Tieing for first were Helton Oil Co. and Mark Owen. Both were 19 off the tie breaker.

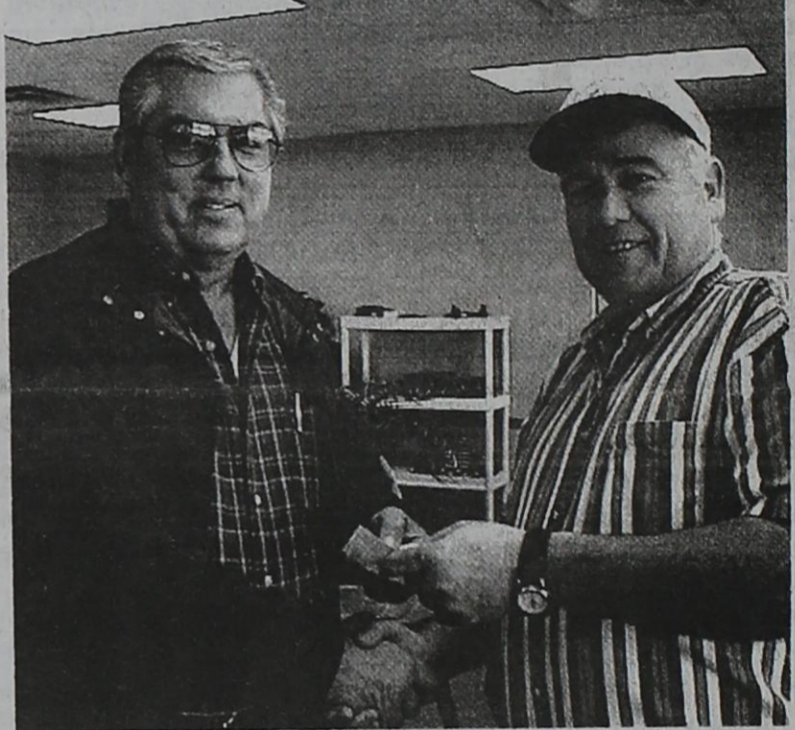

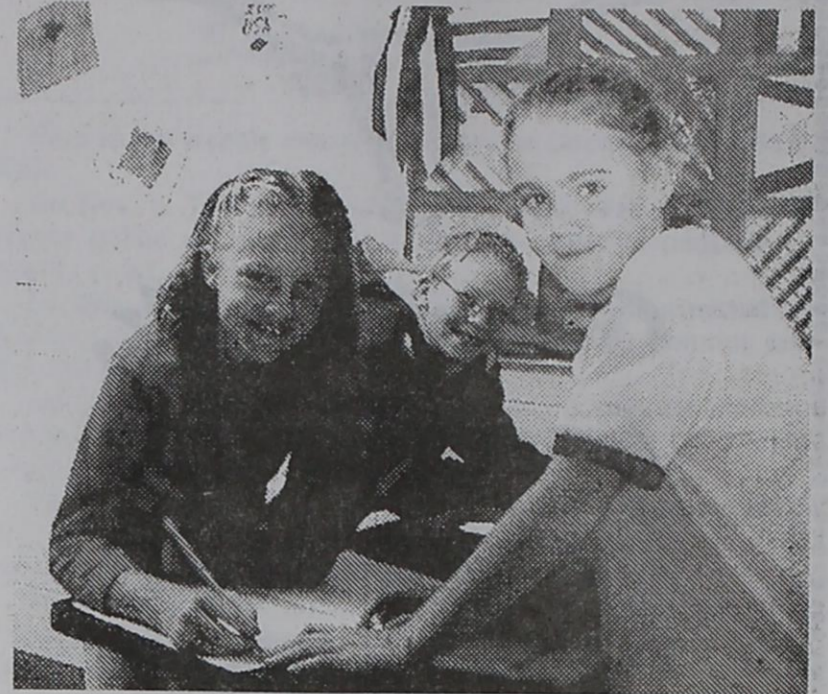
**Rhea-Hollene Fire Department plans fund-raiser auction**

Proceeds will go toward truck upkeep and to complete a 2,000 gallon tanker in the works.

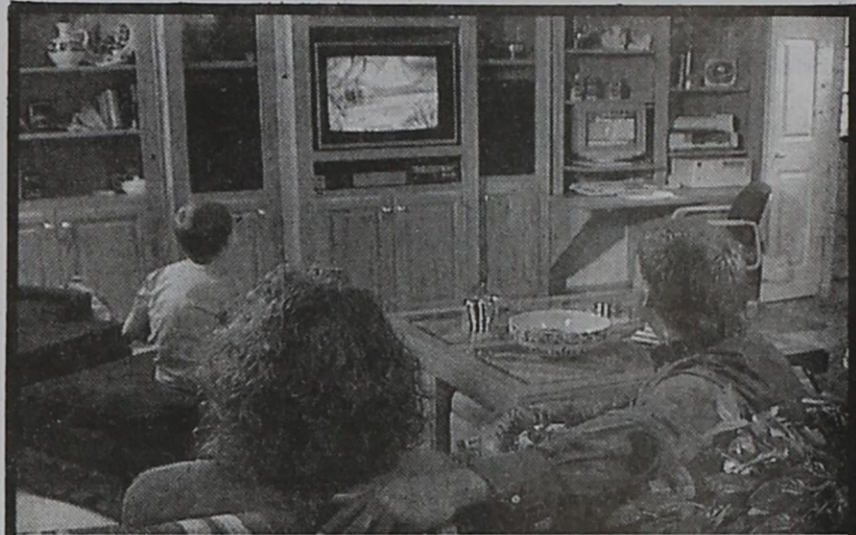

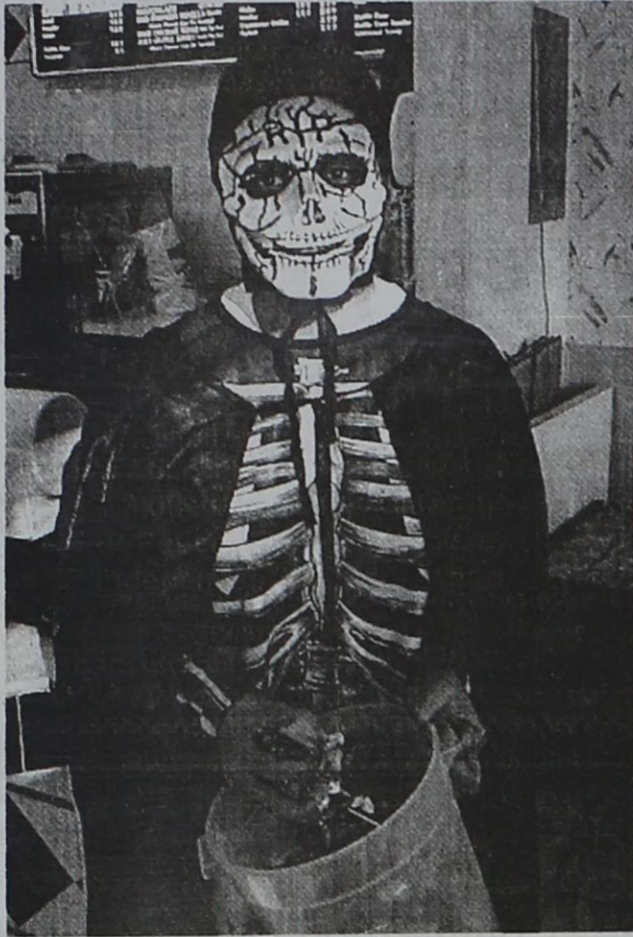
# New calf service opens in our area

If you've driven around eastern New Mexico or down the highway towards Lubbock, you've no doubt seen the big dairy farms that are now in operation or that are in the process of being built.

These mega-dairies are first class operations that require stringent management and superior animal maintenance and care. One aspect of these dairies are the number of baby calves being born on a daily basis.

The calves are the future of each of these operations and with the focus toward milk production, too many times, the calf operation is put on the back burner for attention.

Monica Rivas, of Farwell, an employee at the Burger King in Texico was dressed appropriately for Halloween on Tuesday as she passed out candies to kiddies who stopped at the restaurant.

Because of this, three local businessmen and stockmen have capitalized on the situation and are available to these dairies for a very unique, and much needed, service.

Calf-Trac calf ranch is the brainchild of Don Oppliger, Jim Abacherli and Bryon Luce. Calf-Trac is now open for business and has the capability of housing 2200 calves in hutches and 1300 in run pens. It is located northwest of the Clovis Airport, midway between the Airport Road and the Pleasant Hill Highway.

Jim Abacherli and Don Oppliger are partners on a 3000 cow dairy located just north of the calf ranch and they saw the need for quality care and raising of the calves about a year and a half ago. Their dairy has it's own calves to raise and through Jim's management and expertise, the calf program caught the attention of several dairymen.

The attention to cleanliness, feedings and calf health culminated in the idea to offer the same strict care to calves from other dairies. Calf ranches have been in operation for years in California, where Jim is from. He had first-hand knowledge of the ins-and outs of these operations and was able to help put together an ideal arrangement for this region.

One major step in putting together the calf operation was to find the perfect hands-on manager for the ranch. This person had to be an expert in the care and raising of baby dairy calves. This person was Bryon Luce.

Bryon had been working for the past 11 years for a dairy producer as his calf manager. He has a special touch with the calves and can spot problems before they get out of hand. He is a stickler for cleanliness and humane care and the three partners all agree that effective communication between themselves and the producers they are serving is a crucial factor in the overall success of raising strong, healthy and productive dairy heifers.

The program works by a producer contacting Calf-Trac and requesting service for their dairy. The calves are picked up each day and brought to the calf ranch. They are then fed, watered, vaccinated, dehorned and tracked for 130 days. The calves are then delivered back to the dairy for the remainder of their growing period.

"One key to the success of the calf growing is the health of the mother cow that delivered the calf," Jim explained. "Because of this, we require that all cows must be pre-vaccinated with a vaccination program that we specify before we enter into business for the 130 days with the dairy."

This attention to the vaccination and pre-birth health will make a critical difference in the strength of the calf and its ability to fight disease, colds and other harmful elements. This, coupled with the stark cleanliness of the calf raising areas and daily upkeep of the hutches, pens, water and grain

buckets and milk bottles almost guarantees a healthy dairy heifer being delivered back to the producer after 130 days of care.

Another added benefit to the producers is that the heifer will come back to the dairy stanchion trained. This is a big factor in a dairy operation. If a heifer or cow is apprehensive or scared of the feeding stanchion area or the stanchion itself, then her feed intakes suffer. Because of the run pen structure and the staging of the calves from one area to another, the stanchion training is very subtle, yet very effective.

The Calf-Trac calf ranch is a very secure operation that has been designed with the producers confidence and calf security in mind.

The ranch sits on 40 acres and is surrounded by secure chain link fence. One has to enter through a locked gate only after calling ahead for clearance. This was done for security purposes but also for reasons of disease and infection control for the calves.

The hutch calves are only fed powdered milk replacer by bottle only. Bucket calves have been the norm for most dairies, but by bottle feeding, Jim and Bryon feel that this helps to break the disease cycle that calves are exposed to through other feeding options.

The ranch currently employs eight full time employees and will increase that number to 15 by the time the ranch is completely full and complete. The operation requires this many people for the attention to detail and calf care. Don and Jim's dairy houses 1100 calves and employees seven full time people for calf care alone.

"Calves are the future of all the dairies and we must all pay attention to them to assure good health, longevity and milk production," Jim stated. "Excellent herds start with excellent calves."

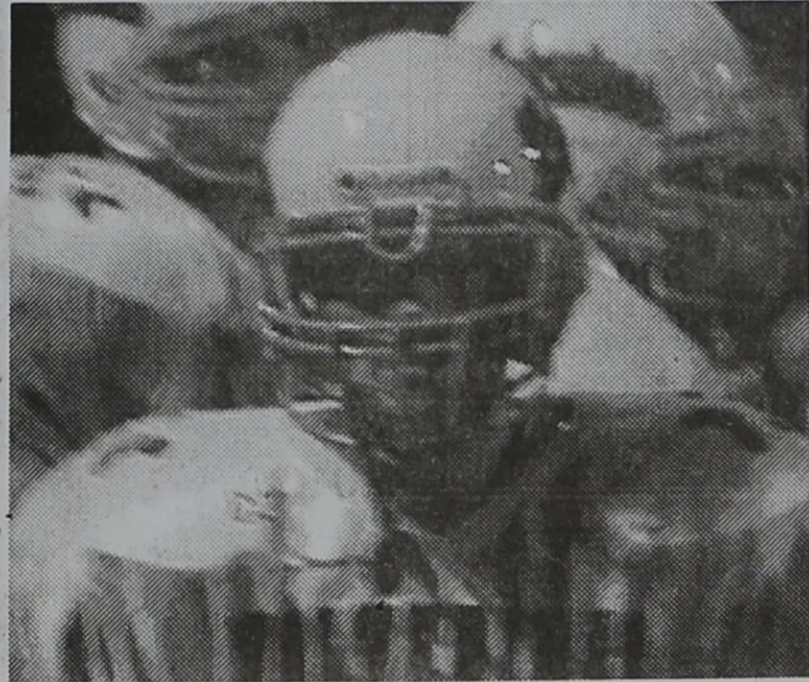

# Corn, Pierson win Parmer County races

Ed Corn and Bobbie Pierson were winners of the two locally-contested races in Parmer County.

Ed Corn, a Democrat, defeated Paul Fulcher, a Republican, 503-357, for the County Commissioner Pct. 3 (Farwell area) post.

Corn received 58% of the vote to Fulcher's 41%. Corn will replace Flo Davis on the commissioners court. Mrs. Davis was filling the unexpired term of her husband, who died earlier this year.

In the race for county tax assessor-collector, Mrs. Pierson, a Democrat, defeated Teresa Ancira, a Republican, 1,518 (56%) to 1,171 (43%).

This post was open after incumbent Doris Herington announced her retirement. Of Parmer County's 4,935

voters, 2,770 cast ballots -- 56%.

Other county candidates were unopposed:

-- County sheriff, Randy Geries, a Republican, 2,290.  
-- County attorney, Charles Aycock, a Republican, 2,238.  
-- District attorney, Johnny Atkinson, a Democrat, 1,778.

In the Presidential race, Parmer County went overwhelmingly for George Bush, the Republican. He won 2,272 votes -- 82%. Democrat Al Gore got 447 votes -- 16%.

(In the 1996 presidential race, GOP's Bob Dole got 2,042 votes to Democrat Bill Clinton's 676.)

Also, Ralph Nader got 15 votes and the Libertarian candidate for 5. Similar totals were re-

ported for U.S. Senator, with GOP's Kay Bailey Hutchison getting 2,270 (84%) and Democrat Gene Kelly, 396 (14%).

Incumbent U.S. Rep. Larry Combest, a Republican, rolled over Libertarian John Turnbow here, 2,377 (94%) to 130 (5%).

GOP's Kirk Frye was unopposed for Parmer County commissioner for Pct. 1 (the Friona area). He got 656 votes.

State Rep. Pete Laney, a Democrat, was unopposed and got 1,946 votes.

In another County Commissioner race, Tim Ashley (R) beat out Pleasant Hill resident and former Texico High School principal, Dewey Pierce (D) 2,163 votes to 1,812.

Linda Hall (D), the incumbent Curry County Treasurer was re-elected with 5,997 votes. Her opponent, Bernice Baker (R) received 5,619 votes.

Mario Trujillo (D) ran unopposed for the Curry County Clerk position.

Curry County voters went for Bill Redmond (R) for the U.S. Senator position with 6,482. Incumbent Jeff Bingaman (D) received 5,332 votes in the county. Bingaman was re-elected.

Write-in candidate Orlin Cole (R) received 8 votes in Curry County.

U.S. Representative - District 3 candidate Lisa Lutz (R) won Curry County by 5,898 votes to incumbent Tom Udall's (D) 5,785 votes. But Udall won re-election.

State Sen. Shirley Bailey, State Rep. Earlene Roberts, District Attorney Randall Harris and Scott Barthel for State Board of Education District 9 were all unopposed.

Texico Precinct 33 had 564 eligible voters. Of this total, 295 cast votes.

Curry County had 20,046 eligible voters. Of these voters, 12,000 cast votes.




