Growing up in the country had its advantages. We could pretend we were anywhere and do anything we wanted to.

Wilbur and me would go into the woods and pretend we were hunting Injuns. First, we would watch our favorite TV program, "Cowboy Buck-Aroo Bob" and then we would reenact the wild west, according to our way of what it should've

Wilbur would pretend that he was an Indian scout and I would pretend to be the Marshal. We spent countless hours in the woods, portraying our hero, Buck-Aroo Bob.

Cowboy Buck-Aroo Bob was a national hero to us kids all over the country. I can remember the times when it appeared that he was at the end of his rope. The outlook was dim, when all of a sudden, he would rely on his intelligent thinking and get himself out of a jam every week. We would sit on the edge of our seats, gripping whatever we could get our hands on, and fearfully tense ourselves, wondering if here was going to be a show the next week.

One time, Cowboy Buck-Aroo Bob was surrounded by Indians who were shooting arrows at him, just missing him by inches. He would duck just in time to avoid the arrows, then he would rise and shoot at least 16 bullets from his pearlhandled guns.

At least 20 or 30 Indians would fall from their horses when Cowboy Buck-Aroo Bob shot at them. He never ran out of bullets. Sometimes, with only one bullet left, to shoot three Indians. He would get them every time, though, and ride off into the sunset, a victorious hero.

We never stopped to think of why the Indians were chasing and shooting at him. He would just be riding along when 400 or 500 Indians would go on the warpath and start chasing

First, his horse, named Copper-Boy, would get shot and go down. Cowboy Buck-Aroo Bob would then jump off, get Copper-Boy to lay down, then Cowboy Buck-Aroo Bob would lay down behind Copper-Boy and start picking off Indians by the dozens, until they were either all dead or the remainder ran off behind the hill in the distance. When it was all over, Copper-Boy would jump back up and Cowboy Buck-Aroo Bob would mount him and holler "HI-HEY-HO" and ride off.

The only thing we didn't like about this show was that at least for 10 minutes each show, Cowboy Buck-Aroo Bob would hang around his girl friend, "Missie Pearlie." We would get sick of these times and wish that at least 600 Indians would show up and get Cowboy Buck-Aroo Bob busy shooting at them instead of kissing Missie Pearlier.

As I think about it, Cowboy Buck-Aroo Bob didn't chase outlaws very often. And he didn't have any lawmen as friends. He would just be riding along, singing to himself (at least that's what it appeared like because there was never anybody else around) and all of a sudden, a whole bunch of Indians would begin chasing him.

The Indians would come out of nowhere on a flat plain, and then when they would run away, several hills would appear in the background. Cowboys Buck-Aroo Bob's clothes never got dirty, nor did his guns ever need cleaning. His hat was never off his head (which is a good thing when he killed Missie Pearlie because it would hide their heads), and he never wasted time eating or bathing. His gunbelt was always full of bullets, even when he would finally run out of bullets in his guns and would reload.

Yessirree, Cowboy Buck-Aroo Bob was someone us kids could look up to and admire. He gave us hours upon hours of good entertainment and our imagination was never lax from imitating Cowboy Buck-Aroo Bob every day.

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



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

# New calf service opens in our area

If you've driven around eastern New Mexico or down the highway towards Lubbock, you've no doubt seen the big dairy farms that are now in operation or that are in the process of being built.


These mega-dairies are first class operations that require stringent management and superior animal maintenance and care. One aspect of these dairies are the number of baby calves being born on a daily basis.

The calves are the future of each of these operations and with the focus toward milk production, too many times, the calf operation is put on the back burner for attention.

Because of this, three local businessmen and stockmen have capitalized on the situation and are available to these dairies for a very unique, and much needed, service.

Calf-Trac calf ranch is the brainchild of Don Oppliger, Jim Abacherli and Bryon Luce. Calf-Trac is now open for business and has the capability of housing 2200 calves in hutches and 1300 in run pens. It is located northwest of the Clovis Airport, midway between the Airport Road and the Pleasant Hill Highway.

Jim Abacherli and Don Oppliger are partners on a 3000 cow dairy located just north of the calf ranch and they saw the need for quality care and raising of the calves about a year and a half ago. Their dairy has it's own calves to raise and through Jim's management and expertise, the calf program caught the attention of several dairymen.

The attention to cleanliness, feedings and calf health culminated in the idea to offer the same strict care to calves from other dairies. Calf ranches have been in operation for years in California, where Jim is from. He had first-hand knowledge of the ins-and outs of these operations and was able to help put together an ideal arrangement for this region.

One major step in putting together the calf operation was to find the perfect hands-on manager for the ranch. This person had to be an expert in the care and raising of baby dairy calves. This person was Bryon Luce.

Bryon had been working for the past 11 years for a dairy producer as his calf manager. He has a special touch with the calves and can spot problems before they get out of hand. He is a stickler for cleanliness and humane care and the three partners all agree that effective communication between themselves and the producers they are serving is a crucial factor in the overall success of raising strong, healthy and productive dairy heifers.

The program works by a producer contacting Calf-Trac and requesting service for their dairy. The calves are picked up each day and brought to the calf ranch. They are then fed, watered, vaccinated, dehorned and tracked for 130 days. The calves are then delivered back to the dairy for the remainder of their growing period.

"One key to the success of the calf growing is the health of the mother cow that delivered the calf," Jim explained. "Because of this, we require that all cows must be pre-vaccinated with a vaccination program that we specify before we enter into business for the 130 days with the dairy."

This attention to the vaccination and pre-birth health will make a critical difference in the strength of the calf and its ability to fight disease, colds and other harmful elements. This, coupled with the stark cleanliness of the calf raising areas and daily upkeep of the hutches, pens, water and grain

buckets and milk bottles almost guarantees a healthy dairy heifer being delivered back to the producer after 130 days of

Another added benefit to the producers is that the heifer will come back to the dairy stanchion trained. This is a big factor in a dairy operation. If a heifer or cow is apprehensive or scared of the feeding stanchion area or the stanchion itself, then her feed intakes suffer. Because of the run pen structure and the staging of the calves from one area to another, the stanchion training is very subtle, yet very effective.

The Calf-Trac calf ranch is a very secure operation that has been designed with the producers confidence and calf security in mind.

The ranch sits on 40 acres and is surrounded by secure chain link fence. One has to enter through a locked gate only after calling ahead for clearance. This was done for security purposes but also for reasons of disease and infection control for the calves.

The hutch calves are only fed powdered milk replacer by bottle only. Bucket calves have been the norm for most dairies, but by bottle feeding, Jim and Bryon feel that this helps to break the disease cycle that calves are exposed to through other feeding options.

The ranch currently employs eight full time employees and will increase that number to 15 by the time the ranch is completely full and complete. The operation requires this many people for the attention to detail and calf care. Don and Jim's dairy houses 1100 calves and employees seven full time people for calf care alone.

"Calves are the future of all the dairies and we must all pay attention to them to assure good health, longevity and milk production," Jim stated. "Excellent herds start with excellent calves."

Calf-Trac Custom Calf Raising is an opportunity whose timing is perfect for the growing market and industry that this area is attracting. It is a unique opportunity for three future-sighted entrepreneurs and area dairy producers. It is also a very interesting operation.

Perhaps the Calf-Trac slogan says it best: "Our Only Interest is in Your Future."

And with what the future holds for the dairy industry in this region, Calf-Trac appears to be on the right track.


Texico, with a 4-5 regular season record and runnerup spot in its district, was a heavy underdog to Ft. Sumner, which was 9-1 coming into the game.

Curry County had 20,046 eligible voters. Of these voters, 12,000 cast votes.

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
