years, was unable to

operate due to the high costs of electricity and other utilities for the month long display.

"The decision to not put up lights for those two years was very hard on me," Glen stated. "I felt like a bad guy

taking away something wonderful from the little kids especially."

Glen just couldn't bear not doing the lights, so he tried to get financial help from area businesses, the Chamber and utility companies. Incredibly, the response to his plight was not very good.

"I'd get a little bit here and there, but most do not realize how much it costs to have the lights on and to have fuel for the heaters," Glen said. "Right now, I'm still paying off the electricity bill from the display last year! I really had to think long and hard about doing it again this year. I'm just hoping that folks will come through with some good donations."

Conway Oil will supply the heating oil for the heaters in the barn and a handful of individuals and businesses have made financial donations to help defray the cost of the lights. Glen Shot is very appreciative of these people and businesses and is hoping that the good will of the community will continue. Sadly however, it is looking like this may be the last year for Shot's Winter Wonderland.

"I cannot keep paying out of my own pocket for the display because it is just too expensive," explained Glen. "I don't mean to sound petty or selfish, but it's just a fact. I don't like the idea of charging folks to see the display, but in order to keep it going, I may have to do something like that."

This year, Shot will try to collect money by placing large donation barrels out around the display areas.

The Winter Wonderland will officially open on Dec. 6 at 5:30 p.m. mst with choral performances by the Cannon Air Force Base Chapel choirs. The lights will be turned on at 6 p.m. mst.

### Recipe of Week

Antipasto Pasta Cakes With Tomato Rosemary Salsa

- Tomato rosemary salsa:  
1 can (15 oz.) Italian style stewed tomatoes, drained, chopped  
8 dried tomato halves packed in oil, drained, chopped  
1/2 tsp. minced fresh rosemary  
1/4 tsp. ground red pepper

- Pasta cakes:  
1 cup cooked, drained orzo or other small pasta  
1 cup chopped CARANDO Pepperoni  
1 cup CARANDO Genoa Salami  
1/2 cup shredded CARANDO Provolone Cheese  
1/2 cup chopped red onion  
1/2 cup fine dry bread crumbs  
1 tsp. Italian herb seasoning

# Sinter Klaas and Swarte Piet are waiting for you

Ben and Mary Mesman and members of their family share a little international flavor of the holiday with many of their Parmer County neighbors.

Ben and Mary came to the United States from Holland and spent their first Christmas in this country in 1959. They moved to the Oklahoma Lane area from California in 1968.

Though far from the land where they were born, the Mesman's have long kept Dutch traditions alive with their own local celebration of Saint Nicholas Day in early December.

In recent years, the Mesman's began inviting friends and neighbors to join them in celebrating the fun and festive Dutch tradition of greeting "Sinter Klaas" and "Swarte Piet" at their dairy farm near Oklahoma Lane.

"We don't run Saint Nicholas Day and Christmas together. The Dutch tradition is that Saint Nick Day, Dec. 6, is a fun holiday, and Christmas is the observance of a holy day," says Mary.

The ritual of Santa Claus coming in the dark of night to bestow gifts is the North American commemoration of Saint Nicholas, a saintly and generous bishop of the third century. Legend held that St. Nicholas was so enamored by the gift of the Christ Child that Nicholas became accustomed to going in the secret of the night and gratuitously throwing bags of gold into the homes of the poor, or as anonymous ransom for prisoners and slaves.

In Holland, St. Nicholas is called "Sinter Klaas." On the eve of the feast of Saint Nicholas, Dec. 6, Dutch children put their wooden shoes near the fireplace and stuff them with

hay and carrots, so that Sinter Klaas can feed his horse.

If the children have been good, they will find presents the next morning. The gifts have been left by Sinter Klaas and his helper, or helpers, "Swarte Piet" (Black Pete).

Sinter Klaas can also make public appearances at this time and brings treats in his bag for all the boys and girls that have been good. Swarte Piet warns youngsters to be good and deals with children that have not been good. Mary says that if a child has been especially bad, Black Pete may even pick them up and stash them in his pack.

For the feast of St. Nicholas, Mary keeps traditional treats on hand - Dutch chocolate in the shape of the first letter of each person's name, windmill cookies, marzipan - a sweet confection like almond paste that can be shaped into holiday figures, pepernoten - a fruit-flavored sort of marshmallowy substance and speculaas brokken with almonds formed into dolls.

"About three years ago, I thought it would be neat to have some close friends and neighbors over for a little observance for the Feast of Saint Nick, and then neighbors started coming to see some of the decorations we put up about the holiday," says Mary.

Two years ago, Mary and her daughter-in-law Teresa decided to have a full-fledged St. Nicholas Day open house at the farm. Doves of people flocked to Ben and Mary's home for the observance.

"When we came to this country, we had a hard time adapting to the saying 'Dutch Treat.' In this country, that means you pay for yourself, but it was hard for us to take it that way. In Holland, it means we are the hosts and it's not necessary for the guests to bring anything. In that regard, you could certainly say that our St. Nicholas Day open house is Dutch treat!" says Mary.

After the uproar of the open house, the Mesman's and their family hold their own celebration of St. Nicholas Day in the evening with a meal and gift exchange.

"We celebrate the Feast of St. Nicholas separate from Christmas, the birthday of Christ. No gifts are exchanged on Christmas Day. We attend Midnight Mass and then have a family dinner together. I think it's better this way, observing St. Nicholas Day and keeping Christmas a religious holy day," says Mary.

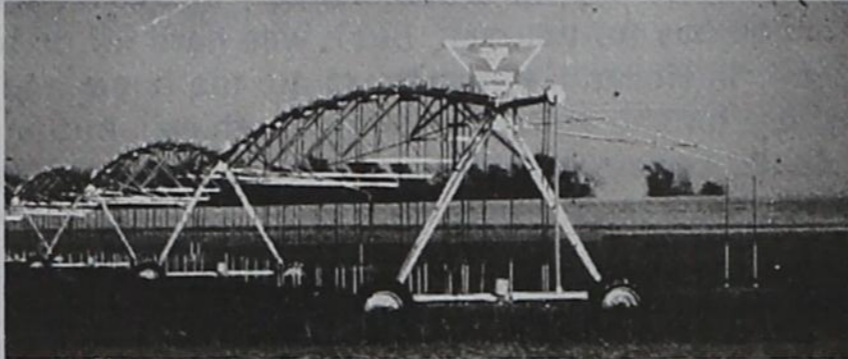
