The Barnes family is an outstanding family in our community. And for me to hurt them by publication of an article that could have been left out of the paper troubles me deeply.

When I say my apology to them is sincere, there should be no doubt. It was my error in judgment and for that I stand accountable. I pray their forgiveness.

State Report Card

Farwell, Lazbuddie Schools produce academic upgrades

The Texas Education Agency on Monday released its annual accountability ratings and Farwell and Lazbuddie schools showed major academic increases over what already had been excellent standings.

The rating system goes in this order: exemplary is first, followed by recognized, acceptable, with "low performing" as last.

Lazbuddie's report card was "exemplary" while Farwell's was "recognized."

Last year, both schools were rated "recognized." It's very difficult for a small school to achieve exemplary status because every sub-group has to score 90 percent or higher. For example, if just one student in a school system does poorly, exemplary status is lost.

Both Lazbuddie School Supt. Hardy Carlyle and Farwell School Supt. Larry Gregory congratulated their teachers and students on these academic achievements.

Farwell

High school -- exemplary for the fifth consecutive year.
Junior high school -- exemplary, up one notch from recognized last year.

Elementary school -- recognized, also up a notch, from acceptable last year.

Thus, two of Farwell's three rankings improved this year. Rankings are based on student test scores and drop out rates.

Here's a look at the TAAS (Texas Assessment of Academic Skills) results by school:

High school -- reading, 100 percent, up from 90.7 percent last year; math, 95.7 percent, down from 100 percent; and writing, 100 percent, up from 95.3 percent.

Junior high school -- reading, 97.2 percent, down slightly from 97.8 percent; math, 97 percent, up from 93.3 percent; and writing, 100 percent, up from 96.9 percent.

Elementary school -- reading, 87 percent, down from 95.6 percent; math, 89.8 percent, up from 85.4 percent; and writing, 92.9 percent, up from 91.9 percent.

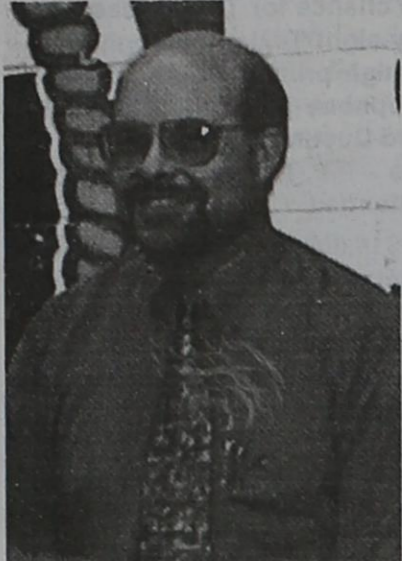
"I'm very excited about the TAAS results," said Supt. Gregory.

Lazbuddie

Lazbuddie has one campus (kindergarten through 12th grade) which makes it extremely tough to gain exemplary status. But that is exactly what the school did this year, improving from "recognized" last year.

Lazbuddie's TAAS scores were: reading, 97.3 percent, up from 92.7 percent; math, 96.2 percent, down from 96.3 percent, and writing, 100 percent, up from 94.4 percent.

TAAS scores are taken from students in grades 3 through 8 and 10.

Texico Schools begin plans for a new gym, academic learning center

The Texico School Board on Aug. 12 began the process of a long-range building plan which could include a new varsity gymnasium and an academic learning center.

Supt. R.L. Richards said the board wants the views of the community toward these proposals. If the response is positive, the board may look toward a bond election in 2001 or 2002. "This is a long-range plan," Richards stressed.

Texico Schools currently are paying for the last bond issue, which will expire in 2003. If the board goes ahead with these early plans, there would not be an overlap -- the new bond would begin after the current one ends.

Richards noted the difficulty of planning years ahead on academics, pointing out the great changes the past 10 years have brought. But he believes an academic learning center would help keep up with rapidly changing technology. He foresees more Internet-connected learning.

As an example, he said he visited a center in a Colorado school which integrated a science lab with computers and more fundamental library aides.

As for a new gymnasium, he noted that in 1990 then-Supt. James Pierce had suggested it. Meanwhile, the "old gym" -- a wooden quonset hut -- is not getting any younger.

If a new gym would be built, it would be constructed adjacent to the current locker rooms. When the football field was replaced a few years ago, it was done with the idea of leaving enough space for a new gym.

It also was pointed out that a bigger gym would be great to

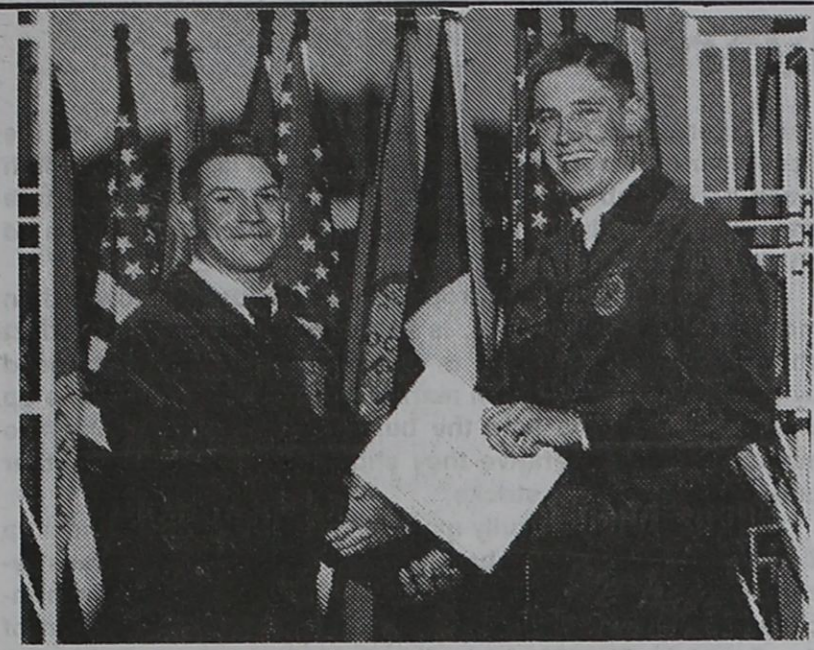

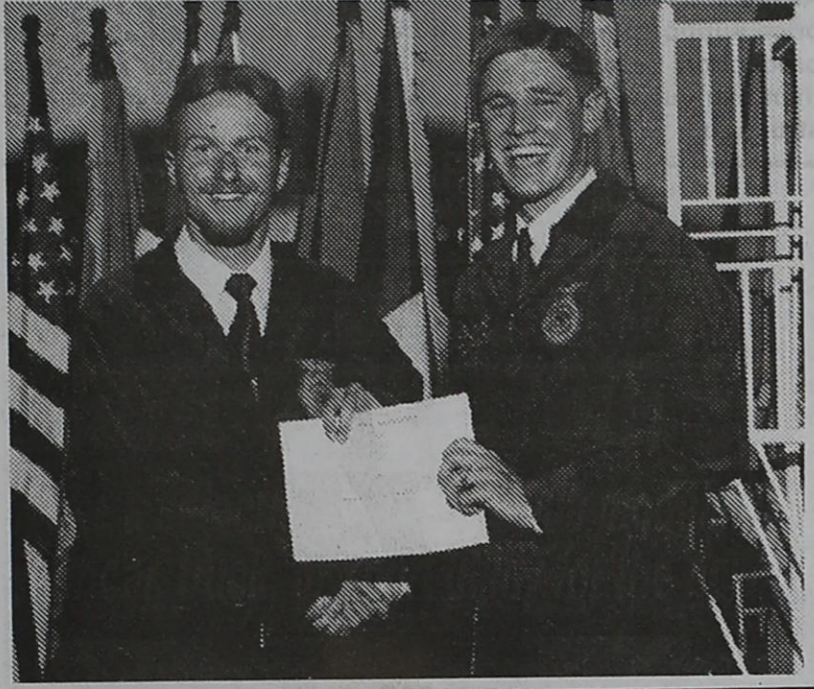

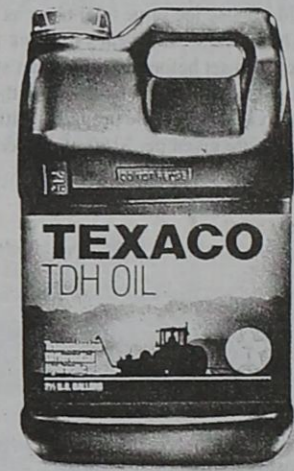

Cotton crop statistics given

The Texas Agricultural Statistics Service (TASS) released its first attempt at putting a figure on the 1999 cotton crop Aug. 12. In its report the TASS estimated that Texas High Plains cotton production would be just over 3 million bales in 1999.

The High Plains figure represents estimated production from 2.88 million harvested acres. Total US cotton production (Upland and Pima) was forecast at 18.3 million bales by the National Agricultural Statistics Service.

The TASS estimate indicates that the High Plains region has accounted for as much as 80 percent of the states abandoned cotton acreage thus far, some 720,000 acres in reporting districts 1-N and 1-S. Overall, Texas has an estimated 900,000 cotton acres that will not be carried to harvest.

Beltwide, Thursday's Upland Cotton Crop estimate of 17.6 million bales was regarded as bullish and helped push New

York futures prices higher by as much as 1.67 cents on the December contract. How long the rally will last and how high it can go is anybody's guess. Overall a week demand picture and a large worldwide cotton supply is expected to keep a lid on prices in the near term.

The fact that a bullish crop report, considerably lower than most industry projections, is likely to create only a modest short-term spike in prices is evidence of the desperate need by producers for all cotton market building programs to be up and running by the time the bulk of the US crop comes to market. If fully operative they should help prevent a further building of carryover stocks.

One key to successfully marketing the 1999 crop is the step 2 program, which could be reinstated soon after congress reconvenes in September. Money for the program has been included in a supplementary relief package approved as part of the Senate's FY2000 Agricultural Appropriations Bill. The program may not prop prices up more than a few cents domestically but should encourage the purchase of more US cotton abroad.

Another key is modification of the current marketing loan gain/Loan Deficiency Payment (LDP) payment limit structure. As it stands now many producers cannot receive the minimum price support level this program could provide on all of their production because they can grow more pounds of cotton than can currently receive payments under the payment limit structure.

Farwell's valuation up more than \$2 million

The Farwell City Council on Tuesday approved a budget for 1999-2000 which calls for a tax rate of .4086 cents, down slightly from this year's .4111 cent (per \$100 assessed valuation) rate.

The council was able to do this because Parmer County Appraisal District honchos Ron Proctor and Curby Brantley gave a presentation noting that Farwell city valuation was up more than \$2 million.

In other business, the council:

- Accepted TML health insurance rates for 1999-2000.

- Okayed a building permit for Carlos Saenz at 404 7th St. (a garage).

- Held a lengthy discussion with Farwell EMS Director Aloha Fulcher that included the following decisions:

(1) The "old" 1979 ambulance was decertified, meaning it will no longer be used.

This is a major financial

savings because the EMS Service no longer needs to supply this vehicle.

(2) The "new" 1989 ambulance is having problems, such as with its steering, and EMS officials will look into any possible state grants.

A new "cheap" ambulance costs at least \$75,000.

There aren't enough available ambulance personnel to run two ambulances, and Texico will be called for backup if necessary.

(3) The city will reimburse Wade Cargile expenses for taking EMT classes in Muleshoe to get certification.

(4) The EMT service has purchased five radios, and they are working well.

(5) A new state regulation involving drug keeping means that the EMS Service needs to probably buy a refrigerator.

(6) Approved buying a computer for the EMS Service for filing reports with the state - if this is the route Mrs. Fulcher feels they need to go.

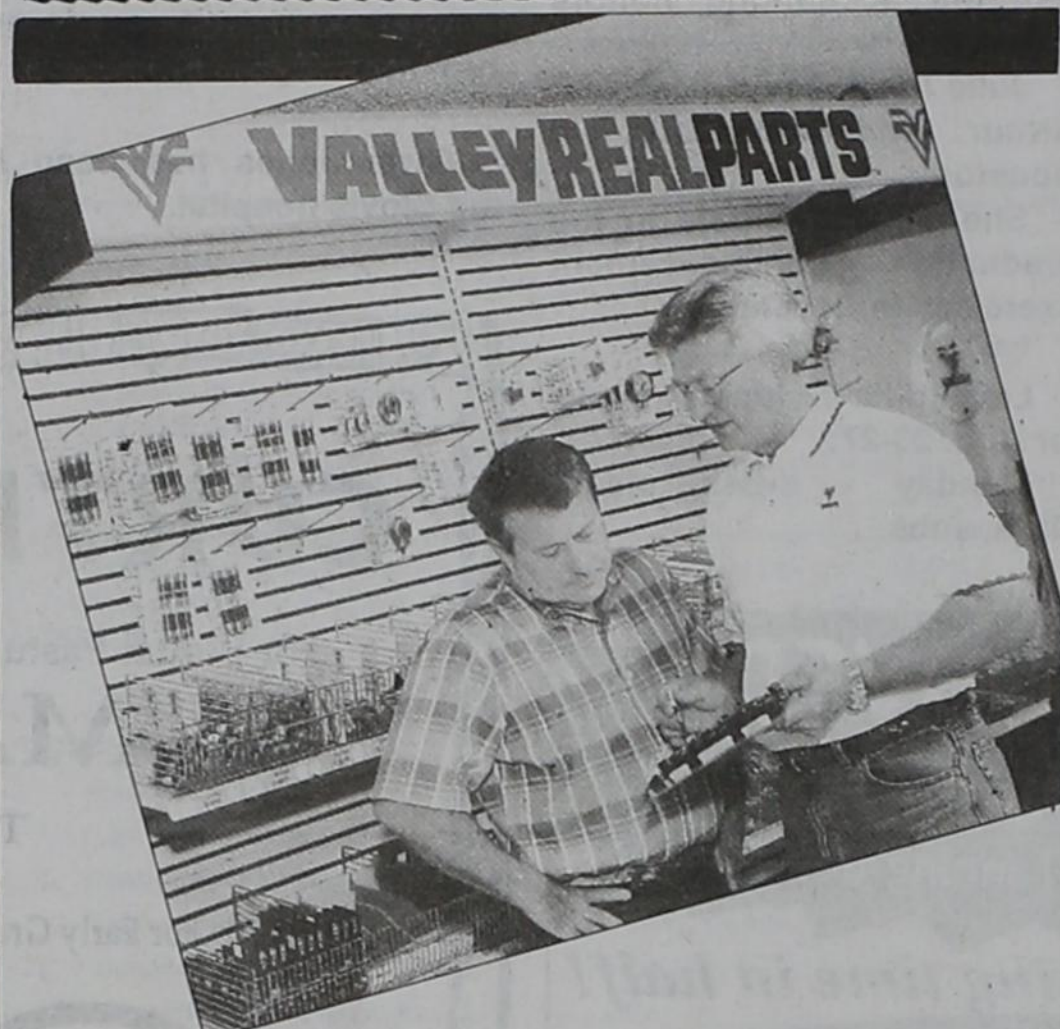

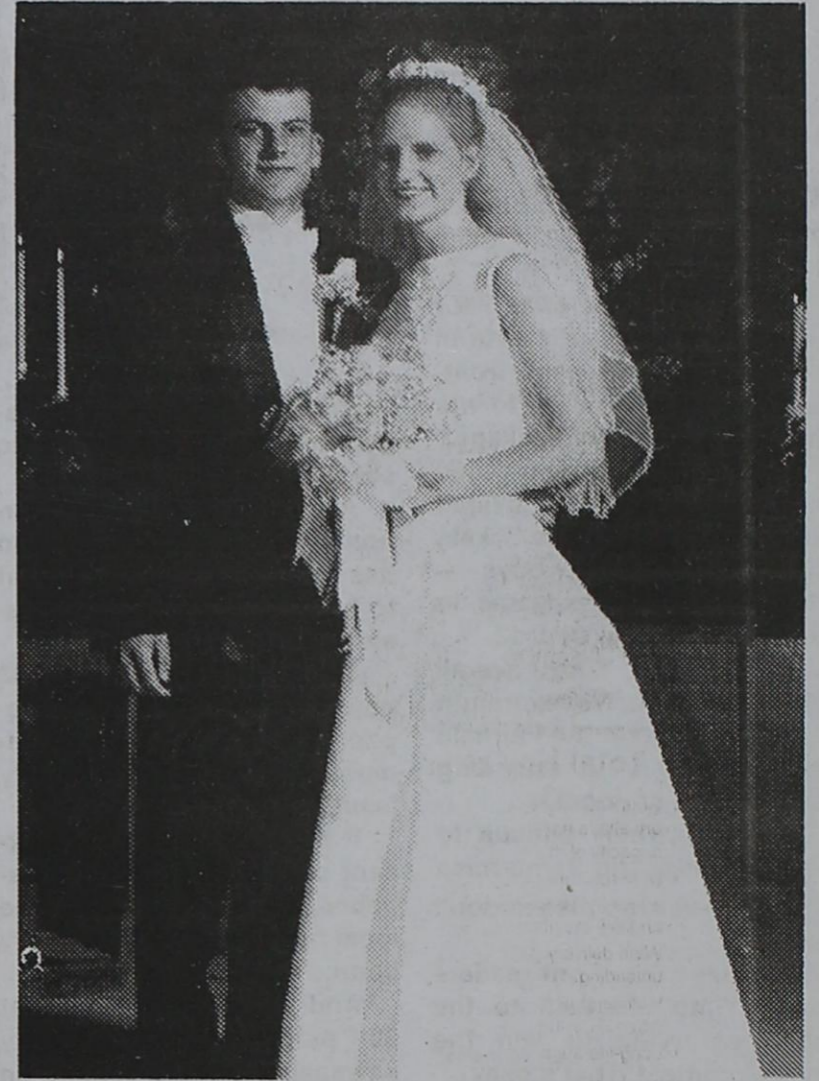

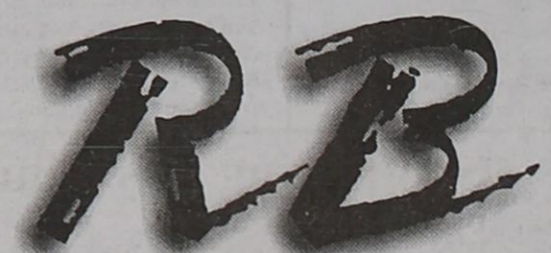
